The Speaker informed the Assembly that he had received a communication from the Private Secretary to His Honour the Lieutenant Governor stating that His Honour would open the Session at 2:00 p.m. today, Wednesday, the 21st day of October, 2009.

SPEECH FROM THE THRONE

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor entered the Chamber, and having taken his seat upon the throne, was then pleased to open the Session with the following speech:

Mr. Speaker, Members of the Legislative Assembly, Honoured Guests, people of Saskatchewan:

It is my pleasure to welcome you to the Third Session of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature.

Introduction

Albert Einstein, a man who used his prodigious intellect to unlock the secrets of the universe, once made this simple but elegant observation:

“Life is like riding a bicycle. To keep your balance, you must keep moving.”

In 2009, our province has faced the challenge of a global economic recession. Saskatchewan has met this challenge and kept its balance because we kept moving – moving forward. In the past year, Saskatchewan’s population has grown faster than at any time since the early 1950s. Think about that.

In a year where the headlines across Canada and throughout the world were all about recession and economic gloom, Saskatchewan grew by over 16,000 people – the equivalent of adding a new city the size of Yorkton.

Saskatchewan continues to post the lowest unemployment rate in the country, while Saskatoon and Regina have the lowest unemployment among major Canadian cities. While Saskatchewan has felt the impact of the recession, today there are optimistic signs the recovery is slowly starting to take hold.

In the September 2009 edition of its Provincial Outlook, the Royal Bank of Canada states the Canadian economy is “poised to return onto a recovery track.” The report concludes next year’s economic recovery is expected to be widespread. All ten Canadian provinces are projected to expand in 2010, with western Canada leading the way. This report anticipates a growth rate of 3.6 per cent in Saskatchewan in 2010 and states: “...*This would return the province (Saskatchewan) to the head of the pack in terms of provincial growth rates.*” (*RBC Provincial Outlook, September 2009, pg. 4*). My government believes this level of performance is achievable and realistic, because of the industrious, resourceful and prudent nature of Saskatchewan people.

My government has spent considerable effort in the past year maintaining and enhancing Saskatchewan’s economic advantage through lower property and income taxes, a massive reduction in the provincial debt, and a record investment in infrastructure. This record investment in infrastructure includes \$1.2 billion to rebuild and repair over 3,200 kilometers of provincial highways over the past two years.

Debt Reduction

Since taking office, my government has reduced the province’s debt by \$2.7 billion, or nearly 40 per cent. In his 2009 Report “Understanding the Finances of the Government,” the Provincial Auditor noted that as a result of debt reduction: “*A greater proportion of the Government’s revenue was spent providing services instead of paying interest charges.*” (*Provincial Auditor 2009 Report, Volume 2, page 1*). However, this report also pointed to an inherent vulnerability in the Saskatchewan economy — a vulnerability that suggests the need to change the budgetary process.

This spring, as the recession was taking its toll on government revenues all across Canada, my government presented its budget. This document contained a forecast for potash revenues of \$1.9 billion. The forecast was based on a review of past volume levels, recent sales and prices, and on the most up-to-date projections. This forecast was wrong. Steps will be taken to modify the budgetary process in the future to reduce the impact of wild fluctuations in natural resource revenues.

Keeping our Balance

While Saskatchewan continues to move forward, my government has worked hard to maintain the proper balance between growth and ensuring that all Saskatchewan people enjoy the benefits of that growth. Housing and training allowances have been increased. My government has provided more daycare spaces and more opportunities for persons with disabilities. We have increased assistance to low income seniors by doubling the Seniors Income Plan benefit and 80,000 low income individuals in our province no longer pay any income tax at all. Still, there is more to be done to keep Saskatchewan moving forward.

Health

During this session, my government will focus much attention on improving our healthcare system. We will set specific goals and work to achieve those goals. Upon assuming office, my government was confronted with a serious shortage in the health care system. There were simply not enough nurses to provide the care needed for our sick and infirm.

In response to this shortage, my government did what others had refused to do. It set a bold, new goal. That goal was to recruit 800 additional nurses within four years. Today, my government is pleased to report that we are well on our way to achieving this important goal. As of today, 560 more nurses are working in Saskatchewan than when my government assumed office. 70 per cent of our goal has been achieved in less than two years. My government wishes to congratulate and thank the many people who have established new nursing careers throughout our province. The success of the nursing recruitment initiative shows there is power in setting bold goals.

Now, it is time to set another ambitious goal in health care. For many years, there has been a surgical backlog in Saskatchewan. This has created unacceptably long wait times for Saskatchewan patients. My government recently received the final report of the Patient First Review, and during this session, we will outline our response to the recommendations of this report. As a result of the excellent work of Mr. Tony Dagnone, and in response to the unacceptable surgical backlog, my government has set a bold, new goal. Over the next four years, we will reduce surgical wait times in Saskatchewan to no longer than three months. The plan to achieve this goal will be outlined during this session.

Saskatchewan has made significant progress in increasing the number of nurses working in our province, but the number of physicians in Saskatchewan remains a concern for the people of our province and our government. Saskatchewan has fewer family physicians than the national average, fewer specialists and retains fewer of its medical graduates. Our physician recruitment strategy is a partnership with regional health authorities, the Saskatchewan Medical Association and its physician members, the University of Saskatchewan's College of Medicine and its students, the Saskatchewan College of Physicians and Surgeons and Saskatchewan communities. This recruitment strategy will increase the number of physicians working in the province and enhance access to health care for Saskatchewan citizens.

The main focus of the strategy is to retain our province's medical graduates and residents so the people of Saskatchewan benefit from the dollars we spend training doctors in our province. The shortage of long-term care spaces continues to be a concern for Saskatchewan seniors and their families. In recent weeks, the Legislative Secretary to the Minister of Health has traveled throughout the province, consulting with Saskatchewan people on improving care for seniors. The results of these talks will form the basis of a plan to improve access to long-term care for seniors.

My government will also respond to concerns about the province's needle exchange program. There is a need to balance harm reduction and improved health outcomes with broader concerns for public safety. Therefore, my government will introduce changes to limit the proliferation of needles handed out by needle exchange programs. Ultimately, this program cannot be allowed to function as a source of unlimited free needles.

My government will tighten controls around both the numbers of needles exchanged and distributed. We will cap the number of needles given out at any one time, thus creating more frequent contact with health professionals, which in turn means more frequent opportunity for intervention and treatment. Our goal should not simply be safer drug use. Our goals should be to reduce drug use, to break the deadly cycle of addiction and to better assure the safety of all.

To that end, my government will fulfill its commitment to re-establish an independent provincial addictions agency and build on the work of the Ministry of Health, regional health authorities and their partners to strengthen the current system of prevention, education and treatment services.

Tobacco use in Saskatchewan remains too high, particularly amongst our young people. My government has already taken several important steps to curb smoking and the harmful effects of second-hand smoke, including enacting a ban on smoking in the workplace. During this session, my government will take further steps to protect the health of Saskatchewan people by introducing new legislation and a comprehensive new strategy to continue the reduction of tobacco use in our province.

Jurisdictions around the world are preparing for a second wave of H1N1 influenza. Saskatchewan is well prepared. Our government has been working and will continue to work with regional and local authorities along with First Nations and Métis leaders. Our goal is to ensure the health and safety of the people of Saskatchewan.

Education

My government recognizes that keeping Saskatchewan moving forward requires well-trained and highly educated people. We must prepare our children to meet the challenges of the future. There is still much truth in the time-honoured proverb: the only thing more expensive than education is ignorance. My government has significantly increased its share of direct funding to Saskatchewan schools – shifting the tax burden for education funding away from property taxpayers.

My government is also committed to providing high quality schools for our students. To date, nearly \$300 million has been invested by my government in pre-kindergarten to Grade 12 infrastructure – the largest amount ever invested in building and upgrading Saskatchewan schools in a two-year period. This commitment has moved forward a wide range of improvements – everything from maintenance and repairs to brand new schools. This funding has resulted in improvements to over 230 schools in communities in every part of Saskatchewan.

My government is also moving Saskatchewan forward by exceeding its campaign commitment to the provision of early learning and childcare opportunities. In the current fiscal year, over \$4 million has been provided for the development of 1,000 new licensed childcare spaces. By the end of March 2010, the number of funded childcare spaces will total 11,400. The quality of care provided to these young children is also improving.

As part of a government-wide initiative, community-based organizations now have three per cent more funding to recruit and retain early childhood educators. An additional \$1.2 million has been added to enhance their training. My government's commitment to the education system extends beyond Grade 12.

In the past two years, my government has made the largest investment ever in post-secondary infrastructure projects – over \$150 million. More than \$18 million was spent on student housing, including the first-ever SIAST student housing development at the Woodland Campus in Prince Albert and the first new residences built at the University of Saskatchewan in over 30 years.

This is an area that had unfortunately suffered from considerable neglect in the past. No longer. Money is also being earmarked for student loan enhancements. The weekly amount students can receive has been increased for the first time since 1994.

Putting Vulnerable People First

Over the past two years, my government has made significant investments towards protecting vulnerable children, foster families and supporting extended family caregivers. In the most recent budget, nearly \$25 million was set aside to improve the child welfare system. In the upcoming year, my government will continue this work with a thorough review of *The Child and Family Services Act* and *The Adoption Act*. My government will also begin implementing a new electronic case management system, to provide better monitoring and protection of children and youth in its care.

Roughly one year ago, my government announced the single largest investment in Saskatchewan history for supporting people with intellectual disabilities. It began as a four-year, \$76.9 million initiative to eliminate a 440-person waitlist for programs. By the end of this fiscal year, 264 people with intellectual disabilities will have received the help they require. That's 264 more people receiving the services they need to lead more fulfilling, independent lives. This is a clear example of Saskatchewan moving forward.

My government takes considerable pride in being able to report this significant progress and thanks the many people who work in community-based organizations to improve the lives of Saskatchewan people with disabilities. Since coming to office, my government has also acted to address the shortage of low

income housing in Saskatchewan. Over 500 low income units have opened in the past two years with over 500 more currently under construction and another 600 in the development and planning stages.

Justice and Policing

My government is proud of the considerable achievements in the last two years in making Saskatchewan a safer place. Crime rates are falling, but there is more work to do. This is why my government will continue moving forward toward our commitment of an additional 120 police officers.

The past two years have seen the creation of an Internet Child Exploitation Unit and the Northern Drug Unit. The Combined Forces Strategic Unit has been strengthened. The officers in these units target organized crime activities. Their efforts have already led to several high profile arrests. We will continue working with our neighbouring provinces to crack down on the scourge of drug trafficking and other gang activities.

My government will also introduce a number of laws that will improve safety and protect consumers. These laws include banning texting and hand-held cell phone usage while driving, new ticket sales legislation to protect those wishing to attend events and concerts, as well as preventing members of a profession from escaping disciplinary proceedings by resigning.

