## Monday, March 15, 1999 (1st Day)

PRAYERS

The Speaker informed the Assembly that he had received a communication from the Private Secretary to His Honour the Lieutenant Governor stating that His Honour would open the Session at 2:30 p.m. today, the 15th day of March, 1999.

2:32 p.m.

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor entered the Chamber and having taken his seat upon the Throne, was pleased to open the Session with the following speech:

#### Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

It is my pleasure today to welcome you to the fourth session of the twenty-third Legislature of Saskatchewan.

It is once again my pleasure to begin by welcoming all those citizens of our province who are observing these proceedings, both here and in their homes.

#### THE SASKATCHEWAN WAY

As we gather here today, with spring less than a week away, we might consider the wise counsel of the Saskatchewan poet Vesta Althea Pickel, who wrote,

#### 'There is no spring, though all the world is greening, Unless you see through eyes renewed with hope.'

So let us renew ourselves with hope, as we join for what will likely be the last regular sitting of this Legislature before the year 2000.

With spring in the air and a new century dawning, it is a good time to reflect on the basic values that have built our province. The values of balance, and common sense, and hope.

The women and men of Saskatchewan have used these values to build our province. Working together, with balance, hope and common sense, is "The Saskatchewan Way."

In the Saskatchewan Way, we came back from the 1980s, that dark winter of division and deficits, and into the bright greening springs of co-operation and prosperity.

In the Saskatchewan Way, we pulled ourselves free from the perilous quicksand of financial irresponsibility, and stepped onto the firm bedrock of financial balance, allowing us to invest in our most precious resource, our people, by providing the families of Saskatchewan with the jobs, health care and education they need.

Fourth Session

2:31 p.m.

Those women and men responded by building a province that is the best place in the world to live.

A province that is home to artists like Vesta Pickel, the longtime Saskatchewan poet with whose words we began today. Mrs. Pickel is with us here in the chamber, and it is my pleasure to ask her to rise to accept our welcome.

A province that is home to entrepreneurs, to dynamic companies and co-operatives. Home to innovations, in technology and social programs.

And most importantly, a province that is home to some of Canada's best communities, where the women and men of Saskatchewan are raising their families and building our common future together.

We can be proud that we have come a long way in a short time. But we have much work left to do, to build our future the Saskatchewan Way.

So while the women and men of Saskatchewan expect lively debate in this session, they expect my government to attend to the people's business – to the real issues that are important to them.

And my government will do just that.

#### My government will attend to the people's agenda:

- Jobs and our economy.
- Our schools.
- Our health care.
- And our community safety.

We meet here to resume the people's work as the last shadows of winter dissolve in springtime's hopeful sun. To keep "renewing our eyes with hope," so that we might continue to enjoy the full greening of each Saskatchewan spring.

#### JOBS AND GROWTH

#### The first step is job creation and continued growth.

Together, we have created 30,000 jobs. We will do more.

Step by step, through balance and common sense, we will keep building the new Saskatchewan and its growing, prosperous, diversified full-employment economy.

A new Saskatchewan that builds on the innovation that is the trademark of our province. Where a vital new rural, small-town Saskatchewan is breaking new ground in value-added agriculture, in forestry, in tourism, in energy and in information technology.

A new Saskatchewan where young people stay at home to do high-skilled, high-paid work. Where everyone has access to the opportunities of economic growth. And where our economy thrives on the creativity and knowledge of all its workers.

We're on the way there. And we'll get there, with hope and common sense, a step at a time.

We must not act recklessly. We have learned through bitter experience that we cannot afford to buy our future with borrowed money.

#### The Saskatchewan Way is the balanced way. The sensible way.

The people of Saskatchewan recovered from billion-dollar deficits in the 1980s and balanced the budget.

And building on that foundation, we are achieving some remarkable things together:

- Our population is steadily growing.
- Between 1992 and 1997 Saskatchewan led the nation in economic growth, and is still growing today.
- We're paying down debt, from 70 per cent of GDP to 40 per cent today.
- More people are working in good, full-time jobs in Saskatchewan today than ever before. Unemployment is at a 16-year low.
- A recent Alberta study ranked Saskatchewan number one in youth employment for three years running.

- Through initiatives like the Northern Dialogue, we are building partnerships with Northern and Aboriginal communities, working together to open the doors to full participation in our economy, and to realize the vast untapped economic potential these women and men represent.
- And capital is being invested in our economy. We saw \$7 billion in new investment in 1998 alone a fundamental declaration of confidence in Saskatchewan by the business and co-operative community.

Our rapidly diversifying economy is allowing us to weather a worldwide economic storm - a decline in prices for oil and farm commodities, and an international subsidy war that depressed farm prices even further.

Earlier this year, my government acted to help farm producers affected by these events.

My government brought in a bridge support program at a critical time to assist our hog producers.

A few weeks ago, my government committed \$140 million to assist producers. We will pay 40 per cent of the proposed federal program, to cover 40 per cent of Canada's farmland, financed by just 3 per cent of Canada's taxpayers.

And my government also announced an \$85-million "top-up" for NISA accounts.

My government will continue to fight for a national response to a national problem — for a national program that will help our producers, and is fair to our taxpayers.

These challenges remind us of a hard and sobering fact: Our old economy – built on the export of raw unprocessed commodities – will always be at the mercy of prices we don't control.

That's why we must continue to diversify, into new crops, into new resources, and into new value-added services, production and manufacturing.

We will not turn our backs on the past. But we must look ahead to our future.

