The Speaker informed the Assembly that he had received a communication from the Private Secretary to His Honour the Lieutenant Governor stating that His Honour would open the Session at 2:00 p.m. today, Thursday, the 26th day of October, 2006.

2:01 p.m.

SPEECH FROM THE THRONE

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor entered the Chamber, and having taken his seat upon the throne, was then pleased to open the Session with the following speech:

Mr. Speaker, Members of the Legislative Assembly, Honoured Guests, People of Saskatchewan.

Welcome all to the opening of the Third Session of the 25th Legislature. Tansi.

We sit in the Chamber today for the first full legislative Session of the second 100 years of our Legislature. On the table in front of us lies a traditionally crafted runner and cushion for our Mace, a blending of First Nations and Parliamentary traditions in the Assembly, just as First Nations and the people of other cultures now live together in Saskatchewan as neighbours under the Treaty relationship.

We are many; we are one. A particular welcome is extended today to the families who have recently chosen to make their homes in our province, to the youth who have graduated and are building their futures here, and to the musicians and artists we will celebrate in the year ahead. Some of you have joined us today.

WHERE WE HAVE COME FROM

As this Session opens, many will remember that fifteen years ago, Saskatchewan was on the brink of bankruptcy. The financial future of the next generation was at risk. Social infrastructure was in jeopardy. There was much hard work and sacrifice in the following decade to restore the province's fiscal foundation. The results have been dramatic: thirteen consecutive balanced budgets, fourteen credit rating upgrades and the significant reduction of public debt.

Five years ago, our economy had reached a turning point. Today, thanks to the hard work of the Saskatchewan people, our economy is re-energized and there are now more jobs than ever before in our history. Our quality of life remains second to none, and we have a proud record of social progress.

My government is committed to a plan that ensures Saskatchewan maintains its hard-earned designation as one of only three "have" provinces in this nation, and we proudly reflect on this accomplishment as a "have" province with a heart.

VISION FOR THE FUTURE

A year ago, my government outlined a broad future vision for Saskatchewan. That vision is to seek a province where no one is left behind on the path to opportunity, a province with an unbreakable social fabric, built on the foundation of diverse and growing communities, within a green and prosperous economy.

In the year that has passed, much progress has been achieved toward this vision. Even more progress is planned.

Ours is a province that is down to earth, but where the sky is the limit.

FOCUS FOR THE YEAR AHEAD

The focus for my government in this Session is to make life better for today's Saskatchewan families, and to build an even better future here for young people.

Four cornerstones will set the foundation for my government's agenda:

- Make Saskatchewan the best place for young people to live, work, and build strong futures;
- Strengthen Saskatchewan's leadership in improving public health care while reducing wait times and improving access to services;
- Advance Saskatchewan as a leader in environmental protection and the green economy; and
- Ensure that today's Saskatchewan families benefit from our strong economy.

MAKE SASKATCHEWAN THE BEST PLACE FOR YOUNG PEOPLE TO LIVE, WORK AND BUILD STRONG FUTURES

There is no clearer calling than our collective responsibility to provide a legacy of opportunity for our children. My government's first cornerstone is dedicated to that goal, making Saskatchewan the best place for young people to live, work and build strong futures.

Encouragement and support to nurture a lifelong learner's success must begin early in life. These ingredients are some of the essential building blocks for the province's social and economic wellbeing.

My government wants quality options for families with children, and the best in early learning and child care that can be provided. We want all children to be able to read the books they carry home in their book bags from their school or local library.

Investments in Education

To make this happen, the province's Literacy program will expand, and we will deliver Saskatchewan's Early Learning and Child Care Program, despite the federal government's withdrawal from its commitments.

In the year ahead, investments in education will continue to focus on meeting the needs of families and ensuring their children grow into healthy and well-educated adults.

As one example, Saskatchewan will invest in its groundbreaking KidsFirst initiative, which blends the efforts of health districts, school divisions, Aboriginal organizations and communities, and provides:

- home visiting programs;
- community supports;
- early development programs;
- pre-natal care; and
- family supports.

Toward the same goal, building on our education renewal initiative, new School Community Councils will provide parents and community members with opportunities to have real input and make a difference in children's learning at their local schools.

Investments in Training

As young people grow and look to their future here, in whatever walk of life they choose, my government is committed to addressing the labour market's changing needs and will:

- expand training opportunities to meet market demands;
- unveil a new partnership between business, labour and our training institutions to provide counsel to government to meet Saskatchewan's evolving labour market needs; and
- strengthen and expand our regional training model to bring education closer to students and better link training to learners, job-seekers and employers.

Additionally, it will:

- expand partnerships with First Nations and Métis to enhance education and skills training for Aboriginal youth;
- continue the freeze on university tuition; and
- host a Youth Summit that links young people, business, employers and government in building a bright future for youth in our province.

During this Session, my government will also receive and act on a comprehensive review of access to post-secondary education. These actions will address essential issues for students and promote the exceptional range of career opportunities right here at home.

Ours is a province with abundant career opportunities; a province that is down to earth, but where the sky is the limit for jobs in every corner.

Last year, we launched a bold initiative to attract 5,000 immigrants annually by 2008, and we are on track to accomplish that goal.