Agriculture

My government is committed to moving forward by making support programs for farm and ranch families more timely, simple and reliable. To this end, my government is moving the administration of the AgriStability program to Melville and assuming from the federal government the responsibility for administering the program. Crop insurance has been improved with innovations like yield trending, yield cushioning and 100 per cent wildlife damage compensation.

Farm and ranch families will also continue to benefit from the Agricultural Crown Land Sale Program, the Gopher Control Rebate Program and the Farm and Ranch Water Infrastructure Program, which is providing \$53 million over four years for wells, dugouts and pipelines.

My government has provided over \$70 million in direct support to livestock producers through the Cattle and Hog Support Program. Most importantly, after years of governments talking about education property tax on farmland, my government has provided a long-term solution and the largest farmland property tax reduction in Saskatchewan history.

First Nations and Métis Relations

The coming year will see further work on developing guidelines covering Saskatchewan's legal obligations under court rulings that outline the duty to consult. Saskatchewan can take considerable pride in becoming the first jurisdiction in Canada to implement Jordan's Principle – to ensure First Nations children get the medical attention they need when they need it.

My government will continue to focus on greater First Nations and Métis engagement in the economic prosperity of Saskatchewan. Provincial government funding to the Saskatchewan Indian Institute of Technologies, the Gabriel Dumont Institute and other educational institutions will help ensure First Nations and Métis young people have the skills they need to enter Saskatchewan's growing workforce.

The Métis Nation of Saskatchewan has requested that 2010 be designated as the Year of the Métis in Saskatchewan. My government will recognize the unique history and culture of Métis people by

honouring this request and by working with the Métis Nation and other organizations to honour the Trails of 1885 celebrations in 2010.

Environment

In the coming months, my government will move forward with plans for a new environmental regulatory framework. The safety of the public and protection of Saskatchewan's pristine beauty will remain its top priorities. However, there remains considerable room for eliminating duplication and delays within existing administrative processes. Saskatchewan's vast resource wealth and ingenuity have become an international story.

Later this year, Saskatchewan will be represented in Copenhagen at the United Nations Climate Change Conference. On this international stage, Saskatchewan will present its unique and practical plan to ensure carbon offsets or penalties imposed on heavy greenhouse gas emitters will stay in the province. This money will be used to fund continuing research and development of emissions-reduction technologies.

Saskatchewan will continue to move forward in its role as a world leader in carbon capture and storage through further progress on the large scale Boundary Dam clean coal project and the Saskatchewan-Montana clean coal and carbon capture initiative. Our most important natural resource is an abundant supply of safe, clean water. In this session, my government will be presenting a comprehensive water management plan. It will provide security of supply for residential and commercial uses, both now and in the future.

Energy

My government believes we need to look at all energy options – gas turbines, cogeneration, clean coal, wind, hydro, biomass, solar, import contracts and nuclear – to determine the best way to meet Saskatchewan's future energy needs in the most affordable, reliable and environmentally-friendly manner. A robust, advanced and reliable power system that can accommodate future growth is essential to keep Saskatchewan moving forward.

Over the past few months, Saskatchewan's energy future has been the focus of considerable public discussion. This discussion has been timely and productive. The Standing Committee on Crown and Central Agencies recently completed the first phase of hearings on Saskatchewan's energy future, with a second phase to take place early in the new year. Over the course of the next year, SaskPower will develop an electrical power generation strategy to meet our province's future needs.

This strategy will include a significant commitment to increased wind power. The past two years have also seen significant growth in the development of our oil and gas and mining sector. My government has and will continue to work diligently to provide regulatory and tax certainty. This will encourage major investment across Saskatchewan in coming years. In the next year, Innovation Saskatchewan will be fully implemented. My government's goal is to be a leader in innovation with the most aggressive innovation agenda in Canada.

Municipal Affairs

One must reach all the way back to 1913 to find a year when two new Saskatchewan cities were proclaimed in the same year. This year, it happened in the same week. My government is pleased to welcome Martensville and Meadow Lake as Saskatchewan's newest cities. These two communities — like all others in our province — have benefited from my government's historic commitment to increase municipal revenue sharing by tying those grants to the revenue received through the Provincial Sales Tax. As a result, Saskatchewan communities will have predictable funding, now and into the future.

Tourism, Parks, Culture and Sport

Our parks, our vibrant culture and our sport and recreational opportunities make Saskatchewan a great place to live. This year, more people than ever enjoyed Saskatchewan's beautiful provincial parks. By the beginning of the 2010 camping season, my government will have added 600 electrified campsites, and we will continue to improve our provincial parks by electrifying more campsites.

My government is in the final stages of creating the first new Provincial Cultural Policy in 30 years. This policy will build pride and enhance the distinct character of our unique Saskatchewan communities. We will also highlight Saskatchewan tourism, Saskatchewan business opportunities and Saskatchewan hospitality through our participation in the 2010 Vancouver Winter Olympics.

Those attending the Olympics will see what Saskatchewan has to offer through our athletes, our participation in the Cultural Olympiad and a first-class Olympic pavilion that will showcase Saskatchewan to people from around the world.

Immigration

Saskatchewan has a long and rich history of welcoming new Canadians from every part of the world. Our province's motto reflects this rich history – "From Many Peoples, Strength". Today we are writing a new chapter – attracting more new immigrants to Saskatchewan than at any time since the earliest days of our province's settlement. Over the past year, Saskatchewan has welcomed nearly 8,000 newcomers from other countries. These new Saskatchewan residents are making a strong contribution to our province's economy.

In this fiscal year, the Saskatchewan Immigrant Nominee Program has set the goal of attracting 3,400 nominations. This represents a 100 per cent increase over the goal two years ago. This goal will be met by reducing processing times. Last year, those times were cut by 24 per cent, despite a 47 per cent increase in applications. My government applauds those who have worked hard to achieve this goal. We welcome these new Canadians to the best province in the best country in the world.

Conclusion

One of the reasons Canada is the best country in the world is because of those who are ever willing to defend her liberty and her safety. As Members of the Legislative Assembly were preparing to return for this session, over 20 Saskatchewan reservists were preparing for a tour of duty in Afghanistan.

My government salutes these Saskatchewan heroes and all the brave men and women who serve in Canada's armed forces. We pray for their safety and wish them Godspeed in their mission as they risk their lives for our security, for our freedom and for the war-torn and war-weary people of Afghanistan.

In the past year, my government has honoured the courage and sacrifice of Saskatchewan's military personnel by affixing tribute decals on all government vehicles and by creating the Scholarship of Honour. This scholarship is available to returning soldiers and to the spouse and children of permanently disabled or fallen soldiers. To date, 11 Scholarships of Honour have been awarded and more will be awarded in the coming year.

During this session, the Public Accounts for the last fiscal year, together with the Estimates for the new year commencing April 1, 2010, will be submitted to you.

Saskatchewan poet Florence Scholer penned the following:

*I am an ageless, impatient land that makes of timid men heroes;
I am the hopes and dreams and disappointments
Of long-gone pioneers.
I am history and heartache and happiness,
And I welcome all who pause here.
I am the past and the future of this great, good land.
I am Saskatchewan.*

The residents of our province have much to be thankful for. We have been blessed by providence. Saskatchewan people are a patient people, because sometimes our blessings have come to us later than we may have hoped. This year, summer came late to Saskatchewan.

Time and again, you heard people say how much they were enjoying the beautiful September weather, probably because they had waited so long for it to arrive. In the same way, Saskatchewan people seem to share a special appreciation for our great province's new era of growth and opportunity, probably because they have waited so long for it to arrive. Saskatchewan is moving forward.

To keep our balance, we must keep moving forward. That is the goal of my government, and that is the task ahead for all Members of this Assembly. We can do this. We will do this.

God Bless Saskatchewan. God Bless Canada. And God Save the Queen.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER

(Deferred Ruling)

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Privilege – November 3, 2009)

Yesterday, the Opposition House Leader (Mr. Yates) gave notice of a question of privilege. The notice concerned responses by the Minister of Corrections, Public Safety and Policing (Mr. Huyghebaert) made during the oral question period of October 29, 2009. The notice and details of the subject matter were in writing and the proposed motion of remedy was received at least two hours prior to the regular opening of the Assembly, in accordance with the requirements of Rule 12.

The Opposition House Leader's case is that the Minister of Corrections, Public Safety and Policing breached the privileges of this Assembly by his responses during the oral question period.

To begin with, I want to outline for all members the parliamentary issue that is raised by the Opposition House Leader's question of privilege. The allegation of the member is that the Minister of Public Safety, Corrections and Policing was "attempting to mislead the House." An allegation of "attempting to mislead the House" is equal to a charge that a member has willfully or deliberately misled the Assembly.

I think all members are familiar with the Rule that prohibits the making of a personal charge or accusation against another member in the normal course of debate. The charge that a member has made deliberately misleading statements, if well-founded, is treated as contempt of parliament. Accusations and personal charges against a member must be made directly by substantive motion or by raising a question of privilege.

I remind all honourable members that it is not the role of the Speaker to decide if a breach of privilege or contempt has been committed. This is a question that only the Assembly can decide. It is the Speaker's role to decide whether a *prima facie* case has been established. What that means is the Speaker is to judge whether there is sufficient evidence to merit setting aside the regular business of the Assembly to debate the matter. If the Speaker finds a *prima facie* case has been established, then the question is put to the Assembly in the form of the motion included as part of the Opposition House Leader's case.

Yesterday, I deferred my ruling on the case in order to carefully review the evidence put forward by the Opposition House Leader, the authorities and relevant precedents. I am now prepared to rule on the case.

First of all, I want to outline the parliamentary practices of the Houses of Commons in Ottawa and Westminster, when allegations are made against a member for deliberately making a false statement. I do this because both Ottawa and Westminster practice are cited in the case and because Saskatchewan's practice differs somewhat.

At Ottawa and Westminster, the primary threshold of proof that a member deliberately misled the House is the member's own admission of guilt. The Opposition House Leader cites a House of Commons case in Ottawa, which he states is "virtually identical" to his case against the Minister of Public Safety, Corrections and Policing. He quotes the Speaker, who cites House of Commons practice by quoting from Erskine May, as follows:

"The Commons may treat the making of a deliberately misleading statement as contempt. In 1963 the House resolved that in making a personal statement which contained words which he later admitted not to be true, a former member had been guilty of a grave contempt."

The quoted passage can be found at page 132 of the *Erskine May's Parliamentary Practice*, 23rd edition, where the Profumo case is cited as the guiding precedent. In that case Profumo, a Minister of the Crown, confessed that he had misled the House and lied in testimony elsewhere. Similarly, although not mentioned by the Opposition House Leader, in the Ottawa case, the Minister of Defence admitted to the

media that he had misled the House. This is why the Speaker quoted the 1963 Westminster case. In the case before us, there is no admission by the Minister of Public Safety, Corrections and Policing that he had deliberately misled this Assembly in Question Period on October 29, 2009. Therefore, the Ottawa situation is not “virtually identical” and does not support the Opposition House Leader’s case.

