# Regina, Thursday, February 12, 1970

3:06 o'clock p.m.

This being the day appointed by Proclamation of His Honour the Lieutenant Governor, dated the Twenty-third day of December, 1969, for the meeting of the Third Session of the Sixteenth Legislative Assembly of the Province of Saskatchewan, and the Assembly having met:

Mr. Speaker informed the Assembly that he had received a communication from the Private Secretary to His Honour the Lieutenant Governor stating that His Honour would open the Session at three o'clock p.m. today, Thursday, the Twelfth day of February, 1970.

3:10 o'clock p.m.

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor entered the Chamber and, having taken his seat upon the Throne, was pleased to open the Session with the following Speech:—

Mr. Speaker,

Members of the Legislative Assembly:

IT IS MY PRIVILEGE to welcome you to the Third Session of the Sixteenth Legislature of Saskatchewan.

The Legislature meets at a time when many of our citizens face serious economic problems.

#### INFLATION

Both provincially and nationally inflation continues to be of major concern. Rising prices and high interest rates are causing hardship to all groups of our society—particularly to those in the low income category, to pensioners, and to farmers.

The Government of Saskatchewan welcomes the announcement of the Prime Minister, that every possible step will be taken in the near future, to bring inflation under control.

My Ministers are determined to assist the Federal Government in every way possible in this most important task.

#### AGRICULTURE

Agriculture continues to be the foundation of Saskatchewan's economy.

Yet despite bumper crops, farmers in our province are experiencing major reductions in income, because of a drastic fall in export sales.

The present situation emphasizes again the vulnerability of the Saskatchewan economy to the vagaries of weather and the international wheat market.

As the current Session commences, there are encouraging signs that the world wheat marketing situation will improve during 1970.

### Agricultural Diversification

Today it is even more apparent that increased production of livestock and poultry offers a major method of marketing surplus grain.

My Government, since taking office, has consistently urged and promoted agricultural diversification.

Again at this Session you will be asked to approve additional measures designed to expand our livestock population.

An Act to authorize the guaranteeing of loans for the purchase of female breeding stock will be introduced.

Appropriations of the Department of Agriculture will include increased amounts for paying swine building construction grants, for re-seeding cultivated lands to grass, and for the extension of small irrigation projects.

You will be asked to approve additional funds for the Saskatchewan Economic Development Corporation, which will permit that agency to make additional loans to major agricultural projects.

#### Irrigation

With the completion of the Outlook-Broderick system anticipated in the coming year, the construction of a system to irrigate lands in the Conquest-Ardath area will be commenced in 1970.

#### EDUCATION

My Government continues to give the highest priority to education of our people.

At the same time, it views with concern the year by year increase in local property taxes, which are necessary to partially finance the cost of our school system.

Thus, in the current year, all school budgets will be thoroughly examined by the Department and rigid controls on spending will be imposed.

# Student-Teacher Ratio

In an effort to obtain better value for the education tax dollar, efforts are being made to increase the student-teacher ratio throughout the province by an average of two students per classroom.

At this Session you will be asked to approve changes in the School Grants formula.

These amendments will form the basis for a Foundation Grants Program.

#### Larger Provincial Grants

My Government will ask the Legislature to assume a larger proportion of the overall costs of education, in an attempt to ease the burden of the local taxpayer.

#### University

You will be asked to approve the largest sum of money in history for the continued expansion of the University of Saskatchewan on both the Regina and Saskatoon campuses.

#### Student Representation

Legislation will be proposed to give students on the Regina and Saskatoon campuses the right to elect two members, each, to the University Senate.

#### French Language

You will be asked for funds which will permit the expansion of the number of schools using French as the language of instruction.

#### Teacher Pensions

Your approval will also be requested for a measure to increase the present ceiling for the pensions of teachers.

#### Grade Twelve Textbooks

Since 1964, my Government has introduced free text books in grades 9, 10 and 11.

You will be asked at the current Session to expand the program to include grade 12.

#### MUNICIPAL ASSISTANCE

#### Sewer and Water

My Government will continue the program of bringing sewer and water installations to our towns, villages and hamlets.

#### Airstrip Program

During 1969, grants were approved for 13 new communities to assist in the construction or expansion of airstrips.

Since its inception, 69 airstrips have been included in this project.

The program will be continued and expanded during 1970.