Investments in language training, employment and other services will foster strong beginnings for our newcomers in their new neighbourhoods in this province. This includes a program at the College of Medicine to aid the certification of international medical graduates living in Saskatchewan

My government will also reinvigorate our relationship with the Fransaskois community, with particular emphasis on immigration and employment needs of Saskatchewan francophones.

In this 21st century, it is important that we continue to spread the word that Saskatchewan is a great place to live, work and raise a family.

Saskatchewan is home to a diverse, robust and fundamentally strong economy, and our doors are open, with opportunities for workers here at home and from abroad.

All these efforts are in support of my government's focus in this Session to make life better for today's families and to build an even better future here for our youth.

STRENGTHEN SASKATCHEWAN'S LEADERSHIP IN PUBLIC HEALTH CARE WHILE REDUCING WAIT TIMES AND IMPROVING ACCESS TO SERVICES

The second cornerstone of my government's agenda is to work with health care providers to strengthen Saskatchewan's leadership in public health care, while reducing wait times and improving access to services.

Investments in health care will be the highest they have ever been.

As the birthplace of Medicare, Saskatchewan retains its distinction as the only "have" province in Canada that does not charge its people a health care premium.

To strengthen the best health care system for families, we will:

- enhance efforts to recruit health care providers, using new relocation incentives in return for service commitments, among other initiatives;
- increase opportunities for internationally-educated professionals to work right here, right now; and
- expand the Aboriginal health workforce.

To further improve health care for Saskatchewan families, we will:

- continue the progress towards the development of a Children's Hospital within a hospital;
- provide support for children with mental, physical, or behavioural disabilities and disorders;
- continue the implementation of the Premier's Project Hope to prevent and treat the devastation caused by drug and alcohol abuse; and
- work with First Nations and Métis leaders to call on the federal government to meet its commitment to achieve the targets agreed upon at the First Ministers' meeting on Aboriginal issues.

Our seniors and elders fought for Medicare and pioneered this province. They set out to create a better life for their families, children and grandchildren. So too, in this Session, my government will introduce new measures to recognize their dedication.

Cornerstone efforts to improve health care and its delivery are firmly in place to meet the goal of making life better for today's families and to build a future here for our young people.

ADVANCE SASKATCHEWAN AS A LEADER IN ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AND THE GREEN ECONOMY

For our families to remain healthy and for our economy to prosper, Saskatchewan will be a leader in the protection of the environment and the promotion of clean and renewable energy. The third cornerstone of my government speaks to this goal.

Saskatchewan will demonstrate national leadership in conserving, protecting and restoring the health of our environment and our diverse ecosystems.

In this Session, my government will:

- implement further steps to achieve our long-term goal of meeting one-third of our energy requirements through renewable resources; and
- work in partnership to research the feasibility of the world's first, Saskatchewan-designed, utility-scale clean coal generating facility.

In addition, my government will:

- implement measures to assist in energy conservation;
- carry out a comprehensive plan to develop bio-fuels;
- continue leadership in carbon sequestration and wind power development;
- implement a plan for the mandated use of ethanol;
- ensure a safe water supply for communities; and
- take further measures toward our vision of agroforestry.

Finally, with one-third of the organic farmers in Canada, and 60 per cent of the land in this nation which is dedicated to organic farming, this province will lead the way in organic production. Upon completion of work now underway, initiatives will be introduced to expand the production, processing and marketing of local organic food.

With our connection to the land and our commitment to environmental stewardship, Saskatchewan clearly demonstrates it is down to earth, with only the sky as our limit.

All efforts in environmental protection will contribute to our goal of making life better for today's families and help to build a future here for our young people.

ENSURE SASKATCHEWAN FAMILIES BENEFIT FROM OUR STRONG, PROSPEROUS ECONOMY

Our province has caught the eye of the world. Major investments are being made by national and international companies, including in oil and gas, diamonds, uranium, value-added agriculture, ethanol and potash. Our external trade missions and promotions, and the work of the Saskatchewan Trade and Export Partnership, are bearing fruit.

There have been significant gains made through our university-based capacity for research and commercialization in bio-technology, petroleum, medicine, pharmacy, information technology and greenhouse gas emission reduction.

Saskatchewan's co-operative, financial, manufacturing, tourism, film and video, music, small business and retail sectors are expanding and providing even greater opportunities for Saskatchewan's young people.

All of these developments and more have contributed to the strong economy of Saskatchewan today.

The fourth cornerstone for my government within this Session is to ensure that Saskatchewan families will benefit from our strong and prosperous economy.

This will take shape in many ways within their communities, rural and urban alike.

Over the last year, business tax reforms were introduced and are making Saskatchewan's corporate tax structure one of the most competitive and business-friendly in Canada, now leading to more job creation and employment opportunities for Saskatchewan people.

Additionally, throughout our province, Aboriginal economic development has significantly contributed to the growing employment numbers among Saskatchewan's First Nations and Métis. To further this progress, a national summit on Aboriginal economic development, in partnership with First Nations, Métis and Inuit, will be held.

Without a doubt, the rise in the Canadian dollar and changing international markets are having significant impact on two of our major sectors – forestry and the meat industry.

During this Session, my government will work with the Forestry Task Force, local communities and industry partners toward a viable and long-term forestry sector in the province. Also during this Session, my government will work with the meat industry to evaluate our plans in light of recent changes.

