PRAYERS

Mr. Speaker informed the Assembly that he had received a communication from the Private Secretary to His Honour the Lieutenant Governor stating that His Honour would open the Session at 2:00 o'clock p.m. today, Monday, the 21st day of March, 1988.

2:03 o'clock p.m.

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor entered the Chamber and, having taken his seat upon the Throne, was pleased to open the Session with the following speech:

MR. SPEAKER

MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

It is my privilege to welcome you to the Second Session of the Twenty-First Legislature.

It is appropriate that we are here today to begin the deliberations of this Legislative sitting as Saskatchewan shrugs off the last remnants of winter and prepares for its annual spring awakening.

This is a time of hope and a time of optimism despite the difficult economic times that continue to harass us all.

And it is a time of commitment - of commitment to the land and to the people we love, and to the future and to the belief that we have passed through the darkest time and can now look forward to better days.

There is no doubt the past year has been a difficult one for the people of this province.

A world economy in the turmoil of transition has created hardship for each and every one of us. My government's revenues have fallen dramatically because of sharp drops in commodity and resource prices. And incomes, particularly those in Saskatchewan's key farm sector, have also fallen sharply because of unacceptably low international prices for grains.

The world economic situation continues to be volatile and continues to be a cause for concern.

But my government remains confident that the steps it has taken in the past year to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of its administration, and to diversify the economic base of the province, will enable the province to meet the new challenges on a firm and positive footing.

Despite the uncertainties and the financial pressures on the provincial treasury, my government remains committed to protecting and improving essential services for the people of Saskatchewan.

My government will continue to consult with and assist those in need of help at home, and will continue its efforts to influence North American and overseas market conditions to ensure that Saskatchewan farmers and businessmen receive fair prices for their products and fair access to those markets in a time of increasing protectionist sentiment.

TRADE

The fundamental restructuring of world economic conditions has led to a rise in protectionist trade policies in many countries. Punitive tariff and non-tariff barriers have created difficulty for Saskatchewan's resource industries. Direct farm subsidies have contributed to downward pressures on international grain prices, thus hurting Saskatchewan agricultural producers.

My government believes it to be an elementary fact of life that fair trade is essential to the economic well-being of this province. Over half of all the goods and services produced in Saskatchewan are shipped to markets outside our provincial borders.

It is not by accident that Saskatchewan is known world-wide as the breadbasket of the nation. But it is simply not enough for us to only be able to ship our grain to world markets. Our farmers must also receive a fair price for their produce. If they don't get it, they suffer financially and that in turn puts additional stress on the provincial treasury at a time when we can ill afford it.

No country operates in an economic vacuum. And it is no longer possible for any country to achieve long-term growth and prosperity by isolating itself from events beyond its borders.

My government believes that worldwide prosperity depends on trade. So, it will continue its efforts through GATT and with trading blocs such as the European Economic Community to improve the trading environment for Saskatchewan products.

Our biggest trading partner remains the United States. My government believes it is absolutely essential that we maintain a stable trading relationship with the giant on our southern border. We must be able to take advantage of the opportunities provided by access to that market.

We must also expand the shared economic interests we have with our North American neighbor. We must get rid of the threat of protectionist retaliation that would curtail trade between us. And we must protect our common interest in bargaining with other world trading blocs such as the European Economic Community.

But our ability to do this depends to a large measure on our own actions here in Saskatchewan. My government recognizes that our own producers must retain the competitive edge that they have worked so hard to gain over the years.

We must continue the thrust to diversify our economy so we can continue to create jobs and provide a higher standard of living for the people of this province.

MONDAY, MARCH 21, 1988

AGRICULTURE

Despite the desirability of diversifying our economy, my government recognizes that agriculture remains the backbone of Saskatchewan.

Our farmers produced over 22 million tonnes of grains and oilseeds last year, down slightly from the record crop of 1986.

And there can be no disputing that agriculture policies around the world have wreaked havoc on rural Saskatchewan. Farmers and ranchers in this province have paid a price simply for being good at their jobs. As a result, farm debt is of crisis proportions.

But people in Saskatchewan have learned to live with adversity.

The tough times come. And the tough times pass. But the commitment to the land, and to what it gives and what it demands, remains strong.

And my government's commitment to the protection of those who live in rural Saskatchewan remains as strong as the land.