#### Police Assistance

You will be asked to approve legislation which will permit my Government to give financial assistance to municipalities in providing adequate police protection for their citizens.

#### Home-owner Grants

In 1966, in an effort to help property owners with their local taxes, my Government introduced an annual \$50.00 Home-owner grant.

Last year, 180,300 taxpayers applied for these grants, which totalled over \$8,845,000.00.

At the current Session you will be asked to increase the individual amount of these grants.

#### **Industrial Incentives**

My Government welcomes the "Federal Designated Area Legislation", which was amended and improved a few months ago.

This Act permits the Federal Government to make cash grants to new industries of up to 33% in certain "slow growth areas".

Unfortunately, only about one-third of the populated area of Saskatchewan is designated under the Act.

My Government will ask you to support supplementary legislation, which will bring industrial incentives to other small towns and communities.

### **Home Construction**

Because of unbelievably high interest rates on mortgages, and high building costs, generally, the building of new homes has slowed appreciably.

My Government will recommend that a \$500.00 grant be given to all home-owners who construct a home during the winter months throughout the province.

My Government will continue the program of constructing subsidized rental housing units, and will expand the program of constructing or acquiring housing units, for families placed in employment by The Saskatchewan Department of Indian and Metis.

#### Pipe Lines

You will be asked to approve legislation which will permit the sharing of a portion of the property tax levied against oil and gas lines.

#### Liquor Outlets

The demand for additional liquor outlets in rural areas is still widespread. My Government will continue the policy of closing some stores in small villages where the size of population does not justify the regular type of store.

You will be asked to approve amendments to The Liquor Act which will permit the establishment of additional agencies.

#### Civil Service Pensions

Your approval will also be asked for a measure to increase again the present ceiling on annual pension benefits for civil servants.

Furthermore, the Assembly will be asked to pass legislation making further adjustments to the existing superannuation allowances for our pensioners and widows.

#### Coming of Age Act

In Saskatchewan, as in other provinces, persons under twenty-one years of age have always been considered minors at law without legal capacity to enter into contracts on the same basis as adults. My Government believes that our young people are discharging effectively their responsibility as citizens and as members of society at an earlier age than twenty-one.

You will, therefore, be asked to approve "The Coming of Age Act, 1970", which will provide that a person who has reached the age of nineteen will be considered to be a legal adult, and to have reached legal maturity.

#### Electoral Reform

During the past year, a special legislative committee has been meeting periodically to study electoral reform.

Using the committee's final report as a basis, at the current Session my Government will propose certain far-reaching changes in The Election Act and The Controverted Elections Act.

#### Legislative Rules and Procedures

Since the last Session, a special legislative committee under the Chairmanship of Mr. Speaker has been studying changes in the rules and procedures of the Legislature.

You will be asked to consider new legislative procedures and rules, based upon the committee's report, which are designed to expedite and facilitate the discharge of House business.

#### SOCIAL WELFARE

#### Child Care

After assessing recommendations proceeding from our clients' Child Welfare Conference, my Government will present far-reaching recommendations regarding the objectives and policies of child care services in our province.

#### Saskatchewan Assistance Plan

Because of the steady and continuous increase in living costs, you will be asked to increase the food and clothing allowance granted under the Saskatchewan Assistance Plan.

#### Day Care Centres

My Government will initiate a program which will encourage the establishment of day care centres for children in certain of our major centres.

#### **Bus Fares**

My Government will propose a reduction in the rates of the Saskatchewan Transportation Company for Old Age Pensioners.

#### HIGHWAYS

Huge sums will be requested again for the construction and expansion of our provincial highway system.

Another major bridge over the South Saskatchewan River will be commenced during 1970.

To facilitate the development of our northern resources, the construction of roads in the North is being expedited.

Assistance to municipalities for expansion and maintenance of their road system will again be emphasized.

#### INDIAN AND METIS

It is noted with gratification that the native people of Saskatchewan are indicating a renewed pride and confidence in themselves, and a strong sense of common purpose.

The provincial Indian and Metis Department, established by my Government last year, has made progress in attacking the many problems facing our native people.

In co-operation with the Indian Task Force, many job opportunities have been made available to native workers.

However, it must be realized that only a modest start has yet been made. During the past year improvements were made on the Cumberland House, Lebret and Green Lake Training Farms.

