10:01 a.m.

Her Honour the Lieutenant Governor entered the Chamber and took her seat upon the Throne.

The Hon. Ms. Joan Beatty, Provincial Secretary, then said:

I am commanded by Her Honour, the Lieutenant Governor, to inform you that she does not see fit to declare the causes of the summoning of the present Legislature until later today, when the Legislative Assembly shall have elected a Speaker according to law.

Her Honour the Lieutenant Governor then retired from the Chamber.

10:03 a.m.

ELECTION OF SPEAKER

Pursuant to the provisions of Rules 27, 28, and 29 inclusive, the Assembly proceeded to the election of a Speaker.

The Clerk informed the Assembly that the following Members declared their intention to stand as candidates for election to the Office of Speaker:

Ms. Doreen Hamilton, Member for the Constituency of Regina Wascana Plains
(Sessional Paper No. 43)

Mr. Myron Kowalsky, Member for the Constituency of Prince Albert Carlton
(Sessional Paper No. 44)

Members then proceeded to cast their ballots.

The Clerk, being satisfied that the voting procedure had been completed, proceeded with the counting of the ballots.

At 10:28 a.m. the sitting was recessed during the counting of the ballots.

At 10:39 a.m. the sitting resumed and the Clerk informed the Assembly that Mr. Kowalsky, Member for the Constituency of Prince Albert Carlton, had been duly elected to the Office of the Speaker.

The Clerk having declared Mr. Myron Kowalsky, duly elected, he was conducted to the chair where, standing on the dais, he addressed the Assembly as follows:

I wish to express my grateful thanks and humble acknowledgement of the high honour the Assembly has conferred on me. While I leave the floor of this Assembly to take the Speaker's chair, I leave behind all political partisan biases in order that I may discharge with impartiality to all and to the best of my ability the various and important duties pertaining to the high office of Speaker.

It will be my aim and duty to uphold the principles and traditions of the Assembly and secure for each Member the right to express his or her opinions within the limits necessary to preserve decorum; to recognize the rights and privileges of the Honourable Members, the political groups and the Assembly itself; to facilitate the transaction of the public business in an orderly manner; and, above all, to seek to be fair and impartial in the decisions you entrust to me.

Thereupon The Speaker took the chair, and the mace was laid on the Table.

The Assembly recessed from 10:49 a.m. until 2:00 p.m.

2:01 p.m.

Her Honour the Lieutenant Governor re-entered the Chamber and took her seat upon the Throne.

The Speaker then addressed Her Honour to the following effect:

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOUR:

The Legislative Assembly has elected me to the Office of Speaker. If, in the performance of my duties, I should at any time fall into error I pray that the fault may be imputed to me and not to the Assembly, whose servant I am. On behalf of the Assembly and its Members it is my duty to claim all their traditional rights and privileges, especially that they may have freedom of speech in their debates, access to your person at all reasonable times, and that their proceedings may receive from you the most favourable consideration.

The Hon. Ms. Beatty, Provincial Secretary, then said:

I am commanded by Her Honour the Lieutenant Governor to declare to you that she freely confides in the duty and attachment of the Assembly to Her Majesty's person and Government. Her Honour is confident that the Assembly's proceedings will be conducted with wisdom and prudence and grants the Assembly's claim to its traditional rights and privileges.

I am commanded also to assure you that the Assembly shall have ready access to Her Honour upon all reasonable occasions and that their proceedings, as well as your words and actions, will constantly receive from her the most favourable construction.

SPEECH FROM THE THRONE

Her Honour the Lieutenant Governor was then pleased to open the Session with the following Speech:

Mr. Speaker, Members of the Legislature, Honoured Guests, Citizens:

Welcome to the opening session of the 25th Legislature of the Province of Saskatchewan.

Following the democratic choices of the people of Saskatchewan, this Legislature begins its work at a unique time in our history.

Today, we stand on the eve of Saskatchewan's second century.

We are now just months away from the celebration of our Centennial. It will be a year in which we celebrate the long remarkable history of Aboriginal peoples in our province. It will be a year in which we

will remember the immigrant pioneers who came from every corner of the globe and made this a multicultural and richly diverse place. It will be a year in which we celebrate the accomplishments of our people over the past ten decades, and all that they have contributed to the uniqueness and quality of life that is ours in Saskatchewan.

This Legislature will guide us into that new century. As we look to the future, our government recognizes many challenges that confront us today. Working with our citizens, our government intends to take on these challenges and make this province ready for our future. The changes necessary to take us into the future must begin today. Our task is to make Saskatchewan ready for the next generation.

Making Saskatchewan Ready for the Next Generation

Our next generation will strengthen Saskatchewan and improve the quality of life for us all through their creativity, their strengths, their flexibility and their pragmatism. They are the young people of today -- Aboriginal youth and the young from across the province, the country and indeed the world. To prepare the way for them to become the pioneers of the next century and to find their futures in Saskatchewan is the central vision and goal of our government.

As our government said when we sought a mandate last November, we believe that making our province ready for the next century means working today to make Saskatchewan even more youth-friendly; it means building a green and prosperous economy that includes a new role for our Crown utilities and investments; and it means building quality of life in health care for all generations, to support healthy families, neighbourhoods and communities.

It is now the mandate of our government that the doors of opportunity to all our citizens, particularly the young, be opened as we begin our next century.

We will do so in our unique Saskatchewan character.

We have a distinct way of achieving our goals, a special style that combines creativity with flexibility. Engaging in a partnership with Saskatchewan people, our government will deliver this mandate in that same style of imagination and realism, balancing our dreams against day-to-day realities.

Education and Opportunity

To enable young people to gain skills and begin careers, with our educational partners, we will begin to implement the Career Start Program. Career Start will prepare youth for career opportunities here in Saskatchewan and connect youth to jobs.

Our government will further implement our unique School^{Plus} model at the elementary and secondary school levels, and will expand that program this year.

For our very young, we will add more child care spaces.

We will establish Green Teams, bringing together young people, jobs and the building of a greener Saskatchewan.

For students launching their careers, we will expand the youth recruitment plan beyond the Crown Corporations to include the broader public service. We will invite the co-operative movement, Métis and First Nations people, and the private sector to join us.

For our graduates, we will enhance the Post-Secondary Graduate Tax Credit program.

The opening of the Canadian Light Source Synchrotron, the single largest science project in Canada, will attract researchers from around the globe and foster a new era of research and innovation.

We will celebrate and encourage our youth in recreation, sport and culture.

It is the flagship goal of our government that, in this term and in this first decade of our second century, Saskatchewan will become more youth friendly and the first choice in opportunity for all of our youth. Their future and our province's future are one. With the Young Rotarians of Saskatchewan, we say, "Our future is wide open and your future is here!"

Building a Green and Prosperous Economy

But opening the doors of opportunity to the next generation means even more than offering the tools of education and training. All of our citizens, and in particular our youth, require the opportunities that can only be found in a vibrant economic atmosphere and expanding province. Our economy is built on exports. We are Canada's most significant trading economy, and many of those opportunities for our youth will be found in trade.

With vigour, our government intends to build a green and prosperous economy.

Over the course of this term, our government will begin to host annual summits of Saskatchewan people to focus our common efforts in achieving economic, environmental and social progress. The first Saskatchewan Summit will be held this fall.

Immigration will be key in meeting the needs of an expanding economy, and serving to provide growth in our population. Our government will build an aggressive immigration strategy. A new program, Open Up Saskatchewan, will begin to unfold during this session in partnership with the Federal Government, communities, workplaces, and educational institutions. We will immediately increase the number of nominees this year in the Immigrant Nominee Program.

The foundations of a green and prosperous economy are established upon Saskatchewan's abundant natural resource base in our southern agricultural lands, our northern forests, and our mineral wealth across the province.

In partnership with farm families, farm organizations and rural communities, our government will strive to expand opportunities in agri-business and for farm families. We will seek to ensure that young people have as one of their choices the opportunity to work on the land. We will create an integrated, value-added and research-based new agricultural economy.

This is our hope for the future. Today, however, the highest agricultural priority for our government is to work with the livestock industry and other governments to open the borders to the export of Saskatchewan livestock. Anticipating the reopening of borders, we will vigorously pursue our plans to expand the livestock industry. To further assist the industry in the coming year, the Saskatchewan Research Council plans to develop and apply technologies for disease identification and animal traceability.

In forestry, the Centennial year will see the official opening of the new forest centre in Prince Albert, which showcases Saskatchewan wood products and energy efficient technologies. It will provide

information for innovation, undertake research, and support Saskatchewan companies to be competitive internationally.

The forests of our north, the mineral wealth of our north, the beauty and hospitality of the diverse communities across our north will play an expanding role in a green and prosperous economy, opening new opportunities for the young people of our north.

We will see growth in our mining sector that will keep us in the forefront of that industry in Canada. Our goal is to see Saskatchewan take its rightful place as the centre of mining activity in the nation. We are dominant in world markets in uranium and potash. We anticipate further development in the uranium industry and further expansion of the potash industry. We have changed the royalty and incentive structure in mining to allow for greater development of traditional minerals, and we will work with industry and communities to expand into new areas of mining such as diamonds.

And our government believes that Saskatchewan has a bright future with energy. Our vast energy potential will be dominant in our province's economic growth.

The energy resources beneath the ground will be aggressively pursued.

During this session, our government will work with industry to expand CO₂ injection projects in the oilpatch, both stimulating the industry and reducing greenhouse gases. We will work with industry to enhance recovery of Saskatchewan's immense heavy oil reserves.

Recent discoveries of new natural gas reserves will continue to expand our vital natural gas industry.

We seek to unlock the vast potential of our oil and gas resources for the North American energy market.

As our major coal reserves continue to provide the source for electricity generation, Saskatchewan will play a major role in working towards clean coal technology. The government and its Crown utilities will seek opportunities to research and explore coal gasification as a potential source of new energy.

By the close of this century, however, our energy sources may well be those that come from above the ground. It is the vision of our government that Saskatchewan should lead in these new energy resources, such as wind, ethanol, bio-fuels, solar and hydrogen.

Building on Saskatchewan's Ethanol Strategy, our government welcomes the recent announcements of significant ethanol production in Lloydminster and Weyburn. We look forward to future ethanol and bio-fuel developments. We anticipate the inclusion of cleaner fuel in the Saskatchewan marketplace and the export of grain-based fuels to the North American market.

We will further enhance green power generated by the wind.

And our government will lead in placing Saskatchewan at the centre of the 21st century hydrogen revolution. Our goal, in the next decade, is to make Saskatchewan the national model in researching and demonstrating hydrogen as a new source of energy.

The Saskatchewan Research Council and a partner in the private sector have developed the world's first truck fuelled by a combination of diesel and hydrogen.

A green and prosperous economy goes beyond what we have established in our natural resources. New industries in tourism, culture, and information technology will continue to diversify and expand our economy.

Tourism can be expected to increase in our Centennial year as we celebrate our anniversary and as we host major national events such as the 2005 Canada Summer Games. We expect to see a road built from LaLoche, Saskatchewan to Fort McMurray, Alberta, increasing trade and jobs in both provinces. The road will also increase tourism in the north.

Culture will continue to be a significant contributor to the economy. For example, the film industry alone is expected to contribute \$45 million to the economy in the coming year. The Saskatchewan-based and produced television comedy *Corner Gas* has seized the attention of Canadians across the country, providing a valuable insight into Saskatchewan wit, satire and culture.

As we build this green and prosperous economy, our government believes that our publicly owned utilities and Crown investments should also play an important role in the quality of life in our province and in our economic development.

Our Crown utilities, built by past and present generations, should serve the next generation of Saskatchewan citizens.

To this end, our government will entrench the principle of public ownership of the Crown utilities in legislation during this session.

To this end, our government will develop the means to achieve our commitment to ensuring basic utility prices that, as a bundle on an annual basis, will provide Saskatchewan families with the lowest cost package from utility providers in Canada.

Our Crown utilities and Crown assets will be used in such a way as to foster economic opportunities for our next century and the next generation. During this session, Investment Saskatchewan will seek private sector management of its assets and will begin to build a pool of private and public sector capital to further expand the Saskatchewan economy.

This year, our government will establish The Young Entrepreneurs of Saskatchewan program. Existing assets and private sector capital will be used to help new, start-up business activity and community-based economic development. Under the stewardship of highly qualified business and community leaders, and joined by a pool of experienced business mentors, funds will be available to young entrepreneurs and community-based, small and start-up enterprises.

More than any previous generation, our youth are calling for a green Saskatchewan and a green, sustainable economy for their future.

Our government has heard their voice. We will pursue an agenda of energy conservation. We have taken immediate steps with programs such as the establishment of the Office of Energy Conservation, the Energy Star appliance rebate program, upcoming retrofits of public buildings across Saskatchewan, and Energuide for Houses.

And during this term, our government will unveil a Green Strategy to ensure the sustainability of our resources, the future of Saskatchewan water resources, sustainability of economic and community

development, and the preservation and enhancement of our province's natural beauty. Working with Saskatchewan people and communities, we will take this Green Strategy to reality.

A vibrant, green and prosperous economy will open doors to our next generation and allow them to build their futures here. It will be an economy of strength. It will be an economy that will allow all Saskatchewan people to dream big and find the quality of life they want for themselves and their families.

