The Speaker informed the Assembly that he had received a communication from the Private Secretary to His Honour the Lieutenant Governor stating that His Honour would open the Session at 2:00 p.m. today, Wednesday, the 27th day of October, 2010.

SPEECH FROM THE THRONE

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor entered the Chamber, and having taken his seat upon the throne, was then pleased to open the Session with the following speech:

Mr. Speaker, Members of the Legislative Assembly, Honoured Guests, people of Saskatchewan:

Welcome to the opening of the Fourth Session of the Twenty-sixth Legislature.

The poet Robert Frost ends his most famous poem with these lines;

*Two roads diverged in the wood and I,
I took the one less travelled by,
And that has made all the difference;*

Today, in the new Saskatchewan, we are on the road less travelled. It is a new road for our province – and it has made all the difference. This new road is marked by strong and continued growth. Our population hit an all-time high of 1,045,622 people, 16,498 more than last year – the largest ever year-over-year increase since 1953.

A recent survey shows Saskatchewan business owners are some of the most optimistic in Canada. According to the most recent Financial Post/CFIB rankings, Saskatchewan has three of Canada's top ten entrepreneurial cities – Lloydminster, Saskatoon and Prince Albert.

Saskatchewan recently set a record for the most people working in our province. There are now 6,300 more people working in our province than one year ago. Chartered banks are predicting nation-leading growth for Saskatchewan. And the benefits of that growth are being widely distributed.

For the first time ever, wage rates in our province are rising above the national average, with a percentage increase that is third highest in Canada. However, this growth is not an end in itself. Growth simply marks the way to a better quality of life for all Saskatchewan people.

On the new road, we don't just talk about a new Children's Hospital for Saskatchewan. We fund and are beginning to build a new Children's Hospital for Saskatchewan. On the old road, there were no targets set to tackle a serious nursing shortage. On the new road, the target of 800 was not only set, it now has been surpassed. On the new road, we also find unique and innovative solutions to reduce surgical wait times. In last year's throne speech, our government set another ambitious target to reduce surgical wait times to no more than three months, within four years.

My government is already beginning to make significant progress. In Saskatoon for example, the number of patients waiting more than a year for hip and knee procedures has dropped 71 per cent in the past year. My government will continue to make further investments to continue working towards our surgical wait times goal.

On the new road, we are doing more to help those in need. Services are now underway or in development for 308 individuals, reducing the community living waiting list. Since the last Speech from the Throne, 161 affordable housing units have been built or have been rejuvenated. Over the same period, 175 housing units for persons with intellectual disabilities have been completed or started.

The new road means, quite literally, new roads. Efforts to improve and repair Saskatchewan's long-neglected highways continue. Work on 1,129 more kilometers of highways was tendered in the past year. An additional 793 kilometers of maintenance and safety improvements were completed by the Ministry of Highways and Infrastructure as of the end of this summer. The Global Transportation Hub is also emerging as a major economic force in our province. This project, driven by private sector investment and public sector infrastructure, is already hiring hundreds of new workers, with more jobs to come.

In recognition of the need for everyone to have the opportunity to participate in the workforce, my government has improved childcare. Since November of 2007, funding has been allocated for over 2,900 new licensed childcare spaces. By the end of March next year, the number of childcare spaces in Saskatchewan will have increased by over 30 per cent.

Our workforce is also being bolstered by bright young minds that have decided to stay right here in Saskatchewan, because of initiatives like the Graduate Retention Program. This trend will be enhanced in the coming months by the addition of a new Scholarship Fund.

This year, about ten thousand new immigrants are also calling Saskatchewan their new home. These families will help increase our workforce while creating a brighter, more dynamic and diverse province of the future.

My government has been more responsive to Saskatchewan farmers and farm families. This year will be remembered by many farm families as the year Mother Nature conspired to create conditions that were virtually impossible for many. My government acted quickly and significantly in partnership with our federal counterparts to ease this pain.

The result was \$360 million made available to help those hit by flooded croplands. My government is also providing support to flooded areas through Crop Insurance, AgriStability and Agri-Invest. Crop Insurance alone has already paid out over one quarter of a billion dollars to producers this year, with many more post harvest claims soon to be processed.

It's estimated that this year's agriculture budget could be the largest in Saskatchewan history. The next decade will see a significant and meaningful commitment to rehabilitating Saskatchewan's irrigation system. This is an investment in our future.

Over \$30 million will be committed over the next ten years to restore and repair irrigation infrastructure in the Lake Diefenbaker area. This will include over \$1 million this year for repair of the M1 canal in Central Saskatchewan, which provides water for 55,000 acres of irrigation, 8 communities, three potash mines and 26 domestic users.

Not only are Saskatchewan farm families getting more, they are paying less as a result of implementation of Phase I of an historic education property tax reduction plan. That plan means farmers and ranchers no longer have to pay a disproportionate share of education property taxes.

In addition, rural and urban dwellers now benefit from a more effective and nimble government response in times of natural disaster. My government would like to extend its thanks to the many local volunteers and municipal officials who worked tirelessly this past summer under very difficult conditions and made suggestions to improve disaster programs.

My government is investing significantly in a new public safety telecommunications network that will ensure communities can keep in touch during emergencies. This new state-of-the-art system will be in place by January of next year.

Saskatchewan streets will be safer with the addition of new police officers. By the end of this fiscal year, a total of 90 new officers will be on the streets, with money for thirty more to be included in the next budget. The fight against organized crime and gangs will also be expanding to adult correctional centres. My government will introduce legislation authorizing it to monitor telephone conversations by inmates in correctional centres.

All of these initiatives have taken place against the backdrop of lower government debt – meaning current prosperity is being shared with future generations. Government debt is now \$4.1 billion, compared to \$6.8 billion when my government took office.

In this session, my government will also introduce a regulatory accountability initiative, designed to cut red tape for Saskatchewan businesses. There will be a renewed focus on citizen-centred services, with people getting what they need from their government, in a way that is useful to them.

In addition to tax cuts and lower government spending, life remains affordable in Saskatchewan. Average wages paid to workers in our province are up by five per cent compared to a year ago, well above the rate of inflation. Utility costs remain among the lowest in Canada. In fact, Saskatchewan families will benefit from a seven per cent decrease for the average residential natural gas customer, effective November 1.