The establishment of new training farms at La Loche, Ile-a-la-Crosse, and Mortlach was undertaken and will proceed during 1970.

My Government believes that the problems of our native population must continue to be given a top priority, and you will be asked for sharply increased appropriations for these programs.

#### MECHANICS' LIEN ACT

Over the years many problems have been encountered, resulting from certain inadequacies and deficiencies in our Mechanics' Lien Act.

You will be asked to approve an entirely new Mechanics' Lien Act which is designed to meet the many problems encountered in this area and to reflect a new approach to this very important aspect of the commercial life of our province.

#### VOLUNTARY PAYMENT OF FINES

You will be asked to approve amendments enabling persons charged with Vehicles Act Offences to make voluntary payments of fines through the mails, thus avoiding loss of time for Court appearances to the offender and resulting in increased efficiency in our courts.

The Public Accounts for the last fiscal year, together with the Estimates for the year beginning April 1, 1970, will be submitted to you.

I leave you now to the business of the Session with full confidence that you will favourably discharge your duties and responsibilities.

May Divine Providence continue to bless our province and guide this Legislature in all its deliberations.

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor then retired from the Chamber.

#### PRAYERS:

Mr. Speaker informed the Assembly that Gordon Leslie Barnhart, Esquire, had been appointed Clerk of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan, in place of Charles Beverley Koester, Esquire, Resigned.

And also that Michael Arthur de Rosenroll, Esquire, had been appointed Clerk-Assistant during the present Session.

Mr. Speaker informed the Assembly that the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly had received from the Chief Electoral Officer:—

A certificate of the following election and return, viz.:

Of Neil Erland Byers, Esquire, as Member for the Constituency of Kelvington. (Sessional Paper No. 1)

Neil Erland Byers, Esquire, Member for the Constituency of Kelvington, having previously taken the Oath, according to law, and subscribed the Roll containing the same, took his seat in the Assembly.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Thatcher have leave to introduce a Bill respecting the Administration of Oaths of Office.

He accordingly presented the said Bill, and the same was received and read the first time.

Mr. Speaker then informed the Assembly that, in order to prevent mistakes, he had obtained a copy of the Speech of His Honour the Lieutenant Governor, which was laid on the Table.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Thatcher, seconded by the Hon. Mr. Heald:

Ordered, That the Speech of His Honour the Lieutenant Governor be taken into consideration on Wednesday next.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Thatcher, seconded by the Hon. Mr. Heald:

Ordered, That the Votes and Proceedings of this Assembly be printed after having first been perused by Mr. Speaker; that he do appoint the printing thereof, and that no person but such as he shall appoint do presume to print the same.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Thatcher, seconded by the Hon. Mr. Heald:

Ordered, That *Messieurs* Heald, Guy, Larochelle, Snyder and Michayluk be constituted a Select Special Committee to prepare and report, with all convenient speed, lists of Members to compose the Select Standing Committees of this Assembly, provided under Standing Order 50;

That the said Select Standing Committees be severally empowered to examine and inquire into all such matters and things as may be referred to them by this Assembly, and to report from time to time their observations thereon; with power to send for persons, papers and records, and to examine witnesses under oath.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Thatcher, seconded by Mr. Lloyd, by leave of the Assembly:

Ordered, That when this House adjourns on Friday, February 13, 1970, it do stand adjourned until Wednesday, February 18, 1970.

The Assembly then adjourned at 3:26 p.m.

Mr. Speaker laid before the Assembly, pursuant to Standing Order 105, the report of the Legislative Librarian dated February 9, 1970, which is as follows:—

#### REPORT OF THE LEGISLATIVE LIBRARIAN

REGINA, FEBRUARY 9, 1970.

To the Honourable

The Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan.

Sir:

I have the honour to submit to you the Annual Report of the Legislative Library.

The program of the Legislative Library during 1969 was in virtually all respects identical to that of previous years, namely the maintaining of a well-balanced, properly serviced reference and research collection to meet the needs of Members of the Legislative Assembly. Of course, the Library continued to offer its services to members of the general public insofar as this extension of service did not interfere with the Library's primary function of serving the Legislative Assembly. As a part of its program the Library acquired a broad range of government publications, reference books, periodicals, newspapers and books. Following the practice of recent years the books and pamphlets acquired were restricted largely to those relating to the fields of law, Canadian public affairs, the social sciences, and to material relating to the province of Saskatchewan.