Quality of Life

Our government believes that for the sake of our elders and seniors today, for the benefit of families and communities, and for our next generation, our economic progress must result in social progress. Nowhere is this more true than in the provision of health care and in services that support healthy citizens, healthy homes, neighbourhoods and communities.

During this session, our government will introduce a plan to maintain balance in the provincial budget. We will be confronted by difficult budgetary choices. But we must make these choices if we are to provide the health care services Saskatchewan people want and need for themselves and their families.

Guided by the Saskatchewan Action Plan on Health, we will continue to do more for health care. The public expects that our health resources meet the most pressing needs of the people. To achieve this, our government will assess how health dollars are used with a view to ensuring that resources are used most effectively for the benefit of Saskatchewan people.

We will do more to reduce waiting times for surgery and diagnostic imaging, both of which are top priorities of the people of this province. Our government will also ask for people to take a more assertive role in promoting and protecting their own health, that of their families and that of their communities. We will heighten our focus on tobacco control by introducing legislation that will ban smoking in public places across Saskatchewan in 2005. We will also introduce a strategy to assess and support people with cognitive disabilities, which include Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder.

Our goal of providing the best public health care in Canada goes beyond health services themselves. Housing is a key determinant of health, and one of the most significant new programs our government will introduce will be a new housing strategy. This five-year housing plan will help thousands of low-income families to establish quality and affordable homes – for many that means living the dream of owning a home. Homes allow families to build their independence and provide stability for their children. Communities across the province will be strengthened as these housing investments are made.

Healthy families require healthy workplaces and fair return for labour.

In this session, Saskatchewan will introduce amendments to *The Labour Standards Act* to allow people to take advantage of compassionate care benefits when caring for gravely ill family members. Our government will continue to implement an Action Plan on Workplace Health and Safety. Our government will conduct regular reviews of the minimum wage.

Building healthy families and communities requires support for our neighbours in need. During this session, two key areas in the Building Independence program – the Saskatchewan Employment Supplement and Family Health Benefits -- will be enhanced to ensure these programs continue to support low-income working families.

In this term, our government will release a comprehensive disability strategy that supports people with disabilities so that they can be included in the social and economic life of our communities and province.

This year, the Legislature will be asked to enact significant new legislation to improve the safety and security of our neighbourhoods.

This will build on the spirit and vitality of our communities. This spirit was demonstrated in Regina when it hosted the Grey Cup in 2003; it was demonstrated by the community of Shaunavon when it hosted Hockey Day in Canada last month; it was demonstrated last week when Saskatoon hosted the Nokia Brier, and it will be demonstrated throughout Saskatchewan as we all celebrate our 100th birthday as a province next year.

This year, the Voluntary Sector Initiative will move into its second phase, with the goal of strengthening and supporting Saskatchewan's volunteers, communities and families.

Like bluffs of poplar that rise on Saskatchewan's prairie, for generations we have gathered to live in community. The quality of life in our province has been shaped by community. Looking to the next century, we seek to build stable and growing rural communities and vibrant, diverse urban communities. In our villages, towns, neighbourhoods and cities, we have benefited from the labour and investment of those who preceded us. The next generation should equally benefit from our efforts today.

Conclusion

The challenges that confront us in making Saskatchewan ready for the next generation are many.

Building a balanced budget plan will not be easy. Our government, however, is prepared to make difficult but necessary choices to ensure our quality of life, to ensure the quality of our health care and to ensure the next generation is not saddled with this generation's debt.

In shaping our future, our government will seek to engage the people of Saskatchewan and our partners in governance. We will seek new directions and new strategies with municipal leaders. We will seek new directions with our partners in education, and begin the challenging work in providing for the funding of education. We will seek new partnerships and solutions with Aboriginal governments. And we will seek a stronger Saskatchewan and a stronger Canada by tackling fair equalization, health care, and the fiscal imbalance, in co-operation with the Council of the Federation and the national government.

Mr. Speaker, Members of the Legislature, Honoured Guests, Citizens of Saskatchewan, making life even better for Saskatchewan families in every region of our province, with focus on supporting the future of our young people in their own province, is our government's vision.

As we move forward, we will do so in the unique Saskatchewan style of creativity, flexibility and pragmatism, imbued throughout with the spirit of optimism for the future that is the hallmark of our people.

Many of us have seen the barn north of Aylesbury with the words "Risk n Hope" painted on its roof. That barn and hundreds like it were built by a generation of young pioneers who came to risk and build their future in a province of hope. On the eve of our Centennial, our vision is to make Saskatchewan ready for the next generation who will risk and build their lives in a province of hope.

An agenda of change has been put before you. May you work together so that we may achieve it.

May Divine Providence continue to bless our province and guide this Legislature in all its deliberations.

God Save the Queen.

Mr. Speaker, under Rule 26(2), cast his vote in favour of the motion and stated his reason to be as follows:

The Clerk has announced that there is an equality of votes for and against the motion. Before voting I feel it appropriate to outline the principles used to guide the Speaker when casting a vote.

In parliamentary assemblies in the Westminster tradition, a central principle underlying the system is the impartiality of the Speaker. Both Erskine May and Beauchesne state the following:

Confidence in the impartiality of the Speaker is an indispensable condition of the successful working of procedure, and many conventions exist which have as their object, not only to ensure the impartiality of the Speaker but also, to ensure that his impartiality is generally recognized. He takes no part in debate in the House. He votes only when the voices are equal, and then only in accordance with rules which preclude an expression of opinion upon the merits of a question. [May, 22nd ed., p. 90; Beauchesne, 6th ed., p. 49]

The principle that the Speaker votes only to break a tie is enshrined in both legislation and Rules in the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan.

The Legislative Assembly and Executive Council Act states as follows:

Section 18: Questions arising in the Assembly shall be decided by a majority of votes, other than that of the Speaker or acting Speaker, but, where there is an equality of votes, the Speaker or acting Speaker has a vote.

The Rules and Procedures of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan state the following:

Rule 26(1) The Speaker shall not take part in any debate before the Assembly.

Rule 26(2) In case of an equality of votes, the Speaker shall give a casting vote, and any reasons stated by him shall be entered in the *Journal*.

Under these rules, the Speaker is obliged to vote when the voices are equal. How then does the Speaker vote? *Marleau and Montpetit* (p. 268) summarize parliamentary convention in this area as follows:

In theory, the Speaker has the same freedom as any other Member to vote in accordance with his or her conscience; however, the exercise of this responsibility could involve the Speaker in partisan debate, which would adversely affect the confidence of the House in the Speaker's impartiality. Therefore, certain conventions have developed as a guide to Speakers (and Chairmen in a Committee of the Whole) in the infrequent exercise of the casting vote. Concisely put, the Speaker would normally vote to maintain the *status quo*.

Canadian and British authorities describe these principles or conventions as follows:

- (1) The Chair should always vote for further discussion;
- (2) Where no further discussion is possible, important decisions should not be taken except by a majority;
- (3) Where amendments to a bill are involved, the bill should be left in its existing form.

Generally, the Chair votes to maintain the *status quo* regarding the motion and leaves the matter open for future consideration.

That the Speaker should follow these principles rather than any partisan position was reinforced when this legislature unanimously made the decision to select a Speaker by secret ballot of the elected members instead of by appointment by the Premier.

These principles also apply to a vote of confidence. The vote on the Address in Reply to the Speech from the Throne is traditionally viewed as a question of confidence. In our parliamentary system, a question of confidence is a motion which, if defeated, indicates that the Government has lost the confidence of the House and is thus unable to continue in office.

In general, the principle that applies in this instance is that decisions of the legislature should be taken only by a majority. In a vote such as this one, that is a test of the Assembly's confidence in the Government, the decision of non-confidence should be clearly stated by a majority. It would not be appropriate for the vote of the Speaker alone to overturn the *status quo* as determined in the last election.

I therefore vote in favour of the motion to adopt the Address in Reply to the Throne Speech.

The motion is carried.

Henry Harold Peter Baker, who passed away on March 4, 2004, was a Member of this Legislative Assembly from 1964 until 1982 representing the constituencies of Regina East, Regina South East, Regina Wascana, and Regina Victoria for the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation and the New Democratic Party.

Mr. Baker was born on the family farm near Lipton on November 24, 1915. He received his early education at local schools before graduating from teacher's college in Regina. Later he pursued his education in Chicago, where he studied business engineering and personnel administration. Mr. Baker married Helen Sauer on May 31, 1942 and together they had one daughter.

Mr. Baker's first career was as a teacher. He taught in elementary and high schools and spent two years instructing R.C.A.F. air crew personnel. Mr. Baker then became the Secretary of the Public Service Commission, a position he held for fourteen years. Mr. Baker was active in a number of community organizations, including the Frontiersmen and the Boy Scouts.

Mr. Baker's dedication to his fellow citizens was evident in his lengthy service in civic and provincial affairs. He was an alderman on the Regina City Council for three years before his election as Mayor for the first time in 1959. He continued to lead the council until 1970 and then for a second period from 1974 until 1979. He was Regina's longest serving mayor. At the provincial level, Mr. Baker was first elected to this Assembly as a member of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation party in the 1964 general election. He retained his seat in the following three elections as a member of the New Democratic Party.

Mr. Koskie practiced law before being elected to this Assembly in the 1975 general election. He was re-elected in the following four elections. Mr. Koskie served in the cabinets of two premiers. He held the Social Services and Consumer Affairs portfolios in the Blakeney administration. Later in 1992, Mr. Koskie was appointed Minister of Highways and Transportation by Roy Romanow.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER

On Thursday, April 8, 2004, the Member for the Battlefords (Hon. Mr. Taylor) raised a point of order concerning the quotation of electronic mail in debate. The Member cited paragraphs 498 and 499 of the Sixth Edition of *Beauchesne's Parliamentary Rules and Forms* to make a case that electronic mail, like telegrams, should not be quoted in the Assembly because there is no way of ensuring the authenticity of the signature. He went on to argue that if it is permissible to quote electronic mail in the Assembly, then the Member should be required to indicate who has written the e-mail. I have reviewed this issue with respect to the Assembly's practice and the applicable parliamentary authorities.

Marleau and Monpetit's *House of Commons Procedure and Practice* states on page 517 that Members may quote from private correspondence as long as they identify the sender by name or take full responsibility for its contents. Members of the House of Commons have been required to take responsibility for the contents of unsigned or anonymous letters. This is wholly consistent with the practices of this Assembly. Members are at liberty to quote signed and unsigned letters as they wish to support an argument. They are not required to identify the sender of a letter but then they are required to take responsibility for the contents of what they quote. This extends to both the content and the accuracy of the material they cite. There is one exception to this practice, which relates to the Members' responsibility for the content of a quotation. It is out of order to read any document that contains language that would be out of order if spoken by the Member directly.

While on the topic of citing correspondence, I want to remind the Assembly that Private Members are not obliged to table documents cited in debate. If a Minister quotes a letter, it must be tabled on request.

Given the Assembly's practice on the quotation of documents, it is the Speaker's ruling that electronic mail may be quoted without identifying the author, but it can only be done so if the Member takes full responsibility for its content. With respect to the propriety of electronic mail, it is the Speaker's ruling that it is to be treated the same as any other document or correspondence that is cited in the Assembly.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER

Yesterday the Government House Leader (Hon. Mr. Van Mulligen) raised a Point of Order regarding a statement made by the Member for Melville-Saltcoats (Mr. Bjornerud). The Government House Leader said: "the member imputed that the Premier personally benefited from tax increases by – in the member's words – by putting the money in his pocket." I have reviewed Hansard on this matter and find that the member for Melville-Saltcoats did indeed use the words: "He raised our taxes, put it in his pocket."

This statement alone can be interpreted several ways. On one hand the fact that it caused disruption in the Assembly indicates that several members felt the statement was offensive. On the other hand when the Government House Leader and the Opposition House Leader (Mr. Gantefer) spoke to the Point of Order, both House Leaders acknowledged that there was no attempt on the part of the Member for Melville-Saltcoats to imply wrong doing. It is also on record that the Member for Melville-Saltcoats later clarified his intent with the following statement: “. . . but I know the Premier had no personal gain.”

When ruling in a case like this, the Speaker is obligated to take into account actual words said and the effect of the words used. I accept the statement of both House Leaders and the Member for Melville-Saltcoats that the words used were not meant to imply wrong doing on the part of the Premier. I also wish to emphasize that it is unparliamentary for any member to state that another member put money in his/her pocket. I refer Members to *Marleau and Montpetit* page 522: “Remarks directed specifically at another Member which question that Member’s integrity, honesty or character are not in order.” I therefore rule the line “put it in his pocket” is personally directed and therefore out of order and ask the Member from Melville-Saltcoats to withdraw that statement.

Thereupon, Mr. Bjornerud withdrew his remarks.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER

Ruling on a Question of Privilege

At 11:20 a.m. today, in accordance with Rule 7(1), the Opposition House Leader (Mr. Gantfoer) gave notice that he proposed to raise a question of privilege. I thank the Member for providing notice and documents related to his case. I also want to thank the Government House Leader (Hon. Mr. Van Mulligen) for his intervention. I have had the opportunity to review the case and some of the literature involved.

In his case, the Opposition House Leader stated that a staff member of his caucus was denied access to a technical briefing on the 2004 annual report of the Saskatchewan Water Corporation. The decision to prohibit the attendance of the staff member, in the opinion of the Opposition House Leader, constitutes a breach of Members' parliamentary privilege.