In Saskatchewan, however, a contempt charge does not necessarily require an admission of guilt. Contempt has been found on the basis of evidence. On November 18, 1975, the Speaker ruled that unless evidence can be produced that demonstrates “knowing and deliberate deception of the Assembly, there is no question of privilege.” Such was the case on July 13, 1982, when a *prima facie* case was established that a Minister had deliberately and willfully misled the Assembly when a letter proved that he had been personally involved with the dismissal of an employee after having denied the fact in Question Period.

In the absence of a confession, the Speaker must review the details provided by the Opposition House Leader for evidence to determine if the Minister did commit a “knowing and deliberate deception of the Assembly.”

I will first deal with the exchange in Question Period of October 29, 2009, which is where the Opposition House Leader begins his case.

The Opposition House Leader has quoted, in the first instance the Minister did say he had no knowledge that a dangerous sex offender is unlawfully at large. What isn’t quoted is that the Minister then said “if the member would like to pass some information over to me, I will definitely look into it.” After another exchange about government policy, the Minister asks for “details on the specifics of the case.” The Opposition House Leader then provided the specifics, which the Minister addressed. It is clear, and I don’t think disputed, that the Minister did provide the information sought by the member. What is under review is whether the Minister had, by this evidence, deliberately attempted to mislead the Assembly.

It is apparent that after further questions the Minister did know that the person in question was at large. The Opposition House Leader claims that if the initial answer had been allowed to stand, then quote “the Minister would have misled this Assembly without anyone being the wiser.” The operative words are quote “would have misled.” If the record had not been corrected, the member might have a case if it could be proved the Minister did knowingly mislead the Assembly. The fact of the matter is that the Minister did not allow his initial answer to stand and he corrected the record after more information was supplied by the member. For this reason I find that the Opposition House Leader has not provided proof that the Minister did knowingly and willfully attempt to mislead the Assembly. Nor has the Opposition House Leader provided evidence that the exchange in Question Period had in any way obstructed or impeded the Opposition House Leader or any other member in the performance of their duties.

I will now deal with the claim that the Minister said one thing in the Assembly about his responsibility and another thing outside the Assembly to the media.

Generally, the Speaker is not concerned with what is said outside this chamber unless it has some bearing on, or connection to, the rights and privileges of the Assembly and its members. In this case the Opposition House Leader alleges that what was said outside by the Minister to the media is evidence that he deliberately misled the Assembly.

In the Assembly the Minister stated “we decided and I decided not to make a public announcement.” It is common, and required in this Assembly, for Ministers to take responsibility for the administrative and policy decisions of their ministries regardless of who actually committed an action. The Opposition House Leader has not provided any evidence that the Minister attempted to deceive or mislead the Assembly in this regard.

For these reasons, I find that Opposition House Leader has not produced the evidence necessary for the Speaker to find that a *prima facie* case of contempt has been established.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Relevance of Responses and Decorum)

I would like to bring to the attention of the Assembly an issue of order that needs to be addressed before the commencement of proceedings today.

First, the question of order relates to the scope of responses during Question Period. I ruled on this issue on a previous occasion. I am concerned that certain Ministers might have lost sight of Rule 19(3) that responses shall be relevant to the question, but a Minister may decline to answer or take notice of a question.

During the exchange yesterday between the Member from Saskatoon Fairview (Mr. Iwanchuk) and the Minister of Advanced Education, Labour and Employment (Mr. Norris) there were questions posed regarding occupational health and safety rules and safety standards relating to a specific crane. I find that although the Minister related his responses to occupational health and safety they did not relate to the specific crane in question. This response was not completely irrelevant but it does raise some concerns of a trend.

In the same Question Period, the question brought forward by the Member for Regina Dewdney (Mr. Yates) focused on objections by police forces in issuing a media advisory. The response provided by the Minister of Corrections, Public Safety and Policing (Mr. Huyghebaert) related to disclosure of confidential inmate files. I find that the Minister's responses were not relevant and therefore not in order. If unable to provide a relevant response, Ministers may decline to answer or may take notice of the question.

Secondly, I want to remind members to conduct themselves in a manner befitting this Assembly. In the last few days, there have been several instances where members have hurled insults across the floor. The latest example was yesterday during the period leading up to the recorded division on the Address in Reply. The Minister of Health (Mr. McMorris) hurled a comment across the floor that caused considerable disorder. I want to remind members that the language used in the Assembly should be temperate and worthy of the place it is spoken. members are responsible for the words that they choose.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER

(Privilege)

On Thursday, November 5, 2009 the Opposition House Leader (Mr. Yates) raised a question of privilege after having provided notice and written details of his case in accordance with the provisions of Rule 12.

The Opposition House Leader claims that the Minister of Corrections, Public Safety and Policing made certain remarks in the Assembly that were “intended to be perceived as threats and therefore to have discouraged [the Opposition House Leader] from the performance of his duties and his exercise of free speech.” The Opposition House Leader states that the statements, which the Minister later confirmed to have said to the media outside the Assembly, constituted a threat of police or legal prosecution if he persisted with his actions in the Assembly, most notably during Question Period.

Subsequent to receiving the notice of this privilege case, the Minister of Corrections, Public Safety and Policing made an apology in the Assembly for his remarks. On Orders of the Day, the Opposition House Leader presented the arguments of his case to the Assembly, to which the Government House Leader responded. Having considered the case, heard the apology by the Minister and the arguments of both House Leaders, I deferred my ruling until today. This is a serious case that is without exact precedent in this province so it was necessary for me to consult the parliamentary authorities and precedents in other parliaments. I am now prepared to rule on this case.

First, I want to refer members to what the parliamentary texts say about interference with member’s privilege of free speech. Maingot’s *Parliamentary Privilege in Canada* (Second Edition), page 228, states: “...if a member was threatened for what he said in the House that would amount to a breach of the member’s privilege of speech.” *Erskine May Parliamentary Practice*, 23rd edition at page 144 states “threatening a member with the possibility of a trial at some future time for a question asked in the House” has been considered contempt.

It is clear that the perceived threat by one member against another has been the basis for finding contempt in cases at other parliaments in Canada. Both Alberta and Quebec have cases where the circumstances are relevant to the case brought forward by the Opposition House Leader.

In September 1993, a Minister in Alberta objected to a line of questioning during estimates review and stated to an opposition member that “I can assure the honourable member across the way that he has lost any road program for the next four years.” The response was raised as a question of privilege and the Speaker, in making his ruling, stated: “Threats of this kind are an extremely serious matter. There is no doubt that the implications by a Minister that action might be taken with respect to another member’s

words or actions could have the effect of inhibiting freedom of speech.” A withdrawal of the offending remarks closed the matter.

In May 1996, a government member of the Alberta Legislative Assembly asked a Minister to respond to a question about a proposed opposition amendment to a bill before a committee. The question was whether the Minister “would confirm that he will not bring forward legislation to protect convicted criminals as suggested by the Liberal Opposition.” The opposition member who proposed the amendments wrote a letter to the member who asked the question. The letter was viewed to imply that civil action would be taken if the government member continued to make defamatory remarks and false and misleading statements. The Speaker found that the letter constituted a threat and found a *prima facie* case of privilege had been established. The matter was quickly settled when the offending member apologized for his letter.

Similarly, in a ruling from the Quebec National Assembly in December, 2000, a Minister threatened a member for remarks she made in debate saying she “would pay for her remarks.” In this case, the Speaker accepted that the Minister had made a threat in response to comments made in debate. The question of privilege was resolved when a letter of apology that was written by the Minister to the member and tabled in the Assembly.

It is clear from the parliamentary authorities and relevant precedents from other jurisdictions that comments made in the nature of a threat do constitute contempt of parliament. Having reviewed the details presented in this case, and the admission of the member to having spoken the words, I find that the comments in the nature of a threat are therefore contemptuous.

The Opposition House Leader further directs attention to a letter that he received from the Deputy Minister of Corrections, Public Safety and Policing. In his case, the Opposition House Leader details that the letter is “most probably not intimidating” but cites it as evidence that the Minister meant his comments as a threat. I do not find the letter affects the privileges of the member. I refer all members to page 235 of Maingot’s *Parliamentary Privilege in Canada* (Second Edition) where it states “Accordingly, not every action by an outside body which may influence the conduct of a Member of Parliament as such could now be regarded as a breach of privilege, even if it were calculated and intended to bring pressure on the member to take or to refrain from taking a particular course.”

I will now address the apology made by the Minister of Corrections, Public Safety and Policing to the Assembly on November 5th. The Minister apologized and withdrew the inappropriate remarks.

Erskine May Parliamentary Practice (23rd Edition) at page 172 states, in the section “Proceedings against Member” the following: “When a member has made an acceptable apology for the offence, the critical motion has sometimes been withdrawn. In two instances, the House condemned the member’s conduct as a breach of privileges, but resolved that in consequence of the full and ample apology [the member] had offered to the House, or that having regard to his withdrawal of the expressions complained of, it would not proceed any further on the matter.” Similarly, at page 267 of Maingot’s, *Parliamentary Privilege in Canada* (Second Edition), in the section “Where a member is the subject of a question of privilege” it is stated: “An apology by the offending member will invariably close the matter without the necessity of putting the motion to a vote.” In each of the cases cited an apology ended the matter. This has also been the custom of this and other Assemblies as outlined by the precedents cited.

In consequence of the apology of the Minister, it is my decision that this case need not go further. I want to make it clear, however, that if the Minister had not apologized I would have had no other choice but to find a *prima facie* case of privilege. The Minister has done the honourable thing and I must accept the sincerity of the apology just as I accepted the sincerity of the Opposition House Leader’s perception that the offending words were meant as a threat.

Before leaving this subject, I would like members to consider the unanticipated consequences of the words they sometimes choose to use in this Assembly. The Minister has apologized for words that were perceived by another member as a threat. In the heat of debate it is sometimes difficult to know where to draw the line with the remarks made across the floor. I want to repeat what was said by the Speaker in Alberta at the close of one of the rulings I have cited: "Members are human and subject to the emotions that come with that territory: anger and pride are two that come to mind. Sometimes this job seems to require that we be superhuman in controlling our anger and our pride and in exercising good judgment and we just have to do it. If we fail, we must make amends." The Minister has done the honourable thing by apologizing. I think there is a lesson for all of us in this case.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Appropriateness of Statement by Minister)

I am now prepared to rule on the point of order raised yesterday with regards to the Ministerial Statement given by the Minister of Education (Mr. Krawetz).

First, I would like to remind members of my previous rulings relating to Ministerial Statements given on April 23, 2008 and December 19, 2007. At that time, I stated that Ministers should not comment on matters that have been previously announced. My rulings were based on previous Speakers' rulings and our practice that Ministerial Statements must refer to a new government direction, policy or program.