Since the fall of 2007, when Saskatchewan voters bestowed upon my government its first mandate, over one hundred campaign promises have been kept.

A few promises that remain outstanding will be completed during this session. In the coming year, Saskatchewan's new road will take us to the establishment of a revenue sharing formula with our municipal partners, based on one full percentage point of the provincial sales tax. This will represent the highest level of operational support ever provided to municipalities.

A further promise to continue reducing the amount paid in education property taxes will also be met. This means the education portion of property tax will have dropped by an average of 20 per cent since 2008.

For agricultural land, that tax bill will drop by an average of 80 per cent. This is a substantial improvement and a real accomplishment.

In health care, my government is beginning to plan for a significant expansion of emergency medical services in cooperation with the STARS (Shock Trauma Air Rescue Service) program in Alberta. This helicopter-based system would supplement existing air ambulance and ground ambulance services. When acute trauma incidents occur, time is of the essence. A new helicopter EMS system like STARS could be the difference between life and death.

The number of registered nursing students being educated in our province is also increasing. A total of 130 seats have already been added, with an additional 170 seats on the way.

Efforts to increase the number of physicians across Saskatchewan also continue through the establishment of Saskatchewan's physician recruitment agency. However, efforts to assure every Saskatchewan resident has access to a qualified physician regardless of where they live will go even further. My government is in the process of implementing a realistic, made-in-Saskatchewan assessment process for internationally trained medical graduates. And to further ensure the needs and rights of patients remain paramount, my government will fulfill a promise to create a health ombudsman within the office of the current provincial ombudsman.

Work will continue on the re-establishment of a dedicated addictions agency and the creation of an additional 100 long-term addictions recovery spaces in the province.

As we travel down Saskatchewan's new road, we must make every effort to ensure we stand shoulder to shoulder with First Nations and Métis. This is why my government is committed to improving educational outcomes for our First Nations and Métis students.

The education of these students is a crucial precursor to their full participation in the labour market, and in Saskatchewan's future prosperity. This is why several of my government's ministries are working collaboratively with First Nations and Métis leaders. The goal is simple and profound: create a strategy best suited to the needs of this important group of students. The initial focus will be on early learners.

Saskatchewan's new road also includes a demonstrated commitment to pre-kindergarten programs for vulnerable three and four year-olds across our province. Since coming into office, my government has added an additional 75 such programs, serving 3,680 children. This represents an overall increase of 45 per cent in the number of pre-kindergarten programs offered, since 2007.

First Nations and Métis partners are also part of my government's new and innovative approach to development of our northern forests under a new forestry management agreement. This new approach sees industry partners fully cooperating with these groups, to manage the forest in an economic and sustainable manner.

In the words of Montreal Lake Cree Nation Chief Roger Bird:

“We would like to thank the Minister ... for making a great move to include First Nations in this endeavor, and we now have the task and challenge to create a better future for our young people in the forestry sector.”

My government is also committed to working with local school boards to enhance business literacy, entrepreneurship and career education.

Not everyone on Saskatchewan's new road starts at the same place. Some need a helping hand. Others need continued support. Upon entering office, my government addressed a long-standing concern by doubling benefits provided to seniors. These benefits had remained unchanged for over a decade.

Yet another challenge was an infrastructure deficit in long-term care. New facilities are much needed and some existing facilities are in dire need of capital improvements and repairs. My government is addressing these issues through extensive community consultations, detailed planning plus significant financial support for the needed engineering, architectural and design work.

However, the innovation goes further. My government is committed to pursue innovative funding models to address the shortage of long term care beds through partnerships with reputable third party agencies. At least one of these new, innovative projects is underway right now in Saskatoon, with more to follow. Work also continues on providing home safety audits for low-income seniors across our province.

From the Great Sand Hills in the southwest to our pristine northern boreal forest lakes, Saskatchewan's landscape is comprised of many unique and irreplaceable features. These features must be protected for the enjoyment of future generations. This is why my government will be introducing measures designed specifically to protect these beautiful regions of our province.

My government is also demonstrating its commitment to sustainability through support of expanded wind power capacity. That capacity will double between now and 2015 to a total of up to 400 megawatts of clean, green wind power.

Another signal of my government's commitment to the environment is its continued support for the EnerGuide program. EnerGuide and the federal ecoENERGY Retrofit-Homes program were designed to assist families in making their homes more energy efficient. These programs have helped Saskatchewan homeowners reduce greenhouse gas emissions by an estimated 75,535 tonnes per year. That's the same as taking 13,730 cars off the road.

Despite a federal decision to suspend the ecoENERGY program, my government this year allocated an additional \$9.4 million to the EnerGuide budget. With EnerGuide scheduled to wind-down in the spring, my government will use this opportunity to develop a new program that will continue to encourage homeowners to make energy efficiency upgrades.

My government is also moving ahead with a new multi-material recycling program in Saskatchewan.

Innovation is the wellspring from which future prosperity is drawn. In addition to the many steps my government has already taken to encourage growth in innovation, my government is pledging to invest \$20 million over the next five years in a new technology commercialization fund.

With the backing of the federal government, Saskatchewan universities and the private sector, my government's plan is to enhance our support for Saskatchewan graduate students, especially in fields of new technologies and telecommunications.

There may be unexpected turns along the way as Saskatchewan travels on its new road. For example, in recent weeks, there has been tremendous interest in the future of PotashCorp. My government has made it clear that, no matter who owns the potash mines, the potash belongs to the people of Saskatchewan. This principle, and the best interests of our province and its people, will guide the actions of my government in its deliberations on this important matter.

In the next few weeks, my government will review a series of recommendations from the Independent Panel examining Saskatchewan's Child Welfare system. This review will provide my government with an opportunity to review longstanding efforts in this area, and continue a commitment to improve the lives of vulnerable children and youth.

One initiative my government looks back on with justifiable pride was the launch in October of 2009 of the Saskatchewan Assured Income for Disability program. Work will continue on expanding enrollment and examining further opportunities for a more individualized income support system.

My government realizes that a lack of affordable homes is creating challenges across Saskatchewan. To address this issue, details will soon be provided regarding a new program, Headstart On a Home. This new initiative will see my government help in the private sector construction of 1,000 new affordable homes over the next five years.