The basis of the Member's case is a ruling by the Speaker of the House of Commons, made March 19, 2001. In that ruling Speaker Milliken found that the denial of Members or their staff to an embargoed technical briefing for media on a bill constituted a prima facie contempt of Parliament. The Speaker's finding was later supported and reinforced by a review conducted on the matter by the House of Commons' Standing Committee on Procedure and House Affairs.

I want to remind Members that under Rule 1 of the *Rules and Procedures of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan*, in all cases not provided for, the usages and customs of the House of Commons of Canada, as in force at the time, shall be followed, so far as they may be applicable. I have surveyed the precedents of this Assembly and find none directly applicable to the denial of access of Members or their staff from technical briefings.

In making his ruling, Speaker Milliken acknowledged that lock-ups and embargoed technical briefings for a long time had been the way parliamentary business was conducted at the House of Commons. He also stated very clearly that previous Speakers had consistently ruled that it is not a breach of privilege to exclude Members from lock-ups. However, it was his point of view that the denial of information Members needed to do their work was a key consideration in the case at the House of Commons when Members and their staff were denied access to technical briefings. Speaker Milliken stated the following: "To deny to Members information concerning business that is about to come before the House, while at the same time providing such information to the media that will likely be questioning Members about the business, is a situation the Chair cannot condone." Despite this being a departure from previous rulings of the chair, the House of Commons Standing Committee on Procedure and House Affairs supported the ruling.

In Saskatchewan, Speakers have admonished the government for releasing bills to the public before their introduction to the Assembly. Such infractions were not considered a breach of privilege. However, this Assembly has no case as close as the Milliken ruling I have just cited. Despite that case relating to a technical briefing on a bill, it is important to understand that, whether a bill or a report, the principles underscored by the House of Commons committee remain the same. That principle is that nothing should be done that disadvantages or impedes Members from carrying out their parliamentary functions. Speaker

Milliken noted in his ruling that the practice of media lock-ups and embargoed technical briefings, whether they be on bills, budgets or Auditor General reports, are successful and useful when Members and their staff are given access.

Given the Milliken ruling, and the findings of the House of Commons Committee on Procedure and House Affairs, as well as taking into consideration arguments made to this Assembly, I believe it would be appropriate for the Assembly to consider the direction that this Assembly wishes to take on this matter. Therefore, I find the Opposition House Leader has made a sufficient case for me to find a prima facie case of breach of privilege. I invite the Member to make his motion.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER

Yesterday, the Government House Leader (Hon. Mr. Van Mulligen) raised a point of order concerning an apology made to this Assembly by the Member for Thunder Creek (Mr. Stewart) for remarks made off the record during Oral Question Period on April 14, 2005. The Government House Leader asked for a ruling as to whether Members' Statements during Routine Proceedings is an appropriate place to deal with a point of order; whether an apology must be the result of a point of order, and thirdly whether the apology offered by the Member for Thunder Creek was made unequivocally.

I have reviewed the record and it is clear that an apology was made directly to the affected Member, the Deputy Premier (Hon. Mr. Serby), and also to the Assembly. The Member withdrew the unparliamentary language with the following words, which I quote from Hansard, page 2531: "... During question period on Thursday, Mr. Speaker, I directed comments towards the Member from Yorkton, and in so doing I used unparliamentary language. Mr. Speaker, I wish to apologize to the member and to this Hon. Assembly for, and to retract that particular language." I find that there was no equivocation in the Member's apology.

With respect to when and how the apology was offered, there is nothing within the rules or practices of this Assembly that prohibit a Member from making an apology in the absence of a point of order nor during Members' Statements. Rule 12(3) states that "Members may make statements about any subject of interest or concern."

The point of order raised by the Government House Leader is not well taken.

With respect to language usage in the Assembly I do want to emphasize the necessity for Members of this Assembly to be able to exercise freedom of speech and at the same time respect the integrity of the Assembly and personal integrity of all members. Beaudesne Citation 494, p. 151: "It is not unparliamentary temperately to criticize statements made by Members as being contrary to the facts; but no imputation of intentional falsehood is permissible." Marleau and Montpetit, p. 525: "The proceedings of the House are based on a long-standing tradition of respect for the integrity of all Members. Thus, the use of offensive, provocative or threatening language in the House is strictly forbidden. Personal attacks, insults and obscene language or words are not in order."

I bring this to Members' attention because the lack of respect members occasionally show one another in the House reflects upon the entire body of MLA's and thus on the institution itself.

I therefore remind all Members to be respectful of our parliamentary rules and processes which have withstood the test of time.

As Members exercise the responsibility given to them by the electorate, they should respect the privilege of free speech through vigorous debate of issues while making conscious effort to refrain from intemperate and personal attacks.

Gordon Samuel MacMurchy, who passed away on April 20, 2005, was a Member of this Legislative Assembly from 1971 until 1982. He represented the constituencies of Last Mountain and Last Mountain - Touchwood for the New Democratic Party.

Mr. MacMurchy was born on July 4, 1926 in Semans. He received his early education at Alexandra School and later graduated from the Semans High School. Mr. MacMurchy married Jean Neff on September 7, 1949 and together they raised three children.

Mr. MacMurchy volunteered his time with a variety of local organizations, ranging from community boards to his church. He was a prominent supporter and participant in amateur sports such as hockey and baseball. He was inducted into the Saskatchewan Baseball Hall of Fame in 1989 and awarded their Special Merit award in recognition of his years as an athlete, coach and referee.

Mr. MacMurchy's concern for the well being of the communities in which he lived was evident in his lengthy record of public service. He was first chosen to represent his community as a trustee on the Govan School Board. Later, Mr. MacMurchy served as mayor of Semans for fifteen years and as chairman of the Living Sky Health District board from 1982 until 2002. In his private life, Mr. MacMurchy was a farmer. This background led him in 1982 to set up the Family Farm Foundation which encouraged research and public education on family farming issues.

Mr. MacMurchy's dedication to a life of public service was recognized by his investiture into the Saskatchewan Order of Merit in 1999. He was also awarded a lifetime membership in the Saskatchewan Urban Municipalities Association.

Mr. MacMurchy was first elected to this Assembly in 1971 and successfully retained his seat in the following two elections. He served in the cabinet of Premier Blakeney throughout his tenure in this House. He was responsible for a number of portfolios, including Education, Continuing Education, Municipal Affairs and Agriculture. Mr. MacMurchy's interest in politics extended beyond elected office. He was active in the New Democratic Party and served in several capacities, including director and president of the party.

In recording its own deep sense of loss and bereavement, this Assembly expresses its most sincere sympathy with members of the bereaved family.

Her Honour The Lieutenant Governor, having entered the Chamber, took her seat upon the Throne. Her Honour was then pleased to deliver the following speech:

Mr. Speaker, Members of the Legislature:

It is my duty to release you from further attendance at the First Session of The Twenty-Fifth Legislature.

In thus relieving you, I would like to thank you for the work done and progress made.

This Session's work included preparation for, and celebration of a milestone event – Saskatchewan's Centennial; a year in which to remember our heritage, pay tribute to our past, and to thank our citizens who have contributed much to the success of our province. It was a year to honour the uniqueness and diversity of the citizens of Saskatchewan by celebrating the accomplishments of our past, with a forward look to the next generation and our future.

It was also a year in which you recognized and celebrated the remarkable achievements of Aboriginal peoples and the immigrant pioneers of our province. We were proud to designate 2005 as the Year of the First Nations and Métis Women. This year was also made memorable in marking the Year of the Veteran, which gave us the opportunity to recognize those generations who dedicated and risked their lives for the sake of our future. We can all be proud of the significant progress made in readying our province for generations to come.

This year's accomplishments focused on providing our youth with quality educational and training programs, accompanied by employment opportunities, and to continuing our commitment to provide a green and prosperous economy, and improving the quality of life for our youth, elders, seniors and families, with supports that enable and facilitate healthy rural and urban communities.

You unveiled an "Action Plan for the Economy: A New Century of Opportunity", in response to the successful Centennial Summit of January, 2005. The plan contains 81 actions to encourage economic growth and to build on our natural strengths and the competitive advantages of our key economic sectors.

Along with the recognition that Saskatchewan is an affordable place, boasting a clean environment in which to live and raise a family, you continued to promote the fact that feeling safe in one's community is a right, not a privilege. In carrying out this commitment, legislation was passed that directly supports keeping our communities safe for all citizens of our province.

The Safer Communities and Neighbourhoods Act improves community safety by providing for additional tools for police and justice agencies to utilize, in the goal of targeting residences, buildings and lands that are routinely used for specified illegal activities and prohibit and put a stop to illegal, criminal activities occurring in our neighbourhoods.

To ensure the safety of emergency service workers, good Samaritans and victims of crime, you passed *The Mandatory Testing and Disclosure (Bodily Substances) Act*. This legislation protects those who help others and provides peace of mind to those who may be exposed to another person's infected blood or bodily fluid. If there is cause to believe that an individual may have come into contact with an infectious disease and the person who may already be infected refuses to be tested voluntarily, this legislation will set out a Court guided process for the source person to be tested on a confidential basis.

The Criminal Enterprise Suppression Act provides that, if the Court is satisfied that the owner or manager of a business is a member of a criminal organization, the police can apply to the Court to cancel and withhold licenses needed to operate the business. In addition to this, you passed *The Seizure of Criminal Property Act*, which takes the profit out of crime by allowing for property that is the product of an unlawful act, or property owned by an individual committing unlawful acts, to be seized and sold by order of the Court.

In your commitment to have an inclusive, fair and just society that serves all citizens of this province, you amended *The Police Amendment Act, 2005*, to increase First Nations and Métis community input into the police complaints process.

To enhance consumer protection, promote privacy, accuracy and fairness in the consumer credit marketplace, you passed *The Credit Reporting Act*.

You recognize and take seriously the problem of addictions and substance abuse, and as such, appointed a Legislative Secretary on Substance Abuse and Prevention. The Legislative Secretary was given the task of meeting and consulting with stakeholders, health care providers, experts in the field of addictions and substance abuse, families and individuals affected by addiction, to create and implement practical solutions and recommendations on how to alleviate, treat and heal individuals, families and communities from the devastating effects of addictions and substance abuse. Those concerns were heard, and Project Hope was created; a new three year, \$10 million plan to prevent and treat substance abuse.

In maintaining the commitment to healthy citizens and healthy workplace environments, you passed *The Tobacco Control Amendment Act*, which prohibited smoking in public places effective January 1, 2005. This legislation also bans the sale of tobacco and tobacco-related products to youth-frequented establishments, thereby encouraging our young people to make healthier lifestyle choices.

To provide confidence in the spending practices of government, you passed *The Financial Administration Amendment Act*, which will assist to improve administrative efficiency and to demonstrate the Government's continued commitment to sound financial management, transparency, accountability and controlled spending.

To assist in making our province a youth-friendly work environment, you amended *The Labour Standards Act* which requires the Minimum Wage Board to review the minimum wage at least every two years. This legislation also provides for an appropriate balance between work and family, by ensuring those who access compassionate care benefits under *The Employment Insurance Act* are protected to a maximum of 16 weeks in a 52-week period.

To assist, enhance and promote private sector industries, you passed *The Corporation Capital Tax Amendment Act, 2005*. This legislation restores tax equity in the oil and gas industry. *The Labour-sponsored Venture Capital Corporations Amendment Act* was also passed to facilitate and sustain the growth and development of the provincial venture capital industry.

To maintain your commitment to education and our youth, *The Post-Secondary Graduate Tax Credit Amendment Act, 2004* was passed to increase the post-secondary graduate tax credit in each taxation year from 2004 to 2007.

To provide the highest level of legislative protection for all ecological reserves, ensuring the reserves cannot be reduced in size without approval of the Legislative Assembly, you passed *The Ecological Reserves Amendment Act, 2005*.

The Municipalities Act represents a significant step in advancing the municipal – provincial relationship, and presents a significant opportunity to strengthen our urban and rural opportunities and to create opportunities for more effective local government.

Saskatchewan's producer-led agricultural agencies have done an excellent job of promoting and benefiting their industries and this province's producers through research, market development and extension services. *The Agri-Food Act* assists these agencies by providing increased flexibility, through effective legislation, to enable them to take a stronger leadership role in the development of those industries.

To demonstrate your commitment to providing the lowest cost utility bundle by setting out in legislation public ownership of our Crown corporations, *The Crown Corporations Public Ownership Act* was passed.

You also had the privilege of welcoming Her Majesty The Queen and His Royal Highness, the Duke of Edinburgh in May, 2005. Highlights of the Royal Visit included the unveiling of the statue of The Queen and her Saskatchewan-born horse, Burmese in Wascana Centre, unveiling of the Centennial Mural in the Legislative Building, the announcement of the Queen Elizabeth Centennial Aboriginal Scholarship, a visit to the Synchrotron in Saskatoon, and the official opening of the Government House Centennial Project.

I was also honoured to take part in hosting Her Majesty The Queen and His Royal Highness, the Duke of Edinburgh, in this Centennial Year.

Finally, in taking leave of you, I wish to thank you for the diligent manner in which you have devoted your energies to the activities of the Session, and wish you the full blessings of Providence.