The Saskatchewan of today is wheat fields. But it is also agricultural biotechnology and food processing and implement manufacturing and knowledge export.

It is mining, but it is also robotics and information technology. Forestry and forest products processing. And tourism. And all the enterprise that our clever and capable people can imagine.

## We are building on the old to create a new Saskatchewan economy that gives us a fighting chance to ride out boom and bust cycles – at last.

In this session of the legislature, my government will continue this important work:

- My government will continue to work with the business and co-operative community to create jobs, to promote investment in diversification, to further reduce the cost of doing business in Saskatchewan, and to expand trade and tourism.
- My government will make education a renewed priority, to ensure our young people learn the skills they'll need to find their place in the new economy.
- My government will continue to work with industry and with researchers to expand and diversify research and development.
- And my government will maintain Saskatchewan's balanced budget and balanced approach. Further measures to promote growth, diversification and job creation will be announced in this year's budget, and during this session of the Legislature.

Finally, since co-operatives are one of Saskatchewan's most important building blocks in our new economy, my government will introduce *The New Generation Co-operatives Act* to help them in their work.

#### **EDUCATION**

#### The next step is education.

My government's goal is to keep building an education system that gives our children and youth the tools they'll need to "learn a living".

They'll need a new set of basic skills – how to use emerging technology, and how to be comfortable using it to keep learning.

They'll need the full support of our communities.

And they'll need to be ready to learn, in safe and healthy schools.

Our teachers and parents are already making real progress meeting those needs:

- Our province last year completed a top-to-bottom review of our Saskatchewan school core curriculum.
- Twenty-six schools in disadvantaged neighborhoods already have pre-kindergarten programs, helping our youngest students to be ready to learn.
- Computers are already almost as familiar as blackboards in our schools. More than 90 per cent of our schools now have an internet connection.
- Saskatchewan's Community Schools are helping local neighborhoods and communities fully support their students in their schools and received a national award from the Canadian Association of Community Education last year in recognition of their work.
- Schools are being upgraded and renovated, and new modern schools are being built in growing communities like Lloydminster, Biggar, and Yorkton.

This afternoon, one-fifth of the population of Saskatchewan is in school. All of our school-age children will spend their entire adult lives in the twenty-first century. Next September, 12,000 more students will enroll in kindergarten.

They are our province's future. And as we approach the 21<sup>st</sup> Century, now is not the time to freeze investment in our schools and our children's educations.

My government today renews its commitment to quality education in Saskatchewan – and to investing appropriately to ensure our children get the excellent, accessible, world-class education they will need.

During this session of the Legislature, my government will work closely with parents, teachers and school boards, to move forward on some of the key priorities facing our school system:

- Making sure vulnerable children get the best possible start, through stronger pre-kindergarten programs.
- Making sure children get full benefit from their schools, by implementing Saskatchewan's core curriculum and making it more accessible to parents and teachers.
- Making sure students can handle the basic tools of tomorrow's economy, by providing broader access to computers and new technologies.
- And investing appropriately to ensure all our students learn in good, safe schools.

As we prepare our classrooms and students for the new century, the time has also come to ask what is next for our schools themselves in our complex and challenging times.

More than ever, we must see our schools not just as repositories of learning for our children, but as social, cultural and educational centres for our communities. The local school can become the heart and soul of every neighbourhood in Saskatchewan.

So, in the same co-operative, collaborative way we have built our schools, we will launch a Role of Schools Task Force. My government will engage in dialogue with teachers, trustees, and our other partners, to define the changing purposes of our schools, and to determine how we can best achieve those ends.

In this sitting of the Legislature, my Government will introduce amendments to *The Education Act* to help school boards serve families better.

But education and training go beyond our kindergartens, elementary and high schools.

Saskatchewan's universities and colleges are as crucial to the future of our children as their elementary and secondary schools. My government is committed to working with the university community to provide world-class post-secondary education – and to making sure our students have fair and equal access to that education.

And my Government will introduce *The Apprenticeship and Trade Certification Act* to fundamentally reform and improve Saskatchewan's apprenticeship program.

The goal is an apprenticeship system tightly integrated into our province's economy, helping students get directly into jobs. Employers and labour representatives will be given a much bigger say in management of the program. Over 5,000 apprentices will benefit from this reform.

We must make learning a lifelong pursuit, and my government is committed to making learning a way of life.

#### HEALTH CARE

#### The next step is health care.

My government's goal is to keep building a strong, sustainable health system. Health care that is there when people need it, and that helps people stay well in the first place.

Our province founded Medicare. In Health Region One in southwestern Saskatchewan, people and communities decided to work together to provide themselves with the kind of health care they needed.

They were determined that no family should go without medical care because they lacked the money to pay for it. And their determination lives on in us.

We've tackled a lot of problems in that same spirit of co-operation and common sense. Our people are justly proud of Medicare.

Now is not the time to abandon the principles of our health system, nor to freeze our investment in our people's health.

Instead, we are renewing health care The Saskatchewan Way, working together with common sense and balance.

And we have made good progress:

- By building better clinics and health facilities, that communities and citizens need and use.
- By reorganizing 400 local health administrations into just 32 regional administrations.
- And by investing in new, better community care like home care, community nutrition programs, ambulance services, first responder programs, and other initiatives.

At the same time, we have been moving ahead with advanced care:

- By investing in new, better acute care facilities, like the General and Pasqua hospitals, providing world-class hospital services for southern Saskatchewan.
- And by investing in the latest miracles of modern technology additional MRIs and state of the art nuclear medicine facilities in our major hospitals, CT services in Prince Albert, and satellite renal dialysis in Tisdale and Yorkton.

