## Regina, Thursday, February 24, 1972

3:05 o'clock p.m.

This being the day appointed by Proclamation of His Honour the Lieutenant Governor, dated the twenty-fifth day of January, 1972, for the meeting of the Second Session of the Seventeenth Legislative Assembly of the Province of Saskatchewan, and the Assembly having met:

Mr. Speaker informed the Assembly that he had received a communication from the Private Secretary to His Honour the Lieutenant Governor stating that His Honour would open the Session at three o'clock p.m. today, Thursday, the Twenty-fourth day of February, 1972.

3:07 o'clock p.m.

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor entered the Chamber and, having taken his seat upon the Throne, was pleased to open the Session with the following Speech:—

Mr. Speaker.

## MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

It is my privilege to welcome you to the Second Session of The Seventeenth Legislature of Saskatchewan.

My Government will proceed at this Session to enact legislation in fulfillment of its four-year program, which was presented to, and endorsed by, Saskatchewan electors in June of 1971. The changes contemplated in that program are significant. Many important pieces of legislation will be laid before you.

To enable my Government to implement its program you will be asked to approve major changes in the organization of Government.

THE ECONOMY

The year just past in Saskatchewan has been a year of partial economic recovery. Almost all indicators showed a marked improvement in the Saskatchewan economy in 1971, compared to 1970.

Yet, in spite of improved economic performance, unemployment continues to be a serious problem. Although the unemployment rate in Saskatchewan as measured by Statistics Canada is characteristically lower than the Canadian average, it remains far too high—particularly among younger people.

#### EMPLOYMENT

Immediately upon taking office, my Government took emergency action to create jobs.

On my Government's initiative, millions of dollars in provincial works projects were accelerated to provide employment during the winter months. When the Federal winter works program was belatedly announced in October my Government, with the full co-operation of local governments, made a maximum effort to generate more job-producing projects.

In addition to the Federal program, my Government has committed more than \$10 million in provincial funds to loans and grants for winter works.

In total, it is estimated that the combined Federal-provincial-municipal effort will produce over 13,000 man-months of employment this winter in Saskatchewan.

In the year ahead, my Government will take a series of steps to create new jobs, particularly for young people.

New programs will be introduced to provide employment for students and other young people seeking work in the summer months.

Provincial investment in public works will again be increased.

Park and recreation development will be earried forward in many parts of the province.

In order to stimulate house construction, the housebuilders' grant program will be continued, but with a new emphasis on assisting those on low incomes.

Contingency plans for special municipal and local work programs for the winter of 1972-73 will be formulated during the summer. This will enable local governments to plan their projects more effectively, and provide even more jobs, than was the case this winter.

#### ACRICULTURE

There are encouraging signs in the farm economy. Crop yields were high in 1971. Cattle numbers and prices increased, and hog prices improved. Wheat exports regained lost ground.

In recent months, my Ministers took the initiative in bringing together their colleagues in the two neighbouring prairie provinces to make common cause with respect to agricultural problems and policies.

My Government welcomes the announcement that the Federal Government intends to inaugurate a two-price system for wheat. This will introduce a greater measure of equity in the farm price for wheat destined for domestic consumption.

My Ministers in co-operation with their prairie colleagues will, however, continue to urge upon the Federal Government the pressing need for a grains income stabilization plan which recognizes the impact of farm production costs.

Many serious and chronic problems continue to beset agriculture. My Government is dedicated to use its full powers to move toward solving these problems and to strengthen the family operated farm.

To ease the transfer of farm lands from one generation to the next, and to facilitate the entry of young men into farming, you will be asked to consider legislation establishing a Land Bank Commission.

The signal success of the first Western Canadian Agribition in 1971 won international recognition for the Saskatchewan livestock industry. My Government will take steps to encourage further development of that industry,

Legislation will be introduced to provide for veterinary inspection of all feeder cattle and hogs sold at auction.

You will be asked to extend The Live Stock Loans Guarantee Act and to approve a program to assist in the construction of veterinary clinics.

Uncertainty in prices for feed grains has hampered both livestock producers and grain producers. Legislation will therefore be introduced to provide a measure of price stability in the marketing of feed grains.

My Government has noted with approval the rapid increase in rapeseed production. You will be asked to approve amendments to The Margarine Act which will encourage greater utilization of rapeseed oil.

To assist dairy producers, you will be asked to provide funds for grants to encourage the production of manufactured milk.

Legislation will also be introduced to provide a more equitable method of determining compensation to farmers for surface rights acquired by mineral producers.

#### INDUSTRIAL AND MINERAL DEVELOPMENT

Although there has been considerable improvement in retail sales in the past year, my Government continues to be concerned about the problems faced by small businessmen, particularly in our towns and villages. Legislation will be introduced to provide new services and financial assistance to merchants and business concerns.

Earlier, my Government restored the option of net royalty bids in the disposition of oil exploration leases. Further measures will be placed before you to increase the returns to the people of Saskatchewan from the production of mineral wealth in the province.

Construction of an all-weather road through the heavily mineralized section of north-eastern Saskatchewan to the uranium mine under construction at Rabbit Lake will be undertaken this year.

#### TAXATION

My Ministers have had many consultations with the Federal Government over the past months concerning the extensive changes recently approved by the Parliament of Canada in the Federal tax system.

As a result of these changes, you will be asked to approve complementary provincial income tax legislation.

The Federal Government has withdrawn from the estates tax and gift tax fields in favour of the provinces. Legislation will be introduced to occupy these tax fields with provincial succession duties and gift taxes.

You will also be asked to approve amendment to The Education and Health Tax Act.

#### FISCAL ARRANGEMENTS

The present Canada Fiscal Arrangements Act expires at the end of the current fiscal year, and it is anticipated that new Federal legislation concerning tax sharing will be enacted in the coming weeks.