For 2002-2003, the typical planning cost to reconstruct an asphalt concrete paved highway ranged between \$450,000/km to \$600,000/km depending on factors like terrain, soil type, vertical or horizontal alignment, roadway width and traffic characteristics.

Ms. Harpauer asked the Government Question No. 4, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Sonntag:

To the Minister of Highways and Transportation: For the fiscal year 2002-2003, what was the average cost of repairs for one (1) kilometre of primary weight or heavy haul road in Saskatchewan?

Answer:

In 2002-2003, the average cost for routine, light and medium preservation activities on a pavement was \$2,340/km.

The Agency of Record was chosen under the terms of the Communications Services Procurement Policy of the Government of Saskatchewan, administered by the Communications Procurement Division of Executive Council.

Saskatchewan Property Management Corporation spent \$1,289.70 in the 2003/04 budget year for decorative art purchases in government office buildings and Crown Corporation Buildings.

SPMC purchased eight pieces of art, all from Saskatchewan artists. Six of the pieces are at SPMC's head office. The other two were purchased for inventory, but have since been placed. One with SPMC and another with ITO.

Mr. Brkich asked the Government Question No. 45, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Quennell:

To the Minister of Justice: (1) Who is the Chair of the Provincial Mediation Board for tax enforcement? (2) What are the official Board policies when it comes to handling tax enforcement cases in a timely manner?

Answer:

(1) The Chair of the Provincial Mediation Board is Terrance S. Chinn and the Board member is David J. Forrest.

(2) The Board operates with the premise that municipalities would rather have taxes paid than acquire title to the land and that property owners should be provided a reasonable opportunity to retain their land.

The Board deals with each application on a case by case basis to meet the needs of both parties.

If tax arrears cannot be paid immediately, the Board will attempt to arrange a repayment plan that is acceptable to both parties. The Board will provide a reasonable amount of time where a sale of property is required to discharge the arrears. Repayment arrangements would normally not exceed three years for urban property or five years for farm property. In the absence of an agreed repayment plan, the Chair will impose a repayment plan or issue consent for the title transfer.

To the Minister Responsible for SaskTel: (1) How many customers have subscribed to SaskTel's "MAX TV" service from January 1, 2003 to December 31, 2003? Answer:

- (1) SaskTel had a net increase of 11,541 customers in 2003.
- (2) The total number of customers on January 1 and December 31, 2003 was 3,319 and 14,860 respectively.

Answer:

- (1) The alteration of the taxation scheme was made because lawsuits were started before the change. After the change, more lawsuits were started. The new taxation system ended further potential liability accruing against Saskatchewan taxpayers.

- (3) There are 29 lawsuits outstanding. Most of these First Nations have not yet quantified their claims.

In fiscal 2002-2003 Saskatchewan Liquor and Gaming Authority (SLGA) spent \$489,541 on freight to SLGA stores. This freight would include combined shipments of alcohol, allied products and stationery.

Mr. Dearborn asked the Government Question No. 72, which was answered by the Premier:

To the Premier: Will the Premier ensure that men and women of Saskatchewan serving in the Canadian Armed Forces in theatres of conflict such as Afghanistan, Bosnia, Haiti and the HMCS Toronto serving in the Persian Gulf receive full income tax exemption similar to federal income tax exemptions for such persons?

Answer:

The March 23, 2004 federal budget announced that for the 2004 and subsequent taxation years, a deduction be allowed in computing taxable income for members of the Canadian Forces or a Canadian police force in respect of employment income earned in a high-risk deployed operational mission as described in the budget documents tabled by the Minister of Finance in the House of Commons on March 23, 2004.

The Saskatchewan personal income tax system is linked to the federal income tax system and administered on the Province's behalf by the federal government. This linkage provides a common definition of income for tax purposes. The Province therefore, accepts the federal government's policies on income inclusions and deductions and provincial income tax must be calculated as a percentage of 'Taxable Income', after allowing for federally defined deductions from 'Total Income'. As a result, Saskatchewan's income tax system will automatically ensure that those persons having employment income exempt from federal income tax will likewise have their employment income exempt from Saskatchewan income tax.

APRIL 14, 2004

Mr. Dearborn asked the Government Question No. 155, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Beatty:

To the Minister of Culture, Youth and Recreation: (1) What impact will the recent hike in taxes on tobacco and alcohol have on musicians who perform at live venues in Saskatchewan taverns? (2) What consideration and study was given to this matter prior to the increase decisions? (3) Could these documents be provided for the Saskatchewan Arts Community?

Answer:

No specific study was conducted to measure the impact of the recent tobacco tax increase and change in alcohol markup on musicians who perform at live venues in Saskatchewan taverns.

Ms. Bakken asked the Government Question No. 158, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Crofford:

To the Minister of Community Resources and Employment: (1) For fiscal year 2004-2005, how many third-party grants will be eliminated by this department? (2) Which grants to those organizations will be so affected? (3) Could you please list the amount of each grant that is being eliminated?

Answer:

- (1) There will be no third-party grants eliminated by the department's 2004-2005 budget.
- (2) No organizations are affected.
- (3) No grants were eliminated, therefore no list is attached.

Ms. Bakken asked the Government Question No. 159, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Crofford:

To the Minister of Community Resources and Employment: (1) For fiscal year 2004-2005, how many third-party grants will be reduced by this department? (2) Which grants to those organizations will be so affected? (3) Could you please list both the previous and the newly-reduced amounts of each grant?

Answer:

- (1) There will be no third-party grants reduced by the department's 2004-2005 budget.
- (2) No organizations are affected.
- (3) No grants were reduced, therefore no list is attached.

Ms. Bakken asked the Government Question No. 160, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Crofford:

To the Minister of Community Resources and Employment: (1) In fiscal year 2004-2005, is the \$12.6 million allocated for "affordable housing construction" all provincial funding? (2) If not, could you please provide a breakdown of funds from contributing sources?

Answer:

- (1) No.
- (2) In 2004, the Province's share of the \$12.6 million budget is estimated at \$5 million. The federal government's share is estimated at \$6.3 million. Municipalities will contribute an estimated \$1.3 million.

To the Minister of Community Resources and Employment: What is the mandate of the Provincial Housing Policy Framework for fiscal year 2004-2005?

Answer:

The mandate of the new provincial housing policy framework is to work with Saskatchewan people, all levels government, and the public, private and non-profit sectors to develop and deliver sustainable programs which improve the affordability, quality and availability of housing for Saskatchewan residents with a particular emphasis on low-income households.

The 2004-2005 action plan of the Provincial Housing Policy Framework will focus upon:

- The continued delivery of new affordable housing through the Centenary Affordable Housing Program (CAHP) to assist in addressing the supply of affordable housing; and
- The development of a family housing supplement tied to accessing quality housing.

Ms. Bakken asked the Government Question No. 162, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Crofford:

To the Minister of Community Resources and Employment: (1) For fiscal year 2003-2004, what was the total allocation for "affordable housing construction"? (2) Was this all provincial funding? (3) If not, could you please provide a breakdown of funds from contributing sources?

Answer:

- (1) For 2003, \$5.241 million was spent on the Affordable Housing Program for construction, acquisition and/or renovation.
- (2) No.
- (3) The Province contributed \$357,000. The federal government contributed \$4.78 million. Municipalities contributed \$106,000.

Mr. Cheveldayoff asked the Government Question No. 165, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Thomson:

To the Minister of Learning: (1) At what facility does the government plan to house the new nursing education seats? (2) How many new instructors will be hired to accommodate the increase in nursing education seats?

Answer:

- (1) The new nursing education seats will be housed at SIAST, Wascana Campus in Regina and at the University of Saskatchewan in Saskatoon.
- (2) It is estimated that 24 additional faculty are required to handle this increase.

APRIL 15, 2004

Mr. Heppner asked the Government Question No. 166, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Sonntag:

To the Minister of Highways and Transportation: (1) With regard to the Highway 11 twinning project, what is the Department's plan for accesses on this Highway in the communities of Hague, Osler and Rosthern? (2) Has the Department consulted with the councils in those communities about the number and location of these accesses? (3) What is the position of those communities about these accesses, and how does it compare to that of the Department of Highways' plan?

Answer:

- (1) Osler, Hague and Rosthern will each have one main access point, and a secondary access point.
- (2) Yes, the department has consulted the Councils of Osler, Hague and Rosthern. As well, the public was invited to open houses in all three communities.
- (3) The Department of Highways and Transportation has met with and noted the concerns expressed by the Council representing each of the communities. As this initiative draws closer to the final planning stages, the department will seek additional input from the local Councils to determine if their concerns have been addressed.

To the Minister of Highways and Transportation: When will the section of highway 15 from the junction of #20 east to the junction of #6 be resurfaced or re-paved?

Answer:

Highway 15 from Semans to the junction of Highway 6 is a granular pavement in good condition, so there are no immediate plans for resurfacing or repaving at this time.

The department has entered into a partnership with local municipalities to upgrade Highway 15 from the junction of Highway 20 to Semans within the next four to six years. The delivery schedule is flexible and will be dependent on available funding in any given year.

For 2004-05, 9.6 km of Highway 15 from Semans to 9.6 km west is being graded. Further work planned for 2005 involves either completion of the grading to Highway 20 or surfacing of the grading completed in 2004. The department will be finalizing these plans with the municipal partners this summer. The focus remains to complete surfacing this link within the timeframe outlined in the partnership agreement.

Answer:

A total of 23 full-time and 45 part-time positions have been reduced at SPMC due to the budget. An additional seven vacant positions were also reduced.

- infection control
- statistical and outcome monitoring etc.

Contracts are awarded on this criteria and the total number of points scored.

(2) Each regional health authority that contracts with physiotherapy clinics, establishes its own criteria for clinic selection

Mr. Gantefer asked the Government Question No. 393, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Nilson:

Mr. Hermanson asked the Government Question No. 453, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Sonntag:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Telecommunications: What is the value of incremental revenues earned from MAX TV to date?

Answer:

SaskTel releases its audited financial information on an annual basis. As of December 31, 2003, Max revenues were \$6.6 million.

Ms. Bakken asked the Government Question No. 454, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Nilson:

To the Minister of Health: (1) What process is used to ensure that Methadone is only provided to people who qualify for the Methadone program? (2) Are those qualifying for the Methadone program required to take their dosage in the presence of a physician?

Answer:

- (1) Prior to initiating methadone treatment, physicians must screen all potential patients to ensure individuals meet admission criteria from the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Saskatchewan guidelines. Educational audits are performed by the College of Physicians and Surgeons to ensure that physicians properly understand the principles and practice of the assessment and management of these patients, and that patients receive maximum benefit.
- (2) Typically physicians do not directly observe clients taking their medication. The healthcare professionals responsible for 'directly observed therapy' of prescribed methadone are pharmacists and nurses.

Mr. Brkich asked the Government Question No. 455, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Nilson:

To the Minister of Health: What is the total cost savings of closing one wing of the long-term care facility in Davidson?

On May 18, 2004, it was announced the Heartland Regional Health Authority would close one wing of the long-term care facility in Davidson. The estimated savings are \$100,000, net of resident revenue, annually.

Based on preliminary survey results provided to Saskatchewan Health by the Regina Qu'Appelle Health Region, the Region was operating a total of 630 acute care beds [includes psychiatric inpatient beds] across its nine hospitals, on March 31, 2004. It should be noted that the number of hospital beds staffed and in operation on any given day may fluctuate based on patient need and acuity.

NOVEMBER 18, 2004

Mr. D'Autremont asked the Government Question No. 511, which was answered by Hon. Len Taylor:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Assessment Management Agency: With reference to the reassessment that SAMA will be undertaking this fiscal year: (1) What are the preliminary proposals and will they be released to the public? (2) What is the expected impact on property taxes? (3) When is it expected that reassessment will come into effect? (4) Will public hearings be held prior to the recommendations being implemented? (5) If so, when and in what communities will these hearings be held?

Answer:

(1) The Saskatchewan Assessment Management Agency (SAMA) reviews the Saskatchewan Assessment Manual and determines if changes are required, in the context of the statutory four year revaluation cycle. The manual sets out the policies and rules applicable to valuation of properties.

The manual is established by Board Order pursuant to *The Assessment Management Agency Act* and the order is published in the Gazette. The manual for the 2005 revaluation was prepared on January 22, 2003, and amended by Board Order after that date (the latest occurring on March 25, 2004). The manual was first made available to the public in February, 2003.

SAMA released preliminary fair value assessment figures, to those municipalities for which it provides assessment valuation services, at the end of April/early May 2004. Municipalities that do not employ

SAMA could have obtained the same information from their independent assessment valuation services provider.

SAMA and the cities calculate taxable assessments from fair value assessments following the establishment of provincial percentages of value. These were announced by government for 2005 in October 2004. The decision on when to provide assessment notices is a local municipal government decision, but it is anticipated that most will be delivered to ratepayers early in 2005.

- (2) The final impact on property taxes from the assessment changes associated with the revaluation will not be known until local municipal governments and school divisions have made the necessary mill rate and the tax distribution decisions.

Projections of the impacts of the 2005 revaluation, based on the percentages of value adopted for the 2001 revaluation, were posted in June 2004 at <http://www.municipal.gov.sk.ca>.