This cornerstone contributes to economic growth. It supports job creation so our young people can build strong futures right here. It provides real benefits for families.

REAL BENEFITS FOR FAMILIES

My government distinguishes itself by being committed to the conviction that economic progress must result in social progress and that should result in real benefits for families.

Saskatchewan families should benefit from their earned success, and their pocketbooks and lifestyles should reflect that growth.

Over the coming months, we will take important steps to make sure life here is even more affordable for every Saskatchewan family.

As part of that, the commitment to the Lowest-Cost Utility Bundle through our Crown Corporations will continue.

Real Benefits for Families A Fair Deal for Saskatchewan's Non-Renewable Resources

My government believes there must be a fair and equitable equalization formula respecting Saskatchewan's non-renewable resource revenues. We are demanding fairness and full benefits for our families when the Government of Canada honours its commitment to the people of Saskatchewan.

During this Session, my government will be relentless with vigorous efforts to ensure that the Government of Canada keeps its promise.

Families will feel real benefits from Saskatchewan's strong economy.

Real Benefits for Families Public Infrastructure Renewal

Families need sturdy, 21st century public infrastructure that meets their growing needs.

Modern transportation corridors are essential to our future economic development and to create opportunities for our young people.

During this Session, my government will deliver a multi-year strategy of road and rail, to build a transportation network that will serve the economy of today and tomorrow.

In this Session, legislation will be passed to dedicate every dollar of fuel tax collected by the province from motorists toward the maintenance and building of Saskatchewan's road network.

With the opportunity presented by one-time revenues from high energy prices, a multi-year infrastructure fund will be established and will provide funding for initiatives such as:

- the Building Communities fund for cultural and recreational facilities;
- improvements to roads affected by heavy-haul traffic;
- improvements to access to First Nations communities; and
- improvements to the economic and social development capacity in our North.

Further to these initiatives, my government will:

- expand high-speed internet to more rural and northern communities;
- address barriers to the movement of goods, services, investment and people with our neighbouring provinces and within Canada; and
- work with municipalities to create an "Urban Agenda" to support our cities, communities and regional economies.

Families will feel real benefits from Saskatchewan's strong economy.

Real Benefits for Families Safety and Security in our Communities

My government is committed to a Saskatchewan where families feel safe and secure in their communities.

Toward this goal, as examples, my government will:

- create more targeted crime reduction efforts in communities;
- continue action to protect against dangerous offenders;
- develop a province-wide police protocol with the task force for missing persons;
- introduce legislation which gives police new means to combat violence;
- review legislation to ensure that everyone in the province, including those in First Nations communities, has an acceptable level of fire protection and fire prevention services; and
- continue to develop a provincial anti-racism strategy.

Real Benefits for Families The North

My government believes in the vast potential and breathtaking beauty of Saskatchewan's North.

Within this Session our priorities will include:

- working on the Northern Roads to Prosperity strategy;
- moving forward in implementing our commitment to clean up abandoned uranium sites;
- examining the impact of the overtime exemption that currently exists in northern Saskatchewan; and
- maximizing business, training and employment opportunities made possible by high levels of investment in the North.

Ours is a province with limitless potential: down to earth, expanding like the northern sky.

Real Benefits for Families Working People, Working Families

Working people and working families are fundamental building blocks of a strong economy. The health and safety of, and benefits for, workers are important values of my government.

During this Session, my government will:

- focus on workplace safety through the response to the Occupational Health and Safety Council Report; and
- receive and respond to the report from *The Workers' Compensation Act* Committee of Review.

There will be initiatives to assist vulnerable workers to overcome employment challenges by responding further to the recommendations of the Commission on Improving Work Opportunities for Saskatchewan Residents.

As part of our province's commitment to improving working benefits for Saskatchewan people, particularly Saskatchewan young people, the minimum wage will increase to \$7.95 on March 1, 2007, as part of a three-stage increase from \$6.65 just over one year ago.

Families will feel real benefits from Saskatchewan's strong economy.

Real Benefits for Families Our Families Who Farm

Families who farm continue to fill the breadbaskets of the world even as the cost/price squeeze in agriculture continues.

Over the past year, my government has made significant improvements to the education tax on farmland, and today's farm families are gaining from that benefit.

During this Session, efforts will ensure that the benefits of our economy continue to touch the lives of average farm families by fully funding the Canadian Agricultural Income Stabilization Program while negotiating for a more effective and fair national program.

My government will also:

- work with industry to improve risk management programs such as Crop Insurance; and
- stand firm in calling for the federal government to announce an effective new disaster program, and to commit to greater support for the grains and oilseeds sector in levelling the international playing field.

During this Session, my government will also press the federal government to honour its own legislation and enable farmers to decide the future of the Canadian Wheat Board through an open and fair plebiscite. The legislature will be asked to endorse that position.

Families will feel real benefits from Saskatchewan's strong economy.

Real Benefits for Families Our Volunteers and Our Communities

Community-based and voluntary organizations are the backbone of the high quality of life Saskatchewan families enjoy. Saskatchewan people volunteer more than any in Canada to sustain their organizations.

Working with the voluntary sector, we are striving to maintain and strengthen our position as a national leader in voluntary participation. My government is deeply disappointed in the decision by the federal government to withdraw support from the Canada Volunteerism Initiative.