Two members of the Library staff were engaged in the program of indexing significant articles in the daily newspapers of Regina, Saskatoon, Prince Albert and Moose Jaw. This program, which was initiated by the Legislative Library almost thirty years ago, has proven to be of considerable value to this Library and to the many Saskatchewan and Canadian Libraries that have been receiving copies of the index compilations during the past years. However, in order to remain up-to-date and of maximum utility to its users, an index of this type must be revised from time to time. A major revision is a time-consuming task, and the Library with its small staff has not, unfortunately, always been able to keep abreast of this necessary chore during recent years. Consequently, during the past months several of the Library staff have devoted considerable time and effort to a full-scale revision of the index subject-headings. As a result, although the task is far from completed, we believe that the next four-year compilation of the newspaper index, which will be issued during 1970, will be superior to those of previous years. At the same time the Library has continued to cooperate closely with the Regina office of the Saskatchewan Archives Board in the program of acquiring and microfilming all Saskatchewan weekly newspapers, and in servicing the joint Legislative Library-Archives Public Documents Centre on the University of Saskatchewan's Regina Campus.

The Public Documents Centre, as indicated in a previous Annual Report for the Legislative Library, was established as a centre to which could be transferred government publications, back-files of newspapers, periodicals, and other materials that are of permanent research value, but of little current value to Members of the Legislative Assembly. The purpose of the centre was to make such material more readily available to researchers in the university community and the general public, and — more immediately — to alleviate the critical lack of storage space which confronted the Library at that time.

Unfortunately, although the Public Documents Centre has proven to be quite successful during the past two years, the lack of stack space for Library materials within the Legislative Building has remained critical, and, there appears to be little hope that the situation will improve. During 1969 the Library's basement stack area, which had been located in the east wing of the building in poorly lighted, ill-ventilated and dirty quarters was transferred to a new, freshly renovated area within the basement. Although we are more than grateful for the much improved conditions that prevail in the new quarters, the total floor space of the new area is less than half of that of the old quarters. As a result the Library has been required to transfer additional materials to the Documents Centre, and we have donated to the University Library a large portion of our back files of periodicals, scholarly journals, and many books.

It is with great regret that we contemplate the transfer of any part of our collection to the University Library in Regina, or other public institutions within the province, for the Legislative Library—small though it is—by virtue of its age and the collection it has acquired through its lifetime has been one of the finest libraries in the province for many years. Yet, with the establishment in the city of a major research institution such as the University Library there is no doubt that the Legislative Library's role should, henceforth, be confined more strictly to that of meeting the immediate needs of Members of the Assembly rather than that of attempting to maintain an in-depth general research collection. Doubtlessly, the Library during the coming years will find it necessary to continue reducing the size of many portions of its present collection.

The following statistics indicate the general level of usage of the Library, excluding the many items borrowed for use on the premises. It should also be noted that these statistics do not indicate the level of usage of Library materials in the Public Documents Centre.

JOHN WESLEY CORMAN, who died on April 29, 1969, was a Member of this Legislature for Moose Jaw City from 1944 to 1956. He was born in Stoney Creek, Ontario. He graduated from the University of Toronto in 1912 with a degree in Political Science. He studied law and was called to the bar in 1915. He was elected to Moose Jaw City Council as an Alderman in 1938 and elected Mayor in 1940. In 1944, he was appointed Attorney General, and Minister in charge of the Local Government Board, Provincial Mediation Board and Administrator of Estates of the Mentally Incompetent Office.

Tom Johnston, who died on September 11, 1969, was a Member of this Legislature for Touchwood from 1938 to 1956. He was Speaker of the Legislature from 1944 to 1956. He was born in Birmingham, England in 1881 and received his education there. He came to Canada in 1901. He homesteaded near Cymric, Saskatchewan in 1903. In 1929-30, he was a Member of a Provincial Royal Commission on Immigration and Settlement. In 1950 he represented the Saskatchewan Branch of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association at the General Conference in New Zealand.