Internationally, the government will continue to exert whatever influence is possible to bring an end to the senseless policies that have threatened the very fabric of our rural society.

Grain exports have been at record levels but prices remain unacceptably low.

And my government will continue to provide policies at home - both alone and in cooperation with the federal government - to preserve the way of life in rural Saskatchewan.

Measures will be introduced to provide greater protection for rural families when times are difficult.

Measures also will be introduced to enable Saskatchewan's industry to take advantage of opportunities that may arise through broadened trade with the United States.

RESOURCES

Resource prices, and consequently resource revenues, remained unacceptably depressed and unsettled in the past year.

But my government sees reason for cautious optimism here as well.

The potentially damaging potash dispute with the United States has been resolved, assuring Saskatchewan producers of "fair market value" for their product - although the industry is likely to continue to operate below capacity.

World oil prices remain low and volatile, but a modest recovery is expected to continue in this province.

Natural gas continues to become more important in terms of employment and royalties, which are likely to reach a new high this year.

Exploration and development in the gold industry continues to be strong and there has been some increase in demand for uranium, although prices have softened somewhat.

My government will continue to implement policies to promote continued development of the resource sector - providing jobs for Saskatchewan people and tax revenues to pay for public services such as health and education.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

My government believes that all people in Saskatchewan have a right to the opportunity of participating in the province's economic growth. It also believes public participation can make a major contribution to economic development by enabling Saskatchewan residents to invest skills and capital in areas that may not have been accessible to them.

The foundation has already been laid for a strong program of public participation through programs such as SaskPower bond issues, Saskoil share offerings, the re-organized delivery of some government services, the establishment of Rural Development Corporations and the introduction of Labour Venture Capital programs.

Legislation will be introduced to mandate the new Department of Public Participation and to make it possible, as needed, for public investment in the plans and programs of the department.

The legislation will ensure that the quality of government services is retained and that the rights and privileges of public sector employees are fully respected.

DIVERSIFICATION

Economic diversification continues to be a major thrust in my government's plans for combating the boom-and-bust cycles that continue to plague our development. Growth in the manufacturing and service sectors are key to the strategy.

My government has previously launched significant initiatives to do with irrigation, paper manufacture, heavy oil, meat processing and production, poultry processing, steel fabrication and the high-tech industry.

New initiatives are being actively pursued in both the manufacturing and service sectors.

EDUCATION AND THE FAMILY

My government believes that the single most important resource in the province is our people, and particularly our young people. They are the future of Saskatchewan. Their destiny is the destiny of this province.

They must be given the opportunity to develop to their fullest potential and they must be given the knowledge to enable them to adapt to the rapid technological changes that are so much a part of today's environment.

My government is absolutely committed to providing the excellence in programs, in facilities, and in people to ensure that our youth are indeed able to take full advantage of the opportunities available to them in the Saskatchewan of tomorrow.

My government also remains firmly committed to the belief that no institution is more important than the family. Government programs will continue to be modified to meet the changing needs of family life.

Legislation will be introduced to:

- improve The Saskatchewan Pension Plan;
- improve The Labour Standards Act, particularly as it relates to part-time workers;
- amend The Occupational Health and Salety Act to provide information on toxic chemicals used in the workplace;
- replace The Family Services Act with legislation to improve the role of the family in foster parent situations and to simplify adoption procedures;

- provide the framework and standards for daycare in both urban and rural areas of the province;
- provide a new Homesteads Act that recognizes modern-day arrangements concerning ownership of marital property;
- amend The Urban Municipality Act to deal with such questions as store hours and dangerous dogs;
- amend The Small Claims Act so that the courts are more accessible to our people;
- improve the operation of the judicial system and the jury selection process;
- provide for greater financial and personal security for mentally disabled adults;
- and to control and regulate all-terrain vehicles as a result of growing concern over accidents resulting from the increased use of such vehicles.

² My government also wishes to advise that development of the Whitespruce Youth Treatment Centre is proceeding on schedule. The Centre, near Yorkton, will emphasize family involvement in the treatment of chemically dependent youth. It will be in operation in the very near future and has drawn considerable interest from provinces all across Canada.

HEALTH

Health care represents the most difficult financial challenge facing my government and the people of Saskatchewan today.