As a national leader in voluntary participation, support will continue for the Premier's Voluntary Sector Initiative. My government anticipates moving forward to forge a new structure that will strengthen the relationship between the public sector and the voluntary sector.

All of our efforts are toward the goal of making life better for Saskatchewan families and contributing to a quality of life second to none.

Real Benefits for Families A Year of Music – Saskatchewan on Centre Stage

It is often said that Saskatchewan people are the most creative and the most innovative by nature. My government believes in the strength of creative economies and the enhancements to our quality of life that are brought by innovation and the arts.

In this Session, legislation affecting the Status of the Artist will be introduced.

In 2007, we look forward to a year of celebration of the arts, particularly music.

Building on an impressive track record in establishing a thriving film and video industry, a similar course for the creative economy of music and the arts will be charted.

Working in partnership with SaskCreativeMusic 2007, and having recently secured the world tour of The Rolling Stones, there is no doubt that more excitement is on the way. Saskatchewan has properly reserved its place on centre stage. Events and programs to showcase our own wealth of musical talent will boom.

The 2007 stage has been set for Saskatchewan to play host to:

- the Juno Awards in Saskatoon in April;
- the Canadian Country Music Awards in Regina in September; and
- the Western Canadian Music Awards in Moose Jaw in October.

Watch for the marquees and have the welcome mat ready as other announcements unfold. If you love music and good times, Saskatchewan will be the place to be in 2007. Nobody throws a party like Saskatchewan! This will be a year to be proud out loud.

We know good times, but Saskatchewan people are also known for a strong work ethic. We are amongst the most productive and efficient workforce in this nation. To recognize this, and to further build a healthy balance of work and family, beginning this February, a new annual statutory holiday will be introduced. It will be known as Saskatchewan's "Family Day.

Families will feel real benefits from our strong economy.

Much has been accomplished. My government has set out a clear, focused agenda to benefit families in four cornerstone priority areas. Social progress comes from progress in our economy.

As the provincial motto calls for unification, let us build upon the strength of our many peoples.

We are building a province where children, regardless of race or culture, will be able to read the books they carry in their school bags.

We are building a province where young people will establish their careers and raise their families in a healthy environment and with a quality of life second to none.

We are building a province where the contributions of our seniors and elders are celebrated with the utmost pride and respected with dignity.

We are building a province where no matter if we carry a tool box, a briefcase or a wireless device to work, we have ample leisure time to enjoy our land, our lakes, our skies, our neighbours and most importantly, our families.

This is our province – a province we are so proud to call home; a province that is down to earth, with only the sky as our limit.

This is our home. Saskatchewan!

May divine providence continue to bless our province and guide this Assembly in all its deliberations.

God bless Saskatchewan. God bless Canada. God save the Queen.

Benjamin Dave Heppner, who passed away on September 24, 2006, was a Member of this Legislative Assembly from 1995 until 2006, representing the constituencies of Rosthern and Martensville for the Progressive Conservative and Saskatchewan Parties.

Mr. Heppner was born on March 18, 1943 in Waldheim. He attended local schools before graduating from Briercrest Bible College in 1964. Mr. Heppner continued his education at the University of Saskatchewan, from where he convocated with Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Education degrees. Mr. Heppner married Arlene Fast on September 3, 1965 and together they had three children.

A teacher by training, Mr. Heppner taught for twenty-three years in rural and city schools around Saskatchewan. He also served in an administrative capacity at three high schools. Mr. Heppner was a small business owner, operating a John Deere farm implement dealership and a lumber yard in Rosthern.

Mr. Heppner was an active participant in the affairs of the communities in which he lived. He was very involved with his church and served in a number of capacities, including serving as chairman of the Board of Elders and as a Sunday school teacher. He was involved with the Army Cadets in Swift Current, the Community Bond Corporation and the Seager Wheeler Farm Committee.

Mr. Heppner first sought to represent his community at the municipal level. He served as a councillor and as mayor of the town of Rosthern. He was elected to this Assembly in 1995. He successfully retained his seat in the 1999 and 2003 general elections. He was a founding member of the Saskatchewan Party in 1997 and served as caucus chair from its inception.

In recording its own deep sense of loss and bereavement, this Assembly expresses its most sincere sympathy with members of the bereaved family.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER

(Question of Privilege – Announcement of Tax Cut outside of Assembly)

On Friday, October 27th, the Opposition House Leader (Rod Gantefoer) raised a question of privilege concerning the disclosure by the Minister of Highways and Transportation during a media interview of an impending reduction in the Provincial Sales Tax. I thank the Member for his comments and for the written correspondence he provided to me later that afternoon. I also thank the Government House Leader (Hon. Glenn Hagel) for his intervention.

The circumstance that gave rise to the question of privilege was an interview given by the Minister of Highways and Transportation to a radio station on the morning of October 27th. During the interview, the Minister revealed that the Provincial Sales Tax would be reduced. This interview was broadcast on the 27th prior to the Minister of Finance's announcement of the tax reduction in this Assembly later that same morning.

It is the position of the Opposition House Leader that the disclosure of a tax measure outside of this Assembly violates a parliamentary principle that they be first introduced in the Assembly, and further, that the violation of this principle constituted a contempt against the privileges of this Assembly.

In his rebuttal, the Government House Leader asserted that the interview had been subject to an embargo agreement that would, in the normal course of such arrangements, have prevented the premature disclosure of the tax cut.