- (3) The new assessment values will come into effect on January 1, 2005.
- (4) SAMA has several advisory committees (Rural, Urban, Cities, and Commercial) with numerous private organizations and local governments represented. The committees were consulted regarding the manual changes before the Board Order was made by the SAMA Board of Directors to adopt the 2002 base-year manual for use with the 2005 revaluation.

In preparation for the 2005 revaluation, the department of Government Relations consulted with numerous organizations concerning percentages of value and local tax tools. Local government associations, representing municipal governments and school divisions and their constituents, were consulted in June, 2004.

Over the next 24 months, an additional 270-310 Landed Immigrants are expected to arrive in Saskatchewan as a result of these trips. This includes individuals who have received job offers from employers who participated in the trips and will be applying to the Saskatchewan Immigrant Nominee Program (SINP), those now working in Saskatchewan on temporary work permits who will be applying to the SINP, those who have already applied to the SINP but have not yet received Landed Immigrant Status, plus their accompanying family members.

Mr. Morgan asked the Government Question No. 515, which was answered by the Hon. Mr.**Prebble:**

To the Premier: On February 17, 2003, the Premier said, "In March of 1997, the government believed it had an equity partner to share the risk of building storage sheds." Is there any written communication between Con-Force and the government that corroborates this statement by the Premier?

Discussions with Con-Force regarding their initial interest in participating as a full equity partner in the storage facilities construction project were recently confirmed by Ron Adams, President of Con-Force and Brian Burnett, former Assistant Deputy Minister of Economic Development.

After formal discussions which included the preparation of proformas, Con-Force decided not to participate as a full risk-sharing partner. Minister Prebble's office confirmed this in telephone call with Mr. Adams on October 20, 2004.

Mr. Morgan asked the Government Question No. 516, which was answered by the Hon. Mr.**Prebble:**

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Water Corporation: An October 21, 2004 Regina Leader-Post article states, "Provincial Cabinet Minister Peter Prebble said Wednesday that the government did believe in 1997 that Con-Force Limited intended to become an equity partner in the building of potato sheds for its failed Spudco venture." Is there any written communication between Con-Force and the government that corroborates this statement by the Minister?

Answer:

Discussions with Con-Force regarding their initial interest in participating as a full equity partner in the storage facilities construction project were recently confirmed by Ron Adams, President of Con-Force, and Brian Burnett, former Assistant Deputy Minister of Economic Development.

After formal discussions which included the preparation of proformas, Con-Force decided not to participate as a full risk-sharing partner. Minister Prebble's office confirmed this in telephone call with Mr. Adams on October 20, 2004.

Mr. Morgan asked the Government Question No. 519, which was answered by the Hon. Mr.**Prebble:**

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Water Corporation: On August 21, 1998, Mark Langefeld of Judith River Farms Ltd. wrote to Ron Styles and Harvey Fjeld of SaskWater asking the following question: "Does Con-Force Industries really have a 51% interest in the storage buildings or is this a 100% SaskWater operation?" What was SaskWater's response to this request?

Answer:

Throughout the late summer and fall of 1998, SaskWater officials met on numerous occasions with representatives of LDPC, FCC and the Royal Bank in an effort to work through the financial difficulties LDPC was experiencing, in the interests of stabilizing the company and sustaining the development of the potato industry in the Lake Diefenbaker area.

These efforts included SaskWater's participation in the financial restructuring of LDPC with the transfer of the Lucky Lake Potato Terminal to LDPC for the original capital cost of approximately \$5.8 million; the provision of a \$2.8 million second mortgage and a \$3 million debenture to finance the transfer and the conversion of \$1.5 million in existing accounts receivable owed by LDPC to SaskWater into a debenture.

With specific reference to the relationship with Con-Force, this arrangement was detailed in SaskWater's 1997 Annual Report and Financial Statements, which publicly released in April 1998. While the financial statements used equity accounting, the nature of the equity investment by Con-Force was disclosed in the notes to the financial statements, specifically Note 12. This note also described the interim financing for the construction, the operating lease agreements and the share

buy-back provisions of the unanimous shareholder agreements, as well as the negotiated sale agreements for two of the three storage facilities.

Although we have been unable to find any formal, written response by SaskWater to Mr. Langefeld's correspondence, Mr. Ron Styles, acting President at the time, reports that there were conversations with Mr. Langefeld subsequent to this communication, in which the nature of the Con-Force relationship was explained.

Answer:

For a detailed outline of SaskWater's business relationship with Microgro, please see response to written question #520.

Mr. Morgan asked the Government Question No. 522, which was answered by the Hon. Mr.

(1) Who made the decision to use this money to finance SPUDCO storage capital and losses? (2) Which Minister or Ministers approved this decision and which Ministers were aware of this decision?

Answer:

The above questions and related allegations by the Opposition that SaskWater improperly drained funds being held in trust for Ducks Unlimited and for Souris Basin development projects is premised on an inaccurate understanding of these specific arrangements.

The matter of trust liabilities associated with Rafferty/Alameda and Ducks Unlimited was thoroughly discussed at the November 28, 2002 meeting of the Standing Committee on Crown Corporations. Both SaskWater officials and the representative from the Provincial Auditor's Office explained very clearly that funds related to these projects were never held in specific trust accounts. Since the inception of these programs (1991 for Ducks Unlimited and 1994 for Rafferty/ Alameda) SaskWater has recorded these funds as deferred revenue with the remaining annual balances shown as outstanding liabilities.

Notwithstanding the Opposition's ongoing efforts to misconstrue this arrangement, it should be noted that the Provincial Auditor has never questioned the accounting treatment of these liabilities or the allocation of expenditures under these programs.

As the following history demonstrates government has met all financial commitments related to these liabilities.

Ducks Unlimited Fund:

Ducks Unlimited upfronted monies to SaskWater at the time the Luck Lake and Riverhurst irrigation projects were being constructed. These monies were to fund the portion of the capital costs that related to the Ducks Unlimited project, as well as operating costs of their project for the next 30 years. This fund was drawn down by the annual capital and operating costs of the projects.

As at December 1999, the value of this fund was \$1,909,500. At the end of 2003, the balance in this account was \$530,400. It is expected that this account will be depleted by the end of 2004.

Deferred Funding (Rafferty/Alameda):

Construction costs of the Rafferty/Alameda projects were funded by the General Revenue Fund, the U.S. Government and SaskPower. Amounts received in excess of expenditures incurred were recorded as deferred funding. As construction costs were incurred by SaskWater, this fund was drawn down by that value.

As at December 1999, the value of this fund was \$1,292,900. On October 1, 2002, the balance of this fund, \$294,100, was transferred to the Saskatchewan Watershed Authority. As at March 2004, this fund was totally expended.

Depredation Fund (Rafferty/Alameda):

The Environmental Impact Assessment report done at the time that these projects were being constructed, dictated that a wildlife and waterfowl depredation fund be established. This was done in 1993. Interest was accrued to this account annually. The purpose of this fund is to provide compensation for crop loss claims made due to the damage caused by wildlife. The compensation formula has triggered no claims against this fund.

As at December 1999, the value of this account was \$1,016,400. On October 1, 2002, the balance of this fund, \$1,119,200, was transferred to the Saskatchewan Watershed Authority. As at March 2004, the account balance was \$1,182,900.

As confirmed by both SaskWater's external auditors and Provincial Auditor, these funds were appropriately accounted for, and all obligations related to these funds were met and are being met in accordance with the related agreements.

Mr. Morgan asked the Government Question No. 523, which was answered by the Hon. Mr.**Prebble:**

Answer:

As outlined in the response to written question #522, funds related to Rafferty/Alameda and Ducks Unlimited were never held as separate accounts under trust conditions, and all obligations related to these liabilities have been and are being met by government.

Mr. Morgan asked the Government Question No. 524, which was answered by the Hon. Mr.**Prebble:**

(1) Was a legal opinion obtained with regard to this matter? (2) If so, what law firm provided the legal opinion?

Answer:

As detailed in the response to written question #522, the accounting treatment and the allocation of expenditures under these programs have never been called into question. Hence, no outside legal opinion was needed or acquired.

Answer:

Both parties agreed not to make any further complaints or grievances about these matters. At the specific request of the plaintiffs, the settlement agreement included all allegations and issues arising from the counterclaim.

In this context it is entirely inappropriate to revive allegations that have been settled, but it should be noted that the application for the counterclaim was partly successful, in that the claim of negligent misrepresentation against the plaintiff Judith Rivers Ltd. was allowed to proceed.

Second, with specific reference to evidence in support of the counterclaim, related documents were filed with the court, and are publicly accessible at the Regina Court House.

And finally, when the allegations in a legal action are as serious as these were, with the significant claims for damages in excess of \$100 million, government has an obligation to mount a vigorous defence. The counterclaim application was advanced in response to a very serious threat posed in the actions following a comprehensive review and analysis of LDPC’s business plans, projections and financial statements by Grant Thornton LLP, the forensic auditors engaged to assist in the preparation of government’s defence.

They may be connected but at this point the file doesn't indicate they were.

Regarding the second one, Fjeld v. Gov of Sask. and SaskWater and Maynard Sonntag, Saskatoon QB No. 1887 of 2003, the pleadings do not disclose that the basis of the action is related to Spudco, but it may be that the circumstances surrounding their departure from SaskWater were indirectly related to Spudco. NOVEMBER 25, 2004

Ms. Eagles asked the Government Question No. 831, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Nilson:

To the Minister of Health: Provide the average percentage of wage increases awarded to administrative positions in the Sun Country Regional Health Authority for the fiscal year 2004-2005

and the total amount of money these increases cost for this fiscal year.

Answer:

The Sun Country Regional Health Authority follows the Saskatchewan Association of Health Organization's (SAHO) pay bands as a source to guide their compensation policy. The annual increase this year to the salary scale for out-of-scope employees was zero percent.

Ms. Eagles asked the Government Question No. 832, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Nilson:

To the Minister of Health: What public consultation process took place prior to the recent changes to the delivery of services and staffing in the Sun Country Regional Health Authority?

Answer:

Regional health authorities are responsible for the day-to-day delivery of health programs and services. This includes working with local residents to ensure community involvement in program decisions.

Mr. Gantfoer asked the Government Question No. 833, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Nilson:

To the Minister of Health: Please provide the terms of tendering contracts with pharmacies as well as the policies for administering prescription drugs in the Moose Jaw Pioneer Lodge, Five Hills Regional Health Authority.

Answer:

Moose Jaw Pioneer Lodge is a licensed special-care home owned and operated by the Five Hills Regional Health Authority.

Regional health authorities that own and operate a special-care home or the Board of an affiliate special-care home are responsible for arranging the contract for pharmacy services for the special-care home.

NOVEMBER 26, 2004

Mr. Brkich asked the Government Question No. 834, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Sonntag:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Telecommunications Corporation: (1) Has SaskTel decided to replace the FleetNet 800 service? (2) Will SaskTel be providing any grants, loans or other assistance to our rural fire departments and emergency service providers to help them pay for the new communications equipment?

Answer:

(1) SaskTel announced that the anticipated date to exit *FleetNet 800* service is December, 2006. SaskTel is part of a cross-functional committee that is exploring alternatives to FleetNet. The committee is comprised of representatives from SaskTel, SaskPower, Sask911, the RCMP, and the Departments of Justice, Health, Environment, Corrections and Public Safety, and Highways and Transportation.

(2) For FleetNet users who choose to migrate to SaskTel's Push-To-Talk solution, SaskTel intends to offer promotion incentives for existing FleetNet customers to support this migration.

Mr. Bjornerud asked the Government Question No. 837, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Nilson:

To the Minister of Health: (1) How many orthopaedic surgeons are currently practicing in Yorkton? (2) Is the Region's Health Authority currently recruiting additional orthopaedic surgeons for the Yorkton hospital?

Answer:

(1) There are no orthopaedic surgeons currently practicing in Yorkton.

(2) The Sunrise Regional Health Authority is not currently recruiting orthopaedic surgeons for the Yorkton hospital.

Mr. Dearborn asked the Government Question No. 854, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Prebble:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Water Corporation: (1) Did Spudco obtain federal ministerial exemptions to move potatoes inter-provincially in 1997? (2) For what varieties, and in what quantity? (3) If exemptions were requested for blended variety potatoes, were the make up of the blends provided, and in what quantity?

Answer:

The Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) expects that the purchaser of potatoes from another province will obtain any required Ministerial Exemptions regarding potatoes being purchased interprovincially. This is based on the objective of the exemption process regarding interprovincial purchases, which is that a purchaser of bulk shipments of potatoes will purchase them locally (from within province) if possible. When that is not possible then shipments of bulk potatoes will be authorized from another province when the purchaser provides acceptable information to the CFIA that the particular type of potato is not available locally and obtains the Ministerial Exemption respecting the packaging and volume of the bulk shipment from out of province.

Mr. Dearborn asked the Government Question No. 855, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Prebble:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Water Corporation: (1) Did Spudco obtain federal ministerial exemptions to move potatoes inter-provincially in 1998? (2) If so, for what varieties, and in what quantity? (3) If exemptions were requested for blended variety potatoes, were the make up of the blends provided, and in what quantity?

Answer:

See Answer 854.