None of this has been easy. Mistakes have been made. But it has been worth it.

Now we must move forward, and address the continuing challenges in health care.

In this session of the legislature, my government will introduce measures designed to tackle some of the key priorities still facing our health system:

- Waiting times. A comprehensive plan will be introduced to reduce waiting times for key procedures.
- Cancer treatment. Important improvements will be made to our province's cancer care.
- Women's health. A multi-year plan will be introduced to address critical needs for women's health needs including prevention and better treatment for illnesses like heart disease, osteoporosis, and diabetes among women.
- **Health providers**. My government will work closely with health providers to make sustainable improvements to working conditions and terms of employment, so they can provide better care. We will work to reach agreements that are fair to both health providers and to the taxpayers of Saskatchewan.

• And even less spending on administration. In the for-profit American health industry, more than twenty per cent of health spending goes to administration. Our public Medicare system spends a mere fraction of that on administration – and my government is going to reduce that spending even more, by working with health districts to further economize on health administration.

This has been an important year for the Canadian Medicare system.

For four years, provinces have tried to cope with deep federal cutbacks to health care and other social services.

And for four years, provinces have argued that health care should be a greater national priority.

As chair of the provincial Premiers for the past eighteen months, our Premier helped lead this national fight. And a few weeks ago our efforts were rewarded, when Ottawa announced it will at long last begin to reverse its health cuts, and make a significant national reinvestment into Canada's Medicare system.

Every penny of that new federal investment in Saskatchewan will go to improve front-line health care.

And my government, which replaced every lost federal dollar over the years and more, will continue to invest substantial provincial funds in front-line services as well – shorter waiting times, better cancer treatment and women's health care, and better working conditions for health providers so that they can provide better care.

This Legislature can make a further contribution – by reaffirming and enshrining the principles of Medicare, and by strengthening the rights of patients.

To that end, and as a first step towards implementing the recently negotiated Agreement on Canada's Social Union, my government will introduce *The Saskatchewan Medicare Act*.

This Act will lock in our province's unconditional support for *The Canada Health Act* – both its principles, and its continued application as a national statute.

This Act will also give citizens the right to be informed about the quality of their care and how it compares to other provinces; and it will give citizens the right to be heard when they don't receive the care they need.

While debating these measures, my government will challenge everyone in this legislature – and those hoping to join you here – to explain the public positions they have taken on *The Canada Health Act* and our national Medicare system, Saskatchewan's greatest gift to Canada.

The people of Saskatchewan believe in Medicare. My government believes in Medicare. Together, we will protect and build Medicare, and we will ensure our citizens have the services they need and deserve.

#### **JUSTICE**

#### The fourth step is safe communities.

My government's goal is to ensure that citizens are safe on their streets and in their homes, by working together with police, prosecutors and communities to crack down hard on the handful of criminals who cause most of the crime.

Saskatchewan's Serious Crimes Task Force is targeting organized criminals and gangs, and the Serious and Habitual Youth Offender Comprehensive Action Plan is targeting violent and repeat young offenders.

To support these initiatives, my government has pressed for important amendments to the federal *Young Offenders Act*, with reforms including adult trials for young offenders accused of murder, attempted murder, sexual assault and armed robbery, and more appropriate sentencing rules for serious offences.

Some progress has been made on these issues last week. But a great deal of work remains to be done to strengthen federal law on young offenders.

My government will vigorously pursue these efforts, and will support them by introducing measures designed to further improve police and emergency services.

My government will continue to work with people and communities to turn around the causes that lead directly to crime: Unemployment and poverty, lack of education, family violence, poor childhood nutrition, and tragedies like fetal alcohol syndrome.

Replacing poverty and hopelessness with independence and hope are noble causes in their own right. They are also key elements of any comprehensive crime reduction strategy.

Important initiatives like my government's fundamental reform of the welfare system, *Building Independence*, and my government's award-winning *Child Action Plan*, are restoring hope to vulnerable families and building safer communities from the ground up.

In this session of the Legislature, my government will press on with the *Building Independence* welfare reform, the *Child Action Plan*, and other initiatives designed to build healthier and safer communities.

And my government will introduce *The Child and Family Services Amendment Act (1999)*. This important measure will improve services to rescue children enmeshed in the sex trade. And it will substantially toughen penalties for those who sexually abuse these children.

#### **OTHER PRIORITIES**

Jobs, education, health care and safe communities are the people's agenda and my government's priorities in this session of the Legislature.

There will be several other important pieces of public business brought before you.

My government will introduce an important measure to protect the integrity of Saskatchewan elections by introducing *The Respect for Constituents Act (1999)*.

This act will require Members elected under the banner of a party recognized under *The Elections Act* to resign their seats, and to obtain the permission of their constituents in a by-election, before they may sit in this House with another party.

Citizens have the right to expect that the decisions they make in elections will be honoured until they get to vote again.

Other legislation planned by my government for this session includes:

- Several municipal bills to improve provisions relating to property assessment.
- *The Local Government Election Amendment Act*, to further improve the framework for municipal and school board elections.
- The Animal Protection Act, to improve enforcement and provide for the humane care of animals.
- And *The Wildlife Habitat Protection Act 1999*, to enhance wildlife in this province by building upon the more than ten million acres protected through the existing act, our Parks, and our growing Representative Areas Network.