My Ministers have urged the Federal Government to broaden the base of equalization payments to the less wealthy provinces by including municipal revenues—particularly school revenues—in the new formula.

My Government is alarmed at suggestions that such tax sharing arrangements are unconstitutional. My Ministers are preparing to defend with vigour the constitutionality of these arrangements. A constitutional secretariat will be established to protect Saskatchewan's interests in these matters.

#### CONSUMER PROTECTION AND INDIVIDUAL RIGHTS

Major moves are planned to extend consumer protection, enhance individual rights and protect civil liberties.

Legislation will be introduced to establish a new Department of Consumer Affairs.

You will be asked to approve measures to control pyramid selling, to protect against unscrupulous vendors of privately operated training courses and to permit review by an individual of files of credit reporting agencies which pertain to him. Other legislation will be introduced to give greater protection to consumers in their credit transactions.

Legislation will be introduced to establish a Human Rights Commission and to provide for an Ombudsman.

You will be asked to lower the age of majority to 18.

My Government also plans to assist people seeking answers to their problems or requiring information from Government agencies. An information and referral centre will be established, with toll-free telephone service from any point in Saskatchewan.

#### YOUTH, CULTURE AND RECREATION

My Government recognizes the need to assure that the multi-cultural and recreational activities of the people of Saskatchewan are freely developed as a dynamic source of creativity for all our residents. Accordingly you will be asked to approve legislation establishing a new Department of Culture and Youth to co-ordinate and advance these aspects of our community life.

To provide a further incentive for our young athletes, you will be asked to approve funds for the Saskatchewan Games, to be held in the summer of 1972.

#### ELECTORAL BOUNDARIES

To remove the fixing of constituency boundaries from the influence of partisan politics, you will be asked to approve a Bill establishing an independent electoral boundaries commission.

#### ENVIRONMENT

My Government intends to take comprehensive measures to preserve and enhance our natural environment.

You will be asked to approve legislation establishing a Department of the Environment, consolidating existing pollution-control functions and expanding monitoring and research capacity.

A concerted effort will be made to recover and recycle derelict automobiles now scarring the landscape.

You will be asked to approve funds to provide grants to farmers to control pollution from livestock operations.

#### NORTHERN SASKATCHEWAN

The development of Northern Saskatchewan in the interests of the people who live there is a matter of prime concern to my Government. Of equal urgency is the provision of opportunities for developing human resources in all parts of the province—particularly among these persons outside the mainstream of the majority society.

You will be asked to approve legislation which will make possible sweeping changes in my Government's approach to the people of the North and the problems of northern development.

Legislation will also be introduced to abolish the Saskatchewan Indian and Metis Department. You will be asked to approve the establishment of a new Human Resources Development Agency, which will be concerned with all disadvantaged people, in whatever circumstances.

#### Co-operatives

My Government believes that co-operatives and credit unions have an important part to play in the life of our province. Steps to strengthen the Department of Co-operation and Co-operative Development will be proposed.

In the coming year credit unions will be relieved of payment of inspection fees levied heretofore by the Department.

#### HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES

Legislation will be introduced to facilitate the inclusion of chiropractic care as an insured health service.

Promising methods of procuring and distributing prescription drugs and hearing aids at greatly reduced prices are under intensive study.

It is my Government's intention to emphasize health services rather than sickness services. To this end, improvements in the delivery of health care are being planned.

You will be asked to approve funds to increase payments under the foster home program, and to improve the ratio of welfare staff to clients in regional offices.

#### EDUCATION

In the current fiscal year, my Government introduced Saskatchewan's first bursary program for post-secondary students. You will be asked to approve legislation which will provide increased aid to students and to expand student bursaries.

To prepare for the creation of community colleges, and to administer the province's participation in all phases of university and other post-secondary education, legislation will be introduced to establish a Department of Continuing Education.

The year ahead will see expansion in the technical institutes at Moose Jaw and Saskatoon, and the opening of the first phase of the Institute of Applied Arts and Sciences in Regina.

Establishment of the Lakeland regional library system is scheduled for the coming year, to serve the area from North Battleford to Lloydminster. This is the six of seven regional libraries required to serve the entire settled area of the province.

#### LABOUR

My Government has already taken steps to improve the lot of working people. Legislation will be introduced at this Session to raise benefits under The Workmens' Compensation Act.

You will also be asked to approve legislation which will promote industrial harmony by strengthening conciliation, mediation and arbitration procedures.

#### MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS

Legislation will be proposed to assist my Government in dealing with the growing problems of urban centres.

#### ACCIDENT INSURANCE

A quarter of a century ago, the government of that day pioneered the development of no-fault accident insurance. Today, my Government believes that it is time to expand that concept.

You will therefore be asked to approve legislation providing major increases in benefits to persons injured in automobile accidents, including a 140 per cent increase in weekly indemnity payments.

#### NATURAL GAS

In the year ahead the Saskatchewan Power Corporation will accelerate its program of extending natural gas distribution to smaller communities in the province.

#### COMMITTEE REPORTS

My Government is pleased with the diligence and thoroughness with which the two special committees of the Legislative Assembly have undertaken their tasks. Careful consideration will be given to their recommendations respecting agriculture and crop insurance, and concerning changes in liquor regulations.

#### 1973 CELEBRATIONS

My Government looks forward with anticipation to 1973 as a year to be marked with special celebrations in Saskatchewan.

1973 will be the 100th anniversary of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, an event which holds particular significance.

1973 will also mark the 100th anniversary of Treaty Four between Her Majesty and Indian bands in Saskatchewan.

My Government is pleased to lend its support to the Silver Broom International Curling Championships which will be held in Regina in 1973.

My Government commends 1973 to the people of Saskatchewan as a year to be celebrated, and my Government will use the occasion to give increased emphasis to the developing tourist industry.