WILLIAM PEDERSEN, who died on January 31, 1970, was a Member of this Legislature for Milestone from 1934 to 1944. He was born in Rorbeck, Iowa, United States of America in 1883. He came to Canada in 1907. He received his education at Clay Township School, Commercial College at Des Moines, Iowa and also the Agricultural College, Ames, Iowa. He was a farmer and breeder of Aberdeen Angus cattle. He was the Secretary of the Caledonia School District; Councillor for the Rural Municipality of Caledonia, 1916 to 1925; Reeve, 1925 to 1934; President of the Grain Growers Local Milestone for three years; President of the Milestone Agricultural Society for three years and President of the Saskatchewan Aberdeen Angus Association. He was a Mason and a Member of the Scottish Rite.

In recording its own deep sense of loss and bereavement, this Assembly expresses its most sincere sympathies with members of the bereaved families.

Your Committee met for organization and appointed Mr. Meakes as its Chairman, Mr. Mitchell as its Vice-Chairman, and Mr. T. C. Wakeling of the Law Firm of McDougall, Ready, Wakeling, Youck and Evans as Counsel to the Committee.

Your Committee has examined Saskatchewan Regulations 1/69 to 334/69, a total of 334 Regulations, thus completing its scrutiny up to December 31, 1969. Of this total, your Committee considered 23 Regulations drawn specifically to its attention by Counsel, and it sent to the authorities who made the Regulations comments on nine of these Regulations, inviting them to submit explanatory memoranda should they see fit. Six replies have been received and considered by the Committee; three remain to be reported on by the authorities. Your Committee does not wish at this time to draw the special attention of the Assembly to any Regulation on the grounds set out in its terms of reference.

### STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER

In connection with the Motion of the Member for Touchwood, moved on March 3rd, which proposes to amend Resolution No. 1, I would draw attention of all Hon. Members to the fact that a Motion which passes becomes an order of the House and all Resolutions must be considered in that light.

The amendment urges the Federal Government and the Provincial Government of Saskatchewan to take certain steps which, in the case of subsection (d) would require an expenditure of provincial funds.

I draw attention of all Hon. Members to Beauchesne's Parliamentary Rules and Forms, Citation 249, which says in part: "No principle is better understood than the constitutional obligation that rests upon the executive government, of alone initiating measures imposing charges upon the public exchequer."

Citation 260, subsection 1, further states: "The tendency has been in the Canadian House of Commons, for the past twenty-five years, to rule out all motions purporting to give the Government a direct order to do a thing which cannot be done without the expenditure of money. Our Journals are full of precedents to this effect."

The Journals of this Assembly contain many instances of rulings in connection with Bills and Resolutions which infringed the prerogative of the Government of the day to be the sole arbitrator of increased expenditures.

I refer Members to the Journals of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Saskatchewan, March 30th, 1965, pages 161, 162, 163 and 164; March 24th, 1966, pages 192, 193 and 194; November 30th, 1920, page 70; February 15th, 1939, pages 91 and 93; March 6th, 1947, page 91 and March 11th, 1947, page 99.

Students of procedure might also be interested in Erskine May's Parliamentary Practice, pages 779 to 783.

I wish now to draw the attention of all Hon. Members to Beauchesne's *Parliamentary Rules and Forms*, Citation 251, subsection 4, which states as follows: "Private members may introduce resolutions that do not directly involve the expenditure of public money and have no operative effect but simply express an abstract opinion on a matter which may necessitate a future grant."

An abstract resolution does not finally bind the House to make a grant, and it imposes upon the Government the responsibility, and also grants the privilege of either accepting or rejecting the recommendation.

Whether or not this particular amendment is in order hinges upon the definition of the word "urge". The Oxford dictionary gives the following definition: "Drive forcibly, impel, hasten, cause to proceed with effort". I consider the word "urge" as used in the context of the amendment to be mandatory, and that it neither implies recommendation or consideration of the proposed course of action.

I further draw the attention of all Hon. Members to the fact that any irregularity of any portion of a Motion renders the whole Motion irregular. (See Beauchesne's Citation 199.)

However, in the light of the foregoing, although in my opinion the Member's Motion is out of order, it would appear that only a slight change is needed in the wording to bring it into order.

I would draw attention to a Ruling made by Mr. Speaker Johnson as recorded in the *Journals of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Saskatchewan*, March 5th, 1952, page 125, where, when faced with a similar and analogous situation, he did by leave of the Assembly, alter the wording of a Motion in order to make it conform to the accepted form of Private Members' Motions involving the expenditure of money.