More tax dollars are spent on health care than on any other single budget item. At 1.3-billion dollars, it represents one-third of total provincial expenditures.

And there is no visible end in sight. Costs could rise as quickly as we can throw money into the system.

But the government remains absolutely committed to ensuring that we continue to have a firstrate health care system.

And our people are demanding that we do so.

The challenge is straight forward. How do we maintain the system while, at the same time, controlling the ever-increasing costs?

Our primary goal over the next decade will be to ensure effective and relevant delivery of health care. It will require setting priorities to accurately forecast our needs so we can adequately fund the system. It will require drafting a blueprint for health care into the year 2000.

It is a challenge for all of us.

How we meet it will lay the foundation for the quality of life in Saskatchewan for the next generation.

None of us can escape our share of the responsibility for the decisions that have to be made. We are all going to be asked to contribute our share, whether large or small, and we cannot hide from our individual responsibilities. The issue is simply too complex and too critical, and consumes too much of our financial resources, to be settled without the broadest possible support of the people of this province.

The questions we must answer include those surrounding the specialization of services in major hospitals; regional health care services; the most effective use of nurses and other health care professionals; the role of home care in the system; services in rural Saskatchewan; life-style programs and preventative medicine; the special needs of seniors; and the urgent requirements of funding.

Our system is now 25 years old. It needs major renovations. We must all get involved in making the changes.

To ensure that the matter gets the broadest possible consideration and debate over the next several months; and to ensure the widest possible participation in the debate from both health care professionals and other concerned citizens, my government will establish a task force to hold hearings across the province.

Members of the task force will be asked to collect input from as many sectors of our society as possible and to submit a report with recommendations for future government action to meet this challenge.

CONCLUSIONS

It has been a difficult year in Saskatchewan. Tough decisions had to be made. There may yet be other difficult decisions that have to be made.

But members of my government, along with the people of Saskatchewan, remain optimistic that fairness and common sense will see us through. The benefits of co-operation and consultation will enable us to achieve our goals, and to continue to make this a better province in which to live and raise our families.

My government remains committed to expanding its partnership with the people of this province - to providing the opportunities to enable our people to use their considerable talents and expertise to build Saskatchewan's prosperity.

I leave you now to the business of the Session, with full confidence that you will favourably discharge your duties and responsibilities.

May Divine Providence continue to bless our province and guide this Legislature in all its deliberations.

JACOB BENSON, who died in Victoria, British Columbia, on August 23, 1987, was a Member of this Legislative Assembly representing the constituency of Last Mountain from 1929 to 1934 and again from 1938 to 1952. Mr. Benson was born on March 13, 1892, at Calder Bridge, Cumberland in England. He came to Canada in 1903 and married Hilda Ferris of Buckingham, Quebec in 1918. He was educated at Regina College and the University of Saskatchewan.

Mr. Benson lived in Semans and was a farmer and Municipal Councillor. He was a member of many farm organizations and the Progressive movement. As a Member of the Legislative Assembly, Mr. Benson regarded himself as a representative of many viewpoints. He began his long career in 1929 as an independent supporter of the Anderson government. He then ran unsuccessfully as a Farmer-Labour candidate in 1934. In 1938 he was returned to this House as a Member of the CCF party. He was re-elected in both the 1944 and 1948 elections. Mr. Benson failed in 1952 to be elected as an Independent. Mr. Benson liked to be remembered as a member who stood by his convictions regardless of which side of the House he sat. Mr. Benson was predeceased by his wife who died in 1986. He is survived by a brother and many nieces and nephews.

In recording its own deep sense of loss and bereavement, this Assembly expresses its most sincere sympathy with members of the bereaved family.

STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER

Yesterday, before Orders of the Day, the Member for Regina Victoria raised a point of order that the Minister of Health used quotations in his answers to supplementary questions. I deferred my ruling at that time.

I have reviewed the verbatim record and find that the Minister did use a direct quotation in answering a supplementary question. But before ruling I would like to clarify the current practices of this House with regard to the use of quotations in Oral Question Period.