Mr. Dearborn asked the Government Question No. 856, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Prebble:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Water Corporation: (1) Did Spudco obtain federal ministerial exemptions to move potatoes inter-provincially in 1999? (2) If so, for what varieties, and in what quantity? (3) If exemptions were requested for blended variety potatoes, were the make up of the blends provided, and in what quantity?

Answer:

Mr. Dearborn asked the Government Question No. 857, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Prebble:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Water Corporation: (1) Did Spudco obtain federal ministerial exemptions to move potatoes inter-provincially in 2000? (2) If so, for what varieties, and in what quantity? (3) If exemptions were requested for blended variety potatoes, were the make up of the blends provided, and in what quantity?

Answer:

NOVEMBER 29, 2004

Mr. Elhard asked the Government Question No. 858, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Sonntag:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Government Insurance: What discounts do SGI employees, executives and retirees receive on their SGI bills?

Answer:

SGI staff and retirees receive a 10 per cent discount for SGI CANADA home, personal auto and agro policies. Employees, not retirees, purchasing salvage receive a discount equal to the “trade discount,” which is 30% on sheet metal parts and 20% on mechanical parts. No discount is given on tires, batteries, whole vehicles, general salvage items, any other sales or for Saskatchewan Auto Fund products.

Mr. Elhard asked the Government Question No. 859, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Quennell:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Power Corporation: What discounts do SaskPower employees, executives and retirees receive on their SaskPower bills?

Answer:

SaskPower employees, executives and retirees do not receive any discounts on their SaskPower bills.

Mr. Elhard asked the Government Question No. 860, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Van Mulligen:

To the Minister Responsible for SaskEnergy Incorporated: What discounts do SaskEnergy employees, executives and retirees receive on their SaskEnergy bills?

Answer:

SaskEnergy employees, executives and retirees do not receive any discounts on their SaskEnergy bills.

Mr. Elhard asked the Government Question No. 861, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Sonntag:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Transportation Corporation: What discounts do STC employees, executives and retirees receive on their STC services?

Answer:

All full-time permanent employees of the Saskatchewan Transportation Company receive a pass for free travel on STC lines, which is valid for the term of their employment. Temporary and part-time staff may request a free trip pass, which is good for a specified trip on a specified date. Retirees with 10 or more years of service will receive a lifetime pass, entitling them to free travel on STC services for the remainder of their lives.

Mr. Elhard asked the Government Question No. 862, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Cline:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Liquor and Gaming Authority: What discounts do SLGA employees, executives and retirees receive on their SLGA purchases?

Answer:

SLGA employees, executives and retirees do not receive a discount on SLGA purchases.

Mr. Weekes asked the Government Question No. 863, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Forbes:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Watershed Authority: (1) How many wells have been affected by the Grandora/Dunfermline/Vanscoy TransGas Natural Gas Storage Project? (2) Where are these affected wells located?

Answer:

(1) At present there is no evidence of any wells in the area being affected by TransGas in terms of water quality. In terms of water levels, a number of wells in the Tyner Valley have been impacted as was expected. TransGas has undertaken measures to ensure that impacts were mitigated. SaskEnergy will provide the number of wells where they have provided mitigation. Although it is suggested that a number of wells have been affected by the project thus far, there is presently no scientific evidence to assign responsibility to TransGas beyond those which they have already mitigated. Expanded monitoring, further investigations and the upcoming temporary shutdown of the project will be used to further assess the possible impacts of this project.

- (2) The affected wells which required mitigation are located in the Tyner Valley Aquifer between Vanscoy and Grandora.

Mr. Weekes asked the Government Question No. 864, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Van Mulligen:

To the Minister Responsible for SaskEnergy Incorporated: (1) Has an environmental impact study been completed on the Grandora/Dunfermline/Vanscoy TransGas Natural Gas Storage Project? (2) If so, what are the findings?

Answer:

The full requirements of the Saskatchewan Watershed Authority (the Authority) water use permit application were met by TransGas Limited (TransGas) in 2003. A hydrogeological aquifer flow modeling study was conducted by qualified professional engineering and geoscience consultants and was submitted with the application. This model assessed the impacts of water movement within the aquifer, the recharge within the aquifer, and the sustainability of water use at the rates and duration required for the TransGas project. The model indicated that the water use rates and duration was sustainable for the project and the Authority issued a permit to TransGas.

Mr. Weekes asked the Government Question No. 865, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Forbes:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Watershed Authority: What scientific basis does TransGas have that the Grandora/Dunfermline/Vanscoy TransGas Natural Gas Storage Project will not affect local groundwater quality and quantity?

Answer:

It was acknowledged from the outset that there would be impacts on groundwater levels in the Tyner Valley aquifer and that some wells in the aquifer would have to be mitigated. It must be recognized that any groundwater withdrawal project will affect water levels to some degree, but scientific modeling indicates that the water will begin to recover as soon as pumping concludes. In terms of the information used in the decision making process, the groundwater investigation report provided in support of TransGas's application was completed by a qualified engineering firm. The report was in turn reviewed by qualified professionals within the Authority. The report was the primary basis for the TransGas Approval. TransGas was also required to implement a groundwater monitoring network prior to starting up their project. Information from this network is regularly collected and assessed. Further investigations are being done to examine the concerns which have recently come to light.

Nitrate is the most significant water quality concern in the area. Information gathered in advance of the TransGas project indicated the presence of nitrates already in the water source. However, it must be recognized that there is no mechanism for groundwater pumping to cause nitrate contamination.

Mr. Weekes asked the Government Question No. 866, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Forbes:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Watershed Authority: According to Saskatchewan Watershed Authority Vice President Wayne Dybvig, "Seventeen wells in the Vanscoy/Grandora area were sampled by Authority staff between November 8 and 10, 2004. These 17 wells were deemed to be at the highest risk, based on previous data." What previous data is being referenced?

Answer:

The Saskatchewan Watershed Authority selected 17 wells for sampling due to elevated nitrate levels found when they were sampled by TransGas in summer 2003. The results of these tests were shared with affected local residents. TransGas also took samples as part of their investigations prior to the project start up and later as part of their investigations into concerns expressed by individual well owners.

To date, monitoring in several private wells and in TransGas production wells has shown no measurable change in water quality.

Mr. Weekes asked the Government Question No. 867, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Van Mulligen:

To the Minister Responsible for SaskEnergy Incorporated: According to Saskatchewan Watershed Authority Vice President Wayne Dybvig, "Seventeen wells in the Vanscoy/Grandora area were sampled by Authority staff between November 8 and 10, 2004. These 17 wells were deemed to be at the highest risk, based on previous data." What previous data is being referenced?

Answer:

TransGas Limited (TransGas) is not aware of the location of the 17 wells sampled by the Saskatchewan Watershed Authority (the Authority) in November 2004 or the criteria the Authority used to select the wells they tested. However, TransGas sampled and tested the water quality of 31 private wells in the summer of 2003 and submitted results to the SWA with TransGas' application for water use. In addition, TransGas sampled and tested the water quality of 86 private water wells so far in 2004 and submitted results to the Authority. All sample test results were also shared with individual well owners in 2003 and 2004.

Mr. Weekes asked the Government Question No. 868, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Van Mulligen:

To the Minister Responsible for SaskEnergy Incorporated: What scientific basis does TransGas have that the Grandora/Dunfermline/Vanscoy TransGas Natural Gas Storage Project will not affect local groundwater quality and quantity?

Answer:

The hydrogeological model developed in 2003 has been verified against actual pumping results in 2004. The model and pumping to date has confirmed that the quantity of water removed from the Tyner Valley Aquifer (TVA) is sustainable for the duration of cavern mining. There is no known mechanism for TransGas Limited's pumping to introduce groundwater contaminants into the TVA or any overlying aquifers.

Mr. Weekes asked the Government Question No. 869, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Forbes:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Watershed Authority: (1) Has an environmental impact study been completed on the Grandora/Dunfermline/Vanscoy TransGas Natural Gas Storage Project? (2) If so, what are the findings?

Answer:

- (1) TransGas engaged the services of Beekie Hydrogeologists Ltd. to perform a hydrogeological evaluation to evaluate the availability of a sustainable ground water supply. This report was reviewed by ground water professionals from the Saskatchewan Watershed Authority. Based on this report, the project did not raise concerns with potential to trigger *The Environmental Assessment Act*. In particular, water related impacts were considered to be local, temporary and reversible. Also, the hydrogeological analysis indicated there was adequate water supply and the proponent had undertaken prior public consultation. As a result, an Environmental Impact Assessment of the project was not requested.
- (2) The project did not raise concerns with potential to trigger *The Environmental Assessment Act*. As a result, an Environmental Impact Assessment of the project was not requested.

Mr. Weekes asked the Government Question No. 870, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Van Mulligen:

To the Minister Responsible for SaskEnergy Incorporated: (1) Were environmental impact studies done on any other TransGas Natural Gas Storage Projects completed in the province? (2) If so, what were the findings?

Answer:

TransGas Limited has complied with all regulatory requirements in application for water use on past natural gas salt cavern storage facility construction. Water use hydrogeology has been a consideration on previous projects as it has been in this project. Formal environmental impact studies have not been a requirement on past projects.

Mr. Weekes asked the Government Question No. 871, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Forbes:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Watershed Authority: (1) Were environmental impact studies done on any other TransGas Natural Gas Storage Projects completed in the province? (2) If so, what were the findings?

Answer:

- (1) TransGas has complied with all regulatory requirements in application for water use on past natural gas storage facilities. Information about four gas cavern projects was submitted to the Environmental Assessment Branch for review in the past. For each review, the projects were determined to not meet criteria of *The Environmental Assessment Act* and no Environmental Impact Assessment was required.
- (2) In all cases where a project proposal was submitted to the Environmental Assessment Branch, it was determined that an Environmental Impact Assessment was not required.

Mr. Weekes asked the Government Question No. 872, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Van Mulligen:

To the Minister Responsible for SaskEnergy Incorporated: (1) How many wells have been affected by the Grandora/Dunfermline/Vanscoy TransGas Natural Gas Storage Project? (2) Where are these affected wells located?

Answer:

- (1) Water pumping for this Natural Gas Storage Project began in January 2004. Between fall 2003 and October 2004, 55 individual wells have been inspected as a result of hydrogeological modelling predictions or concerns raised by residents. Adverse effects (i.e. lower water levels) have been mitigated on 34 wells to date. The mitigation solutions include lowering pumps in well bores, installing new pumps where necessary, and drilling new wells if required. TransGas Limited (TransGas) was able to pro-actively mitigate future problems on the majority of wells in advance of concerns raised by residents.
- (2) The area directly affected by TransGas pumping, based on all the scientific information to date, lies between Grandora and Vanscoy for those with wells in the Tyner Valley Aquifer (TVA). TransGas is pumping water from the TVA. TransGas well monitoring within the area and outside of the affected area in all aquifers provides the scientific evidence that there has been little to no effect on the water levels in wells in aquifers overlying the TVA.

Mr. Weekes asked the Government Question No. 873, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Forbes:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Watershed Authority: Will there be public involvement prior to the re-start of the Grandora/Dunfermline/Vanscoy TransGas Natural Gas Storage Project?

Answer:

Yes. The Authority will continue to work with the local concerned citizens committee which has been established. Their input is currently being sought on the proposed water quality sampling program and the locations for new monitoring wells. This consultation will last throughout the duration of the TransGas project. Beyond this project, the Authority will continue to work with the group to address groundwater issues.

Mr. Weekes asked the Government Question No. 874, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Van Mulligen:

To the Minister Responsible for SaskEnergy Incorporated: Will there be public involvement prior to the re-start of the Grandora/Dunfermline/Vanscoy TransGas Natural Gas Storage Project?

Answer:

TransGas Limited (TransGas) has worked with the local community representative group throughout the summer and fall of 2004. Recently, the community representative group has been re-formed. TransGas has indicated to this group that they desire to meet with them monthly during the three-month pumping shut down period to share results of aquifer recharge and address other opportunities raised with the previous community group.

Mr. Weekes asked the Government Question No. 875, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Beatty:

To the Minister of Culture, Youth and Recreation: How much did your department give to the Provincial Youth Advisory Committee in the fiscal year 2000?

Answer:

Culture, Youth and Recreation did not give any money to the Provincial Youth Advisory Committee in the fiscal year 2000.

Mr. Weekes asked the Government Question No. 876, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Beatty:

To the Minister of Culture, Youth and Recreation: How much did your department give to the Provincial Youth Advisory Committee in the fiscal year 2001?

Answer:

Culture, Youth and Recreation did not give any money to the Provincial Youth Advisory Committee in the fiscal year 2001.

Mr. Weekes asked the Government Question No. 877, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Beatty:

To the Minister of Culture, Youth and Recreation: How much did your department give to the Provincial Youth Advisory Committee in the fiscal year 2002?

Answer:

Culture, Youth and Recreation did not give any money to the Provincial Youth Advisory Committee in the fiscal year 2002.

Mr. Weekes asked the Government Question No. 879, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Beatty:

To the Minister of Culture, Youth and Recreation: How much did your department give to the Provincial Youth Advisory Committee in the fiscal year 2004?

Answer:

Culture, Youth and Recreation incurred a total of \$12,584.79 YTD for the Provincial Youth Advisory Committee in the fiscal year 2004-05. This consists of \$3955.00 in honorariums and the balance of \$8,629.79 was for travel and expense reimbursement.