The Public Accounts for the fiscal year, together with the estimates for the year commencing April 1, 1972, will be submitted to you.

I leave you now to the business of the Session with full confidence that you will favourably discharge your duties and responsibilities.

May Divine Providence continue to bless our Province and guide this Legislature in all its deliberations.

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor then retired from the Chamber.

#### PRAYERS:

Mr. Speaker informed the Assembly that Ian Peter Phillips, Esquire, had been appointed Clerk Assistant during the present Session.

Mr. Speaker informed the Assembly that Randi Austring, Joanne Nelson, Joanne Neuman and Bryan Cox would be Pages during the present Session.

Moved by the Hon. Mr. Blakeney that a Bill respecting the Administration of Oaths of Office be now introduced and read the first time.

Question being put, it was agreed to and the said Bill was, accordingly, read the first time.

Mr. Speaker then informed the Assembly that, in order to prevent mistakes, he had obtained a copy of the Speech of His Honour the Lieutenant Governor, which was laid upon the Table.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Blakeney, seconded by the Hon. Mr. Romanow:

Ordered, That the Speech of His Honour the Lieutenant Governor be taken into consideration on Monday.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Blakeney, seconded by the Hon. Mr. Messer:

Ordered, That the Votes and Proceedings of this Assembly be printed, after first having been perused by Mr. Speaker; that he do appoint the printing thereof, and that no person but such as he shall appoint do presume to print the same.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Blakeney, seconded by the Hon. Mr. Smishek:

Ordered, That *Messieurs* Dyck, Michayluk, Pepper, Gardner and Lane be constituted a Select Special Committee to prepare and report, with all convenient speed, lists of Members to compose the Select Standing Committees of this Assembly, provided under Rule 86;

That the said Select Standing Committees be severally empowered to examine and inquire into all such matters and things as may be referred to them by this Assembly, and to report from time to time their observations thereon; with power to send for persons, papers and records, and to examine witnesses under oath.

The Assembly then adjourned at 3:34 o'clock p.m.

Mr. Speaker laid before the Assembly, pursuant to Rule 105, the report of the Legislative Librarian dated February 24, 1972, which is as follows:—

#### REPORT OF THE LEGISLATIVE LIBRARIAN

REGINA, FEBRUARY 24, 1972

To the Honourable

The Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan.

Sir:

I have the honour to submit to you the Annual Report of the Legislative Library.

During 1971, as a reference library set up primarily for the service of the Members of the Legislative Assembly and the Saskatchewan public service, the Library continued to expand its holdings with a wide variety of reference materials including government documents, pamphlets, law reports and texts, newspapers, periodicals, and books for the general collection. Following the usual policy of this Library, emphasis has been on the acquisition of books and pamphlets relating to Canadian public affairs, history, and economics, and the social sciences generally, and on materials published in or relating to Saskatchewan, including local histories.

Of the Library's holdings perhaps the most important for its purposes are the government documents. As one would expect, it receives copies of every publication issued by the departments and agencies of the Saskatchewan government. It is also a depository library for Canadian federal government publications, and the only full depository library in Saskatchewan for U.S. government documents, and during the past few years has been generally receiving publications of the federal government of Australia. All of these are in addition, of course, to the Statutes, Journals and similar items from the other provinces, and the Statutes of several Commonwealth countries and of a number of the American states, most of which the Library has been receiving for many years, some from its beginning.

In their totality these government documents form a very valuable collection but it does have the disadvantage of growing very quickly, adding considerably to the Library's continuing space problem of which mention has been made in previous annual reports.

The program of indexing the four Saskatchewan daily newspapers has been continued, and starting with January 1970, significant items in the Western Producer are now being included. A major effort of the past year has been the completion of the 3-volume cumulation of the Newspaper Index covering the years 1966-1969 and its distribution to the chief Saskatchewan libraries and to many university, re-

search and large public libraries across Canada. This is the fifth of such indexes (excluding two of more limited context and done for our own use only) which the Library has produced and distributed, beginning with a fairly selective index covering the years 1935-1949, with the more detailed ones following thereafter. These have proven of great value over the years to our patrons and presumably to the other recipients as well.

Mention might be made of the Library's small but growing microfilm collection of M.A. and Ph.D. theses in the acquisition of which we follow the same criteria for selection as we do for the purchase of books. As yet not much use has been made of this material but with the passage of time we feel its worth will be more and more appreciated. In addition we are building up runs on microfilm of the Financial Post and Macleans, both of which we have found to be very useful reference tools, often providing information not available to us anywhere

As in former years the resources of the Library have been used extensively not only by Members of the Legislative Assembly and by government employees but also by students of the Regina Campus, and during intersessions and holiday periods by graduate students of other universities as well, particularly those working on Western Canadian thences, by local lawyers, and by writers for the news media such as the legislative reporters and CBC writers and reporters.

The following statistics indicate the number of items borrowed during 1971, excluding the many items used on the premises and the materials from the Public Documents Centre consulted in the Saskatchewan Archives quarters. It should be borne in mind that because the Legislative Library is a reference institution, lending to other than members of the Legislative Assembly and the public service is largely restricted to books, other materials being used within the library only.

I wish to record here our appreciation of the co-operation the Legislative Library has received and is receiving from the Regina Office of the Saskatchewan Archives in many areas but particularly in connection with the programme of microfilming Saskatchewan weekly newspapers, a joint project of the Library and the Archives Board which began in 1948, and the servicing of the Public Documents Centre housed in the Archives Office on the Regina Campus. As indicated in a previous Report, this Centre provides several thousand feet of shelf-space for backruns of periodicals, scholarly journals, early bound volumes of Saskatchewan dailies, early Canadian federal and provincial government documents, and the complete U.S. government document collection, all of which were transferred from the Library's overflowing and diminishing storage space in the lower floor of the Legislative Building. In addition the Archives continues to provide the Library with interesting displays for the Reading Room of early photographs, pamphlets, manuscripts and similar materials relating to Saskatchewan history.