Members will appreciate the difficulty faced by the Speaker in determining the appropriateness of a Ministerial Statement as it is being delivered. Often it is only once a statement is well under way or has been announced that the Speaker may be able to discern whether the statement is in order. The Speaker does not monitor government announcements and does not always know if a statement relates to something previously announced. Compounding my difficulty in making an immediate ruling is the need to ensure fairness to the Opposition by affording an equal opportunity to respond to the statement.

In reviewing the matter including the information put forward by both House Leaders, I find that the Ministerial Statement provided by the Minister of Education contained information that was announced by the Government on the previous Thursday. Therefore, on the basis of an established practice of this Assembly, I must find that the point of order was well taken.

For the guidance of members, I would like to clarify that a new announcement is one that is made at the earliest opportunity. I would also like to remind all members that the accepted guidelines for Ministerial Statements are that statements should be brief and not lengthy in nature and equally the response should not exceed the time taken by the Minister.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Unparliamentary Language)

Members are well aware that it is not permissible to accuse or suggest that another member was not being truthful. This practice is codified in our Rule 50(f), in paragraph 484(3) of *Beauchesne's Parliamentary Rules and Forms*, 6th Edition and on page 618 of *The House of Commons Procedure and Practice*, (Second Edition 2009).

After reviewing the record, from yesterday's Question Period, I wish to highlight two matters that affect the ability of members to engage in respectful and dignified debates in this Assembly.

First, I would like to address the point of order raised by the Opposition House Leader (Mr. Yates). The statement at issue relates to the truthfulness of members. It was made by the Premier and directed at the Member from Prince Albert Northcote (Mr. Furber). At page 4472 of *Hansard* the Premier states that the member was providing information that was “not completely the truth”.

In this Assembly, many Speakers have ruled that the integrity of members should not be questioned and the imputations of intentional falsehoods are not permissible. (November 4, 2008, May 15, 2008, December 20, 2007, March 26, 2001, May 11, 2000, April 29, 1999, May 27, 1998) These rulings are further supported by *The House of Commons Practice and Procedure* (Second Edition 2009) at page 618 which states:

The proceedings of the House are based on a long-standing tradition of respect for the integrity of all members. Thus, the use of offensive, provocative or threatening language in the House is strictly forbidden. Personal attacks, insults and obscenities are not in order. A direct charge or accusation against a member may be made only by way of a substantive motion for which notice is required.

In his point of order the Opposition House Leader suggested that the Premier had called into question the character of the member and suggested that members of the Opposition were not being truthful.

On this note, I would like to remind members that last week on March 17, 2010 the Leader of the Opposition apologized to the Assembly for implying that a Minister was not being truthful. In addition, on November 16, 2009 I ruled a member out of order who implied that a member was not being truthful.

I find that the statement by the Premier questioned the honesty of a Member of this Assembly and ask the Premier to apologize and withdraw his remarks.

Thereupon the Premier withdrew his remarks and apologized.

The second point raised by the Opposition House Leader relates to allegations that members are under investigation. I have some concerns relating to the insinuations made this week by members from both sides of the Assembly. Once again previous Speakers have ruled on April 11, 2007 and May 12, 2000 that members should be cautious in how allegations are phrased. Attacks on the integrity of members and the impugning of inappropriate activity are not in order. These types of allegations only create disorder.

I appreciate that it is not always possible to prepare in advance every remark or intervention that is to be made in the Assembly. Indeed, often the most effective and compelling debates occur when members passionately and forcefully present their positions. Nevertheless, I do wish to caution members on their choice of language. I would like to remind members that personal attacks only incite others and bring down the level of debate. Challenging the position of another member is acceptable. Questioning their character is not. A personal charge or accusation against another member may only be done by way of a substantive motion.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Unparliamentary Language)

I would like to give my ruling at this time as the issues addressed in my ruling also relate to Statements by Members.

On Thursday, three points of order were raised by the House Leaders. I have reviewed the issues and I am prepared to rule on each matter.

The first point of order relates to the comments about the trustworthiness of a Member of this Assembly. The Government House Leader (Mr. D'Autremont) contends that the Member from Regina Rosemont (Mr. Wotherspoon) stated "a Premier you could not trust," which he deemed to be an unparliamentary expression. In response to the point of order the Opposition House Leader (Mr. Yates) countered that the member's remarks were not directed at the member rather his comments related to the trustworthiness of the budget. I have reviewed *Hansard* and I have found that at page 4488 the Member from Regina Rosemont stated, and I quote, "this is a budget that you can't trust from a Premier you can't trust."

The word trust has many meanings. It might be applied in the context of confidence, expectation or reliability of a person or thing. It can also be applied in the context of veracity, genuineness or integrity of a person. The words that were spoken applied to the personal character of the Premier and were out of order. This incident only proves yet again that members need to be careful of the words used in this Assembly. I would ask the Member for Regina Rosemont to apologize and withdraw his statement.

Thereupon Mr. Wotherspoon withdrew his remarks and apologized.

The second point of order, which was raised by the Opposition House Leader, implies that the Premier questioned the truthfulness of the statements made by the Leader of the Opposition. I have reviewed the record and I find that on page 4487 of *Hansard* the Premier stated, and I quote, "and I'll carefully word this – the honourable member's information is not true." In a follow up question, the Leader of the Opposition states, and I quote, "the member opposite can say what I'm saying isn't true". In the context used I find the use of the word "true" to be within the acceptable standards of this Assembly. The Canadian Oxford dictionary defines the word as, and I quote, "in accordance or consistent with fact or reality" and "exact, accurate, precise." Members understanding of the facts often differ and that is why we have debate in this Chamber. This is quite different than past instances this session, and in other sessions, when members have made comments that implied that another member had knowingly not told the truth. In this case, it was a dispute over facts which are regularly the subject of debate between members.

The final point of order raised on Thursday related to allegations that members are the subject of investigations. I want to remind members that I had hardly finished commenting on a previous point of order that touched on this issue and we had yet another point of order. I repeat what I said in the ruling I made at the last sitting – members must be mindful that allegations, accusations or innuendo of inappropriate behaviour are not acceptable.

In closing, I want to again remind members that the words spoken in the Assembly should demonstrate respect for one another and this institution. I am seeking the support of all members to ensure that the dignity of our institution is maintained. In conclusion, I would like to quote my predecessor Speaker Kowalsky where on April 15, 2005 he stated, and I quote, "As members exercise the responsibility given to them by the electorate, they should respect the privilege of free speech through vigorous debate of issues while making conscious effort to refrain from intemperate and personal attacks."

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Private Members' Statements – Personal Attacks)

Yesterday, I undertook to review the *Hansard* record in response to a point of order raised by the Government House Leader (Mr. D'Autremont) about comments made by the Member for Regina Walsh Acres (Ms. Morin) in a Member's Statement. I have reviewed the verbatim and I am prepared to rule on the matter.

At the outset, I want members to know that I have serious concerns about the tenor of debate in recent weeks and what looks like a trend away from the principle of fair comment. My concern goes beyond the point of order raised yesterday. I think it necessary to take a few moments to remind members about a few basic principles that seem to be forgotten from time to time.

First of all members need go no further than our own rule that states members shall not "use offensive, provocative or threatening language" and, also that members shall not "make a personal charge or accusation against a member". These rules should be familiar to members.

In addition, *The House of Commons Procedure and Practice* (Second Edition 2009) at pages 604 and 605 states and I quote: “Since one of the basic principles of procedure in the House is that the proceedings be conducted in terms of a free and civil discourse, members are less apt to engage in direct heated exchanges and personal attacks when their comments are directed to the Chair rather than to another member. If a member directs remarks toward another member and not the Speaker, he or she will be called to order and may be asked to rephrase the remarks.”

I think members also realize that these basic rules are a reflection of our long standing practices, which Speakers have expressed time and again over the years.

On April 23, 1991, Speaker Tusa stated that reasonable comment did not include personal accusations, and members should treat each other with respect within the dignity and decorum of the House.

On March 5, 1993, Speaker Rolfes ruled that innuendo and personal reflections create disorder, and that insinuations about other members, whether made in jest or not, is inappropriate.

On December 29, 1996, Speaker Hagel, stated that personal attacks result in escalation and retaliation, which become increasingly personal. He implored members to engage in forceful and spirited debate without having to resort to such avenues.

On May 12, 2000, Speaker Osika, ruled out of order a series of statements made in debate that attempted to connect certain members with criminal convictions. Speaker Osika went on to say provocations and offensive personal attacks exceed the bounds of fair debate. On March 23, 2001, he ruled out of order comments that alleged that a group of members, as part of a political party, were involved in illegal election acts.

On May 10, 2004, Speaker Kowalsky made this statement, which I shall quote: “...freedom of speech is considered fundamentally necessary under our democratic system. This privilege exists to allow members to perform legitimate functions in the legislature. This privilege also confers a grave responsibility to those who are protected by it. Members must bear in mind the possible effects of certain statements. It is not a legitimate function for members in debate to question directly or indirectly the integrity or motives of members individually or collectively.”

All of these statements, made by many Speakers over a long period of time demonstrate the principle that proceedings of the Assembly are based on a long-standing tradition of respect for the integrity of all members.

Recently, certain members seem to have forgotten about this principle. This principle has been lost despite recent rulings when I have called upon all members for their cooperation in addressing unparliamentary language and order and decorum. Despite my rulings and requests, the ugly personal attacks, innuendos and insinuations continue.

We had instances of this again yesterday.

The Member from Regina Walsh Acres, in a Member’s Statement, made comments about the private affairs of the Member for Kindersley. She also stated that the Premier had been involved in theft. I find these comments to be out of order. If what I have said about the principles of fair comment in this place is not enough, I will cite what previous Speakers have said about similar comments.

On March 18, 1999, Speaker Hagel stated the following: “...I notice his reference to the use of the word steal. And I think the honourable minister will recognize that it’s improper to be using that word in debate to refer to the motives of other honourable members, and I’ll ask him to withdraw that remark and

continue his debate.” Similarly, Speaker Kowalsky brought a member to order on June 16, 2003, for using the word “stole”.

The Member for Cannington, who raised the point of order, was also out of order yesterday for the comments he made in his Member’s Statement. The Member from Cannington also reflected on the character of the Leader of the Opposition. Besides the principles I have outlined earlier in this ruling, I also want to point out Beauschesne’s paragraph 486 (1) makes it clear that members are not to reflect on the private character of another member. As previous Speakers have pointed out, personal attacks and innuendos have no place in proceedings of this Assembly. The comments are hurtful and only create disorder and retaliation. I ask members not to make the period for Members’ Statements into a series of attack ads. I ask you to not bring personal attacks and offensive opinions into this Chamber.

I will now call on the Member for Cannington and the Member from Regina Walsh Acres to rise to withdraw and apologize for their unparliamentary remarks.