The use of quotations to frame a question has been permitted in this House. Supplementaries, however, are an entirely different matter. I remind Members that the purpose of a supplementary question is to seek specific clarification of the answer to the main question. It should be put without preamble. This precludes the use of quotations in supplementary questions. On the other hand, it is reasonable that if the initial answer requires clarification then Ministers may be permitted to add detail to their answer by using a quotation. For this reason I rule that the point of order is not well taken.

Having said that, I should point out that where quotations are to be used, then they should be relevant to the question. Furthermore, at this early juncture in the Session I would like to point out that exhibits are strictly forbidden in this House. Upon reviewing the verbatim record I find that the Minister used a picture in the book he was quoting as an exhibit. I point out to all Members that exhibits in any form are out of order.

STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER

Yesterday, before Orders of the Day, the Member for Regina North East raised a point of order concerning firstly, whether the Deputy Premier had taken proper notice of the questions put to him the day before and secondly, the length of the Deputy Premier's reply to the questions taken on notice.

It is the usual practice of this Assembly that when a Minister is asked an oral question he may answer it directly or take notice and bring back an answer on a later day. At the same time, however, some leeway has been given to the Minister to make a very brief but general response while undertaking to bring back a specific answer another day.

I have reviewed the verbatim records for April 6 and April 7, 1988. It is apparent in the record that the Deputy Premier did take notice of a question asked during Oral Question Period on April 6. That day there were three questions asked by two Members regarding delays in admission of patients for surgery. The Minister made responses to all three, but only on the second question did he take notice. Notwithstanding his initial responses, and the fact that he actually took notice of only the second question, the Deputy Premier rose in the Assembly yesterday indicating that he wanted to deal with all three questions. I find this a breach of the accepted guidelines of Question Period. In effect, the Deputy Premier took the opportunity to answer a question twice and use up time in Question Period.

I want now to address the length of the Deputy Premier's answer. From the record it is clear that the Member for Saskatoon Nutana's question was posed in such a way as to provoke a lengthy answer. The Deputy Premier's response was indicative of this as he strayed from the specific topic to speculate on the motives for asking the question. Having said that, I still find that the Deputy Premier's response of a little over four minutes was inordinately long.

For the reasons cited, I find the Member for Regina North East's Point of Order well taken. I therefore urge Ministers to clearly state to the House when they are taking notice of a question. When taking notice, comments should be very brief. I also urge all Members to ensure that questions and answers are not posed in such a way as to provoke debate.

STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER

On April 21, before Orders of the Day, the Member for Regina North East raised a point of order that the Minister of Education twice answered a question by making a response on the date he took notice and then making a further response in Oral Question Period. At that time I agreed to review the record.

On April 20th the Member for Prince Albert asked a specific question which the Minister of Education took as notice. The Minister took notice directly with few comments. The Member for Prince Albert then asked a supplementary but before doing so, alluded to the Minister's competence for not having an answer at that particular moment. This of course, provoked the Minister into giving a response that went beyond simply taking notice of the supplementary. In no way, however, can that response be construed as answering the question. On April 21, the Minister had the opportunity to answer both the question and supplementary. I found that he did so directly and to the point. This was the only time he answered the question, therefore, I find the Member for Regina North East's point of order not well taken.

Before leaving this issue I would like to take the opportunity to address the practise of Ministers taking notice and then being asked supplementaries. Over the last decade it has become a practice of this House to permit a supplementary to a question that has been taken as notice. I have made an effort to ensure, and indeed have ruled that Ministers should not abuse Question Period by responding to a question at the same time as taking notice. This in effect, is answering the same question twice. To enforce this principle I found it necessary on April 21 to ask the Minister of Health to discontinue his remarks after he took notice.

By the same token, however, supplementaries in such a situation should be without a preamble and narrowly worded for the purpose of eliciting further information. The case raised in the point of order shows what happens when Members add provocative comments to their supplementaries. I find that an abuse which can only cause a degeneration of Question Period. Furthermore, Members should not use a new question as a pretext to ask a supplementary question on the same issue. This happened on April 21 when the Member for Regina Lakeview asked a series of questions on one particular case. If a Minister is to be limited in his response after taking notice it is only reasonable that the Member asking a further question should also be limited.

Finally, I ask all Members to adhere to these accepted principles. I invite any Member, who would like to discuss this issue further, to my office. The door is always open.

STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER

A notice regarding this matter proposed for priority of debate was received in the Clerk's Office at 11:47 a.m. today for which I thank the Honourable Member. I refer all Honourable Members to Rule 17(6) which states that the matter proposed for an urgent debate must be in order and of urgent public importance. The proposed matter does not violate any of the conditions set out in Rule 17(10) nor does it, at this point in time, conflict with the sub judice convention which restricts debate on matters which are before the Courts. I would also agree that the issue raised is of much public importance.

The question remaining to be answered is whether it is urgent for the Assembly to set aside its regular business to discuss this matter now. It has been frequently ruled in this Assembly that, and I quote:

The fundamental principle underlying Rule 17 was to provide an opportunity within a proper framework of parliamentary procedure, where none otherwise existed, for the immediate discussion of any matter deemed to be of such urgency and importance that all of the normal or special business of the Assembly should be put to one side in order to provide complete right of way to a discussion of one specific particular subject.

I refer all Members to similar rulings in the Journals of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan of March 6, 1974, January 13, 1976, April 13, 1977, March 13, 1978, April 8, 1980 and December 12, 1980.

As noted above, rulings on priority of debate requests have hinged on whether an ordinary parliamentary opportunity to debate the matter will occur shortly or in time. The failure to Table the Public Accounts has been raised on several occasions in the past week or two and there has been sufficient opportunity for notice to have been given and the matter to have gone on to the Order Paper for debate in the usual way. In addition, the notice has failed to demonstrate the urgency of having this matter debated today as opposed to putting the matter on the Order Paper now for debate after the usual two days notice.

I therefore rule that while this matter is of substantial public importance, there are adequate opportunities within the normal framework of parliamentary procedure to debate the issue and thus the request to set aside all the other business of the Assembly today is denied.

Mr. Hodgins rose on a point of privilege, pursuant to Rule 6(1), that the Member for Regina Victoria misused the authority given to him as Chairman of the Public Accounts Committee in his law suit concerning the Tabling of the Public Accounts. Mr. Speaker made the following statement:

STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER

I thank the Honourable Member for the notice of his point of privilege which was received in my office this morning. I refer all Honourable Members to *Beauchesne's Parliamentary Rules and Forms*, p. 11, para. 16, as follows:

Parliamentary privilege is the sum of the peculiar rights enjoyed by each House collectively as a constituent part of the High Court of Parliament, and by Members of each House individually, without which they could not discharge their functions and which exceed those possessed by other bodies or individuals....

and,

The privileges of Parliament are rights which are "absolutely necessary for the due execution of its powers". They are enjoyed by individual Members, because the House cannot perform its functions without unimpeded use of the services of its Members; and by each House for the protection of its members and the vindication of its own authority and dignity.

The role of the Chair is to decide whether sufficient evidence has been produced to show that the House or its Members have been, or will be, impeded in the performance of their duties, and whether the point raised by the Member is so urgent that the House must set aside all of its business in order to debate this point.

I rule that the Honourable Member has not presented sufficient evidence to convince me that a prima facie breach of privilege exists.

STATEMENT BY MR. CHAIRMAN

Yesterday, the Member for Regina Centre raised a point of privilege stating that comments made by the Minister of Social Services constituted an attack on a Legislative Officer.

I have now had an opportunity to review the point raised and the circumstances surrounding it. I first want it clearly understood by all Members that it is not the role of the Chairman to decide if the privileges of the Assembly have been breached. I refer all Honourable Members to *Beauchesne's Parliamentary Rules and Forms*, Fifth Edition, pp. 24 and 25.

(1) A question of order concerns the interpretation to be put upon the rules of procedure and is a matter for the Speaker, or in a committee, for the Chairman to determine.

(2) A question of privilege, on the other hand, is a question partly of fact and partly of law — the law of contempt of Parliament — and is a matter for the House to determine....

(3) It follows that though the Speaker can rule on a question of order, he cannot rule on a question of privilege. His function, when a question of privilege is raised, is limited to deciding whether the matter is of such a character as to entitle the motion, which the Member who has raised the question desires, to move to priority over the Orders of the Day.

The role of Chairman is to review the arguments as presented and to determine on the face of it whether a *prima facie* case of privilege has been established. It is thus quite properly up to the Assembly as a whole to decide whether any privileges have been breached.