WILLIAM JAMES BOYLE, who died on August 14, 1971, was a Member of this Legislature for Kinistino from 1944 to 1948. He was born in Cobourg, Ontario in 1887 and came to Crystal Springs, Saskatchewan in 1910. From 1918 until his retirement, he farmed in the Kinistino area. He was the President of Kinistino Co-operative Association; Councillor and Reeve of the R.M. of Invergordon No. 430; Director of the Saskatchewan Livestock Association; Member of the Saskatchewan Wheat Pool; Chairman of the Local Wheat Board; trustee for the Gowanbrae Public School and he sat on the local school board.

RUSSELL BROWN, who died on October 17, 1971, was a Member of this Legislature for Last Mountain from 1952 to 1964 and for Souris-Estevan from June to October, 1971. He was born in Fort William, Ontario in 1911. During the 1920's, he bought grain in Saskatchewan and was a field auditor with the Saskatchewan Wheat Pool. During the Second World War, he spent four years with the Canadian army in the King's Own Rifles of Canada and later with the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders. After the war, he joined the staff of the Department of Cooperation and Co-operative Development and helped organize co-operatives. He was an education director for the Regina Labor Council. In July 1956, he became Provincial Secretary and Minister in charge of the Saskatchewan Power Corporation. From April, 1957 to April, 1960, he was the Minister of the Department of Travel and Information and from April, 1960 to May, 1964, Minister of the Department of Industry and Information. In 1964 he owned an insurance and real estate business in Regina. In 1966, he bought a hotel in Estevan and later a jewellery store in that city. He was elected to the Estevan City Council in 1969 and 1970. He was a member of the Canadian Legion and the United Services Institute.

JESSE PICHARD TRIPP, who died on September 6, 1971 was a Member of this Legislature for Souris from 1925 to 1929 and for Souris-Estevan from 1934 to 1938. He was born in Forest, Ontario in 1883. After receiving his primary and secondary education in Forest, he graduated from the Toronto College of Pharmacy. He practiced optometry and pharmacy in Oxbow from 1906 to 1953. In 1924, after having served on Council and as a school trustee, he was elected Mayor of Oxbow. He was elected as a Member of Parliament for the Constituency of Assiniboia from 1940 to

1945 and later served on the Board of Broadcast Governors. He was active in sports including baseball and curling and was a 50-year member and a Past Master of the Boscurvis Masonic Lodge at Oxbow.

"but this Assembly, acutely aware of the serious unemployment and underemployment that exists in the Province of Saskatchewan, denounces the Government for its failure to pursue any resource and industrial development program that would both diversify our economy and provide much needed employment for our citizens."

The former Liberal Government had a policy whereby it rebated the province's 75 per cent share of estate taxes to beneficiaries.

Mr. Roles said he will make the decision shortly on whether to relocate his business in Calgary or Edmonton.

In Regina, Acting Opposition Leader Cy MacDonald submitted notice asking for an emergency debate in the Legislature on "The continuing exodus of established industries from Saskatchewan with the corresponding loss of jobs, wages and provincial revenues."

Mr. Speaker ruled that the matter was not of urgent public importance under Rule No. 17 on the grounds that the company mentioned had not, according to the press release, reached a decision as yet whether the company was moving from Saskatchewan as was mentioned in the Hon. Member's statement.

Locations, dates and oxygen and mercury levels of any tests made during 1971 of water in the North Saskatchewan River between the Alberta border and the junction with the South Saskatchewan River.

The following Questions on the Orders of the Day were dropped:

#### SPEAKER'S STATEMENT

I wish to draw all Members attention to Resolution (No. 2) as it stands in the name of the Hon. Member for Melville. Erskine May's Parliamentary Practice. 17th Edition, page 296, defines a substantive motion as a "self-contained proposal submitted for the approval of the House and drafted in such a way as to be capable of expressing a decision of the House." I would remind all Members that the practice of this Assembly has been to have the substantive motions succinct and clear without

preambles in order that the motion would be capable of expressing decision. Arguments, that are presented in preambles, can be used in the debate itself but should not be included in the Resolution.

Resolution (No. 2), in my opinion, contains a preamble. In Beauchesne's Parliamentary Rules and Forms, Fourth Edition, 1958,Cit. 199 (1), page 167, this situation is covered as follows: "When a member hands a motion to the Speaker after having spoken in support of it, the Speaker may, before putting the question to the House, make such corrections as are necessary or advisable in order that it should conform with the usages of the House."

I would draw attention to a Speaker's ruling as recorded in the Journals of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Saskatchewan, March 17, 1970, pages 96 and 97, where Mr. Speaker altered the wording of a private member's resolution in order to make it conform with the accepted practice of this Assembly.

The Chair will delete the words "recognizing that grain markets are limited and farmers are marketing grain at prices below the cost of production," from the resolution in order that the preamble will be removed.

I also wish to draw all Hon. Members' attention to Resolution (No. 6), standing in the name of the Hon. Member for Saskatoon Nutana Centre which also contains a preamble. For the same reasons as given above, the Chair will delete the words "being seriously disturbed by the intolerably high level of unemployment, particularly among young people, and recognizing that the lack of jobs is a direct consequence of gross mismanagement of the Canadian economy by the Federal Government . . . " from the Resolution in order that the preamble will be removed.