Mr. Weekes asked the Government Question No. 880, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Beatty:

Culture, Youth and Recreation has not given anything to the Saskatchewan Seniors Mechanism in the fiscal year 2004.

- (1) Several changes have been made to fisheries management policy since 1997 and include: the introduction of a competitive fishing event license in 1999; changes to bait fishing regulations in 1999 and 2003; a lengthened angling season in northern Saskatchewan in 2000; and a 2003 policy that clarifies the Saskatchewan Environment relationship with commercial fishing co-operatives.
- (2) No, none of these changes have delegated Ministerial authority to any group. The Department will, however, consider advice and recommendations on fisheries management from third parties.

Mr. Wakefield asked the Government Question No. 886, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Forbes:

To the Minister of Environment: (1) Within SERM, who is responsible for the management of fisheries resources? (2) Have any fisheries resource management functions been devolved? (3) Who is responsible for compliance in fisheries management?

Answer:

- (1) Within Saskatchewan Environment (SE), Resource Stewardship Branch is responsible for the management of the provincial fisheries resource.
- (2) No fisheries management functions have been devolved.
- (3) SE's Compliance and Field Services Branch is responsible for compliance in fisheries management as covered by provincial legislation. Fisheries and Oceans Canada is responsible for compliance with the fish habitat protection provisions of the *Fisheries Act* of Canada.

Ms. Draude asked the Government Question No. 888, which was answered by the Premier:

- To the Premier: (1) Does the government have any financial interest in A1 Soybean Enterprise Ltd.?
(2) If so, what dollar amount and when was it made?

Mr. Stewart asked the Government Question No. 889, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Wartman:

- To the Minister of Agriculture and Food: (1) What is the process used for auditing purposes in the Livestock Loan Guarantee Program? (2) Are there any safeguards in place to protect participants in the program from financial malfeasance?

Answer:

- (1) The executive and members of each association, along with the local supervisor, who is hired and responsible to the local association, is the first check for ensuring the association is following all necessary rules.
Associations (Co-operatives or Corporations) also have their books and records audited annually in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards.
SAFRR randomly audits about seven percent of associations annually to verify cattle inventories as reported by the association. SAFRR also follows up on specific problems identified or if members raise an issue.
- (2) The main safeguard in the program is the members, executive and the local supervisor of the association. The members have a financial stake in ensuring an association is operating appropriately through the members' assurance fund (shared risk).
Additional features to ensure compliance include:
 - monthly inventory reports;
 - monthly loan reports;
 - review of new purchases;
 - review of association procedures.

Mr. Stewart asked the Government Question No. 890, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Wartman:

- To the Minister of Agriculture and Food: (1) For every month since November 2003 to the present day, how many calls has the farm stress hotline received? (2) Please break down the information by month.

To the Minister of Environment: (1) When land is purchased and set aside for wildlife, are adjacent landowners consulted? (2) If not, why not? (3) If yes, please explain the consultation process.

Answer:

- (1) Environment does not consult with adjacent landowners when purchasing important habitat lands.
- (2) All lands considered for purchase by Saskatchewan Environment (SE), because of their wildlife habitat suitability, are acquired following the principle of "willing seller-willing buyer". The purchase price is negotiated directly with the local landowner and is based on fair market values. SE typically becomes aware of the potential availability of suitable wildlife habitat lands through direct contact by the seller or through advertisements and public notices, in the same way as other potential purchasers.
- (3) N/A

Mr. Gantfoer asked the Government Question No. 892, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Nilson:

To the Minister of Health: (1) Please indicate the patient assessment criteria for prioritizing chemotherapy and radiation treatment. (2) Are these assessment criteria the same for both cancer centres in the province?

Answer:

- (1) The Saskatchewan Cancer Agency prioritizes each patient appointment to ensure that treatments occur within medically necessary timeframes.
The oncologists make their recommendations regarding new patient appointments and treatment start times based on scientific evidence and clinical trial protocols, as well as published norms. The level of urgency is established for each individual patient by an oncologist. As soon as the pathology report and physician referral are received, an oncologist who treats that type of cancer reviews the patient's file as part of the triage system. The oncologist considers the type of cancer (whether it is a slow or fast moving disease), the stage (extent) of the disease, whether the disease is a recurrence or a new cancer, the symptoms a patient is experiencing and the advice of the referring physician as to urgency.
- (2) The assessment criteria are the same for both the Allan Blair and Saskatoon Cancer Centres.

Mr. Gantfoer asked the Government Question No. 893, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Nilson:

To the Minister of Health: Please indicate the number of people currently waiting for radiation and chemotherapy, respectively, at the Allan Blair Centre.

Answer:

The Saskatchewan Cancer Agency's count of people waiting includes all patients who have been referred for an appointment with a medical oncologist (chemotherapy) or radiation oncologist (radiation therapy) and whose appointment has not yet taken place. This includes those who have just been referred as well as those who have been booked for an appointment.

The Agency's count of the number of patients waiting does not remove those waiting for clinical reasons, such as recovery time following surgery, an oncologist's order to delay (e.g., further tests may be required to obtain a definitive diagnosis prior to treatment) or a patient's request to delay based on date preference.

Approximately 45-50 new patients are seen every week at the Allan Blair Cancer Centre. In November 2004, there were 46 people waiting for radiation and 145 people waiting for chemotherapy at the Allan Blair Cancer Centre.

This includes those who have just been referred as well as those who have been booked for an appointment.

The Agency's count of the number of patients waiting does not remove those waiting for clinical reasons, such as recovery time following surgery, an oncologist's order to delay (e.g., further tests may be required to obtain a definitive diagnosis prior to treatment) or a patient's request to delay based on date preference.

Approximately 45-50 new patients are seen every week at the Saskatoon Cancer Centre. In November 2004, there were 91 people waiting for radiation and 104 people waiting for chemotherapy at the Saskatoon Cancer Centre.

- (1) The Villages of Keeler and Wood Mountain are the only cities, towns and/or villages to have been charged under subsection 33(3) of *The Environmental Management and Protection Act, 2002*.
- (2) The Village of Wood Mountain is the only city, town and/or village to have been charged under subsection 33(2) of *The Environmental Management and Protection Act, 2002*.
- (3) The Villages of Keeler and Wood Mountain are the only cities, towns and/or villages to have been charged under subsection 30(5) of *The Water Regulations, 2002*.

Mr. Brkich asked the Government Question No. 907, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Quennell:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Power Corporation: (1) What reasoning may be provided for rural customers paying a municipal fee? (2) How are municipal fees assessed? (3) What amount of revenue does SaskPower collect from municipal fees? (4) Do city customers pay this fee?

Answer:

- (1) SaskPower's rural customers, which are those that reside outside of the corporate limits of a city, town or village, will not be required to pay a municipal surcharge on their power bill. The authority to assess the municipal surcharge on a customer's monthly electrical billing is given through section 36 of *The Power Corporation Act*.
- (2) The council of a town or village can require that SaskPower collect an amount equal to five percent of the monthly account for electrical energy of every customer in the town or village. The council of a city can require that SaskPower collect an amount not to exceed ten percent of the monthly account for electrical energy of every customer in the city.
- (3) SaskPower does not retain any revenue from municipal surcharge. All money collected through the municipal surcharge is remitted to the appropriate urban municipality.
- (4) Yes - SaskPower's urban customers, which are those that reside within the corporate limits of a city, town or village, may be required to pay a municipal surcharge on their power bill.

MARCH 23, 2005

Mr. Weekes asked the Government Question No. 908, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Van Mulligen:

To the Minister Responsible for SaskEnergy Incorporated: (1) What was the cost of the TransGas cavern projects located at Landis and near Melville, which were sold in 1997 to Canadian Crude Separators and Plains Environmental, respectively? (2) Why were these caverns developed by TransGas prior to their sale? (3) Why were these caverns sold by TransGas?

Answer:

- (1) The two TransGas caverns at Landis are operational and perform natural gas storage service for TransGas. They have not been sold. In 1993, TransGas purchased five existing underground caverns at Melville previously used for liquids. Three of the caverns were converted for natural gas storage and are still in operation. The other two caverns could not be converted for use in natural gas storage and were sold to Plains Environmental.
- (2) TransGas did not develop the identified caverns at Melville. All caverns developed in Saskatchewan by TransGas continue to be operational and help provide the 30 Billion cubic feet of storage service that TransGas delivers to its customers.
- (3) TransGas has not sold any caverns at Landis. TransGas did not develop or ever use the two Melville caverns that were sold in 1997. At the time TransGas purchased the caverns, the vendor indicated their intent to sell all the caverns at once, and TransGas purchased all of them with the intent of using only three for natural gas storage. The other two caverns could not be used for natural gas storage and were sold to Plains Environmental.

MARCH 24, 2005

Mr. Brkich asked the Government Question No. 909, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Sonntag:

To the Minister of Highways and Transportation: (1) Will the section of Highway 15 between the junction with Highway 20 and the village of Semans be resurfaced during the course of 2005? (2) If so, will this section of Highway 15 be resurfaced to the same standard as the section of Highway 15 east of Semans up to the junction with Highway 6?

Answer:

The department and its municipal partners are currently finalizing plans for work to be conducted in 2005 on this section of Highway 15.

Mr. Dearborn asked the Government Question No. 910, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Sonntag:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Telecommunications: (1) For entry level marketing positions, why are driving licenses a requirement? (2) Does this requirement discriminate against applicants with visual impairments? (3) How many applicants for these positions in the past have been visually impaired, and how many of these applicants have been hired?

Answer:

- (1) Positions require travel to customer sites throughout Saskatchewan for sales presentations, conferences, and meetings.
- (2) No. Accommodations can be made to the job responsibilities or working conditions that provides the employee with the opportunity to perform the duties to the best of their ability.
- (3) We are unable to determine the type of disability or impairment an applicant may have when they apply for employment. However, when individuals are offered employment, they are asked if any type of accommodation is required within the workplace.

Mr. Dearborn asked the Government Question No. 911, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Quennell:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Power Corporation: (1) For entry level marketing positions, why are driving licenses a requirement? (2) Does this requirement discriminate against applicants with visual impairments? (3) How many applicants for these positions in the past have been visually impaired, and how many of these applicants have been hired?

Answer:

- (1) For entry level marketing positions, a driver's licence is not a requirement.
- (2) Marketing Services welcomes applications from all qualified individuals. Since March 2004, one (1) Marketing opportunity has been posted externally. The external posting did not make any reference to Driver's Licence as a requirement therefore no candidates were screened-out. In fact, Marketing Services is looking to develop a more representative workforce and would especially welcome applications from qualified diversity candidates, including those who may be visually impaired.
- (3) Same as Answer No. 2.

Mr. Dearborn asked the Government Question No. 912, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Van Mulligen:

To the Minister Responsible for SaskEnergy Incorporated: (1) For entry level marketing positions, why are driving licenses a requirement? (2) Does this requirement discriminate against applicants with visual impairments? (3) How many applicants for these positions in the past have been visually impaired, and how many of these applicants have been hired?

Answer:

- (1) The Marketing Supervisor position is the entry level position in the department, aside from Administrative support staff and Co-op students. The Marketing Supervisor position requires a driver's licence due to the fact the position involves frequent travel within and between communities throughout Saskatchewan. This travel requirement could not easily be met by other forms of transportation. Specifically, Marketing Supervisors provide information, training and coaching for 138 Network Members in 62 communities throughout the province. As well, they frequently meet with SaskEnergy staff at 11 SaskEnergy area offices. Their role also requires transporting and setting up equipment, displays and promotional materials in a variety of locations, and training internal and external contacts on a variety of online and other services.

- (2) SaskEnergy positions are open to all individuals who meet the position requirements. Marketing opportunities in the past several years have been filled with internal applicants or by students through the Co-op program that meet the position requirements.
- (3) As we have not hired externally for the Marketing Supervisor position for several years, we are not aware of any visually impaired applicants.

MARCH 30, 2005

Mr. Brkich asked the Government Question No. 913, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Forbes:

To the Minister of Environment: (1) What amount of revenue was raised in 2004 through the scrap tire fee? (2) For what purpose is this revenue being used?

Answer:

- (1) The Saskatchewan Scrap Tire Corporation (SSTC) collected \$4.2 million in tire recycling fees in 2004.
- (2) Tire recycling fees are used to facilitate the collection, transportation and recycling of scrap tires. The fee funds the operation and administration of the Scrap Tire Management Program.
 - Operations:
 - recycling credits are paid to collectors who collect and transport scrap tires to the processors;
 - recycling credits are paid to processors who transform the scrap tires into value added products.
 - Administration of the SSTC:
 - rent, salaries, office equipment and the like.

The tire-recycling fee also funds special projects under the Scrap Tire Management Program:

- Phase 2, the removal of stockpiled scrap tires from community landfills at no charge to the community,
- other special projects including:
 - playground grants for communities who use crumb rubber in and around their play structures instead of sand; and
 - research and development grants and demonstration projects such as modified crumb rubber asphalt in road construction.

MARCH 31, 2005

Ms. Bakken asked the Government Question No. 914, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Crofford:

To the Minister of Community Resources and Employment: When a child is placed in foster care and the Department then learns that the child has become suicidal, what steps does the Department take to ensure the child's safety?