Saskatchewan's new road followed the torch to Vancouver for the Winter Olympic and Paralympic Games. In order to succeed, future Saskatchewan Olympians and Paralympians require more than our moral support. My government, in cooperation with SaskSport, is creating a special program for high performance athletes. The new Saskatchewan Program for Athletic Excellence will support these young people as they train. This new program will support high performance athletes to a maximum of \$6,000 each year in addition to existing funding programs.

Saskatchewan's new road will take visitors to new provincial parks. This fall, my government will begin identifying locations for new provincial parks and begin public consultations. This is in addition to the 1,000 electrified campsites my government has promised. Work on fulfilling that promise is ahead of schedule.

My government remains committed to ensuring children in our province get enough exercise. The Ministry of Education has developed guidelines to make sure this happens. To date, there have been some promising success stories. Based on this success, the Ministry of Education will launch a new program, called "Active Kids, Healthy Kids". Students will get at least 30 minutes of exercise each day and be urged to make healthy food choices at school and at home.

A new emphasis on fostering relationships with other jurisdictions and engaging the world has led to the creation of a New West Partnership with Alberta and British Columbia. Together, these three jurisdictions are telling the powerful story of western Canada to the rest of the world. My government has made a concerted effort to tell the Saskatchewan success story throughout Canada and around the world. This effort will continue through a new national advertising campaign, targeting investors, ex-patriots and skilled workers.

During the summer months, a decision by my government to fund clinical trials for a new MS treatment garnered considerable public and media attention. Our province has one of the highest rates of MS in the world. The decision was based on the broad, but admittedly anecdotal evidence concerning the efficacy of this treatment. Many Canadian and some Saskatchewan patients have gone to considerable expense and inconvenience to receive this new treatment. They deserve the best answers science can provide. This is why my government is moving forward with these trials.

To that end, my government is committing \$5 million to fund MS liberation clinical trials in Saskatchewan, based on proposals we receive from the scientific communities. A successful proposal will be chosen in early 2011, with clinical trials slated to begin this spring. Governments can choose to wait on the sidelines, simply benefiting from the investments of others. Or, governments can take an active role in advancing scientific understanding. On Saskatchewan's new road, this is the approach we will take.

THE LEGISLATIVE AGENDA

In the coming months, members of this Assembly will have the opportunity to debate a series of important pieces of legislation, aimed at improving the lives of Saskatchewan people. New legislation will be introduced this fall to protect whistleblowers in Saskatchewan's public service through the establishment of a new Public Disclosure Commissioner.

There will be legislation to increase penalties for those who mistreat farm animals. Changes will be proposed to reduce provincial court delays and increase transparency and accountability for complaints involving provincial court judges. My government will also introduce new human rights legislation to streamline the complaints process and improve efficiency.

Changes to *The Local Government Election Act* will establish four-year terms for municipal politicians and give municipalities the authority to require photo ID when conducting local elections. My government will also be introducing a similar act, requiring voters to produce photo ID when voting in provincial elections.

CONCLUSION

During this session, the Estimates for the new year commencing April 1, 2011 will be submitted to you. The Public Accounts for the current year have been tabled. Saskatchewan is now well on its journey down the new road. The story of that journey is being told by many different voices.

There are the voices of the women and men coming to our province from throughout Canada and from around the globe. They come to our province in search of a prosperity that is entrenched and opportunity that is available to all. There are the voices of the most vulnerable in our society, now more able to live in independence. There are the voices of our seniors, now being afforded the dignity and respect they deserve. And there are the voices of children, who will travel the furthest on this new road.

The author and essayist Neil Postman says children are the living messages we send to a time we will not see. Today, our new road leads to the future we desire for ourselves and for our children. Today, the new road leads to Saskatchewan.

On this road in the new Saskatchewan, the greatest traits of Saskatchewan people are manifest. Their resolve is strong. Their compassion is unrivaled. Their vision is clear. And their future is brighter than it has ever been before.

Together, we travel down this new road with anticipation and confidence. I now leave you to the business of the Session, knowing that you will favourably discharge your duties and responsibilities. May divine providence continue to bless our province and guide this Assembly in all of its deliberations.

God Bless Saskatchewan. God Bless Canada. And God Save the Queen.

Darrel Verner Heald, Q.C. who passed away on August 8, 2010, was a Member of this Legislative Assembly from 1964 until 1971, representing the Lumsden constituency for the Liberal Party. Mr. Heald served as the Attorney General, Provincial Secretary and as the Minister for Co-operation and Co-operative Development.

Mr. Heald was born in Regina, Saskatchewan, on August 27, 1919. He graduated from the University of Saskatchewan in 1942 with a Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Law Degrees. Following the completion of his post secondary education, Mr. Heald served in the Royal Canadian Air Force during World War II. After the war, he began to practice law in a firm that became known as Noonan, Embury, Heald, Molisky and Gritzfeld. Mr. Heald was active in the Regina community as a Mason, Shriner and member of the Kiwanis Club. He was a curler and football fan and was on the Executive of the Saskatchewan Roughriders Club. In 1971, he was appointed to the Federal Court of Canada and served as a Justice on both the Trial and Appeal Divisions until he retired in 1999.

Mr. Heald is survived by his wife of 59 years, Doris, and their children Lynn and her partner, Mike, and Brian and his partner, Debra and niece Cindy Narum Fischer.

In recording its own deep sense of loss and bereavement, this Assembly expresses its most sincere sympathy with members of the bereaved family.

Alex Gordon Kuziak, who passed away on May 14, 2010, at the age of 101, was a Member of this Legislative Assembly from 1948 until 1964, representing the constituency of Canora for the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation. He served as the Minister of Telephones and Telegraphs, the Minister in charge of the Government Finance Office, Minister of Natural Resources and the Minister of Mineral Resources. Mr. Kuziak was the first person of Ukrainian origin to serve in a Canadian cabinet.

Mr. Kuziak was born on October 15, 1908 near Donwell, Saskatchewan in his parents' farm home. He attended early schooling in and near Canora and high school in Yorkton and Saskatoon. He left Saskatchewan and worked in Detroit and Pontiac as a factory worker and taxi driver. Upon return to Canada, Mr. Kuziak obtained his teaching certificate at the Moose Jaw Normal School in 1931. He taught in Canora until he met his wife, Anne, and then worked as the Secretary-Treasurer of the Rural Municipality of Keys. He also operated a real estate and insurance office in Canora and was a senior partner of the Canora Electric and Heating Co. After his years in office, Mr. Kuziak was elected as an alderman for the city of Yorkton in 1971 for one term.