#### **BUILDING OUR FUTURE, THE SASKATCHEWAN WAY**

Friends, Saskatchewan is a place we all know and love, a place we are pleased and proud to call our home.

But Saskatchewan is also an idea.

It's the idea that families – whether they live an arm's length apart in the city, or miles apart in the country – can call each other "neighbour."

It's the idea that all our people should do their very best for themselves and their families – but that we must also work together, to accomplish those things we cannot do alone.

It's the idea that come what may, we'll get through it if we pull together. That today's problem is tomorrow's opportunity.

It's the idea that we can build our future, a step at a time with optimism, balance and common sense. And that our future can offer something to anyone who wants to pitch in.

It's the idea that there is a way. The Saskatchewan Way.

We can build our future the Saskatchewan Way, because the Saskatchewan Way is about faith – in ourselves and in one another.

The Saskatchewan Way is about hope – that the seeds we plant, the businesses we open, and the families we nurture will grow, and prosper, and bloom. That the cold and dark of winter will give way to the warmth and promise of a new spring.

In her poem Spring In Saskatchewan, Vesta Althea Pickel urges us all to keep that faith and to live with that hope:

#### 'Reach out and feel the air and smell the earth, 'For Springtime here is life, new hope, rebirth.'

Good luck, God bless Saskatchewan, and God save the Queen.

#### STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER

Earlier today, the House Leader of the Third Party provided a notice for "Priority of Debate" to the Office of the Clerk, as is required under Rule 19(2). The notice was accordingly distributed pursuant to the notification provision of the Rule.

Members will be aware that it is the Speaker's responsibility under Rule 19(5) to determine whether the matter is proper to be discussed and whether the matter should receive urgent consideration over the other business presently on the Order Paper. Having reviewed the Member's case, I am now prepared to rule on the matter.

In reviewing any case for a Priority of Debate, the Speaker is obliged to review the case in the context of both the extent to which it concerns the administrative responsibilities of the government, whether the matter could come within the scope of ministerial action, and also, the probability of the matter being brought before the House within reasonable time by other means.

The Member has established that the issue he raises is of considerable importance to the public. He also points to the fact that funding of health care, through the Department of Health, is within the administrative responsibility of the government, and therefore within the scope of Ministerial action. However, with respect to bringing the matter before the House within reasonable time, it is clear that the Member has had a number of opportunities to raise these concerns, including in the debate on the Throne Speech and in the Budget debate at which time he could have moved a subamendment addressing this issue.

#### APRIL 14, 1999

This is not an isolated issue but rather is part of an on-going concern on the broader issue of health care services. The potential lay-offs cited in the notice are Health District decisions that are not within the direct administrative responsibility of the Minister. The Member's notice refers to the long-term effects of the potential lay-offs. These long-term effects and the broader concern respecting funding may continue to be addressed by this House through the current review of Estimates for the Department of Health in the Committee of Finance and through private member's motions in the usual way.

**WILLIAM Z. NEUDORF**, who passed away this morning, was a member of this Legislative Assembly from 1986 until 1995, representing the constituency of Rosthern for the Progressive Conservative party. Mr. Neudorf was born on January 1, 1940 in Neuanlage and received his early schooling in Hague, Saskatchewan. He continued his education at the University of Saskatchewan, convocating with Bachelor degrees in Arts and Science and in Education. On July 18, 1964, Mr. Neudorf married Alma Sawatzky and together they had four children.

In his private life, Mr. Neudorf was first a teacher and later a farmer. His association with schools in the Saskatchewan Valley area extended over twenty years and included terms on the Saskatchewan Teachers Federation provincial area bargaining team and as chairman of the PTA. Then in 1979, he purchased a small hog farm. The farm became the focus of his attention as he expanded it to encompass a 315 sow farrow-to-finish operation.

Mr. Neudorf's concern for the well-being of others in his community was evidenced by his participation in a variety of organizations. He served as a municipal councillor in the rural municipality of Rosthern, as the fire chief for the village of Hague, as president of the Saskatchewan Valley Hockey League and the vice-chairman of the Saskatchewan Pork Producers Marketing Board. The Hague Mennonite Conference Church also benefited from Mr. Neudorf's membership and his tenures on the executive and as a Sunday school teacher.

Mr. Neudorf was first elected to the Saskatchewan Legislature in 1986. He successfully retained the constituency in the 1991 general election before retiring from political life in 1995. During his two terms in office, Mr. Neudorf sat on both sides of the Assembly and also in cabinet, where he held the Social Services portfolio from October 3, 1989 until November 1, 1991.

In recording its own deep sense of loss and bereavement, this Assembly expresses its most sincere sympathy with members of the bereaved family.

**EILING KRAMER**, who passed away last night, was a member of this Legislative Assembly from 1952 until 1980, representing the constituency of The Battlefords for the New Democratic Party. Mr. Kramer was born on the family homestead in the North Battleford district on July 14, 1914. He received his schooling at local elementary and secondary schools in Highworth. Mr. Kramer and his wife, Dorothy Johnston, married on December 15, 1944. They had a large family which grew to include six boys and two girls.

Mr. Kramer's first forays into the employment world combined farming during the summer and working as a lumberjack during the winter. He also worked part-time as a constable with the North Battleford police force. Later he purchased a cattle ranch and trained as an auctioneer. Mr. Kramer was noted for his interest in the well-being of his community and served as a member, organizer and director of a number of local and provincial organizations. These included the Saskatchewan Forest Products, Saskair, the Sherwood Co-op Association, the Saskatchewan Wheat Pool, the Battlefords Co-op Association, the Saskatchewan Farmers Union, the International Odd Fellows, and the Lions and Cosmopolitan Clubs. Mr. Kramer was active in the CCF since its inception and was involved as an organizer and campaign manager prior to entering public life himself.