The Order of the Day being called for Resolution (No. 2) it was moved by Mr. Kowalchuk, seconded by Mr. Larson:

That this Assembly urges the Federal Government to proceed immediately with legislation to establish an income stabilization program for prairie farmers, which program would include the following:

- A guarantee that total grain receipts in the prairie region will not fall below 1.1 million dollars during the 1971-72 crop year, and that this figure be adjusted in subsequent years to take into account costs of production;
- (2) The establishment of a Stabilization Fund for the purposes of this program, with contributions from producers; consumers, through a two-price system for wheat; and the Federal Government, through an annual contribution from the Treasury;
- (3) A payout from the Stabilization Fund in any crop year that gross receipts fall below the guaranteed minimum, with distribution on the basis of the numbers of bushels of grain delivered, such payment to be included in the final payment made by the Canadian Wheat Board.

A debate arising, it was on motion of Mr. Faris, adjourned.

The Order of the Day being called for Resolution (No. 5) it was moved by Mr. Gardner, seconded by Mr. McIsaac:

That the Government of Saskatchewan give consideration to taking the necessary steps to reduce the property tax for education to 25 mills.

A debate arising, it was on motion of Mr. McIsaac, adjourned.

The Order of the Day being called for Resolution (No. 11) it was moved by Mr. Grant, seconded by Mr. Guy:

That this Assembly cannot condone that the Minister in charge of S.G.I.O., the Honourable Mr. Roy Romanow, in announcing the licence insurance rates for Saskatchewan drivers for the year ending March 31, 1973, failed to inform the public that there will be an increase in the rates for 1972 model passenger cars of ten dollars (\$10.00) and also an increase in the rates of 1972 Class F trucks and Class R Trucks of \$5.00.

A debate arising, it was moved by Mr. Cody, seconded by Mr. Faris, in amendment thereto:

That all the words after the word "Assembly" be deleted and the following substituted therefor:

"supports the principle of compulsory, no-fault, government-operated, automobile insurance, administered in Saskatchewan by the Saskatchewan Government Insurance Office, because it has provided wide benefits to our people involved in car accidents at extremely low rates of insurance as evidenced by the recent announcement by the Minister in Charge of S.G.I.O., The Honourable Roy Romanow, respecting the rates for the licence year 1972-73."

The debate continuing on the motion and the amendment, and the question being put on the amendment, it was agreed to, on the following Recorded Division:

He also chaired the Saskatchewan Research Council for fourteen years; the Archives Board for twelve years; the Centre for Community Studies for four years; was Minister-in-Charge of Libraries for eight years and the Public Service Commission for twelve years. During his term as Provincial Treasurer, he was Minister-in-Charge of the Queen's Printer, the Government Printing Office and the Purchasing Agency. He attended the 1954 General Conference of the Commonwealth

Parliamentary Association in Kenya. He was Vice-Chairman of the Committee in Charge of Saskatchewan's Golden Jubilee in 1955. In November, 1971 he was appointed as a resident representative in Seoul, Korea, with the United Nations Development Program.

### STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER

On Friday last, a point of order was raised regarding Resolution No. 15 which was moved by the Honourable Member from Moosomin, which reads as follows:

"That this Assembly recommends to the consideration of the Government of Saskatchewan that a Board be established to determine the amount of financial losses suffered by various groups or individuals due to the Family Farm Protection Act, and to determine what compensation should be paid to these people by the Government of Saskatchewan."

I draw all Honourable Members' attention to page 29 of the Final Report of the Special Committee on The Crop Insurance Program and the Family Farm Protection Act which recommends "That the Government of Saskatchewan or any of its agencies do not grant financial compensation to any person claiming damages arising out of the Family Farm Protection Act." A reservation to that report as attached in Appendix B, (See page 35) proposes the establishment of an independent board to consider compensation for possible damages arising out of the Family Farm Protection Act.

This particular situation which is now before the Assembly is covered in citation 131 of Beauchesne's Parliamentary Rules and Forms, Fourth Edition, Page 116 which states that:

"The anticipation rule, which forbids discussion of a matter standing on the Paper being forestalled, is dependent upon the same principle as that which forbids the same question being twice raised in the same session. In applying the Anticipation Rule, preference is given to the discussion which leads to the most effective result, and this has established a descending scale of values for discussions—Bills, Motions, Amendments, etc."

Erskine May's Parliamentary Practice, Seventeenth Edition, page 396 states that:

"A motion or an amendment may not be brought forward which is the same, in substance, as a question which is the same, in substance, as a question which has been decided in the affirmative or negative during the current session."

#### And further that:

"A motion must not anticipate a matter already appointed for consideration by the House, whether it be a Bill or an adjourned debate upon a motion." (Page 399) The rules guiding our procedures of this Assembly are very clear on the point that the same matter cannot be debated twice.

I want to draw to your attention that the Final Report of the Special Committee on the Crop Insurance Program and the Family Farm Protection Act was tabled on March 1, 1972 and was placed on the agenda for consideration by the Assembly at that time. Notice for Resolution No. 15 was submitted to the Assembly on March 22, 1972.

The question that arises is then whether Resolution No. 15 and the report in question are in fact the same. Having considered this matter in great detail, I am of the opinion that the subject matter of Resolution No. 15 and the recommendation and the reservation of the committee report are the same. ### STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER

On Friday, April 14, when Bill No. 73 was called for second reading, the Hon. Member for Saskatoon Nutana Centre rose to move second reading of the said

Bill. A point of order was raised that a motion for second reading of a money Bill standing in the name of a Cabinet Minister could not be moved by a private Member. The Assembly unanimously agreed to allow the Hon. Member to continue with Bill No. 73 pending a ruling by the Chair on the condition that it would not set a precedent of the Assembly.

The point of order that was raised opens the matter of moving motions. In this case, the motion was that Bill No. 73 be now read a second time. Since Bill No. 73 falls under the definition of a "Money Bill," it must be initiated by a Cabinet Minister with the money recommendation. Both of these requirements were met on first reading. The question then arises as to if the motion for second reading has to be moved by a Cabinet Minister or by any Member of the Assembly.