For his contribution to the province, Mr. Kuziak was formally recognized in 1999 with a Nation Builders Award to recognize community contributions of outstanding Ukrainian Canadians.

Mr. Kuziak and his wife, Ann, were married on June 8, 1935. They had four children, four grandchildren and three great grandchildren. STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER (Priority of Debate)

I wish to inform the Assembly that a notice regarding a proposed matter for Priority of Debate was received in the Clerk's office at 11:25 a.m. today for which I thank the Opposition House Leader.

Pursuant to Rule 27(5) it is my duty to determine whether or not the matter should have urgent consideration with regard to the extent it concerns the administrative responsibilities of the government, could come within the scope of ministerial action and the probability of the issue being brought before the Assembly within a reasonable time by other means.

The fundamental principle underlying Rule 27 was to provide the opportunity within a proper framework of parliamentary procedure, where none existed, for the immediate discussion of any matter deemed to be of such urgency and importance that the business of the Assembly should be put aside in order to discuss one specific particular subject.

I have considered this matter carefully in the context of my responsibilities under Rule 27. The motion proposed does not contravene any of the restrictions outlined in subsection six of the rule. However, by the information presented by the Member for Regina Dewdney it is not apparent that the operation of the Salvation Army shelter is within the administrative jurisdiction of the Government of Saskatchewan. I agree with the member that the matter raised is of public importance. The broader scope of the matter is perhaps within the scope of some sort of ministerial action. But from the information presented by the member I do not find it evident that the situation would change appreciably if the matter came under debate utilizing the regular notice provisions of our rules. In the immediate future there will be an opportunity for this matter to be placed on the order paper. The member can provide notice as early as tomorrow to debate this matter on Thursday. According to the rotation, the Opposition House Leader may designate this motion as his priority item to be debated on Thursday. For this reason the decision of the Speaker is to deny the request for Priority of Debate.

**STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Unparliamentary Language)**

Members, before Orders of the Day, I would ask for your attention as I am prepared to make a statement on a point of order raised yesterday by the Deputy Government House Leader (Mr. Harrison).

The Deputy Government House Leader's point of order concerned the use of the word "deceive" by the Leader of the Opposition during Question Period, in an exchange with the Minister of Agriculture. I have reviewed the verbatim and I am prepared to make a statement regarding the exchange.

The Leader of the Opposition said, from page 6374 of Hansard, "the minister signed the AgStability. He's the minister who signed, so let's get that clear. And let's not deceive the public." In *Beauchesne's* 6th Edition, paragraph 490, the word "deceit" is listed as unacceptable while in paragraph 489 the same word is listed as acceptable by House of Commons in Ottawa usage. The reason for this is that the context and use of the word is key to determining whether or not it is acceptable. One of the acceptability tests is cited

in *The House of Commons Procedure and Practice*, 2nd Edition, at page 614, which is as follows: “Remarks directed specifically at another member which question that member’s integrity, honesty or character are not in order.”

In a ruling dated November 19, 2004, Speaker Kowalsky stated the following about the use of the word deceit: “With respect to the use of the word deceive or deception that was called to attention once, but also used again by the member for, I believe, Arm River. The definition of the word deceit in the Oxford dictionary is, to believe what is false or to mislead purposely. With misleading . . . we are often misled, not whether it be intentionally or not intentionally, but using the word deceive then implies intention. So I would ask members not to use that word in this Assembly.”

In response to the point of order the Opposition House Leader (Mr. Yates) asked that the use of the term “hypocritical” by the Minister of Agriculture in the same exchange also be reviewed by the Speaker. At page 6374 of yesterday’s Hansard the Minister of Agriculture said: “I find it somewhat amazing and hypocritical of the Leader of the Opposition”. In passing, I want to remind the Opposition House Leader that this was in effect a separate point of order. In future, I would remind members that a new point of order should not be raised when speaking to another point of order, rather it should be raised as a separate point of order.

Having said that, I did also review how this word was used. Again, the word “hypocrisy” can be found in both the acceptable and unacceptable lists in *Beauchesne*. The same standard for context must be applied. Interestingly, this word was also addressed by Speaker Kowalsky in the ruling I have just cited. Speaker Kowalsky ruled that the word hypocritical, when applied to an individual, is not in order.

I ask both the Leader of the Opposition and Minister of Agriculture to be careful in their choice of words. It is not acceptable to question each other’s integrity, honesty or character. In *Beauchesne’s* at paragraph 491 it says: “The Speaker has consistently ruled that language used in the House should be temperate and worthy of the place in which it is spoken. No language is, by virtue of any list, acceptable or unacceptable. A word which is parliamentary in one context may cause disorder in another context, and therefore be unparliamentary”.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Same Question – Bill Nos. 148 and 617)

I would like to draw to the attention of Members that this Assembly had under consideration two bills, which through the process of amendments, ended up with provisions of substantially the same purpose: Bill No. 148 – The Animal Protection Amendment Act, 2010 in the name of the Minister of Agriculture and Bill No. 617 – The Protection of Service Animals Act in the name of the Member for Saskatoon Centre. Both bills propose means to protect service animals from abuse.

According to *Erskine May Parliamentary Practice*, Twenty-third Edition, p. 578:

“There is no rule or custom which restrains the presentation of two or more bills relating to the same subject, and containing similar provisions. But if a decision of the House has already been taken on one such bill ... the other is not proceeded with if it contains substantially the same provisions ...”

This Legislative Assembly has numerous precedents on the subject of the "same question rule" with respect to bills. Speakers have consistently ruled that if the Assembly has agreed to one bill that contains similar provisions in another bill, the Speaker must then prevent any further consideration of the second bill.

Today Bill No. 148 – The Animal Protection Amendment Act, 2010 was reported back to the Assembly with amendments. The Assembly agreed to the amendments and third reading. Given the decision by the Assembly to adopt the amended bill, it is my duty to ensure that the Assembly does not come to two different decisions on the same question. For this reason it is necessary that I order that Item No. 4 under Private Members’ Public Bills and Orders, Second Readings, Bill No. 617 – The Protection of Service Animals Act be removed from the Order Paper.