Mr. Kramer was one of the longest serving Members of this Assembly. His tenure extended over twenty-eight years before he announced his retirement from public life in October 1980. He was first elected in 1952 and successfully contested the seat for the following eight general elections. Mr. Kramer was responsible for several cabinet portfolios, including Natural Resources, Co-operation and Co-operative Development and Highways and Transportation.

### **QUESTIONS and ANSWERS**

### MARCH 24, 1999

# Mr. Aldridge, asked the Government the following Question No. 1, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Scott:

Regarding the proposed development by American retail giant Wal-Mart, to construct a retail outlet and parking area in Moose Jaw on land used by endangered burrowing owls for habitat: (1) When will the Department of Environment and Resource Management decide whether an environmental assessment is necessary for this and related projects? (2) If an environmental assessment or impact study is deemed necessary will Wal-Mart be responsible for the cost? (3) What steps is the department taking to ensure that all parties involved are in compliance with legislation protecting endangered species such as the burrowing owl? (4) Has the department studied what impact the loss of the birds would have on the eco-tourism potential of the City of Moose Jaw and similar projects in the Thunder Creek constituency? Answer:

(1) The City of Moose Jaw and the department have established a Technical Working Group to investigate the ramifications of the Wal-Mart proposal and other future development on burrowing owl populations in the city. The group's goal is to develop a position within the next few weeks that will provide direction for the city in terms of short- and long-term planning while not jeopardizing the burrowing owls. If the department can reach an agreement with the city, it will not be necessary to carry out an environmental assessment.

(2) If an agreement can not be reached and an environmental assessment is deemed necessary, the cost for the environmental review would be the responsibility of the city, or the city could decide to sell the property flagged with attached environmental caveat which would then make the owner and in this case Wal-Mart responsible for the cost of the environmental review.

(3) The department and the City of Moose Jaw want to promote the conservation of burrowing owls in the city and come to an agreement that will allow the city to develop while protecting the burrowing owls. The Technical Working Group will monitor compliance with the legislation protecting the endangered burrowing owls.

(4) The department has not directly studied what the impact would be to eco-tourism potential of the city. However, in 1998 the first year of operation for the Burrowing Owl Interpretive Centre in Moose Jaw, approximately 2,000 visitors from across North America came to view the owls and 1,500 school children participated in an education program at the interpretive centre. This is really quite encouraging given that there was very little promotion and no signs in place to make people aware of the centre. Ongoing progress is being made to develop a Saskatchewan Bird Trail that would tie Moose Jaw Burrowing Owl Interpretive Centre to other sites such as Chaplin Lake and Nicolle Marsh for eco-tourism purposes. The loss of burrowing owls in Moose Jaw could be significant for tourism.

Answer:

The intent of the 1989 policy change was to focus support on the provision of appropriate services and programs for students with learning disabilities rather than focus on the identification process for grant recognition purposes.

Our Government is concerned that the quality of special education programming and the level of funding are appropriate. We want to ensure that students with disabilities have equal access to and benefit from education in Saskatchewan.

In 1998, the Government established an external committee to review special education in Saskatchewan schools. The Special Education Review Committee will provide the Government with documentation on a wide array of issues in special education in this province. Included in the terms of reference for the Review is an investigation of the present level of funding recognition for special education programs and services. The Committee is also charged with identifying effective program delivery for students with exceptional needs, including students with learning disabilities.

# Ms. Haverstock, asked the Government the following Question No. 13, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Serby:

To the Minister of Education, will the Minister promptly table research that proves that the educational interventions offered in the Province of Saskatchewan to severely disabled children are successful and specify and describe what measurements the Department of Education is using to determine "success"?

Answer:

The research in the area of learning disabilities is extensive. The array of effective strategies and approaches that have developed since the late 1970s are numerous. Current good practice promoted in the bulk of research is characterized by the inclusion of the majority of students with learning disabilities in the regular classroom.

Approaches promoted in the literature to meet the needs of students with learning disabilities are based on the understanding that the intervention must fit the individual student's strengths and needs.

Saskatchewan's Core Curriculum, which is based on child development principles and incorporates sound theory and practice regarding teaching and learning, gives teachers the framework and flexibility to make accommodations to meet the individual learning needs of students.

Research indicates that local school personnel in collaboration with parents are in the best position to identify the specific needs of individual students and to develop appropriate programs and services to meet those needs.

Education legislation gives duly elected school boards the jurisdiction to evaluate the individual progress of students and the effectiveness of their special education program delivery.

To that end, *The Education Act, 1995* was amended to give students with disabilities and their parents the right to ask for a review of local decisions regarding the identification, program and placement of students with disabilities, including students with learning disabilities.

The external committee struck to review special education in Saskatchewan, which was announced in September, 1998, will provide the Government with documentation on a wide array of issues in special education in this province. Included in the terms of reference for the Review is the identification of effective program delivery for students with exceptional needs, which includes students with learning disabilities.

### MARCH 25, 1999

# Mr. Hillson, asked the Government the following Question No. 14, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Hamilton:

To the Minister responsible for SPMC, will the Minister provide the total capital and construction costs and the most recent estimates for any part of the Plains closure, SIAST conversion and move; and the renovations of the Pasqua and General hospitals that their department is responsible for?