In determining whether a contempt against the privileges of the Assembly occurred, one must assess whether the actions of the Minister of Highways and Transportation disregarded, disrespected or clearly challenged the authority and dignity of this House, or whether they improperly interfered or impeded the parliamentary work of Members.

The Opposition House Leader rested his case upon the March 19, 2001 ruling of the House of Commons. In that ruling, Speaker Milliken found that the denial of Members or their staff to an embargoed technical briefing for media on a bill constituted a *prima facie* contempt of Parliament. The House Leader's assertion that the principle outlined in this ruling is not limited to cases involving legislation, but would be equally applicable to technical briefings on budgetary or taxation matters is well taken.

The impact of the Milliken ruling on the practices of this Assembly was considered in a ruling I delivered on April 11, 2005. In that case, a *prima facie* of breach of privilege was found when Opposition Members and their staff were denied access to a technical briefing on a Crown corporation annual report given for the media. Subsequently, when the Standing Committee on Privileges was unable to come to a decision on how to resolve the matter, this Assembly adopted a motion directing that all technical briefings and news conferences that dealt with matters to be considered by the Assembly were to be made available to all Members and their staff in advance of, or concurrently with, any media briefings. It is the terms of this motion that must now guide consideration of privilege matters in this Assembly.

The challenges that this Order creates in the present circumstances is the stipulation that its terms be directed to government officials and Crown corporations, and that it encompasses technical briefings and news conferences. In the absence of clear direction otherwise, I hesitate to interpret the Order to include Members themselves.

In the second instance, I would not characterize the communication of the Minister of Highways and Transportation as being a "technical briefing or news conference" given that the scope of the interview was not known, that it involved only one media outlet and that it addressed a matter, namely tax measures, outside his portfolio.

A further consideration in my decision is whether Members were impeded from carrying out their duties. On many occasions, I and my predecessors have underscored the importance of ensuring that nothing is done that disadvantages Members from carrying out their parliamentary functions (Ruling of April 11, 2005). The timely provision of information is but one facet of this principle. Indeed, the Minister of Finance adhered to this principle by announcing the tax reduction in this Assembly as soon as the Rules permitted, during "Ministerial Statements", and by providing a copy of the statement to the Opposition at that time.

On the basis of the current situation, I do not find that the premature disclosure was significant enough to impede Members in their work. I also note that no one could have benefited in this specific instance from the early disclosure.

Accordingly, I find that the actions of the Minister of Highways and Transportation do not technically meet the threshold required to establish a *prima facie* breach of privilege.

However, I feel strongly that the granting of an embargoed interview could violate the spirit of the Assembly's 2005 motion. The motion was intended to protect Parliament's pre-eminent role in the conduct of legislative matters by ensuring that it was informed first of significant initiatives. It is now apparent these provisions do not sufficiently clarify the practice governing the advance release of information.

For this reason, I strongly recommend this Assembly address this issue either by motion or by referral to the Standing Committee on Privileges to review and make recommendations on the advance release of information, the means by which it may take place, and the sources from which it may come.

SPECIAL PROVISION MOTION

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Hagel, seconded by Mr. Gantefoer, by leave of the Assembly:

Ordered, That the modifications and amendments to the Rules and practices of the Legislative Assembly, as specified by *The Seventh Report of the Standing Committee on House Services*, be adopted and brought into force effective immediately, notwithstanding;

That the Rules and Procedures for the parliamentary calendar shall be varied on an interim basis for the duration of the Third Session of the Twenty-fifth Legislature as follows:

- 1. The Government House Leader may designate, on or before the sitting of the Assembly on March 22, 2007, of the Spring period of the parliamentary calendar, as many as three additional government bills to be considered as "Specified Bills";
- 2. The additional "Specified Bills" shall be designated orally in the Assembly by the Government House Leader, or the Minister of the Crown responsible for the bill, immediately upon the introduction and first reading of the said bill;
- 3. If additional "Specified Bills" are introduced on or before March 22, 2007, the "Completion Day" of the Spring Period of the parliamentary calendar may be postponed up to seven additional sitting days by order of either the Government House Leader or the Opposition House Leader;
- 4. An order to postpone the "Completion Day" shall be made orally on Orders of the Day on or before the sitting of the Assembly on May 3, 2007;
- 5. If there are two orders to postpone the "Completion Day," the order with the greatest number of sitting days shall be observed;
- 6. The deadline for the passage of business under the Rules for the parliamentary calendar shall be applied in accordance with the revised Completion Day;
- 7. The procedures outlined in this sessional order shall expire upon the adjournment of the Assembly on the "Completion Day" of the Third Session of the Twenty-fifth Legislature;"

That upon adoption of this motion, the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly shall ensure *The Rules and Procedures of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan* are revised, printed and re-published in English and French as expeditiously as possible.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER

(Question of Privilege – Carriere Settlement Agreement)

Earlier today, the Opposition House Leader (Mr. Gantefoer) gave notice of a question of privilege. The notice concerned a statement made by the Minister responsible for the Public Service Commission (Hon. Ms. Atkinson) regarding a settlement agreement and its impact on Members of this Assembly.

Before making my ruling, I wish to remind Members that questions of privilege should be raised at the earliest opportunity. The statement at issue was made on Wednesday, March 7th and raised with my office only this morning. Nevertheless, the Speaker has the discretion to waive this requirement and I do so in this instance.