Thereupon, Bill No. 617 was withdrawn.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Appropriateness of Statement by Minister)

I am now prepared to rule on the point of order raised yesterday by the Opposition House Leader (Mr. Yates) with regards to the Ministerial Statement given by the Minister Responsible for the Status of Women (Ms. Draude).

First, I would like to remind Members of previous rulings relating to clarifying acceptable Ministerial Statements on March 24, 2010, March 17, 2009, April 23, 2008, April 15, 2008 and December 19, 2007.

Members will appreciate the difficulty faced by the Speaker in determining the appropriateness of a Ministerial Statement as it is being delivered. Often it is only once a statement is well under way or has been announced that the Speaker may be able to discern whether the statement is in order. The Speaker does not monitor government announcements and does not always know if a statement relates to something previously announced or the timing of announcements. Compounding my difficulty in making an immediate ruling is the need to ensure fairness to the opposition by affording an equal opportunity to respond to the statement.

In reviewing previous Speakers rulings and the information put forward by both House Leaders I wish to clarify for the guidance of members the acceptable guidelines for Ministerial Statements. Several rulings have outlined that Ministerial Statements should not comment on matters that have been previously announced, must refer to a new government direction, policy or program and must be made at the earliest opportunity. I find that the Ministerial Statement provided by the Minister Responsible for the Status of Women relating to Women Build a Habitat for Humanity program in Regina, contained information that was announced by the government earlier in the day. As outlined in my ruling on March 24, 2010 a new announcement is one that is made in the Assembly at the earliest opportunity. In this situation, the minister made a new announcement earlier in the same day. It is not unreasonable for the minister to make a new announcement in the morning and later the same day make a Ministerial Statement in the Assembly. Therefore, I find that the point of order was not well taken.

**STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Unparliamentary Language)**

I am prepared to make a statement on a point of order raised by the Government House Leader (Mr. D'Autremont). The point of order relates to the comments made by the Member from Athabasca (Mr. Belanger) during debate on Bill No. 144 on Wednesday, March 9, 2011. The Government House Leader asserts that the Member from Athabasca made profane remarks across the floor to another member. In response, the Opposition House Leader (Mr. Yates) argued that the matter should have been raised at the time and not two sitting days later.

I would like to remind members it is the practice of this Assembly in raising a point of order that it must be brought at the earliest possible time. *Beauchesne's* 6th edition at paragraph 321 states "a point of order against procedure must be raised promptly." The remarks in question are not published in *Hansard* but are clearly audible on the video record. The Government House Leader contends that it was not possible to review the video proceedings until after the House adjourned on Thursday afternoon. I have confirmed that there was a network connectivity problem that delayed the posting of the video record until after 1 p.m. on March 10.

I agree with the Opposition House Leader that points of order should be raised promptly and at the first opportunity. Most often points of order are raised in the course of debate but it is not uncommon for matters to be raised the next sitting day after a review of the record. In this case, I have confirmed that the first opportunity to raise the issue in the Assembly, after a review of the video record, was yesterday's sitting. I remind members that they are able to ask the Chair to review the record for comments that they believe to be out of order. Members do not need to wait for the publication of proceedings before raising a point of order.

Aside from the timing of the point of order, I do find that the remarks made across the floor were unparliamentary. I have reviewed *Hansard* and found the Deputy Speaker (Mr. Brkich) did intervene when the remarks were made. I would like to direct members to page 6604 of *Hansard* where the Deputy Speaker asked the member to watch his language and not to talk across the floor. I also note that last evening, at the beginning of proceedings, the Member from Athabasca withdrew the offensive remarks. Given that the Deputy Speaker dealt with the matter at the time of the incident and the subsequent withdrawal of the remark, I do not believe the Speaker needs to make further comment.

I want to close by reinforcing what the Deputy Speaker said at the time of the incident and encourage members to be mindful of Rule 46(2) that prohibits loud private conversations and offensive language in this Assembly. This behaviour makes it difficult to maintain order and decorum.

**STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Unparliamentary Language)**

On Thursday March 17, 2011, the Government Whip (Mr. Weekes) raised a point of order about comments made by the Member from Regina Coronation Park (Mr. Trew) during the 75-minute Private Members' Day debate. The Government Whip claims that the Member from Regina Coronation Park accused government members of purposely including a lie in a motion. After making an initial response to the point of order I did commit to carefully review the record. I have done this and I am now prepared to rule on this matter.

The debate in question can be found on page 6776 of *Hansard*. The Member from Regina Coronation Park stated,

I'm wondering how it is that the Sask Party Government House Leader can present such a complete fabrication that cannot be substantiated as fact, but how is it that I can't call that a lie or a mistruth? How does that work? How is it that something can be fabricated by the Sask Party government, a complete fabrication, and yet I can't call it a mistruth or a lie?

Further during the debate, the Member from Regina Coronation Park indicates that the Government House Leader (Mr. D'Autremont) "tries to put falsehoods into our mouths and tries to misrepresent."

On May 10, 2004, Speaker Kowlalsky ruled that it is not a legitimate function for members in debate to question directly or indirectly the integrity or motives of members individually or collectively. Members will find many rulings to this effect over the years. *Beauchesne's Parliamentary Rules & Forms*, 6th Edition at paragraph 487(2) states, "[w]ords may not be used hypothetically or conditionally, if they are plainly intended to convey a direct imputation." In this vein, Speaker Osika ruled on May 12, 2000, that it is out of order to use the guise of a literary device to allege something about another member that otherwise would be unparliamentary.

Upon a careful review of the *Hansard*, I find that the Member for Regina Coronation Park used the device of a hypothetical question to disguise an allegation that another member had tried to deliberately mislead the Assembly. While it is not unparliamentary to criticize statements made by members as being contrary to the facts, the integrity or motives of members, whether individually or collectively, should not be questioned directly or indirectly. For these reasons I find the comments made by the Member from Regina Coronation Park are out of order. I call on the Member to withdraw the remarks.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER (Appropriateness of Statement by Minister)

On Monday, March 28, 2011, the Opposition House Leader (Mr. Yates) raised a point of order regarding the Ministerial Statement made by the Minister of Social Services (Hon. Ms. Draude). The Opposition House Leader indicated that the minister had announced the Headstart program over a year earlier on March 24, 2010. The Government House Leader (Mr. D'Autremont) responded to the point of order by stating that the minister was announcing a new housing strategy. The strategy included a similarly named program that had been previously announced but contained new details, new projects and new programs.