### Answer:

(a) SPMC assumed responsibility for the Plains Health Centre on November 26, 1998 after it had been closed and decommissioned by the Regina Health District. SPMC incurred no costs related to the closure of the Plains Health Centre.

(b) The total capital and construction costs for the amalgamation of the eight SIAST Wascana Campuses into the Plains site is budgeted at \$29 M. All tenders and contracts for the project to-date are within that budget.

(c) SPMC has no responsibility for, nor affiliation with, the renovations under way at the Pasqua and General hospitals in Regina.

# Mr. Hillson, asked the Government the following Question No. 15, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Cline:

To the Minister of Finance, will the Minister provide the total cost estimates his department has received in regards to the Plains closure, SIAST move and conversion, and the renovations and upgrading of the Pasqua and General Hospitals?

#### Answer:

This question should be referred to the Minister of Health.

# Mr. Goohsen, asked the Government the following Question No. 16, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Teichrob:

To the Minister of Municipal Government: (1) How many RMs have amalgamated over the past year? (2) How many RMs have shown an interest in amalgamation? (3) Is there a plan to provide incentives to RMs to amalgamate? (4) Is there a guideline for the number of people living in a rural municipality in order for it to be maintained as an RM? (5) Is there a minimum dollar value for tax base in a rural municipality which they must have to continue to exist?

Answer:

Three RMs volunarily amalgamated to form two RMs. Other than the three RMs that voluntarily amalgamated, no others have expressed an interest in amalgamation. There is no plan to provide incentives for municipalities to amalgamate.

### MARCH 26, 1999

# Mr. Boyd, asked the Government the following Question No. 17, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Lingenfelter:

To the Minister of the Crown Investments Corporation, has the proposed FarmGro organic mill announced by the minister received the necessary export permits from the Canadian Wheat Board?

Answer:

The question cannot be answered because it deals with the company's operations. CIC is a shareholder in the new company, but it does not operate the company. The question would have to be put directly to FarmGro management.

# Mr. McLane, asked the Government the following Question No. 18, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Atkinson:

To the Minister of Health: (1) Will the minister provide an explanation why the Watrous Hospital has only 4 beds and an acute care ADC of 6? (2) Will the minister please explain why the health district is so underfunded that it cannot provide enough staff for the number of beds needed to adequately deal with the patient load at this hospital?

Answer:

(1) In late September 1998, the Living Sky Health District made changes to the number of beds staffed and in operation at the Watrous Hospital. The Living Sky Health District indicates the Watrous Hospital's acute care ADC from October 1, 1998 to February 28, 1999 was 3.11. The Watrous Hospital continues to provide services for 8 long-term care beds and 4 acute care beds.

(2) The Living Sky Health District has a process in place to adequately deal with patient load at the Watrous Hospital. The patient load is assessed daily and extra staff are called in when there is a need to do so. The Living Sky Health District indicates it can and does provide staff for the number of beds needed to adequately deal with patient load. The District is funded according to the needs of its population using the provincial needs based funding formula.

### MARCH 29, 1999

# Mr. Goohsen, asked the Government the following Question No. 20, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Upshall:

To the Minister of Agriculture: (1) Has your government considered an acreage set aside program to reduce the number of seeded acres in the Saskatchewan farming sector? (2) Has your department discussed this American approach with SARM members who have promoted this \$20 per acre concept? (3) Have you made any effort to get federal government involvement in this type of program?

Answer:

The Government of Saskatchewan asked the federal government and other provinces to consider a number of disaster program options. The federal government indicated very clearly that the only disaster program they would consider implementing was an income based disaster program. Some provinces (British Columbia, Alberta, PEI, and Ontario included) supported the federal decision.

The department is aware of the SARM proposal to pay \$20 per acre and other similar proposals. SARM raised the issue with the government at their recent convention.

The province asked the federal government to explore a number of options. These options had to be comprehensive and work across Canada. While a set aside program has an attraction for grain producers in being simple and understandable, it would not address the problems being experienced by the non-grains sector and it would not likely have any impact on world markets unless the set aside program was implemented by a number of the major grain producing countries.

The federal government has announced and is implementing the Agricultural Income Disaster Assistance (AIDA) program, the only disaster program option they were willing to seriously consider.

### Answer:

For the fiscal year ended March 31, 1998, the Farm Land Security Board approved 94 nonresident exemption requests from individuals and 127 exemption requests from corporations, primarily with non-resident shareholders, to purchase land in excess of the maximum amount for non-residents as set out in *The Saskatchewan Farm Security Act*.

# Mr. Bjornerud, asked the Government the following Question No. 29, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Nilson:

To the Minister of Justice: What exemptions to the Saskatchewan Farm Security Act have been made by the Farm Land Security Board in 1999 for the purpose of allowing non-residents of Saskatchewan to purchase land in excess of the maximum amount for non-residents as set out in the Act?

### Answer:

For the fiscal year ended March 31, 1999, the Farm Land Security Board approved 88 nonresident exemption requests from individuals and 104 exemption requests from corporations, primarily with non-resident shareholders, to purchase land in excess of the maximum amount for non-residents as set out in *The Saskatchewan Farm Security Act*.

# Mr. Goohsen, asked the Government the following Question No. 30, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Lautermilch:

To the Minister of Energy and Mines: (1) How many natural gas and  $H_2S$  flares are burning in the province's oil fields? (2) Has the industry offered to voluntarily reduce the number of flares as they have in Alberta? (3) How many cyanide formations have there been identified in the province? (4) How many cyanide formations have been perforated by oil and gas drilling, such as the one in the Consul area? (5) Have residents been issued a warning of the dangers to health in these areas as has been the case in Northern Alberta?