Answer:

Every child in care is assigned a trained professional Social Worker responsible for developing a comprehensive case plan for the child/youth. When a child in care is identified as being suicidal, the department would make a referral to mental health professionals and seek their assistance in assessing the level of risk and developing an immediate plan. The plan could include 24 hour supervision, referral to other specialists for assessment or in severe situations, could include hospitalization to ensure safety. The suicide assessment and subsequent safety planning is vital information and is communicated to everyone involved in caring for the child.

Ms. Bakken asked the Government Question No. 915, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Crofford:

To the Minister of Community Resources and Employment: What are the Department of Community Resources and Employment's policies and procedures for following up on a complaint made by a child against a parent whom the child is living with?

Answer:

The department assesses the validity of all reports of child abuse or neglect whether the report comes from the child or another person. An initial assessment of the report is made to determine whether reasonable grounds exist to believe a child may be in need of protection. An initial investigation may include making collateral contacts with the child's school or other sources to gather information. The purpose of the child protection investigation is to determine whether a child is at significant risk and to determine the best methods of assuring the child's safety. The investigation may involve interviews with the child, interviews with the family and other professionals the family may be involved with. As a result of the child protection investigation, it may be determined that child safety can be maintained in the family home. In other situations, children must be removed temporarily from the home to ensure safety. In situations of allegations of physical or sexual abuse, a joint investigation is conducted with the police or RCMP according to the Provincial Child Abuse Protocol.

Ms. Bakken asked the Government Question No. 916, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Crofford:

To the Minister of Community Resources and Employment: (1) Is it common practice for the Department to place a child with a person who was involved in filing a complaint against the child's parent? (2) If not, what is the common practice for placing a child in foster care?

Answer:

- (1) When children must be placed in out of home care for safety reasons, extended family is explored as a first priority for placement. It is possible that the same family member who initially raised concerns for the child's safety is found to be a safe placement resource for the child. An assessment of the proposed extended family caregiver is conducted to ensure that the home is safe for the child and that the extended family is able to meet the child's needs. The principle of the "best interests of the child" governs all decisions made regarding placement of the child.
- (2) If there is no family member or person of significance to the child that can safely care for the child, an appropriate foster care resource is found.

APRIL 4, 2005

Ms. Bakken asked the Government the following Question No. 917, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Sonntag:

To the Minister of Highways and Transportation: (1) Is highway 35 south of Weyburn to the US border part of the 2005 spring construction project for the Department of Highways and Transportation? (2) When will the construction be started? (3) What section of highway 35 will be included in the project? (4) What type of work will the project include? (5) What is the cost of the project?

Answer:

The department tendered a contract to put aggregate in place this fall/winter in order to commence surfacing of Highway 35 in 2005-06. The length of the surfacing to be completed in 2005 and beyond remains dependent on budget levels, and the performance of the provincial Thin Membrane Surface system.

Ms. Eagles asked the Government the following Question No. 918, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Beatty:

To the Provincial Secretary: Please identify the amount the provincial government has spent to date on: (1) Print commercials promoting the province's centennial; and (2) Radio commercials promoting the province's centennial.

Answer:

- (1) \$635,157 for print advertising in a variety of publications. These include Saskatchewan's daily and weekly newspapers, including the province's only French language weekly; magazines and newsletters, including the *Rural Councillor* and *Urban Voice*; and Aboriginal publications.
- (2) The total cost of radio advertising up to March 31, 2005 is \$193,271.15. This 18 month initiative includes the "Spirit of 2005 Campaign," which profiles Saskatchewan people and their successes and is airing on most radio stations in the province.

Ms. Harpauer asked the Government the following Question No. 919, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Nilson:

To the Minister of Health: In the 2005-06 budget, how much money is allocated for the construction of a new St. Elizabeth's Hospital in Humboldt?

Answer:

Adequate funding is included in the 2005-06 budget to ensure that the cash flow requirements for this project are met.

Ms. Harpauer asked the Government the following Question No. 920, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Nilson:

To the Minister of Health: When is the construction of a new hospital in Humboldt scheduled to begin?

Answer:

Construction is scheduled to begin in 2006.

APRIL 5, 2005

Mr. Morgan asked the Government the following Question No. 921, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Cline:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Liquor and Gaming Authority: (1) How much did SLGA pay for veterinary services at Marquis Downs Race Track in Saskatoon in 2004, and to whom? (2) Please provide details of all veterinary services provided at Marquis Downs Race Track during 2004.

Answer:

- (1) In 2004-05, Saskatchewan Liquor and Gaming Authority (SLGA) paid \$15,430 to Bar S.T. Ranch & Vet Services P.C. Inc. for veterinary services.
- (2) Track Veterinarian Duties at Marquis Downs:
 - a) To ensure that horses entered to race are fit and sound (physically able to perform). The Authority veterinarian shall inspect, on the day of the race, all horses entered to race at Marquis Downs that day. Should the Authority veterinarian, in his/her opinion, find any horse(s) that are not fit, sound, or ready to race on that day, he/she must recommend to the Stewards that said horse should be scratched.
 - b) Supervising the collection of all samples of saliva and blood for drug control purposes.
 - c) Attending all searches, when requested to do so, under the authority of the rules of racing.
 - d) Attending meetings, hearings, appeals when requested to do so by the Authority.
 - e) File an annual report with the Manager of the Horse Racing Branch at the end of each racing season.

The role of the Authority veterinarian is to protect the safety of the participants in live horse racing. This includes not only the horses but also the jockeys that ride the horses in each race.

The Authority veterinarian is also protecting the betting public. Horses that are not fit or ready to race have to be scratched so that the integrity of the sport is upheld for the wagering public that support the industry.

Mr. Morgan asked the Government the following Question No. 922, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Cline:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Liquor and Gaming Authority: (1) How much did SLGA pay for veterinary services at Marquis Downs Race Track in Saskatoon in 2003, and to whom? (2) Please provide details of all veterinary services provided at Marquis Downs Race Track during 2003.

Answer:

- (1) In 2003-04, Saskatchewan Liquor and Gaming Authority (SLGA) paid \$15,730 to Bar S.T. Ranch & Vet Services P.C. Inc. for veterinary services.
- (2) Track Veterinarian Duties at Marquis Downs:
 - a) To ensure that horses entered to race are fit and sound (physically able to perform). The Authority veterinarian shall inspect, on the day of the race, all horses entered to race at Marquis Downs that day. Should the Authority veterinarian, in his/her opinion, find any horse(s) that are not fit, sound, or ready to race on that day, he/she must recommend to the Stewards that said horse should be scratched.
 - b) Supervising the collection of all samples of saliva and blood for drug control purposes.
 - c) Attending all searches, when requested to do so, under the authority of the rules of racing.
 - d) Attending meetings, hearings, appeals when requested to do so by the Authority.
 - e) File an annual report with the Manager of the Horse Racing Branch at the end of each racing season.

The role of the Authority veterinarian is to protect the safety of the participants in live horse racing. This includes not only the horses but also the jockeys that ride the horses in each race.

The Authority veterinarian is also protecting the betting public. Horses that are not fit or ready to race have to be scratched so that the integrity of the sport is upheld for the wagering public that support the industry.

The fact sheet is also on the Saskatchewan Health Web site (www.health.gov.sk.ca). Health regions are responsible for the day-to-day delivery of health services and programs including public health.

During two recent radio broadcasts (CBC and a local radio station in Rosetown), the Medical Health Officer for the Heartland Health Region identified precautions that individuals should take when handling deer mice. As well, the Heartland Health Region is submitting an article on this issue to all weekly newspapers within the region in early April 2005.

- Former Alford's Building – The lease has expired and is not part of the SPM portfolio.
- Former SEDCO Building – The lease has expired and is not part of the SPM portfolio.

(2) In these locations which are occupied by government employees (i.e. the Walter Scott and Palliser Square buildings), any asbestos concerns have been addressed. No corrective measures are required.

Saskatchewan Agriculture indicates that crop damage caused by deer mice, like any other pest or production problem that reduces yields, is an insured peril under the Crop Insurance Program. Any Saskatchewan resident, including farmers and rural residents, can obtain information on how to protect themselves against hantavirus from their Regional Health Authority. Saskatchewan Health and Saskatchewan Labour developed a hantavirus disease fact sheet that has been made available to health regions for distribution to the public when making inquiries. The fact sheet is also on the Saskatchewan Health Web site (www.health.gov.sk.ca). As well, Saskatchewan Health is planning to issue a news release about precautions against hantavirus during the week of April 11, 2005. Health regions are responsible for the day-to-day delivery of health services and programs including public

health. Public Health Officers and Medical Health Officers in the health regions are available to respond to inquiries about hantavirus disease and can provide information about precautions that individuals should take when handling deer mice.

- Throughout the rest of the province the repair and maintenance work is spread among various centres. In these cases it is important that the vehicles can be serviced when needed without resulting in extensive travel to a specific repair shop. Businesses across the province that do a significant volume of repair work are approached regarding the possibility of a discount structure for their services. CVA maintenance staff will direct vehicle drivers to the shops with the lower rates where practicable.
- Competitive quotes are received on body and painting work not covered by SGI.

- All warranty work is performed by the franchised dealers representing the vehicle model involved.

(1) The Occupational Health and Safety Branch establishes standards for workplace safety. Part XXXII of *The Occupational Health and Safety Regulations* "Additional Protection for Fire Fighters" introduced the Code of Practice for Fire Fighters in 1997. Section 480 of The Code of Practice

states that this part “applies to fire fighters who are engaged in emergency operations on a full or part time basis and their employers, but does not apply to (a) fire fighters fighting prairie or forest fires and (b) fighting fires underground at mines.” Part XXXII would apply to those employed in fighting fires in the petroleum industry.

The Code of Practice also makes reference to training of fire fighters under section 482(1), “An employer shall ensure that: (a) all fire fighters receive the training necessary to ensure that the fire fighter is able to carry out safely any emergency operation that the fire fighter will be expected to carry out; (b) the training required by clause (a) is provided by competent persons; and (c) a written record is kept of all training delivered to fire fighters pursuant to this Part.” Although there is no specific reference to training standards in this section, the Appendix makes reference to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA). On this matter, Occupational Health and Safety has coordinated standards with those established by the Office of the Fire Commissioner for training and qualification of fire fighters. The standards for fire fighting used by both Occupational Health and Safety and the Office of the Fire Commissioner are the NFPA Professional Qualification Standards.

- (1) The procurement of all goods and services made in the ordinary course of business are made in accordance with policies approved by the SaskPower Executive and Board of Directors. For purchases less than \$5,000, tendering is not mandatory. Employees are permitted to procure goods and services up to \$5,000. They are encouraged to obtain quotations and rotate business in the community in order to provide equal opportunities for the local vendors. For purchases \$5,000 to \$25,000, an informal tender process is utilized. Employees are required to obtain a minimum of three competitive quotes using a structured process. The process ensures a fair and competitive process and that financially sound decisions are reached. For purchases \$25,000 and greater, a formal tender process is utilized where tenders are issued by the purchasing department. The formal tendering process includes letters of invitation, bid return labels, letters to unsuccessful bidders and a bid depository. SaskPower Internal Audit personnel participate at tender openings where estimates exceed \$200,000. Formal tenders include: instructions to tenderers, supplementary conditions, general conditions, specifications, tender schedules, site labour requirements and project specifications.
- (2) The lowest tender is not guaranteed the contract if the bid does not meet the technical specifications. In tenders where evaluation criteria is used (e.g. RFP - request for proposals) price is not always given highest consideration. Vendors are rated on other aspects such as: qualifications, delivery, warranty, technology or Saskatchewan content. SaskPower also incorporates the use of a schedule in its tenders where price is the primary consideration. However factors such as Saskatchewan content, warranty, delivery, etc., may be included in the evaluation.
- (3) In the formal tendering process bidders are advised of the successful bidder's name. SaskPower does not disclose the details or results on specific tendering analysis which includes pricing.

These exceptions must be authorized as per corporate policy. An RFP will be awarded to the proponent which has the best overall proposal based on pre-determined criteria.
- (3) Unsuccessful bidders are notified of the successful bidder. However, the bid price is not disclosed to protect the competitiveness of the bid process.

- (1) On April 29th, 2005, Saskatchewan signed a bi-lateral Agreement in Principle with the Government of Canada on Early Learning and Child Care. At the time of the signing, the Premier indicated that the Early Learning and Child Care plan will be in place by December, 2005. We don't know all the details of the Plan yet. Although we will build on and strengthen existing school-based pre-kindergarten, child daycare and preschool programs, just how this will happen is yet to be determined. We have not made any funding commitments to individual community based programs at this time.
- (2) At this time, in light of the stage of development of the Early Learning and Child Care plan, we are not in a position to allocate early learning and child care funding for individual programs such as The Family Place Mini-Go School in Weyburn.

Mr. Merriman asked the Government Question No. 1304, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Crofford:

To the Minister of Community Resources and Employment: What is the province's policy on inter-country adoption of children that are not sibling pairings?

Answer:

The department does not recommend two unrelated children being placed for adoption with one family at the same time. There is a consensus among provincial adoption Ministries that placing two unrelated children in the same family at the same time creates unnecessary risk. This position is a best practices approach with paramount consideration to the best interests of the child. Following the adoption placement of one child and the completion of the requirements of that adoption, a subsequent placement of another child can be considered, pending a positive assessment of the family's adjustment to adoption.