I refer all Hon. Members to Erskine May's Parliamentary Practice, Seventeenth Edition, page 295 "Public Bills" are so called because they deal with matters of public general interest. In most cases they are introduced and piloted through the House by a Member of the Government, and referred to as "Government Bills"; other bills are known as "unofficial Members' bills" or, colloquially, as "private Members' bills" (an expression which should not be confused with "Private Bills"). In our Legislature, we have seen many cases of Private Members' Bills whereby a public act was amended by a Bill which was moved and piloted through the Assembly by a Private Member.

The Bill in question was introduced by the Premier and received first reading under his name. The said Bill was also standing on the Order Paper for second reading under the name of the Premier. It has been a long standing custom and practice of this Assembly that one Minister can move a motion standing in the name of another Minister. This practice is based on the theory of collective responsibility of Cabinet. On the other hand, a private Member cannot move a motion which is standing in the name of another Member because of the lack of collective responsibility between private Members. In accordance with this well established practice, I would rule that the procedure used on Friday last in moving second reading of Bill 73 was irregular. Since the Assembly unanimously agreed to allow the Hon. Member to move the motion even if it was an irregular procedure, I would rule that the said Bill can be proceeded with in this case and will be deemed to be valid.

I would point out to the Assembly that I would not consider this practice to be a precedent of the Assembly and would advise all Hon. Members to avoid this particular problem in the future.

#### PRAYERS:

Mr. McPherson, from the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts and Printing, presented the First Report of the said Committee which is as follows:

- Your Committee met for organization, and appointed Mr. McPherson as its Chairman, and Mr. Dyck as its Vice-Chairman. On April 12, 1972, Mr. Meakes was appointed Vice-Chairman in the place of Mr. Dyck.
- 2. Your Committee held six meetings and examined both the Provincial Auditor's Report and the Public Accounts for the year ended March 31, 1971 with the Provincial Auditor, three of his officers, the Comptroller of the Treasury and other Treasury officials in attendance.
- 3. Over the last few years, the Provincial Auditor has repeatedly reported to the Legislature that there is a lack of uniformity in the reporting of Trust and Deposit Accounts. The Public Accounts Committee considered this matter very carefully in 1971 and reported that:

The Committee feels that the Treasury Department should attempt to define Trust Accounts; that all such Trust Accounts should be authorized by legislation; and that the year end balances of all such authorized Trust Accounts should be shown in the statement of "Trust and Deposit Accounts" in Schedule H in Public Accounts.

Some rules should be drawn up as to which authorized Trust Accounts should have certified statements in Public Accounts.

Your Committee reiterates its recommendation of last year that more detail be reported in regard to authorized Trust Accounts, either in Public Accounts or by tabling annual statements in the Legislature.

Your Committee notes that during the last year, little or no progress has been made in this area of defining and reporting Trust and Deposit Accounts. During the present year, your Committee once again reviewed this matter with the Provincial Auditor and officials of the Treasury Department. Your Committee recommends that the Treasury Department should renew its attempt to define Trust and Deposit Accounts so that they can be authorized by legislation and entered into the Public Accounts of the Province.

The Committee is pleased to report that the Provincial Auditor and representatives from the Treasury Department have had one meeting and progress is reported on this recommendation.

- 4. For the last two years, the Public Accounts has considered the matter of net-gross budgeting. Your Committee again examined this matter with Treasury officials and notes that the matter of gross budgeting is under review.
  - Your Committee recommends that gross budgeting and accounting be implemented immediately.
- 5. Your Committee again discussed the matter of Treasury Board Regulations with officials from the Treasury Department. Your Committee welcomes the report that these regulations are expected to be ready within the next twelve months and wishes to commend the department on their activity in this regard.
- The Committee reviewed monies not accounted for and is satisfied
  that the amount of monies not accounted for are very small compared
  with the amount handled by the Provincial Treasury and all Departments.
- 7. In Item 11 of the Provincial Auditor's Report, it was reported that a revenue sum of \$9,000.20 was not properly remitted by a Justice of the Peace. Representatives from the Attorney General's Department reported to the Committee that the matter of the collection of fines is being reviewed so as to avoid possible future problems in this area. Your Committee is pleased to report that this sum of money has been recovered in full.
- 8. Your Committee recommends that the Provincial Auditor's Department be brought to full staff immediately.
- Your Committee recommends that the Standing Committee on Public Accounts and Printing be appointed as a Select Special Committee with power to sit between Sessions or during a period of adjournment of a Session in order to study the Provincial Auditor's Report and the Public Accounts.

Mr. Robbins, from the Select Standing Committee on Crown Corporations, presented the First Report of the said Committee which is as follows:

Your Committee met for organization and appointed Mr. Robbins as Chairman and Mr. Baker as Vice-Chairman.

Having duly examined the Annual Reports and Financial Statements for the last completed fiscal year of the various Crown Corporations and related Agencies, as referred to it from time to time by the Assembly, Your Committee has satisfied itself that they reflect the state of the Corporations and Agencies to which they severally relate, as operated in accordance with Government policy.

In conducting its examination, Your Committee interrogated the responsible Ministers, who attended with the Chief Officers of the respective Corporations and Agencies, no restrictions being placed upon questions asked within the Order of Reference, save and except questions, the answers to which, in the opinion of the responsible Ministers, might disclose information contrary to the public interest or prejudicial to the commercial positions of the Corporation or Agency concerned.