The crux of the case is whether the Government's recent out of court settlement with Murdoch Carriere in any way impedes the ability of Members to carry out their duties.

It is the Opposition House Leader's contention that the government's decision to withhold the details of the settlement agreement constitutes a breach of Members' privileges.

He then cites in support of this view the Minister's statement that the agreement affects "all members of the legislature ... including the opposition" and page 193 of Maingot's *Parliamentary Privilege in Canada* (2nd ed.).

I find that the citation from Maingot is not relevant to the circumstances at hand. The context of the citation refers to situations where the Assembly has issued an order that has not been abided by. For example, if the Assembly had issued an order for the production of a document and the custodian of that document refused to produce it, then a contempt of the Assembly's privileges might have occurred. In the current case, the Assembly has not issued an order for the production of the settlement agreement, nor has a Minister refused to comply.

In addressing the circumstances at hand, I find that the refusal to provide details of the settlement agreement do not obstruct Members in performing their parliamentary duties. Members continue to be protected by privilege while participating in parliamentary proceedings. The ability of Members to speak, debate, or ask questions in this Chamber or the Legislative Committees is in no way impeded by virtue of the settlement agreement having been reached. Indeed, it is not uncommon for Ministers to decline to divulge details of matters on the grounds of *sub judice*, commercial sensitivity or which are of a confidential nature, such as personnel matters.

I therefore find that a *prima facie* case of privilege has not been established.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER

(Unparliamentary Language during 75 Minute Debate)

Last Thursday, two points of order were raised during the Seventy-five Minute debate concerning the language used. I thank both the Member for Saskatoon Southeast (Mr. Morgan) and the Government House Leader (Mr. Hagel) for their interventions. At the time, the Acting Speaker (Mr. Prebble) committed to reviewing both the written and video record and to bring back a ruling at the earliest opportunity. I have discussed the events of last week with the Acting Speaker and now wish to rule on the points of order.

Much of the language and conduct of many Members on both sides during last Thursday's debate on the Murdoch Carriere case was unacceptable. The written Hansard is replete with instances on both sides of language that was unnecessarily personal or offensive, either towards an individual or towards a recognized group. Once again I direct Members to Marleau and Monpetit, where it is stated on page 525 that:

The proceedings of the House are based on a long-standing tradition of respect for the integrity of all Members. Thus, the use of offensive, provocative or threatening language in the House is strictly forbidden. Personal attacks, insults and obscene language or words are not in order.

Numerous rulings by Speakers of this Assembly can be cited in support of this authority. I draw Members' attention to just one. The ruling of May 12, 2000 addressed a similar circumstance where the language and decorum in the Assembly diminished considerably during a debate on a private Member's motion. At the time, my predecessor reflected that "it should be our mutual goal to achieve hard-hitting, politically effective criticism of policies, positions and actions without resorting to rude, intemperate and simplistic attacks on the integrity and motives of others."

I recognize that achieving this goal becomes more challenging when the matter under debate is an emotional one, which involves passionately held beliefs and values. Nevertheless, it is possible. The remarks made by the Member for Regina Dewdney (Mr. Yates) illustrates how one can effectively and forcefully refute the positions proposed by the other side while avoiding any personal aspersions on the integrity of other Members.

I do find that the remarks made by the Member for Humboldt (Ms. Harpauer) at the conclusion of her speech are unparliamentary. Regardless of whether they were captured by the Hansard recorders, the language used was clearly audible in the Chamber and on the video record. They constitute a personal attack on another Member and caused considerable disorder in the Chamber. Accordingly at the end of my statement, I will call upon the Member to withdraw the remarks she directed at the Member for Regina Walsh Acres.

A further concern that I wish to address is the rising level of noise in this Chamber, particularly during divisive debates and proceedings. In my view, the debate last Thursday was characterized by an inordinate amount of heckles and interventions by Members who were not recognized to speak. The volume of noise reached an unacceptable level when it prevented both the Acting Speaker and Members on both sides of the House to hear the words spoken in the debate. When the presiding officer must consult with the written record before a matter can be addressed, it illustrates the difficulty caused by excessive noise. It also prevents the Assembly from dealing promptly with questionable language or possible Rule infractions. In the future, I strongly encourage Members to curb the volume of their interventions to a level which does not impede the proceedings.

In regards to the point of order raised by the Member for Saskatoon Southeast, I reviewed the Hansard and audio tape and they do not record the comments alleged to have been made by the Minister of Finance. Accordingly I am unable to rule on this matter.

I wish to conclude by cautioning all Members to be temperate in their remarks, both while recognized to speak and while speaking from their seat. Many of these unofficial comments or heckles are intentionally provocative and inflammatory. The course of last Thursday's debate is illustrative of how such remarks are unhelpful. The fact that Hansard may not be able to attribute them to a particular Member does not make them acceptable language.

Thereupon, Ms. Harpauer withdrew her remarks.

STATEMENTS BY THE SPEAKER

(Unparliamentary Remarks by a Member)

I have had the opportunity to review Hansard and wish to bring a matter to the attention of the Assembly. During Wednesday's Statements by Members, the Member for Regina Coronation Park (Mr. Trew) referred to another Member's actions as underhanded and unethical. Later he attributed unethical behaviour to another Member and to an identifiable group. Charges of impropriety against other individual Members and identifiable groups of Members are considered unparliamentary. We should hold ourselves to a higher standard of debate.