Thereupon Mr. D’Autremont and Ms. Morin withdrew their remarks and apologized.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Unparliamentary Language)

Yesterday the Government House Leader (Mr. D'Autremont) raised a point of order regarding questions raised by the Opposition House Leader (Mr. Yates) during Question Period. The Government House Leader contends that the questions impugned the motives of government members by accusing them of fixing the 2007 election. In response to the point of order, the Opposition House Leader said the point of order was based on quotes he made from a legal judgment.

Upon review of the questions asked by the Opposition House Leader there were three questions on page 4763 of *Hansard* where he asks if certain members conspired to fix the outcome of the 2007 general election. This part of the question was not part of the material quoted by the member. Even though the question was direct, and not couched in a quote, I want to remind members of a principle. One cannot do indirectly what cannot be done directly.

Speaker Hagel made this point on March 31, 1999, when stated, and I quote, "although he's quoting directly, that still does not permit members to engage in the use of unparliamentary words when engaging in debate".

In this case, the accusation was made directly. A similar accusation was ruled out of order on March 26, 2001, when a group of members was associated with the contravention of election laws. In this ruling Speaker Kowalsky stated, "I remind members that the proceedings of this Assembly are based on a long-standing tradition of respect for the integrity of all members. The integrity or motives of members, whether individually or collectively, should not be questioned indirectly in debate". This was also expressed in Speaker Osika's ruling made May 12, 2000, when a series of statements made in debate attempted to connect members of the Opposition with criminal convictions. These comments were also ruled out of order.

It is well substantiated by the parliamentary authorities and our own rules and practices that such accusations are well beyond the bounds permitted by parliamentary debate. I have found it necessary to rule on this a number of times in the last number of months. Using the device of a question to ask a member if he or she participated in an impropriety is doing indirectly what one cannot do directly. Asking

a member to admit that he conspired to fix an election is the equivalent of an accusation of wrong-doing. There is little difference between this and the incidents earlier this session when questions and comments left the impression that certain members are under investigation. I repeat the words of Speaker Kowalsky: “The integrity or motives of members, whether individually or collectively, should not be questioned indirectly in debate”.

I find that the comments made by the Opposition House Leader are out of order. I call on him to withdraw the remarks and apologize to the Assembly.

Thereupon Mr. Yates withdrew his remarks and apologized.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Propriety of Questions)

I will now deal with the second point of order raised yesterday. The Opposition House Leader raised a point of order that touched on the role of the chair in dealing with his line of questions related to party political funds, which he contends were relevant to responsibilities of the Premier and Attorney General. In response to the point of order, the Government Deputy House Leader contended that it is inappropriate for the Minister of Justice to comment on matters that are before the courts.

I committed to review the whole matter to ensure that the rules are being appropriately and fairly applied.

During the Spring of 2007, Speaker Kowalsky found it necessary to repeatedly caution members about the impropriety of a line of questioning about a caucus matter. That led to a point of order, which was ruled on April 26, 2007. With respect to the propriety of the line of questioning, Speaker Kowalsky made these two points:

“Questions must be posed in a manner that clearly connects the issue to the responsibility of a Minister or the government as a whole”, and;

“when a question is put that is not directly connected to a government responsibility, the Speaker shall rule the question out of order but provide the government with the option to respond”.

Speaker Kowalsky also reiterated the Assembly’s practice to allow questions related to political parties when they are posed in terms of statutes or the administration of law.

I want to point out that our present rule 19(2) came into existence partly in response to the subject of the ruling I have just quoted. Even though the rule specifically prohibits such questions it has been my practice to follow the guidelines established by my predecessor. Specifically in regard to the line of questioning by the Member for Regina Dewdney, I have reviewed the verbatim record.

The first question asked did not relate to a ministerial responsibility and it was difficult to see a clear connection in the questions that followed. It was only through the Opposition House Leader’s point of order that he sought to clarify the connection by stating that the trust money falls within the purview and responsibility of the Minister of Justice. In the questions asked yesterday, a certain level of nuance was applied which was not discernable to the Speaker. I repeat what Speaker Kowalsky stated: questions must be posed in a manner that clearly connects the issue to the responsibility of the Minister.

Further compounding the issue is the fact it is not always possible for the Speaker to have a complete knowledge of what falls under the purview of a Minister. I provided the Minister an opportunity to respond. In the future, if a matter questioned is not part of that responsibility, it would be appreciated if

the Minister could say so. Until recent events, I can find no other examples of a Minister simply not responding to a question. Rule 19(3) anticipates a Minister will provide a response even if it is to decline or take notice. Henceforth, in similar circumstances, for the record, I request that Ministers orally decline the question. The Minister may decline with or without reason. In the meantime, I will continue to intervene to provide caution when it is deemed necessary, and provide Ministers an opportunity to voluntarily answer in accordance with the guidelines established by Speaker Kowalsky.

On this last point I want to relate a relevant precedent on the topic of interventions by the Speaker. On March 23, 1994, the Opposition House Leader of the day complained in a point of order that the Speaker was precipitously intervening in Question Period about a line of questions. In making the point of order the Opposition House Leader stated that it is not up to the Speaker to decide if a question should be answered but, and I quote, “the responsibility of the Minister to make a decision to answer or not to answer.” Speaker Rolfes ruled that his interventions were to warn the member to an irregular proceeding, as he is bound to do as outlined by paragraph 323 of Beauchesne’s 6th Edition. This ruling further enforces the responsibility of the Speaker to intervene when it is deemed necessary.

I now want to address the comments made by the Deputy Government House Leader in response to the point of order. The member is correct in his assumption that matters before the courts should not be discussed or debated by members. In my review of precedents on *sub judice* I find numerous rulings over the years that have defined Saskatchewan practice as follows: “[sub judice] is not a rule in the sense of being a standing order but is rather a long standing practice or convention that has been applied fairly strictly in this Assembly to motions, questions and returns.” It is applied more rigidly here than in other jurisdictions.

Given the Deputy Government House Leader’s assertion that the matter is before the courts, I inquired with the Registrars of both the Court of Queen’s Bench and the Court of Appeal. The Registrar of the Court of Appeal indicated that the matter is scheduled to be heard by the Court of Appeal on Thursday April 15 in Saskatoon.

For the benefit of members I want to take a few moments to explain the principle of sub judice. The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada, in hearing the *New Brunswick Broadcasting Company versus Nova Scotia* (Speaker of the House of Assembly) case in 1993, stated the following:

“Our democratic government consists of several branches: the Crown, as represented by the Governor General; the legislative body; the executive; and the courts. It is fundamental to the working of government as a whole that all these parts play their proper role. It is equally fundamental that no one of them overstep its bounds, that each show proper deference for the legitimate sphere of activity of the other.”

This passage appears on page 319 of Maingot’s *Parliamentary Privilege in Canada*, (Second Edition). Maingot further states: “The legislative bodies in turn exercise deference by their rules of sub judice, no matter awaiting or under adjudication by a court of law should be brought before it.”

On April 18, 1978, Speaker Brockelbank made the following ruling dealing with a point of order that asserted that certain oral questions were sub judice, and I quote, “The sub judice rule is based on two principles. The first is that the Legislative Assembly should take no action which might prejudice the rights of citizens before the courts. The second principle is that the Assembly should not set itself up as a second or alternate forum for debate of matters already before another judicial body. . . .” On March 23, 1994, after checking with the court registrar as to the status of a matter before the courts, Speaker Rolfes ruled, and I quote, “It has long been the practice of this Assembly that matters before the courts are not to be discussed or debated by members. The purpose of this convention is to protect the parties involved in the court action and to maintain respect between the legislative and judicial branches of government.”

As I have stated, this Assembly has taken a strict interpretation of the application of sub judice. Because the matter is before the courts, I rule any questions related to this matter are out of order.

Before closing, I want to comment on the timing of the point of order, which is the subject of this ruling. It was made in the midst of an unrelated proceeding. In the future I ask that points of order unrelated to the matter under debate be held until the question before the Assembly either concluded or adjourned.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Standing Committees)

Earlier today the Opposition House Leader raised a point of order concerning the operation of the standing committees of this Assembly. At the heart of the member's argument is that the present rules governing the operation of committees did not contemplate the meeting of committees outside regular Assembly hours to conduct business on estimates and bills.

Under regular circumstances standing committees conform to the regular Assembly sitting hours to conduct business on bills and estimates. This is prescribed by Rule 125(2) of this Assembly's rules. The rule reads as follows: "On days when the Assembly is sitting, standing committees shall follow the Assembly's recess and adjournment times, except as otherwise ordered by the committee".

I want to emphasize the last clause of the rule, which I repeat, "except otherwise ordered by the committee." If the rule had a full stop period before this last clause, the member would have raised a valid point of order. The interpretation of this rule is that committees are able to sit outside the Assembly hours if they so decide by order. What is meant by order is the adoption of a motion by the committee to meet on a specific date and time. This is something for the committee to decide, not the Speaker.

Committees are masters of their own procedures. It is a long standing practice of this Assembly and Speakers have consistently ruled that Speakers do not exercise procedural control over committees. Procedural difficulties which arise in committees are settled in the committees and not in the Assembly.

Speakers have not intervened to settle disputes that arise in the committees, and this is stated explicitly in paragraph 822 of Beauchesne's 6th Edition. The sitting hours of a committee are a procedural issue that each committee can decide for itself. Only the Assembly can override this, not the Speaker. For this reason the point of order is not well taken.

The Speaker adjourned the Assembly without question put, pursuant to Rule 6(6).

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER (Closure Motion)

I would like to thank the Opposition House Leader for providing a copy of his point of order. The member is correct, it is a question of order. The question of order is: has the minister followed and complied with the terms of the rule? In addressing the point of order, the rules do not require consultation. The member raises the point that there has not been sufficient debate. Our rules do not specify that there is a specific number of hours required before closure can be moved. The Opposition House Leader states

and I quote: “The Speaker can rule this closure motion out of order on the grounds that insufficient debate has occurred and that the procedures simply being sued to violate the rights of the minority”.

On pages 561 and 562 of Marleau and Monpetit, I quote:

“The Speaker has at times been asked to use discretionary authority to refuse to put a closure motion to the House on the ground that a measure had not yet been given enough debating time. Invariably, he or she has declined to interfere with the application of the rule, deciding in each case that the Chair has no authority to intervene in the process when the closure rule is applied properly ... Speaker Fraser ruled that the timing of closure in a debate is not a procedural matter and that the Chair has no discretionary power to refuse the motion and is without authority to intervene when a Standing Order is used according to the House’s rules and practices.”

I find the point of order not well taken. Before closing I would like to point out that in some jurisdictions there are rules which attaches to the Speaker a very clear discretion whether or not sufficient hours have been spent in a debate before closure can be moved. Saskatchewan, like the House of Commons, has no such rule. If the member believes this should be part of the rule, I invite him to raise it with the House Services Committee.