Following the intervention by the Opposition House Leader, I advised the Assembly that the minister should have the opportunity to make her ministerial statement. This is in line with previous rulings where Speakers have ruled that it is difficult to determine the appropriateness of a Ministerial Statement as it is being delivered, and the Speaker must also balance this with the need to ensure fairness by allowing the opposition an equal opportunity to respond to the statement.

I committed to review the details and specifics of the ministerial statement. I have done this and I am now prepared to rule on this matter.

The Ministerial Statement made by the Minister of Social Services can be found on page 6919 of *Hansard*. The minister discussed a five-point housing plan. The Ministerial Statement details Headstart on a Home, affordable home ownership plan, rental construction, rental housing, and renewing and expanding the partnership with Habitat for Humanity. The Opposition House Leader is correct that the Headstart on a Home program was previously announced in a news release on March 24, 2010. The Ministerial Statement presented yesterday does provide further specific details on this program. However, reviewing the record, the Habitat for Humanity program and incentives for investment in rental housing have both been previously announced. On the other hand, the housing plan announced in the Ministerial Statement does contain new information pertaining to affordable home ownership and rental construction plus additional dollars for Habitat for Humanity.

I find that some of the information contained in the Ministerial Statement was previously announced but there was also new information relating to housing. This creates a dilemma for the Speaker in determining whether or not the statement is in order. I have reminded ministers that ministerial statements must focus on announcing new programs. The question is was there anything in the statement that might constitute a new initiative for a program previously announced. Although not a new program, should updates and new initiatives be permitted? This is a very difficult question for the Speaker. In the case of motions, if any part of a motion is irregular, that renders the whole motion irregular. It is the Speaker's point of view that in the absence of clear guidelines for ministerial statements, this principle should be applied. Because a portion of the statement did contain matters from previous announcements, I must find the point of order well taken.

This is the fourth time I have had to rule on the appropriateness of ministerial statements. Our Assembly does not have a rule that details what constitutes a proper ministerial statement. We do have rules that govern the content of members' statements. I think it is time that this Assembly clear up the evident uncertainty about what properly constitutes a ministerial statement. I have called on the Standing Committee on House Services to review the rules for ministerial statements. I can understand that there is confusion and this event only underscores the need for members to consider and properly define an allowable Ministerial Statement for all members and ministers.

On another note, on March 24, 2010, I ruled that the response to a Ministerial Statement should not exceed the time taken by the minister. This is consistent with our practice and previous rulings by other Speakers. Speaker Rolfes interrupted a member due to the length of a response on June 15, 1993. On April 8, 1998 and April 10, 1997, Speaker Hagel interrupted a Member when the response to a Ministerial Statement was longer than the minister's statement, and went on to recognize another member. Members should be mindful of this practice.

**STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Privilege)**

Earlier today, I received notification from the Government House Leader (Mr. D'Autremont) that he intends to raise a question of privilege on Orders of the Day. The notice arrived at 11:30 a.m. in accordance with Rule 12(1) and a copy was distributed by my office to the Opposition House Leader.

The Government House Leader claims that the Member from Regina Dewdney made the comment, "We have a biased Speaker." He argues that the claim is substantiated by reference to the video record of the Assembly proceedings from March 28, 2011, at the 1:13:58 mark. The Government House Leader argues that the statement constitutes a breach of privilege by citing cases from the Northwest Territories and by quoting Maingot's *Parliamentary Privilege in Canada*, 2nd edition, at page 253.

To begin, I want to advise members of the applicable rules and practices of this Assembly. Rule 50(d) states that “Members should not reflect on the conduct of the Speaker or other presiding officer except by way of a substantive motion with notice.” The *House of Commons Procedure and Practice*, 2nd edition, 2009, states on page 313, “Reflections on the character or actions of the Speaker – an allegation of bias, for example – could be taken by the House as breaches of privilege and punished accordingly.” As cited by the Government House Leader, Maingot’s *Parliamentary Privilege in Canada*, 2nd edition, page 253, states, “Any suggestion of partiality or bias on the part of a presiding officer such as the Speaker, a chairman of a Committee of the Whole, or a chairman of a standing or special committee automatically shows disrespect and amounts to contempt.”

On three occasions, November 17, 1977, April 11, 1980, and April 24, 1980, privilege cases were brought before this Assembly based on allegations of bias or impartiality of the Speaker. In all those cases the Assembly found that contempt had been committed.

As Speaker it is my duty to decide whether a *prima facie* case of breach of privilege has been established. In doing so, the Speaker must be satisfied that the allegation is properly a matter of privilege and if a sufficient case has been established to justify giving precedence over the Orders of the Day. It is my conclusion that the remark was indeed stated by the Member from Regina Dewdney. Upon review of our own rules and practices, past cases, and our parliamentary authorities, comments reflecting on the impartiality of the Speaker are properly matters of privilege. For these reasons I find that the comments constitute a *prima facie* case of breach of privilege.

However, in light of the admission earlier today by the Member from Regina Dewdney for having made the remark, and for his full and ample apology to the Speaker and the Assembly, I find that the matter is sufficiently resolved. I remind members at page 267 of Maingot’s *Parliamentary Privilege in Canada*, 2nd edition, in the section “Where a Member is the subject of a question of privilege,” it is stated: “An apology by the offending Member will invariably close the matter without the necessity of putting the motion to a vote.”

I thank the Member from Regina Dewdney for taking responsibility for his actions.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER (Appropriateness of Statement by Minister)

On Monday, May 2, 2011, the Opposition House Leader (Mr. Yates) raised a point of order regarding the Ministerial Statement made by the Minister of Energy and Resources (Hon. Mr. Boyd). He did so very shortly after the minister began speaking. The Opposition House Leader indicated that the Ministerial Statement contained previously announced information dated March 7 and did not contain a new idea, program or public policy, but rather something that had been in the newspaper for more than two months. The Deputy Government House Leader (Hon. Mr. Harrison) responded to the point of order by stating that the minister had no opportunity to provide information on the new announcement before the intervention. It became apparent that the Opposition House Leader based his point of order on the basis of the minister having provided an advance copy of the announcement to his opposition critic.