It was agreed by the Committee that the following resolution be considered the major item agreed to and, consequently, receive priority consideration and be inserted into the preamble to the report:

"That this Committee request that the Government conduct an immediate judicial enquiry, open to the public, into the operations of Saskatchewan Forest Products covering the phasing out of the Reserve and Carrot River mills, the selling out of timber rights to Simpson Timber Company; and the complete operation of the Big River Mill project including feasibility studies, plans and design."

Additionally, the Committee considered and agreed to the following Resolutions:

- That this Committee include in its final report a recommendation to the Board of Directors of S.G.I.O. that the rates for passenger automobiles five years old and over be reduced to coincide with the decrease in value of the vehicle.
- 2. That this Committee recommend to the Government that the \$2.00 surcharge paid by drivers 25 years of age and under be discontinued after a driver in this category has driven 3 years accident-free.
- 3. That this Committee recognize the long and capable services of J. O. Dutton to S.G.I.O. and hope that when his services to the Manitoba

Government expire, the Minister will be able to convince Mr. Dutton that his talents and dedication to the Corporation are required here in Saskatchewan.

- 4. That this Committee recommend to the Minister that he increase the Board of Directors and make it more representative in respect to geographical areas.
- 5. That this Committee recommend to the Sask-Tel Board of Directors that consideration be given to a more aggressive attitude in the promotion of Sask-Tel as the official computer communication media for public and private computer users in Saskatchewan.
- 6. That we commend Sask-Tel for carrying out an experimental program for humanities' sake involving the University Hospital in Saskatoon and the Canora Hospital, through an electrocardiograph link over ordinary telephone lines, and further that, assuming the experiment proved successful in every way, we request the Minister and Sask-Tel to consider providing such links to other community hospitals.
- 7. In view of the large profits in the year under review that this Committee recommend to the Board of Directors of Sask-Tel continuation of the extension of services to unserved areas of Saskatchewan at as rapid a pace as possible.
- 8. That the Committee request the Provincial Auditor to clarify use of the word "fairly" in line 5, page 10, of the Auditor's Report, on the Annual Report of Sask-Tel, 1971.
- 9. That this Committee recommend to the Board of Sask-Tel that in the ten year record of progress the heading "debt as a per cent of year-end Capital" be retained in future reports.
- 10. That this Committee, in its final report, recommend to the Board of Directors of Sask. Power that consideration be given to the appointment of additional members to the Board to make it more representative of provincial interests.
- 11. That this Committee, in its final report, recommend to the Board of Directors of Sask. Power that a policy of reasonable pay-out periods be considered in formulating plans to extend gas services to new users.
- 12. That this Committee include in its final report consideration of a recommendation for reasonable reduction in electrical rates for recreational facilities throughout the province.
- 13. That this Committee recommend to the Board of Directors of Saskatchewan Power Corporation that a feasibility study be made regarding the whole rate structure with a view to making reductions where feasible.

That the report of this Committee include a recommendation to the Government Finance Office that the Balance Sheet of the Saskatchewan Transportation Company for 1972, and in future, show the total accumulated earnings, including the amounts previously credited to the account "Appropriated for Capital Assets" and that the account "Government Finance Office—Advances" show the amount needed for the long-term financing of this Corporation.
- 19. That this Committee recommend to the Board of Directors of Saskatchewan Transportation Company that they explore the possibility of using Credit Unions rather than the present bank, provided terms, conditions and privileges are equal to or better than those currently available from the Bank of Montreal.
- 20. That the report of this Committee include a recommendation to the Government Finance Office that the Balance Sheet of the Saskatchewan Government Printing Company for 1972, and in future, show the total accumulated earnings, including the amount previously credited to the account "Appropriated for Capital Assets" and that the account "Government Finance Office—Advances" show the amount needed for the long-term financing of this Corporation.
- 21. That this Committee recommend to the Minister that when further appointments are made to the Board of Directors of Saskatchewan Minerals that persons are selected on the basis of familiarity with the mining industry.
- 22. That this Committee, in its final report, urge the Board of Directors of Saskatchewan Minerals to continue to pursue an aggressive sales policy.
- 23. That the report of this Committee include a recommendation to the Government Finance Office that the Balance Sheet of Saskatchewan Minerals for 1972, and in future, show the total accumulated earnings

- including the amounts previously credited to the account "Reserve for Research and Development" and to the account "Reserve for Contingency" and that the account "Government Finance Office—Advances" show the amount needed for the long-term financing of this Corporation.
- 24.—That this Committee recommend, in reference to property owned by Saskatchewan Minerals located in various parts of the province, that S.G.I.O. insurance agents in these areas be given permission to bid and commission assignments be made to them, when practical.
- 25. That this Committee go on record as commending the management and staff of Saskatchewan Minerals for the excellent job which they have done and are doing.
- 26. That the final report of this Committee include a recommendation to the Government Finance Office that its financial report for 1972 record the amounts previously credited, by the Corporations responsible to it, to Appropriations and Reserves for Capital Assets and for Research and Development and bring the sum of these amounts into surplus account and that in the G.F.O. balance sheet for 1972, and thereafter, the account "Advances to Crown Corporations" show the total of the amounts required for the long-term financing of the Corporations responsible to it.
- 27. That this Committee include in its final report a recommendation to the Government Finance Office that, in view of the fact that the new Big River sawmill would have at best been economically marginal even if (1) it had been completed at the original budgeted cost of \$259,000. and (2) it had proven in completion in mid-1971 to be capable of producing at the originally planned capacity, and in view of the fact that if future depreciation charges are based in a final capital cost in the range of \$1,000,000. the operating results will bear the costs actually incurred due to inadequate administration in the years 1969-70 and 1970-71, the amount by which the capital costs of the sawmill exceed its economic value of not more than \$259,000. be charged against the Saskatchewan Forest Products deficits for 1969-70 and 1970-71 to show the total deficits incurred in those years due to construction of the new sawmill.
- 28. That this Committee condemn the actions of the former Liberal government for:
  - (a) phasing out the profitable lumber manufacturing yard at Reserve and thereby displacing 130 men;
  - (b) building the Big River sawmill without adequate planning and without a feasibility study of estimated total costs and benefits of such an undertaking; and
  - (c) weakening the Timber Board by allowing a few large forest product companies to monopolize available provincial cutting rights.