Yesterday, the Opposition House Leader (Mr. Yates) raised a point of order regarding the responses to Written Question Nos. 1552 through 1554. The member stated that the response given by the Minister of Environment was out of order as the response and I quote "*As The Wildlife Habitat Protection Act is currently before the Assembly, detailed questions regarding the Bill are better directed to the Minister in the committee stage as per the regular legislative process*" is contrary to the Rules.

I find that the point of order is well taken. The deflection of the response to another venue is not in order. I would like to remind members that Rule 20 provides that the rules that govern questions during Question Period also apply to written questions. In addition, on April 14, 2010 I ruled that ministers must respond to a question even if it is only to decline to answer. This is not a proper response.

Now I would like to detail the options available to ministers when responding to written questions. As outlined in Rule 20(5), the government shall either table the response or convert the question by ordering a return or convert the question to a Notice of Motion for Return (Debatable). Ordering a return provides the government 180 days to respond to the question and converting the question provides the opportunity to amend the wording of the question or to debate the matter by amending or defeating the question.

Later today during Written Questions, the disputed questions 1552 through 1554 will be called again and the government must table a substantive response, order the question or convert the question to a motion for return (debatable).

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER

(Privilege – May 4, 2010)

Yesterday, the Opposition House Leader (Mr. Yates) gave notice of a question of privilege. The notice concerned responses by the Minister of Health (Mr. McMorris) made during Question Period on April 12, 2010, about proposed regulations under *The Health Information Protection Act*. Members will recall yesterday I requested that the Opposition House Leader provide me with the details of his case in writing. Following adjournment of the Assembly I received written information for which I thank the Opposition House Leader. Details of the case were provided to the Government House Leader, in accordance with Rule 12(2). Both house leaders also provided comments about the case when the Opposition House Leader was invited to state his case, on Orders of the Day. I want to reiterate that I allowed the case to be made without notice given the circumstance of the extended sitting hours then in operation.

The Opposition House Leader's case is that the Minister of Health committed contempt by purposefully misleading the Assembly about consultations that were said to have taken place with the Information and Privacy Commissioner.

In Question Period on April 12, 2010, the Minister said, in responding to a question, “the Privacy Commissioner was consulted formally four different times on this very regulation, Mr. Speaker and yes we know his opinions on this regulation as did the former government know his opinions as they worked through this regulation over the last four years of their mandate.” To refute this claim, the Opposition House Leader provided a letter from the Information and Privacy Commissioner that he argues demonstrates, “The Minister of Health clearly misled this Assembly.”

The charge that a member has made deliberately misleading statements, if well-founded, has been treated as contempt by this Legislative Assembly and other parliaments. On November 3, 2009, I addressed another case of alleged contempt for misleading statements. In that case I referenced precedents that established differences in the way such cases are treated in Saskatchewan compared to other jurisdictions. I will not repeat those precedents except to say they are dated November 18, 1975 and July 13, 1982. These precedents established that in Saskatchewan, the threshold of proof of an offence is not restricted to an admission of guilt. Contempt has been found on the basis of evidence. In this situation the Minister has not admitted to have misled the Assembly so the case must be reviewed on the documentary evidence provide by the Opposition House Leader.

The evidence provided by the Opposition House Leader is two letters: one addressed to the Leader of the Opposition and another addressed to all Members of the Assembly. The letter to the Leader of the Opposition is in response to queries made on April 14, 2010, in regard to the exchange in Question Period about regulations two days earlier. In this letter the Commissioner states that rather than respond to him directly he has decided to respond to all members and to publish a report on the regulations. Of material importance to this case is the letter to all members, which is dated Monday May 3, 2010.

The letter begins with the following statement:

“On April 12, 2010, the Minister of Health (the Minister) made reference in the Legislative Assembly (the Assembly) to the Office of the Information and Privacy Commissioner (OIPC) in the course of discussing the new Health Information Protection Amendment Regulations 2010 (Order in Council 187/2010) (the Regulations). In addition, I have now received a request from a Member of the Legislative Assembly (MLA) for written documentation on any verbal or written consultation I have conducted with the Minister, or his representatives, regarding the disclosure of patient’s health information to a third party.

I have determined that the most appropriate way to respond to certain statements made by the Minister on April 12, 2010 and the query for information from another MLA, would be through this letter to all MLAs.”

On page six of the letter the commissioner addresses the question about consultations he or his office has had with the minister or the Ministry of Health. For the record, I will quote the first four paragraphs of the letter because they are at the heart of this case:

“The new Regulation is similar to the 2007 iteration. There is a significant change, however, in the new Regulation in the substitution of “personal health information” for “any information about a client’s health care or state of health” in subsection (7). The statutory definition of personal health information is much broader.

I had not seen the new Regulation until a copy was emailed to my office at my request on April 13, 2010 at 2:47 p.m. by Saskatchewan Health.

I have not received any draft documentation with respect to the type of contract that Saskatchewan Health will be introducing pursuant to subsection 7.1(1)(i) or (8) of the Regulation. In my view, Saskatchewan Health should have completed those pieces and made them available for public comment prior to proclamation of the subject Regulation.

In summary, for my office, there was only the public consultation in 2004, the exchange of correspondence in 2006 and a further exchange of correspondence in June 2007. I am not aware of any other formal consultation on the matter of a fundraising Regulation under HIPA. I also wish to stress that, in each of the three consultations, the text upon which I was commenting was different; none of the three consultations involved text identical to Order in Council 187/2010 although the 2007 consultation text was very similar but for one significant difference.”

I repeat what the minister said in Question Period on April 12, 2010.

“The Privacy Commissioner was consulted formally four different times on this very regulation, Mr. Speaker and yes we know his opinions on this regulation as did the former government know his opinions as they worked through this regulation over the last four years of their mandate.”

The Commissioner states in his letter that the regulations being proposed are significantly different than those proposed in the past. He states he only saw the regulations in question for the first time on April 13, 2010, one day after the exchange in Question Period. This is three years after the last consultation the Commissioner says he had with the Ministry.

It is not common for an Independent Officer of this Assembly to respond in such a direct and formal way to statements made in proceedings. It is apparent from the letter, that the Commissioner had been consulted but not about the regulations recently put into existence by the Order in Council noted. It is also apparent that the Commissioner was consulted but between 2004 and 2007, on regulations which had in his words significant differences.

If the regulations are indeed significantly different, the Speaker wonders how the Minister can claim the Commissioner was consulted. The distinct impression left by the comments by the Minister is that the regulations in question are, to use the Ministers words, the very regulations provided to the Commissioner. The Speaker also wonders why if consultations had taken place on these regulations the Commissioner states he first saw them on April 13, 2010.

Because of these troubling questions and inconsistencies, I find there is sufficient evidence and reason to warrant the Assembly taking up this question, and as such find that a prima facie case has been established.

I remind members that it is not the role of the Speaker to decide if contempt has been committed. This is a question that only the Assembly can decide. It is the Speaker’s role to decide whether a prima facie case has been established. I have determined that there is sufficient reason to merit setting aside the regular business of the Assembly to debate the matter. I now invite the Opposition House Leader to put forward his motion so that the Assembly can decide whether or not contempt has been committed.

Moved by Mr. Yates, pursuant to Rule 12(4):

That, be it resolved that the Standing Committee on Privileges be instructed to examine the issue of the statements made to this Assembly by the Minister of Health on April 12, 2010 and report back to the Assembly and that, until such time that the committee reports, the Minister of Health shall be removed from his position as a minister.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER

(Privilege – May 19, 2010)

This morning, the Member from Saskatoon Fairview (Mr. Iwanchuk) gave notice of a question of privilege. The notice concerned specific actions of the government related to scheduling standing committees and the inability of members to conduct their parliamentary work. Details of the case were provided to the Government House Leader, in accordance with Rule 12(2).

The member claims that the specific actions of the government related to the scheduling of the standing committees have improperly interfered with ability of members to conduct their parliamentary work.

In Maingot’s *Parliamentary Privilege in Canada* (Second Edition) at page 223 it states and I quote “In deciding whether there is a *prima facie* case, the Speaker excludes any matters that are otherwise properly to be dealt with under the practice or Standing Orders of the House. That is to say, where the answer to the alleged ‘question of privilege’ is contained in the rules or the practice of the House, it would unlikely involve a breach of the privileges of members.”

The member claims that a notice was provided around 5:00 p.m. yesterday for the meeting of the Standing Committee on Human Services, which met at 9:30 a.m. this morning to discuss *Bill No. 80 – The Construction Industry Labour Relations Amendment Act, 2009*. He claims that this was not sufficient notice and in consequence interfered with the ability of members to know about or attend the meeting.

In the case of Bill 80, it has been well known for more than six months that there was a distinct possibility that the committee may be required to meet if this bill had not been disposed and reported to the Assembly before the day prior to completion day. The rules of this Assembly required the meeting that took place this morning. Members should have been aware that a meeting of the committee had to take place this morning, as required by the rules.

The next question to consider is the start time for the meeting. In this case, the member cites rule 126(1), and argues that the provided notice was not sufficient. As members are no doubt aware, what is “practicable” is open to interpretation. Committees have met with little notice or days and weeks of notice. The subject of what is sufficient notice is something for each committee to decide, or alternatively, something that could be considered by the House Service committee through a review of the particular rule. I remind you that it is well established that the Speaker is not responsible to rule on committee proceedings outside of a report from the committee itself.

The matter raised by the member is addressed by the rules, as I have explained. I understand that the present rules are perhaps not to the satisfaction of the member.

The remedy to the issue raised by the member is better addressed by changes to the present rules. This is more a question of order and interpretation of the rules and not properly a question of privilege. As such, I cannot find a *prima facie* case of privilege has been established.

I would also like to remind members that our practices require members to include their motion with their question of privilege. This was absent from his case.

PROROGATION SPEECH

10:27 a.m.

Mr. Speaker, Members of the Legislative Assembly. It is my duty to release you from further attendance at the Third Session of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature. In thus relieving you, I would like to thank you for the work done and the progress made.

While the past year has witnessed many of the world's economies still suffering the wounds of a global recession, Saskatchewan has remained strong. The stresses of these difficult economic times have been felt within our province, to be sure. However, the accomplishments of this Legislative session reflect the continued progress and growing confidence which exists right across Saskatchewan.

Members of this Legislative Assembly should be proud of the commitments made this session to enhance and improve the health and safety of Saskatchewan residents.

The Patient First Review noted that surgical wait times are of paramount concern to Saskatchewan patients and their families. In response, a \$10.5 million investment in the Saskatchewan Surgical Initiative was announced this year. The cornerstone of this initiative is the bold commitment to reduce surgical wait times to no more than three months within four years.

In an effort to curb the often tragic consequences of distracted driving, amendments to *The Traffic Safety Act* restrict cell phone use and place a ban on texting when operating a vehicle.