In accordance with previous rulings of the Speaker, I advised the Assembly that the minister should have the opportunity to make his Ministerial Statement as it is difficult to determine the appropriateness of a Ministerial Statement as it is being delivered. I committed to review the details and specifics of the Ministerial Statement. I have done this and I am now prepared to rule on this matter.

The Ministerial Statement made by the Minister of Energy and Resources can be found beginning on page 7427 of *Hansard*. The minister outlined that the company Paper Excellence will be accelerating the restart program of the pulp mill in Prince Albert, new funding to train new mill workers, new pension plan agreements and a new timeline for major forest activity. The Opposition House Leader is correct that the Prince Albert pulp mill reopening was previously announced in a news release and a Ministerial Statement on March 7, 2011.

Reviewing the record, I find that the Ministerial Statement appears to announce new initiatives that Paper Excellence itself has undertaken. The Speaker could not determine what, if anything, in the statement might be a new government program or initiative. In future, I would ask that Ministerial Statements clearly articulate new government initiatives, direction, policy and programmes.

This case once again highlights the confusion that exists over what constitutes a proper Ministerial Statement. This latest example highlights the need for members to clarify and define the proper content for Ministerial Statements through the Standing Committee on House Services.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER

(Ruling on Bill Nos. 629 and 630 – Requirement for Royal Recommendation)

It is the practice of this Assembly and the Speaker's duty to review all bills in regard to Rule 65 of *The Rules and Procedures of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan*. This rule states in part that any bill which proposes "any new or additional charge upon the public revenue or upon the people [...] shall be recommended to the Assembly by Message of the Lieutenant Governor before it is considered by the Assembly."

Speakers have consistently upheld the constitutional principle of the financial initiative of the Crown, including accountability for all public expenditures and initiating legislation that imposes additional charges upon the public. Members of Executive Council are held strictly accountable for all public expenditures, and accordingly, only they may initiate legislation involving the imposition of new or additional charges upon the public revenue or upon the people.

The practice in this Assembly is for bills to be introduced and read the first time with their further progress being contingent upon the Speaker affirming that they are in order pursuant to Rule 65 of *The Rules and Procedures of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan*. I have now had the opportunity to review a number of bills that have been introduced and wish to draw to the attention of the Assembly *Bill No. 629 – The Independent Budget Officer Act*, and *Bill No. 630 – The Health Document Storage Act*. Both bills are presently standing on the Order Paper for second reading under Private Members' Public Bills and Orders, items No. 9 and 10 respectively.

Pursuant to Rule 23(3), these bills could be designated for priority consideration today and considered on Thursday. Therefore, to prevent consideration of bills that may not be procedurally acceptable, I must now rule whether these bills are in order.

On May 12, 2011, *Bill No. 629 – The Independent Budget Officer Act* was introduced by the Member from Regina Rosemont (Mr. Wotherspoon). The issue that I must address is whether Bill No. 629 contravenes the principle of the Crown initiative in financial matters.

Clause two of this bill establishes the Independent Budget Officer as an officer of the Legislative Assembly. Clause five details the mandate of the Independent Budget Officer and clauses eight and nine provide the legislative authority to enter into contracts and obtain services. The establishment of a new Officer of the Assembly would create a charge upon the public revenue.

It is stated in Erskine May 23rd edition at pages 881 and 882, that a particular legislative proposal requires to be authorized by a money resolution when a proposal involves a new expenditure or charge upon the public revenue that is not already covered by legislative authorization. Further on page 883, “the expenses connected with the establishment of a new department” require a Royal Recommendation. The establishment of a new Independent Officer of the Assembly would be similar to the establishment of a new department. I would also refer Members to the ruling of Speaker Hagel on April 7, 1997. In his ruling, Speaker Hagel found that the creation of a Health Ombudsman as an Officer of the Assembly and the associated office created a charge on public moneys. Further, Speaker Brockelbank ruled on March 11, 1980 that the establishment of an information commissioner required a Royal Recommendation. Similarly, rulings on May 6, 1998 by Speaker Hagel and June 12, 2001 by Speaker Kowalsky found bills seeking to create a commission constituted an expenditure of public funds and required a Royal Recommendation.

For these reasons, I find that Bill No. 629 requires a Royal Recommendation. The Member from Regina Rosemont is not a member of Executive Council, therefore I must rule that the said bill is out of order and be removed from the Order Paper.

With respect to the second Bill in question, on May 12, 2011, *Bill No. 630 – The Health Document Storage Act* was introduced by the Member from Saskatoon Eastview (Ms. Junor). The issue that I must address is whether Bill No. 630 requires an expenditure of public funds and thus contravenes the principle of the Crown initiative in financial matters.

Upon review, clause three requires the Ministry of Health to establish a medical file storage facility for both paper and electronic documents. The establishment of a medical file storage facility would require a financial expenditure by the Ministry of Health. Erskine May 23rd edition at page 884 clearly states that “the authorization of a single payment out of the Consolidated Fund requires a recommendation.” Further, Bill No. 630 provides the Office of the Saskatchewan Information and Privacy Commissioner the additional legislative authority to maintain and organize the medical file storage facility. I would refer Members to Erskine May 23rd edition at page 883, which states “expenses arising out of the imposition of new duties on an existing department or authority” require a Royal Recommendation.

This Bill imposes new duties on the Office of the Information and Privacy Commissioner and the Ministry of Health. I refer Members to similar rulings by Speaker Brockelbank on May 20, 1980 and Speaker Tusa on May 1, 1990 where they ruled that a bill that imposed new duties on existing Independent Officers required a Royal Recommendation.

It is for these reasons that I find that *Bill No. 630 – The Health Document Storage Act* contravenes the principle of the Crown initiative in financial matters. Bill No. 630 requires a Royal Recommendation. The Member from Saskatoon Eastview is not a member of Executive Council and not entitled to obtain such a recommendation. Accordingly, I must rule that the said Bill is out of order and be removed from the Order Paper.