I call upon the Member for Regina Coronation Park to unequivocally withdraw that statement.

Thereupon, Mr. Trew withdrew his remarks.

(Admissibility of Questions Regarding Party Matters)

Yesterday, the Opposition House Leader (Mr. Gantefoer) raised a point of order regarding the future admissibility of a line of questioning that the Member for Canora Pelly (Mr. Krawetz) was pursuing during Oral Question Period yesterday. I wish to thank both him and the Government House Leader (Hon. Mr. Hagel) for their interventions.

Members will be aware that parliamentary rules and traditions exist to ensure that Oral Question Period is conducted in an appropriate manner. Paragraph 409(6) of Beauchesne's 6th edition, states that "A question must be within the administrative competence of the Government". Marleau and Montpetit, on pages 426-427, further clarifies this principle by stating that "a question should not address a Minister's former portfolio or any other presumed functions, such as party or regional political responsibilities."

These authorities have been interpreted and applied in this Assembly. In this vein, there have been no fewer than nine rulings on such matters over the course of the last decade. Two statements made in 2000 are particularly relevant to the current circumstances. On April 17, 2000, my predecessor stated that:

Comments regarding the political responsibilities of a Minister, or the Leader of the Opposition, or of another Member, are properly matters of debate. As such, they may be raised during debate on relevant topics in bills, estimates and motions. During Question Period however, only questions touching upon the collective administrative responsibility of the Government or the current individual responsibilities of a Minister are properly the subject of oral questions.

The questions asked by the Honourable Member concerned a former employee of the government caucus in the early 1990s, and sought to determine whether she may have been involved in the misappropriation of public funds. While I recognize that members of the Executive Council do belong to the government caucus, the internal affairs of any caucus, as with those of any political party, do not fall within the administrative responsibility of the Government.

The Opposition House Leader cited several instances from 1996 to support his opinion that the questions should be permitted. At the surface these instances do appear to support the Opposition House Leader's point of view. However, the 1996 precedents can be distinguished from the matter at hand in that the former, the 1996 precedents, did touch upon the administrative responsibility of the Executive, namely the recovery of public funds by the government. In contrast, the questions at issue yesterday addressed the internal accounting of funds within a caucus.

In putting questions to Ministers during Oral Question Period, Members must clearly connect their questions to a government responsibility or portfolio. The Member for Canora Pelly failed to clearly make this connection.

In arriving at my decision, I recognize that it is often a fine line that divides those questions that are acceptable and those that are not. A ruling dated May 9, 2000 addressed the difficulty of maintaining a balance on matters such as the issue at hand. Firstly, the manner in which a question is phrased is of primary importance. As noted in that ruling:

"An inappropriately worded preamble could prompt me as Speaker to intervene even though the question or answer to follow is procedurally acceptable."

The ruling also states....

"The difficulty that I, as Speaker, must resolve is determining whether a question, while it is being posed, is in order. In some instances, it is very clear where a Member is heading and that the subject matter is inappropriate. In other instances, it is only after a Member has completed asking his question that one is able to determine its procedural acceptability. In many instances, by the time the appropriateness of the question is determined, the Minister has indicated his or her desire to respond."

There is one other dynamic of Question Period that touches upon the difficulty of the present situation. Upon review of the relevant precedents I have found some examples when Ministers have voluntarily answered questions. Sometimes a Minister has answered in terms of their Board of Internal Economy responsibilities. Yesterday, I did provide an opportunity for a Minister to voluntarily respond to the question. This opportunity was not taken, therefore the next question was called.

Pursuant to a review of the precedents, and in response to the Point of Order, I rule as follows:

- 1. Questions must be posed in a manner that clearly connects the issue to the responsibility of a Minister or the government as a whole;
- 2. When a question is put that is not directly connected to a government responsibility, the Speaker shall rule the question out of order but provide the government with the option to respond;
- 3. This ruling does not preclude members raising this type of issue by other means that are available.

This ruling is in line with the Assembly's practice to allow questions related to political parties when they are posed in terms of the legislation, statutes or the administration of the law. It is also in line with the practice to allow ministers to voluntarily respond to questions outside their ministerial responsibilities.

In closing, I want to note a matter of particular concern to the Speaker. Yesterday, during my initial ruling a few remarks were heard to challenge the impartiality of the Speaker. In future this will not be tolerated.

MOMENT OF SILENCE

With unanimous consent, the Assembly observed a moment of silence in remembrance of workers killed or injured in the course of their employment.

Unanimous consent having been granted, the Assembly proceeded to Committee of the Whole and then reverted to Orders of the Day.

- (2) In 1997, the Province signed the Mackenzie River Basin Transboundary Waters Master Agreement between the Governments of Canada, British Columbia, Alberta, Northwest Territories and Yukon to ensure the use of the water in the basin is sustainable in all jurisdictions. The Province is a member of the Mackenzie River Basin Board, which administers the Master Agreement.