Perhaps the Assembly would now wish to extend the same courtesy to the Member from Touchwood which was extended to an Opposition Member at the suggestion of Mr. Speaker Johnson in 1952, and if the Assembly gives such leave, the Chair will change the wording of subsection (d) by striking out the word "extend" in the first sentence and substituting therefor the words "consider the extension of".

Leave being granted, the amendment was amended accordingly.

## STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER

I would now draw your attention to Resolution No. 6 standing on the Orders of the Day in the name of the Member for Kelsey, and everything which the Chair had to say in connection with the amendment to Resolution No. 1 applies, in my opinion, to this Motion, and accordingly the Chair is again, by leave, prepared to apply the same remedy by inserting the words "to consider" after the word "Saskatchewan" and before the word "and" in the first line.

I wish to advise the Assembly that by taking the foregoing action in these two specific cases, it is not to be considered that the Chair is establishing a custom, continuing practice, or assuming an obligation.

Leave being granted, the Resolution was amended accordingly.

## STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER

In connection with Resolution No. 7 standing on the Orders of the Day in the name of the Member for Prince Albert East Cumberland, I would draw the attention of all Hon. Members to the Rule of Anticipation concerning Motions, which is to be found on page 399 of Erskine May's Parliamentary Practice, the pertinent passage of which is as follows: "Stated generally, the rule against anticipation (which applies to other proceedings as well as motions) is that a matter must not be anticipated if it is contained in a more effective form of proceeding than the proceeding by which it is sought to be anticipated but it may be anticipated if it is contained in an equally or less effective form. A bill or other order of the day is more effective than a motion."

Beauchesne's Parliamentary Rules and Forms, Citation 131, states: "The Anticipation rule, which forbids discussion of a matter standing on the Paper being forestalled, is dependent on the same principle as that which forbids the same question being twice raised in the same session. In applying the Anticipation rule, preference is given to the discussions which lead to the most effective result, and this has established a descending scale of values for discussions—Bills, Motions, Amendments, etc. Thus a Bill must not be anticipated by (or more shortly "block") discussion of a motion, amendment, or subject raised on another motion." From the foregoing it follows that the most effective form of procedure supersedes the less effective.

The subject matter of the Petition in Resolution No. 7 is, in the opinion of the Chair, now contained in Bill No. 39, and the Bill being a more effective form of procedure than the Resolution, the Resolution of the Member for Prince Albert East Cumberland is, therefore, out of order.

The Order of the Day being called for Resolution (No. 3) it was moved by Mr. Leith, seconded by Mr. Hooker:

That the Legislature of Saskatchewan urge the Canadian Wheat Board and the Government of Canada to take all necessary steps, including all necessary legislative amendments, to keep the 1968-69 Durum pool account separate from all other grain accounts and to ensure that all surplus earnings from the sale of Durum be paid to the producers of Durum.

A debate arising, the said motion was, by leave of the Assembly, with-drawn.

The Order of the Day being called for Resolution (No. 5) it was moved by Mr. Davies, seconded by Mr. Smishek:

That this Assembly urgently recommends to the consideration of the Government of Saskatchewan, action by which the present high, and anticipated higher, levels of unemployment in the Province may be substantially reduced through such means as (1) Publicly financed, or financially assisted, projects for low-cost housing, and to provide schools, hospitals, pollution control, parks and recreation expansion; (2) The improving of labour standards legislation, and the effecting of policies that would augment the buying power of thousands of people on low incomes, as well as to increase employment of many others in the community; (3) The maximum use of available special programs with respect to industrial development and the provision of technical and vocational training.

A debate arising, it was on motion of the Hon. Mr. Heald, adjourned.

The Order of the Day being called for Resolution (No. 8) it was moved by Mr. Brockelbank, seconded by Mr. Whelan:

That this Assembly recommends to the consideration of the Government the introduction of legislation to establish an independent electoral boundaries commission similar in principle to the ones established in Mani-

toba and Alberta charged with the responsibility of drawing Saskatchewan's electoral boundaries based primarily on the principle of representation by population.

A debate arising, it was on motion of Mr. Heggie, adjourned.