- 29. That this Committee recommend that the Board of Directors of Saskatchewan Forest Products begin negotiations immediately with the Simpson Timber Company to attempt to get sufficient timber rights to continue the operation of the Carrot River mill.
- That this Committee request a public enquiry into the total utilization of Saskatchewan forest resources.
- 31. That this Committee include in its final report a recommendation that the Balance Sheet for Saskatchewan Fur Marketing Service for 1972, and in future, show the total accumulated surplus, including the amounts previously credited to "Reserve for Capital Assets" and that the account "Government Finance Office—Advances" show the total requirements for the long-term financing of this Corporation.
- 32. That this Committee condemn the use of Crown Corporations, such as Saskatchewan Pulpwood, as a means of assuming public risks for private enterprise and as a means of disguising public subsidy of private corporations.
- 33. That this Committee accept Mr. Ballantyne's invitation to all M.L.A.'s to visit the North and that arrangements be made through the Minister responsible.
- 34. That this Committee record its strong disapproval of the actions of the previous government that have contributed to the serious deficit position of the Saskatchewan Water Supply Board and resolve:
  - (a) that this Committee recommends the Government establish a committee or other appropriate body to enquire into the causes of and recommend solutions to this financial problem:

This Legislative Assembly has voted the supplies required to enable the Government to defray the expenses of the Public Service. In the name of the Assembly I present to Your Honour the following Bill:— "An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of Money for the Public Service for the Fiscal Years ending respectively the Thirty-first day of March, 1972, and the Thirty-first day of March, 1973."

to which Bill I respectfully request Your Honour's Assent.

The Royal Assent to this Bill was announced by the Clerk.

"In Her Majesty's name, His Honour the Lieutenant Governor doth thank the Legislative Assembly, accepts their benevolence and assents to this Bill."

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor was then pleased to deliver the following speech:

Mr. Speaker, Members of the Legislative Assembly:

It is my duty to relieve you of further attendance at the Legislative Assembly. In doing so, I wish to thank you and congratulate you on the work you have done.

You have worked hard and long to initiate a great many new programs which will be of significant benefit to our Province. You have deliberated for 51 days and have considered and passed a record number of bills—some 160 in all.

You have approved legislation to assist in the solution of many of the problems facing agriculture and the family farm, such as the Land Bank Act which will ease the transfer of land from one generation to the next and will facilitate the entry of younger men into farming.

To assist the producers of livestock, you have extended the Livestock Loans Guarantee Act, approved legislation to assist in the construction of veterinary clinics and made provision for veterinary inspection of all feeder cattle and hogs sold at auction.

You have approved new laws to improve consumer protection and enhance individual rights.

These include an Act to establish a Human Rights Commission, an Act to provide for an Ombudsman, legislation to establish a new Department of Consumer Affairs, and measures to give greater protection to consumers in their credit transactions.

As well, you have recognized the increased responsibility given to young people by lowering the age of majority to 18.

You have taken important steps designed to enable the Government to respond more efficiently to the needs and aspirations of the people of Saskatchewan.

These include legislation to set up six new departments and agencies:

The Department of Continuing Education to give greater focus to the need for adult education;

The Department of Culture and Youth which will lend support to cultural organizations in our province, while giving added recognition to the more important role of youth in our society;

The Department of Consumer Affairs;

The Human Resources Development Agency which will assist disadvantaged segments of our society to fashion their own solutions to the problems they face.

For the people of the North, whose needs and way of life often differ from the rest of the province, you have approved legislation to set up a Department of Northern Saskatchewan.

And you have passed legislation to set up a Department of the Environment to give leadership in the protection of the environment.

A number of bills have been considered and passed by you in the field of education, including legislation to increase aid to students and to expand student bursaries.

You have approved a new Trade Union Act, restoring many important rights to working people. And you have taken steps to raise benefits under The Workmen's Compensation Act.

By approving a major expansion in benefits under The Automobile Accident Insurance Act, you have kept Saskatchewan in the vanguard of no-fault accident insurance.

The Property Improvement Grants program, approved by you in this Session, will result in a more equitable distribution of the tax burden, as will the new Succession Duty and Gift Tax Acts. By amending The Education and Health Tax Act, you have removed the five per cent tax on meals of a value of \$2.50 or less.

You have established an Urban Advisory Commission to give leadership in dealing with the increasingly complex problems associated with urban centres.

You have approved funds to extend the opportunity for summer employment to an increased number of people, particularly young people, through the Provincial Employment Program.

By the passage of amendments to various superannuation acts, you have given additional and much-needed benefits to a large number of retired public servants.

The fixing of constituency boundaries has been removed from the influence of partisan politics by the establishment of an independent electoral boundaries commission.

In an effort to provide more opportunity for the people of Saskatchewan to participate in the decisions of Government, you have established a record number of intersessional legislative committees—on welfare, agriculture, small business and changes in the liquor regulations.

I thank you for the provision you have made to meet the further requirements of the public service and assure you that this sum of money will be used economically, prudently and in the public interest.

In taking leave of you, I thank you for the manner in which you have devoted your energies to the activities of the Session and wish you the full blessing of Providence.

The Hon. Mr. Romanow, Provincial Secretary, then said:

Mr. Speaker, and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

It is the will and pleasure of His Honour the Lieutenant Governor that this Legislative Assembly be prorogued until it pleases His Honour to summon the same for the dispatch of business, and the Legislative Assembly is accordingly prorogued.