Thereupon, Bill Nos. 629 and 630 were withdrawn.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Same Question – Bill Nos. 907 and 625)

I would like to draw to the attention of members that this Assembly had under consideration two bills with provisions of substantially the same purpose: *Bill No. 907 – The Congregation of the Sisters of St. Elizabeth of the Third Order Regular of St. Francis of Assisi Amendment Act, 2011* in the name of the Member for Saskatoon Northwest (Mr. Wyant), and *Bill No. 625 – The Saskatchewan Respectful Language Act* in the name of the Member for Saskatoon Centre (Mr. Forbes). Both bills propose means to remove the same anachronistic phrase from existing legislation.

According to *Erskine May Parliamentary Practice*, 23rd edition, p. 578:

There is no rule or custom which restrains the presentation of two or more bills relating to the same subject, and containing similar provisions. But if a decision of the House has already been taken on one such bill [...] the other is not proceeded with if it contains substantially the same provisions [...]

This Legislative Assembly has numerous precedents on the subject of the “same question rule” with respect to bills. Speakers have consistently ruled that if the Assembly has agreed to one bill that contains similar provisions in another bill, the Speaker must then prevent any further consideration of the second bill.

Yesterday, the Assembly passed all stages of *Bill No. 907 – The Congregation of the Sisters of St. Elizabeth of the Third Order Regular of St. Francis of Assisi Amendment Act, 2011*. Given the decision by the Assembly to pass this bill, it is my duty to ensure that the Assembly does not come to two different decisions on the same question. For this reason, it is necessary that I order that item no. 5 under Private Members’ Public Bills and Orders, Second Readings, *Bill No. 625 – The Saskatchewan Respectful Language Act* be removed from the Order Paper.

Thereupon, Bill No. 625 was withdrawn.

PRIVATE MEMBERS’ MOTIONS

to continue the plan to improve the accessibility of affordable housing throughout Saskatchewan, and take steps to ensure that the knowledge that was gained from the most recent housing summit be implemented to help in taking strides towards addressing rent and affordable housing issues facing people in our province.

The debate continuing on the motion and the amendment, proceedings were interrupted and the Hon. Mr. Krawetz requested leave of the Assembly as follows:

After consultation with the Opposition House Leader, in order to conclude proceedings of this sitting day, I ask leave of the Assembly to suspend Rule 26(4) and further proceedings of Motion No. 2 presently under debate, and that the said debate be reinstated to the Order Paper as an adjourned debate.

Leave having been granted, Motion No. 2 was deemed adjourned and reinstated to the Order Paper.

Sun Country Health Region believes that the closure of 5 long-term care beds in Wawota will improve patient safety. The Region also closed 10 long-term care beds in Carlyle as these beds were not in operation for the past 5 years. Sunrise Health Region is converting double rooms to single rooms which will result in a reduction of 45 beds. Many residents prefer a room of their own and this change will improve the quality of care for those residents.

Note: As a pilot project, the ministry through Prince Albert Parkland Regional Health Authority funded 15 long-term care beds in a 30 bed personal care home at Muskeg Lake. The operator of the home chose to close the personal care home and therefore these beds are no longer available.

This allows Responsible Gaming Specialists to initiate timely interactions with the guest and provide them with information and resources so they can make responsible choices about their play.

The terms and conditions of the Players Club program are provided to guests on the application form. By signing the application form, the applicants agree to the terms and conditions of the Players Club program.

Players Club phone numbers supplied to Fast Consulting by SGC are strictly limited for SGC research only. While being used they are kept in a secure, password protected area. Lists are destroyed each time Fast Consulting receives an updated list from SGC for a research project.

Arcas Direct Marketing Group is also fully PIPEDA compliant. Arcas states that data resides on their secured file server, located in their secure server room within a secured facility, for 6-12 months. Data is kept on the active file server primarily for data processing, mailing verification, suppression and for comparison purposes. All of these functions are for SGC mailings only. Beyond the active time period, the files are then archived. SGC can have access to the archived file as requested. The data will only be deleted at the request of SGC. SGC purges its Players Club database regularly to remove players who have been inactive for 18 months or more.

It is difficult to measure vacancies over a long period of time as positions become vacant and are then filled. Vacancies are best measured at a point in time which the ministry has begun to do. Additionally, the SAHO payroll system at this time cannot measure vacancies so the ministry relies on survey data such as the information below and postings on the HealthCareersInSask website, which does not include vacancies posted internally by RHAs.

The second CT operates from 8:00 to 16:00. On call services are available after hours. Saskatoon City Hospital CT operates between 7:30 and 17:30 Monday through Friday. On call services are available after hours. St. Paul’s Hospital CT operates from 7:30 to 24:00 Monday through Sunday and on statutory holidays. On call services are available after hours.

Sunrise Regional Health Authority – operates its CT services from 8:00 to 16:30, Monday through Friday. On call services are available on weekends and after hours.

Ms. Junor asked the Government the following Question No. 979, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. McMorris:

To the Minister of Health: What are the operating hours of MRI scanners in each facility in the province?

Answer:

MRI services are available at the following hospitals: Regina General Hospital (Regina Qu’Appelle Health Region), Royal University Hospital, Saskatoon City Hospital, St. Paul’s Hospital (Saskatoon Health Region) and Lloydminster Hospital (Prairie North Health Region).

Regina operates both MRIs at the General Hospital from 6:30 to 22:30 Monday through Friday and from 7:00 to 15:00 on weekends and statutory holidays. On call services are available after hours.

In Saskatoon, the Royal University Hospital operates its MRI from 7:30 to 00:30 Monday through Friday, from 8:00 to 16:00 on weekends and from 8:00 to 24:00 on bank days (similar to EDOs that occur every third Friday). On call services are available after hours. Saskatoon City Hospital’s MRI is being replaced and the new machine will be operational in the coming weeks. Normal operating times

are 7:30 to 18:00 Monday through Friday. St. Paul’s Hospital MRI operates from 7:30 to 24:00 Monday through Friday and 8:00 to 16:00 on weekends. On call services are available after hours. In Prairie North Health Region, a mobile MRI unit is being operated in conjunction with the Alberta Health Services Board, which visits the Lloydminster Hospital one in every five weeks for four ten-hour days. A fifth ten-hour day has been added in recent months to accommodate additional patients. This service cares for both Alberta and Saskatchewan residents in the area.

Answer:

- (2) The rationale of the property owner was that extensive physical upgrades were essential to accommodate modern technology and provide full wheelchair accessibility in order for the college to continue providing modern, high quality educational programming.