### Answer:

- (1) There were just under 900 oil and gas facilities reporting some gas flaring in 1998.
- (2) The Alberta program to reduce flared gas volumes was jointly developed by industry, government and non-government organizations. It is a new program and details have not yet been finalized. Although no such program has yet been developed for Saskatchewan, the feasibility of implementing a flare gas reduction program will be evaluated in the near future.
- (3) The question of "cyanide formations" needs clarification. We are not aware of any cyanide occurring naturally in oil and gas producing formations in the province.
- (4) As noted above, cyanide is not known to occur in any oil and gas producing formations in the province.
- (5) There have been no warnings issued of the dangers to health from cyanide because it is not known to be present in the oil and gas produced in the province.

### MARCH 31, 1999

# Mr. Goohsen, asked the Government the following Question No. 32, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Cline:

To the Minister of Finance: (1) How much money is lost in revenue for each 1% removed from the PST from 7% to 6%? (2) How much money would be lost to RMs and towns if property tax for education were reduced 10% and capped? (3) If all education tax on farm land were eliminated, how much would be involved? (4) Has there been any recent research into replacing this tax or returning to the 60-40 formula of the past where government put up 60% of education tax and property tax produced 40%? Due to a processing error at the Royal Bank, all recipients of the overpayment who contacted Social Services were advised to deal with the Royal Bank directly. Due to the urgency of the matter, a toll free number was set up by the Royal Bank and their representatives have been talking to those directly affected.

# Mr. Goohsen, asked the Government the following Question No. 34, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Lautermilch and the Hon. Ms. Bradley:

To the Minister of Energy and Mines and Highways: (1) How many open dumping sites are there where radioactive material mixed with salt water or tailings from fracing of crude oil and natural gas wells are there in the province? (2) Are exemptions from road bans provided to transport these materials to separating plants in the spring time? (3) If not, why not?

Answer:

(1) There are twelve alkali sloughs in the province that have been approved by Saskatchewan Environment and Resource Management for the disposal of certain drilling fluids, drill cuttings and low salinity water produced from gas wells. These sites are not approved for the disposal of radioactive wastes.

- (2) The road bans do not prohibit transport, they limit the allowable weight. In the case of a divisible load, like salt water tailings or crude oil waste, the operators simply have to haul less to meet road restriction guidelines.
- (3) Road restrictions are implemented each spring to reduce damage caused by heavy loads.

The Department of Finance does not have an estimate of the total value of cross border shopping done by Saskatchewan residents in Alberta. Similarly, the Department does not have an estimate of the total value of cross border shopping done by non-residents in Saskatchewan.

# Mr. Goohsen, asked the Government the following Question No. 37, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Upshall:

To the Minister of Agriculture: (1) How many grain elevators do your officials believe will remain in Saskatchewan by the year 2000 and the year 2010? (2) What assistance are you offering to those wishing to purchase branch lines? (3) How many branch lines are being negotiated for by those wishing to purchase them? (4) How many of these do you estimate will be retained as operational? (5) What impact do you predict there will be on communities where branch lines are not converted into private operations?

Answer:

(1) The province does not have any specific estimates for the number of elevators remaining by the years 2000 and 2010, however various estimates have been done on the number of elevators that will remain following the consolidation of the rail and elevator network. The latest estimates, done for the federal government as part of the Estey Grain Review, March 1998, indicated that based on the current and planned number of high throughout elevators, the number of elevators remaining in Saskatchewan in the long run could range from 59 to 310 elevators. This compares to the current 556 elevators (March 11, 1999).

The actual number of elevators remaining would depend on the number of elevator turns required by the elevator companies (the higher number of turns the fewer elevators required) and by other trends in the industry. The trend towards more grain segregations and more and smaller volume crops suggest that some small elevators may be kept to handle these crops.

(2) What amount of the products blowing from the three outlets would be hazardous to the health? (3) How much of the product was blown into the air and would the concentration in the air over Caronport and Moose Jaw be with the prevailing west wind?

Answer:

- (1) Natural gas was being vented to the atmosphere on Monday, March 29 at 11:15 a.m. in order to test one of the emergency shut down systems on a compressor station owned and operated by TransCanada Pipelines Ltd. The venting lasted for approximately four to five minutes. Planned maintenance on the equipment is then carried out after the gas is vented. This procedure is a standard operating practice. The venting of the natural gas creates a loud hissing sound.
- (2) The natural gas in this procedure is not deemed hazardous to people's health since it quickly rises and dissipates into the atmosphere.

(3) A small amount of natural gas was vented into the air and the concentration would be undetectable over Caronport and Moose Jaw since the gas would quickly disperse. TransCanada Pipelines Ltd. advises the local RCMP and the aviation associations in the area when natural gas will be vented.

# Mr. Osika, asked the Government the following Question No. 39, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Atkinson:

To the Minister of Health, where on the list of this year's capital construction costs in your department is the hospital facility in Melville; and given its position will it still be completed by 2001?

Answer:

The Melville project was given approval-in-principle in May 1998 as part of the 1998 - 1999 Health Capital Plan. As a result, the district and local planning committee is currently working toward defining project scope and cost. The project's completion date will be determined based on the progress of planning.