Amendments to *The Tobacco Control Act* and *The Tobacco Tax Act* were passed this session. These changes aim to reduce smoking rates in our province and further protect Saskatchewan residents – especially children and youth – from the harmful effects of second-hand smoke. New provisions within the legislation prohibit smoking on school grounds and in cars where children under 16 years of ages are present.

Several other critical steps were taken this session which focus on supporting and protecting our children. This year's budget provided funding for 235 additional child care spaces and 18 new prekindergarten programs across our province. A pilot project to provide enhanced supports to children diagnosed with Autism was introduced in this year's budget and will include programs such as summer camps for severely autistic children and increased respite services for parents. Also this session, a comprehensive review of Saskatchewan's child welfare system was a significant step towards improving the circumstances and outcomes for our province's most vulnerable children. Perhaps most significantly, this Assembly's commitment to the realization of a Saskatchewan Children's Hospital has been fully funded.

Commitments were made this session to preserving our province's natural environment. New legislation to reduce and manage greenhouse gas emissions was passed. *The Environmental Management and Protection Act*, and amendments to *The Forest Resources Management Act* and *The Environmental Assessment Act* ensure environmental considerations are reasonably and responsibly weighed against increased economic activity.

During this session, Members of this Assembly committed to protecting and preserving unique elements of Saskatchewan's heritage with the passage of *The Protection of the Wild Ponies of the Bronson Forest*

Act and The Hunting, Fishing and Trapping Heritage Act. Additionally, the creation of a Provincial Capital Commission this session was an important first step toward better promoting the distinct heritage and beauty of our capital city.

In celebration of their vibrant culture and the integral role they have played in Saskatchewan's history, 2010 was proclaimed the Year of the Métis. In the spirit of friendship and mutual respect, the province partnered with the Métis Nation to mark the 125th Anniversary of the 1885 Northwest Resistance earlier this year.

For over one hundred years, our identity, and indeed our strength as a province has largely been shaped by the hard work and contributions of farm families across rural Saskatchewan.

Due to excessive moisture, this year has been one of the most trying for agricultural producers. Crop Insurance seeding deadlines were extended, and enhancements to AgriRecovery programs were announced in response to these difficult circumstances. Also this year, producers were shielded from loss of livestock due to predation through enhancements to the Wildlife Damage Compensation Program and the introduction of the Saskatchewan Coyote Control Program.

During this session, our province engaged with Alberta and British Columbia to form an economic region of formidable strength and immeasurable potential on the global stage. The New West Partnership is an ambitious and enterprising agreement, creating Canada's largest interprovincial barrier-free trade and investment market.

Further accomplishments this session include enhancements to Saskatchewan's student financial assistance programs, providing additional support to thousands of post-secondary students across our province.

ensure Saskatchewan's transportation system can sustain our continued economic growth, a near-record investment of \$551 million in our provincial highway system was committed in this year's budget.

Amendments to *The Construction Industry Labour Relations Act* provide more choice for workers and increase competitiveness in the construction industry.

As we reflect on the accomplishments of this Session, I commend the Members of this Assembly for the investments made and milestones achieved. Communities and individuals from every corner of Saskatchewan are the beneficiaries of your efforts within this Assembly.

Finally, in taking leave of you, I wish to thank you for the diligent manner in which you have devoted your energies to the activities of this session, and wish you the full blessings of Providence.

- Has indicated the desire and ability to manage the required care and the willingness to assume the responsibilities and risks associated with Individualized Funding, or has a guardian who will do so.
- Has no other party (e.g. SGI, WCB, other agency, etc.) which may be responsible for the cost of the required services.
- Is accepted as an employer eligible for coverage under *The Workers' Compensation Act*, or has a guardian that is eligible.
- All clients admitted to the regional health authority home care program, including the individualized funding option, are admitted based on assessed need and level of risk.
- A needs assessment is done by the Regional Health Authority staff in consultation with the client and/or family.
- Need is identified through a provincially standardized assessment process resulting in the development of an individualized plan including the level and type of services that are required.
- Services approved for funding may include personal care, home management and other supportive services.
- The individual must be able to arrange and manage his/her own supportive care services.
- Professional services such as registered nursing or therapies are excluded from Individualized Funding and continue to be available as required through the regional home care program.

NOTES

- A. The "overnight" installed capital cost is the cost to build the power plant as if the project was completed overnight. The cost does not include interest which is incurred during construction or escalation of materials, labour or equipment expense.
- B. The capital costs are "typical" in nature for new power plants and not based on detailed site specific analysis of costs.
- C. No transmission or other system integration costs have been included in the capital or busbar power costs.

Because of the nature and complexity of transmission planning work, ND staff do not necessarily track their time on the basis of time spent on any particular generation technology.

There was a consensus decision by federal-provincial-territorial governments in Canada to restrict the use of preferential procurement policies by municipalities in 1999. Specifically, on April 17, 1999, the signatories to the national Agreement on Internal Trade (AIT), including Saskatchewan, incorporated into that agreement's Procurement Chapter an annex that required municipalities to maintain non-discriminatory procurement policies for goods, services and construction procurements above certain thresholds. Preferential policies could, however, be used for procurements below those thresholds.

Earlier this year, Canadian Premiers, including Premier Wall, called for the United States to amend their Buy American protectionist procurement policies at the state and municipal level. In exchange, Premiers indicated they would be prepared to provide formal market access for United States suppliers to the already open provincial and municipal procurements in Canada. These negotiations continue.

And, in September, 2009, Premier Wall, along with his counterparts in Alberta and British Columbia announced the signing of the Western Economic Partnership (WEP) agreements, which include a trilateral internal trade agreement. The WEP, like the AIT, is expected to restrict the ability of municipalities to utilize preferential procurement practices to only those procurements under certain threshold levels.

There has not been, nor is there now, any provincial or territorial government in Canada that has stated support for the full elimination of local preference policies for municipalities in any internal or international negotiations, forums or agreements.

In terms of consultations, in advance of the 1999 changes to the AIT, the Government of Saskatchewan undertook extensive consultations with municipalities and their representative organizations at a number of locations around the province. We do not have the exact dates and locations of these consultations on file.

In June 2007, the former government undertook extensive public consultations on the state of internal trade in Saskatchewan through a Standing Committee on the Economy hearings process. That consultation, which addressed local preference policies, helped lead the government of the day to determine that it would not pursue accession to the Alberta-British Columbia Trade, Investment and Labour Mobility Agreement (TILMA).

Discussions with City Mayors, City Managers, Saskatchewan Urban Municipalities Association (SUMA) and Saskatchewan Association of Rural Municipalities in recent months focused on the benefits of addressing the Buy American provisions in the United States and the benefits to local businesses of greater opportunities for business in the United States and other jurisdictions in Canada. There was little discussion on either non-discriminatory or preferential procurement practices as municipalities have for over ten years conducted themselves in accordance with the procurement rules contained in the AIT.

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1613, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Hutchinson:

To the Minister of First Nations and Métis Relations: (1) With regard to the Saskatchewan First Nations and Métis Economic Development Program, how many different entities were funded? (2) What was the average dollar amount of each grant? (3) When the program is terminated on March 31, 2010, what programming will be introduced to replace the FNMEDP? (4) If new programming is introduced, how will it effectively encourage First Nations and Métis involvement in the Saskatchewan economy?

- (1) The First Nations and Métis Economic Development Program supported 156 different entities.
- (2) The average grant amount was approximately \$23,000.

Answer:

- (1) The Ministry, through the First Nations and Métis Community Initiative, supported 58 initiatives and events in the 2009/10 fiscal year.
- (2) The average grant provided was \$3,866.

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1615, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Harpauer:

To the Minister of Social Services: (1) With regard to the Remote Housing Program, what is the difference between a “forgivable loan” and a grant, for the purposes of this program? (2) How many housing units have been built as a result of this program? (3) What was the average dollar value of the loans? (4) What percentage of these loans was made to self-identifying First Nations or Métis homebuilders?

Answer:

- (1) A forgivable loan is a loan which is provided with conditions. If conditions are not fulfilled, the loan or a portion of the loan must be repaid. A grant is a one-time payment for an intended purpose with no obligation for repayment, or long-term obligation. Assistance under the Remote Housing Program is in the form of a forgivable loan.

- (4) The forgivable loans were not provided to the homebuilders but rather to the clients of the Remote Housing Program.

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1616, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Harpauer:

To the Minister of Social Services: (1) With regard to the First Nations and Métis foster home recruitment program referenced in the 2009/10 ministry plan, when will this program be implemented? (2) What is the goal for the number of new First Nations and Métis foster homes as a result of this program?

Answer:

- (1) Funding to the Saskatchewan Foster Families Association (SFFA), to assist in the recruitment of First Nations and Métis foster homes, started in January 2009.
- (2) The SFFA and Ministry are working together to develop the recruitment plan for 2010/11. As this is a new initiative, no targets have been established for the first year. A dedicated focus continues for attracting First Nations and Métis families to the foster care program.

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1617, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Harpauer:

To the Minister of Social Services: In the 2009/10 ministry plan, the Ministry of Social Services promised to “partner with the Central Urban Métis Federation Incorporated to develop new spaces for child welfare in Saskatoon”, how many new spaces for child welfare in Saskatoon have been created?

Answer:

The Ministry partners with Central Urban Métis Federation Incorporated (CUMFI) to provide the *Coming Home* program in Saskatoon, which is a mentoring service for women whose children would otherwise be in care of the Minister or where family reunification is part of the case plan. In March of 2009, CUMFI opened a 12 suite apartment building under this program. Nine of the suites are for women in the program and the remainder for live-in mentors. Each of the women in the program can have up to 3 children, for a total of 9 mothers and 24 children at any given time

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1618, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Harpauer:

To the Minister of Social Services: (1) In the 2009/10 ministry plan, the Ministry of Social Services promised to “work with the First Nations organization to explore additional ways of delivery services”, what changes have been made to the cultural composition of social service delivery as a result of this promise? (2) What changes have been made to staff recruitment policies as a result of this promise? (3) What First Nations organizations did the Ministry of Social Services work with during the implementation of this promise?

Answer:

- (1) Engagement of First Nations in the development of culturally sensitive programs and services is part of the Ministry of Social Services long-term strategy for improving client outcomes. Officials of the Ministry meet with First Nations representatives on an ongoing basis. The Ministry is supporting an independent panel in the undertaking of an extensive engagement with First Nations communities as part of the child welfare review. Other initiatives undertaken to advance this strategy include: hosting of joint workshops with First Nation Child and Family Services Agencies; development of affordable housing through the First Nations Housing Trust and the Métis Housing Trust; participation in the Saskatchewan Learning Circle for Aboriginal Economic Development; and the introduction of Parent Resources for Information Development and Education for foster families.
- (2) The Ministry follows hiring practices established for the Public Service of Saskatchewan, including designation of positions for candidates of Aboriginal ancestry. In June 2009, the Ministry contributed financial and organizational assistance to the Workforce and Workplace: Strategies for Success Conference in order to attract Aboriginal candidates and to increase labour market participation of Aboriginal persons who might otherwise become dependent on government assistance.
- (3) The Ministry works with the Federation of Saskatchewan Indians, Tribal Councils, First Nation Bands, First Nation Child and Family Service Agencies, and First Nations housing corporations.