It is clear from *The Ombudsman Act* that the Ombudsman is an officer of the House and therefore entitled to those protections outlined in *Erskine May's Parliamentary Practice*, Twentieth Edition, p. 162.

Both Houses will treat as breaches of their privileges, not only acts directly tending to obstruct their officers in the execution of their duty, but also any conduct which may tend to deter them from doing their duty in the future.

It is vital, if parliament is to get fair and impartial service from its officers, that these officers must be defended from intimidation while conducting their duties. Members know that it is their responsibility to protect the independent status of Officers of the Legislature. I refer all Members to a precedent of this Assembly of June 24, 1987, respecting the Office of Legislative Counsel and Law Clerk.

With respect to the specific point of privilege raised here it is questionable that past officers of the House retain the protection of privilege. I have given serious consideration to this point.

Parliamentary privilege is the protection given to Members and Officers of the Legislature to enable them to carry out their duties without interference. Because the individual in question is no longer an Officer of this Assembly he cannot be obstructed in the execution of parliamentary duties.

While the comments made by the Minister may reflect on the credibility of a former Ombudsman, those comments do not necessarily obstruct the present Ombudsman from carrying out his duties. For these reasons I find that this matter, while regrettable, does not constitute a *prima facie* case of privilege.

STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER

The point raised by the Honourable Member is not a new circumstance and I refer all Honourable Members to a ruling of the Chair of December 4, 1975 and I quote:

It has been a custom of the Assembly that when a Minister is going to make an important announcement while the Assembly is sitting, he does so in the Assembly before making the announcement outside the Assembly. This custom or practice is based on the principle that the Members should be advised of new policies before the public generally. (Speaker's Ruling of March 22, 1967 Journals of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan, p. 155).

The same custom has usually applied to the distribution of Bills. This custom has grown up as a courtesy to the Members of the Assembly that they should receive copies of the Bill before general distribution of the Bill to the public. However, neither the Rules or the Precedents require that the Bills are to be kept confidential until introduction in the Assembly. I further refer all Honourable Members to other precedents of this House dated January 19, 1976 and April 5, 1976

I therefore rule that the Honourable Member for Regina North East does not have a point of privilege but caution all Honourable Members that the usual courtesies shown to the Assembly should be maintained.

STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER

Yesterday the Member for Quill Lakes raised a point of order regarding the ministerial statement made by the Premier. I have reviewed the record and will now make my ruling.

Beauchesne's Parliamentary Rules and Forms, Fifth Edition, para. 262 states:

...The Speaker has emphasized that both the Government and Opposition contributions should be brief and factual. The purpose of the ministerial statement is to convey information, not to encourage debate.

This is based on Standing Order 15 of the House of Commons which I quote:

On statements by Ministers...a Minister of the Crown may make a short factual announcement or statement of government policy.

I find that the Premier's statement was factual and its intent was to convey information to this Assembly.

But, while the House of Commons in Ottawa has left the Speaker considerable latitude in setting the limits of ministerial statements, the same cannot be said about Saskatchewan. I refer Members to a ruling of the Chair on April 4, 1979, which states:

The purpose of a ministerial statement is to provide an opportunity for statements on government policy and administration.

The Premier's statement did not deal with a policy of the Saskatchewan Government or its administration. Again, I refer Honourable Members to a ruling of this House dated April 30, 1985. On that occasion the Chair was asked to rule on a statement made by a Minister regarding the federal government's Western Grain Transportation Act. The ruling stated:

...I have reviewed the statement and find that it covered a federal government programme and was not, strictly speaking, a new programme under a provincial government department....While the matter raised in the statement is one of provincial interest, it should be dealt with by some other avenue, not as a ministerial statement.

I would suggest that the Premier's statement yesterday was of a similar nature — of significant provincial interest but the statement did not announce new or existing government initiatives which pertain to the problem. I once more caution Ministers that statements should be brief and not lengthy in nature.

I therefore find the point of order well taken.

STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER

On Friday last at 11:27 o'clock a.m. a notice under Rule 16 was received at the Table. Under Rule 16, written notices are to be tabled no later than 11:00 a.m. on the preceding Friday. Since the notice did not meet the deadline specified under the Rules, I rule that the motion under Rule 16 in today's Routine Proceedings and Orders of the Day is out of order.

STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER

On June 24th the Member for Regina North East raised a point of privilege regarding comments attributed to the Minister of Justice concerning the Provincial Auditor as reported in the *Kinders-ley Clarion*.

All Members will be aware that the purpose of parliamentary privilege is to provide Members with the rights and protection that they need to enable them to carry out their duties as elected Members. The protection of parliamentary privilege is also extended to officers of the Legislative Assembly in certain circumstances. The Member for Regina North East has referred to appropriate citations in parliamentary authorities which point out that any act which obstructs or impedes any officer of the House in the discharge of his duty or which has a tendency directly or indirectly to produce such results now or in the future may be treated as a contempt.

Historically, most cases which have been found to be contempt have involved cases of physical interference or obstruction or threats of the same against an officer in the performance of his duty. However, verbal attacks which call into question the competence, impartiality and professional credibility of the officer have also been found to unduly interfere with an officer's abilities to serve the Assembly.

It is against this measure that the words attributed to the Minister of Justice must be considered. While the reporter made certain statements, it is only the words directly attributed to the Member that are subject to the scrutiny of the Chair in this instance. The words are as follows: Auditors are people who bump against reality once a year. They live in that jungle-zoo and call themselves bureaucrats. They wear thick glasses because they are looking at the fine print to see if every 'i' is dotted. While these comments may be interpreted as being inappropriate and belittling to auditors,

While these comments may be interpreted as being inappropriate and belittling to auditors, and by implication to the Provincial Auditor, I do not find that they constitute the kind of unfair personal attack on the officer which would prevent him from adequately performing his duties. The words, while regrettable, do not of themselves call into question the competence, impartiality or professionalism of the Provincial Auditor. I am confident that this officer can continue to carry out his duties in a professional and impartial manner.

The precedent referred to by the Member for Regina North East respecting another legislative officer, the Legislative Coursel and Law Clerk, in contrast to this one, was a case involving an attack on the professional competence and impartiality of the officer.

Based on the above points, I find that a prima facie case of breach of privilege has not been established.

Her Honour the Lieutenant Governor entered the Chamber and took her seat upon the Throne. Her Honour was then pleased to deliver the following speech:

Mr. Speaker,

Members of the Legislative Assembly

It is my duty to relieve you of further attendance at the second session of the Twenty-first Legislature. In so doing, I would like to congratulate you on the work you have undertaken and completed.

At the opening of this session, my predecessor, the Honourable Frederick Johnson emphasized the government's commitment to protecting and improving essential services for the people of Saskatchewan, to expanding its partnership with the people of this province and to providing opportunities for our citizens to use their considerable talents and expertise to build Saskatchewan's prosperity.

To that end, you have worked to maintain the economic framework of rural Saskatchewan by passing *The Saskatchewan Farm Security Act*. This Act helps farmers to gain a clearer understanding of their rights and obligations without reducing the ability of lenders to advance credit. This became increasingly important as our farm sector suffered the devastating effects of this past year's drought.

Concern for public safety led you to implement measures for the control and regulation of all-terrain vehicles and to provide strong and responsible legislation to control dangerous dogs.

Concern for the environment led you to designate additional lands as critical wildlife habitat and to reduce litter by controlling the use of non-refillable containers, while creating new jobs for disabled persons. Amendments to *The Occupational Health and Safety Act* were made to require identification of toxic chemicals in the workplace.

To permit individual Saskatchewan residents to invest their skills and capital in areas that were not previously available to them, measures were undertaken in the past year by way of bond offerings by Crown corporations and employee investment in Crown corporation and government activities. Legislation to permit the creation of one of the world's largest uranium mining corporations was also passed by this Legislature.

To balance the need to guard the interests of the investor with the business community's need to have relatively easy access to capital you have enacted *The Securities Act, 1988*.

You have enacted legislation which allows the certified nursing assistants to manage the affairs of their own profession and made changes to *The Registered Nurses Act* to allow nurses to regulate their affairs in an effective manner and provide better protection for the public. The Saskatchewan Commission on Directions in Health Care created during this session has received extensive representations throughout the province and has already raised some interesting approaches to the issues our health care system must address over the next few years.

In taking leave of you, I commend you for the manner in which you have carried out your duties during the session and wish you the full blessings of Providence.