To the Minister of Municipal Affairs, Culture and Housing: (1) Who has been appointed to the Task Force on Municipal Renewal? Answer:

(1) The following individuals are serving on the Task Force on Municipal Legislative Renewal

Joe Garcea, Chairperson Pat Youzwa, Vice-Chairperson Maria Lynn Freeland, Member Val Kononoff, Member Murray Westby, Member Bobby Woods, Member Cliff Wright, Member

- (2) The selection criteria for the Task Force were as follows:
  - one or more specialists of municipal law or municipal government
  - former (but not current) appointed or elected municipal leaders
  - at least one member knowledgeable about northern local governance
  - one or more members of the public.
- (3) The members of the Task Force were announced in August, 1998 and the Task Force will be in place for a two year period expiring August 2000.
- (4) The Task Force members are paid an honorarium for their work, according to established Treasury Board guidelines, as follows: Chairman – \$235.00 per day

Members - \$155.00 per day.

# Mr. Goohsen, asked the Government the following Question No. 41, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Bradley:

(1) What is your response to the Southwest Transportation Planning Council's response to the Estey Report? (2) Do you support their claim that the rail companies are abandoning successive sections of a branch line without ever throwing off enough to make an economic short line? (3) If so, what are you doing about it? (4) Do you support S.W.T.P.C.'s request for a federal Act that would allow for arbitration of all disputes between short line and main line railways? (5) Do you support S.W.T.P.C.'s request of the federal government to allow the duly elected board of directors of the Canadian Wheat Board to determine the changes to the board's mandate, including its role in car allocation?

Answer:

- (1) The Government is pleased that the Southwest Transportation Planning Council Inc. (SWTPC) has participated in all phases of the Estey Review process. The SWTPC provides a mechanism for local understanding and involvement in strategic transportation planning issues like the Estey Review.
- (2) We are aware of efforts by both CP and CN to abandonment portions of branch lines, which by themselves are difficult to operate as an economically viable short line railway. The submission of the Western Provinces to the Federal Grain Review identified this "segmentation" issue as a impediment to short line development as an alternative to branch line abandonment.
- (3) We have written the federal government on this issue and have discussed it at the senior management level with both CN and CP. Minister Bradley has emphasized the importance of developing a solution to this issue on several occasions at meetings with her federal counterpart. We are working with several groups around the province to examine short line operations on the "segmented portion" and on the entire line to determine the economic viability of each.

We are also working with a group of municipalities in the Prince Albert/Birch Hills area to preserve a strategic link to the Port of Churchill, a CN initiative to segment this corridor. This particular issue is before the Canadian Transportation Agency for a determination of the net salvage of this line for purchase.

- (4) The Western Provinces suggested to the Federal Grain Review that a mechanism to resolve disputes between the short line and the main line railway was necessary. The provinces recommended a mechanism such as third party arbitration.
- (5) The Province believes that the newly elected board of the CWB should be given the power to use all the tools available which will maximize returns to producers from the sale of Board grains. The CWB's role in transportation needs to be determined under this contract. The CWB has been encouraged to use all options, including the option of public tendering, for it to increase returns to farmers.

### Answer:

(1) Yes, these questions are best answered by the Minister of Education.

(2) The member's question has been interpreted to be asking how much money would be involved if the education portion of the property tax in rural municipalities and towns was reduced by 10%.

The amount of property tax revenue involved is estimated at approximately \$31 million for rural municipalities, towns and villages in 1998.

(3) Approximately \$135 million would have been involved in 1998.

(4) There has been no specific research into either replacing the use of property taxes for education or the Government's returning to providing a larger share of education costs.

Eliminating or substantially reducing the education property tax in the province would require a corresponding increase in other provincial government tax revenues.

Although at one time the provincial share of funding did reach about 57 per cent, it has never been 60 per cent. In 1991, the provincial share had already dropped to just under 45 per cent.

It is estimated that, if the province were to provide 60 per cent of the share of education costs, an additional \$200 million annually would have to be added to the provincial budget for operating grants to schools.

(5) The Government is not aware of any specific suggestions or alternatives made by SUMA or SARM regarding the replacement of the property tax base as one of the sources for the funding of the cost of educating our children.

Answer:

- (1) Yes, the Department is aware of the work being done by the Cypress Hills Research Steering Group and is actually represented on the group by Brad Mason, Manager of Cypress Hills Interprovincial Park (Saskatchewan).
- (2) Saskatchewan Environment and Resource Management (SERM) is supporting the work through IN KIND contributions of labour and a \$5,000 grant to the Alberta Research Council in fiscal 1998-99.
- (3) The majority of funding is coming from Alberta sources because the Steering Group has concentrated most of the actual study on the Alberta side of the Cypress Hills.
- (4) The \$5,000 contributed by SERM in fiscal 1998-99 represented approximately 2-3% of the cash budget of the Alberta Research Council Cypress Hills research project for last fiscal year.
- (5) The Saskatchewan contribution is governed by the limited funds available to support this kind of work, which, in turn, is a reflection of other strong demands on the SERM budget.
- (6) Saskatchewan Environment and Resource Management endorses the major projects scheduled for 1999, and will provide staff assistance via the Grassland EcoRegion.
- (7) The department supports the riparian project scheduled for this year. Again, staff will likely be involved in fence construction, and other labour related aspects. One of the proposed study blocks (low gradient area) occurs on Nine Mile Creek on the Saskatchewan side. (likely a 50 ac. riparian area.)
- (8) Two sites for experimental prescribed burning of prairie are PROPOSED for the Saskatchewan side (West Block); however, much more public consultation and support will be required before this occurs. These two sites would be 6 ac. each in size.