Mr. Hart asked the Government the following Question No. 68, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Nilson:

To the Minister of Environment: (1) Has the provincial government raised the issue of ensuring a sustainable supply of water for Saskatchewan with the Government of Alberta? To the Minister of Environment: Given the importance of a sustainable oil sands development for Saskatchewan and a sustainable water supply to develop our oil sands, what action is the provincial government taking to ensure the Saskatchewan's oil sands are served by a sustainable water supply?

Answer:

The Government of Saskatchewan's thorough regulatory framework, the ongoing monitoring and assessment of Saskatchewan's water resources, and the recently announced water conservation plan ensure that projects, such as oil sands, are developed with the principle of sustainability.

It is the policy of Red Willow to pursue youth who are fleeing whenever possible, taking into consideration the safety of other children in Red Willow Centre. Not all children who run are leaving from the residential centre. They may decide to run while attending school, community outings and programs or while participating in a home visit. When a child is on the run, police, family, and regional workers are notified of the time the child left and the time of their return. Staff persons make daily efforts to locate the child and every lead is followed to bring about their safe return to the program. Red Willow staff take the lead in searching for children who have run away. When children are listed as missing with police, the following information is provided:

- a. Name and basic demographic information of the child;
- b. When the child left:
- c. Where the child left from;
- d. What the child was wearing;
- e. Any known behaviours or interactions that may have precipitated the child's departure;
- f. Any possible places the child may go;
- g. Any special physical or mental health conditions or medications that may affect the child's safety;
- h. Any known companions who may be aware of and involved in the child's absence;
- i. Other professionals, relatives, significant adults or peers who may know where the child might go; and
- j. A recent photo of the child (if available or requested).

Ms. Harpauer asked the Government the following Question No. 72, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Sonntag:

To the Minister of Crown Investments Corporation of Saskatchewan: (1) What is the CIC Social Club? (2) Why did CIC pay it \$7,200 in 2005?

Answer:

(1) The Social Fund is where employees contribute \$4 per month through an automatic deduction on their pay cheque. At the end of each year CIC matches employee contributions with the intent of building a positive work environment.

(2) CIC's \$7,200 payment to the Social Fund accounts for the corporation's matching contributions to the fund for both fiscal years 2004 and 2005. This included contributions to the Salvation Army's Adopt-a-Family Christmas Hamper Program:

The two members are SaskTel employees who are appointed to the board as representatives of the Communication, Energy and Paperworkers Union (CEP). The members are entitled to an annual retainer which SaskTel pays to the CEP who in turn pays the two board members.

Ms. Harpauer asked the Government the following Question No. 75, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Higgins:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Telecommunications: (1) For how much money did SaskTel sell Business Watch International? (2) To whom was it sold?

Answer:

- (1) SaskTel sold its share in Business Watch International for \$574,000.00.
- (2) The shares were sold to the founders of Business Watch International Progressive Communications Inc. and On-Line Regina Inc.

Personal care homes (including for profit and non-profit), while monitored and regulated by Saskatchewan Health, are privately owned and operated by individuals or corporations with no public funding. The expenses of operating a personal care home usually influence the resident fees. It is our understanding that some communities fundraise to help keep resident fees lower.

There are currently 8 personal care homes with a total of 70 personal care home beds in the Heartland Health Region.

Saskatchewan Health provides global funding to regional health authorities for special care homes and community based long-term care services, such as homecare for individuals who require such care. If a resident has sufficient need as assessed by health region staff, they may be offered placement in a publicly subsidized special-care home.

The federal measure will therefore automatically be incorporated into the determination of provincial income taxes for all participating provinces including Saskatchewan.

Mr. Cheveldayoff, asked the Government the following Question No. 328, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Thomson:

To the Minister of Finance: (1) Does the federal government's decision to allow seniors couples to split pension income for the purposes of calculating federal income tax affect provincial income taxes in any way? (2) If so, how?

Answer:

(1) It is our understanding that the federal measure to allow for pension income splitting between Canadian resident spouses alters the common national definition of taxable income. Under the terms of the federal-provincial income tax collection agreement, Saskatchewan (and all other participating provinces) has agreed to adopt the national taxable income base for provincial income tax purposes. The federal measure will therefore automatically be incorporated into the determination of provincial income taxes for all participating provinces.

(2) Federal estimates indicate that this initiative will provide about \$650 million in tax savings in 2007, with about \$15 million of this provided to Saskatchewan seniors. Saskatchewan Finance estimates that this initiative, because it adjusts the taxable income base, will automatically result in a provincial income tax reduction of about \$10 million per year.

20.1 <u>Documents Placed on Employees' Files</u>

For reasons related to the payment of tax, Mr. Carriere wanted the settlement agreement to stipulate that no portion of the payment was to be attributed to pay in lieu of notice. It was the government's position that this may not fairly represent the settlement and may mislead the Canada Revenue Agency. Since this was a matter that would ultimately be determined by the Canada Revenue Agency and did not bear on the settlement itself, the parties agreed to simply state their respective positions.

Therefore, the settlement agreement records Mr. Carriere's position that the amount does not include pay in lieu of notice, and the government's position is recorded as follows: "Settlement Amount includes 16 months of pay in lieu of notice, that is \$120,048 plus defendant contributions on account of pension at the rate of 6.25% (\$7503)". The figure of \$120,048 represents the minimum amount the government was prepared to assign to the category of pay in lieu of notice.

There was no evidence of wrongdoing by any of these 13 individuals and their prizes were paid.