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1619, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Norris:

To the Minister of Advanced Education, Employment and Labour: (1) How many First Nations and Métis workers received training and skill development under the auspices of the Northern Career Quest Partnership in 2009/10? (2) What was the cost to the province for its contribution to this partnership?

Answer:

- (1) 401
- (2) The Ministry has committed \$6.3M to the four year Aboriginal Skills and Employment Partnership delivered by Northern Career Quest. Up to \$1M per year is provided for student training allowances and an additional \$2.3M is provided over four years for skills training.

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1625, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. McMorris:

To the Minister of Health: Whereas the Public Health Agency of Canada reported in *Tuberculosis in Canada 2008* that tuberculosis rate among aboriginals in Saskatchewan is 43 times higher than among non-aboriginals, what actions is the Ministry of Health taking to curb the prevalence of tuberculosis among the aboriginal population in this province?

Answer:

Clinics are conducted by the Tuberculosis Specialist, Nurse Clinician and Clinic Assistant to reach clients throughout the province, including stationary clinics in Saskatoon, Regina, and Prince Albert and mobile (fly-in) clinics to northern communities.

Other initiatives include:

- Use of enhanced DOT (Directly Observed Therapy) and DOP (Directly Observed Prophylaxis) to ensure successful completion of medication therapy;
- Preschool screening for children age 2 and 5; school screening for grades 2, 4 and 6.
- Prophylaxis for Latent Tuberculosis Infection using DOP.
- In all new active disease cases, contact tracing is conducted. The contacts are followed up by the Tuberculosis Control team and are started on DOT or DOP treatment as appropriate.
- TB Control Saskatchewan, First Nations and Inuit Health, and the Northern Inter-Tribal Health Authority collaborate on a regular basis to meet the needs of the clients and communities.
- Tuberculosis Program Workers are from the same community as the clients which assist with developing support for the client for successful completion of treatment.

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1626, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. McMorris:

To the Minister of Health: Whereas tuberculosis rates are merely a symptom of the overall health gap between aboriginal and non-aboriginal residents of Saskatchewan, what steps has the government taken toward a healthier future for the First Nations and Métis people in Saskatchewan?

Answer:

The Ministry of Health is currently undertaking a number of initiatives aimed specifically at improving the gap between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal residents of Saskatchewan. Some examples are:

- The Memorandum of Understanding on First Nations Health and Well-Being entered into by the Ministry of Health, Federation of Saskatchewan Indian Nations (FSIN) and Health Canada in August of 2008. One of the purposes is to improve the health and well-being of First Nations people and eliminate the disparity in health status between First Nations and other Saskatchewan residents. The parties are working toward developing a health and wellness plan.
- The Ministry of Health is funding 15 projects in Saskatchewan utilizing the federal Aboriginal Health Transition Fund (AHTF) which is part of a broad, collaborative effort to close the gap in health status between Aboriginal people and the rest of society. Projects involve First Nations and First Nation organizations, Métis organizations, regional health authorities and the Ministry of Health.
- The Ministry of Health is a partner with the Métis Nation – Saskatchewan (MN-S) in a project funded under the AHTF and the objective is to create structures and processes to enable the MN-S and the Ministry of Health to better respond to the health care needs of the Métis population by adapting the current system.

The Ministry of Health is also undertaking a number of broader health initiatives and recognizes the importance of including First Nations and Métis people in these initiatives. For example:

- The Ministry of Health has identified the engagement of First Nations and Métis people as a priority in the development of both the tobacco strategy and its accompanying action plan. To

achieve this there has been ongoing communications with representatives from the FSIN and MN-S to explore options for greater participation and collaboration. Also, a working group with representatives from First Nations and Métis organizations, Regina Qu'Appelle Health Region, Saskatchewan Coalition for Tobacco Reduction, Health Canada, and Ministry of Health has been established within the Saskatchewan Tobacco Strategy to build relationships that will ensure First Nations and Métis voices are integrated into the work across the Strategy.

- With respect to the Provincial HIV Strategy, broad stakeholder consultation commenced in May of 2009. In March 2010, an intensive HIV Strategy workshop with health and community leaders was held. The purpose of the workshop was to review the draft HIV strategy and refine the goals and objectives as required plus identify key partners to ensure its successful implementation. One of the underlying themes that emerged was the need for community engagement. The Ministry continues to meet with First Nations and Métis organizations and community based organizations to further refine/discuss strategies and initiatives.

In addition, the Ministry of Health is a member of the Jordan's Principle Joint Working Committee, which is tasked with implementing Jordan's Principle in Saskatchewan. The goal of this committee is to ensure that First Nations children have access to care and services similar to those available to other children who live in the same area. While this work is underway, a Joint Interim Agreement negotiated between the Government of Saskatchewan, the FSIN, Health Canada and Indian and Northern Affairs Canada was announced last September to ensure that First Nations children in the province continue to get the care they need, with no delays due to a dispute between the federal and provincial governments over who is responsible for payment of the services.

Twenty-seven sites, 12 which are in the Reserve-a-Site program and 15 first come, first served sites.

Ms. Chartier asked the Government the following Question No. 1664, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Duncan:

To the Minister of Tourism, Parks, Culture and Sport: How many of those two-week sites were reserved through Reserve-A-Site in 2009?

Answer:

This is the first year of the program for Emma Lake.

Ms. Chartier asked the Government the following Question No. 1665, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Duncan:

To the Minister of Tourism, Parks, Culture and Sport: Of the two-week sites that were reserved through Reserve-A-Site in 2009, what percentage of the week were these sites occupied by campers?

Answer:

In 2009 the maximum 14 consecutive night stay was limited to Sagebrush Campground in Saskatchewan Landing Provincial Park as a pilot project. Occupancy rates during the period of June

24 to August 15 (the peak period identified for the program to operate in 18 locations in 2009) was 86% overall.

Ms. Chartier asked the Government the following Question No. 1666, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Duncan:

To the Minister of Tourism, Parks, Culture and Sport: (1) Of the two-week sites that were reserved through Reserve-A-Site in 2009, what percentage of sites were subsequently released? (2) What percentage is attributable to these campers deciding to stay at different open sites in Emma Lake Provincial Park?

Answer:

- (1) No data of this nature exists as the maximum 14 consecutive night stay program is new in 2010 for Emma Lake Recreation Site.
- (2) Same as above.

Ms. Atkinson asked the Government the following Question No. 1667, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. McMorris:

To the Minister of Health: (1) With regard to the agreement between the Saskatoon Health Region and Amicus Health Care Inc. to build 100 long-term care beds in Saskatoon, how will the Amicus facility be staffed? (2) How many of the staff will be long-term care providers? (3) How many will be home care providers?

Answer:

- (1) Saskatoon Health Region and Amicus have not determined staffing at this time.
- (2) Same as above.
- (3) Same as above.

Ms. Atkinson asked the Government the following Question No. 1668, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. McMorris:

To the Minister of Health: What are the terms of the agreement between the Saskatoon Health Region and Amicus Health Care Inc. to build 100 long-term care beds in Saskatoon?

Answer:

The Continuing Care and Service Agreement is between the Saskatoon Health Region and Amicus; a copy of this agreement and its terms should be requested through the Saskatoon Health Region.

Ms. Atkinson asked the Government the following Question No. 1669, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. McMorris:

To the Minister of Health: With regard to the agreement between the Saskatoon Health Region and Amicus Health Care Inc. to build 100 long-term care beds in Saskatoon, what is the estimated cost of care and facility operations?

Answer:

The Saskatoon Health Region and Amicus have not finalized the funding formula at this time.

Ms. Atkinson asked the Government the following Question No. 1670, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. McMorris:

To the Minister of Health: With regard to the agreement between the Saskatoon Health Region and Amicus Health Care Inc. to build 100 long-term care beds in Saskatoon, how much will be paid per resident per day in debt service stipends?

Answer:

The actual per diem has not yet been finalized.

Ms. Atkinson asked the Government the following Question No. 1671, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. McMorris:

To the Minister of Health: With regard to the agreement between the Saskatoon Health Region and Amicus Health Care Inc. to build 100 long-term care beds in Saskatoon, will residents be charged fees according to the same means tested model that is used by other affiliates?

Answer:

Yes.

Ms. Atkinson asked the Government the following Question No. 1672, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. McMorris:

To the Minister of Health: With regard to the agreement between the Saskatoon Health Region and Amicus Health Care Inc. to build 100 long-term care beds in Saskatoon, will Amicus be paying into, or receiving money, from the pool of client revenues established by the Saskatoon Health Region and its 19 affiliates to even out differences?

Answer:

Saskatoon Health Region and Amicus have not finalized how the resident revenue collected by Amicus will be managed.

Ms. Atkinson asked the Government the following Question No. 1673, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. McMorris:

To the Minister of Health: (1) With regard to the agreement between the Saskatoon Health Region and Amicus Health Care Inc. to build 100 long-term care beds in Saskatoon, will the Amicus long-term care facility be classified as an affiliate, or will it have a different status? (2) If so, what are the substantive differences between an affiliate and the status afforded to Amicus? (3) Will Amicus be required to sign the same accountability agreement as the Saskatoon Health Region's affiliates?

Answer:

- (1) Based on the definitions contained in *The Regional Health Services Act* Amicus can only be prescribed as a health care organization rather than an affiliate.
- (2) According to Section 2(1)(a) of *The Regional Health Services Act* an affiliate is a "person who, immediately before the coming into force of this section, is the operator of a hospital approved pursuant to The Hospital Standards Act or a not-for-profit special-care home licensed pursuant to The Housing and Special-care Homes Act, and includes any successor to that operator but does not include a regional health authority or a prescribed person. According to Section 2(1)(h) of *The Regional Health Services Act*, a health care organization is "(i) an affiliate; or (ii) a prescribed person that receives funding from a regional health authority to provide health services. Differences between the two designations are prescribed by the Act. There are two substantive differences. The first is in regards to an affiliate's ability to borrow money, sell, lease or purchase real and personal property and construct or renovate a facility is subject to Ministerial approval. The second is the Minister's ability to appoint a public administrator to manage an affiliate's affairs under certain circumstances. These two limitations do not apply to a health care organization.
- (3) No, because Amicus is not an affiliate. Amicus will be required to sign an agreement with similar accountabilities as they relate to financial and statistical reporting, patient safety and quality and the various program standards applicable to all special care homes.