The Order of the Day being called for Resolution (No. 10) it was moved by Mr. Whelan, seconded by Mr. Romanow:

- (f) Postpone payments on crown lease rental payments and on payments for land purchased from the crown.
- (g) Prevent seizures of farmers' production machinery.
- (h) Make immediate and strong representations to the Federal Government to:
  - (1) forestall business bankruptcies in rural communities;
  - (2) update and rewrite the Farmers Creditors Arrangements Act;
  - (3) provide protection for Saskatchewan people who have loans under the National Housing Act, Veterans Land Act, Farm Improvement Loan Act, and Farm Credit Corporation.

A debate arising, it was on motion of the Hon. Mr. MacDonald, adjourned.

### PRAYERS:

Mr. Wood, from the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts and Printing, presented the Final Report of the said Committee which is as follows:

- 1. Your Committee held 16 meetings and examined both the Auditor's Report and the Public Accounts for the year ended March 31, 1969, with the Provincial Auditor, two of his officers, the Comptroller of the Treasury and other Treasury officials in attendance.
- 2. The accounts of the following Departments were examined with the chief officers of the Departments in attendance:

Department of the Provincial Secretary Department of Municipal Affairs Municipal Road Assistance Authority Department of Welfare Department of Public Health

In addition, the chief officers of the Department of the Attorney General were interviewed in regard to items Nos. 14, 15 and 16 as they appear in the Provincial Auditor's Report. All information requested from the Departments by the Committee was provided.

- 3. In his report of this year to the Legislature, your Provincial Auditor recommended that in the interest of sound financial administration, a consolidated edition of Treasury Board Regulations be printed and made available to all Departments and Agencies of the Government that may be affected thereby. Such recommendations have repeatedly been made by the Provincial Auditor in the past and the Treasury has advised that substantial progress has been made in this direction.
  - However, as yet no such up-dated Treasury Board Regulations have been published. While we recognize the difficulties encountered in obtaining qualified personnel to do this work, we wish to reiterate our recommendation of former years that the Treasury endeavour to give earnest consideration to the completion of this project.
- 4. In his report to the Legislature this year your Provincial Auditor said that it is the practice in this province that the payment of fees for the filing of certain legal documents in Court Houses is indicated by affixing "Law Stamps" which are sold to the public by the Attorney General's staff responsible for the collection of the revenue. He also pointed out that one of the great weaknesses of the use of Law Stamps in this way is the ease with which stamps, which may not be properly cancelled, can be removed from old documents in the files and used a second time.

By correspondence with other Provincial Auditors across Canada, your Provincial Auditor has ascertained that in other provinces, the trend seems to be away from the use of Law Stamps. Two of the Auditors queried, gave reasons for curtailing the use of such stamps which were virtually the same as those outlined by your Provincial Auditor in his report.

Your Provincial Auditor also stated in his report that he was unable to find any formal authority for the use of Law Stamps.

Your Committee is aware that there are features of the use of Law Stamps which are advantageous, but feels that if some other satisfactory method of collecting the fees in question can be devised, their use should be curtailed. If their use is continued, your Committee recommends that control procedures be intensified and that their use be recognized and authorized by legislation.

5. In his report, the Provincial Auditor pointed out that the Land Titles Act, Chapter 115 R.S.S. 1965, section 233 (1) states in part that:

"before the registrar performs any duty under this Act, he shall, except as herein otherwise provided, demand and receive the proper fees therefor, as fixed by a tariff to be made by the Lieutenant Governor in Council".

In their examination of the accounting records of a number of Land Titles Offices, the auditors had noted failure to ensure, before work was performed, that the prescribed fees or that sufficient fees were collected as required by the section of the Act quoted.

When the Department of the Attorney General appeared before the Committee, the Deputy Attorney General made what we considered to be a good case for the continuation of the procedures presently practiced by that department in this regard. Your Committee would therefore recommend that the legislation be changed to make these procedures legal.

- 6. In the perusal of Public Accounts and the Auditor's departmental reports, your Committee noted a wide variation in the financial reporting of the various Trust Accounts. Your Committee would recommend more detail and uniformity in the reporting of trust accounts under the control of Government departments.
- 7. This year's Provincial Auditor's Report presented in some detail a summary of the authority provided for the 16 advance accounts operated by various Government departments. While these accounts are all operated under satisfactory Treasury supervision using accepted accounting methods, guide lines for control and auditing are in many cases seriously lacking. Your Committee recommends that steps be taken to remedy this situation and would suggest that such be initiated by the Departments concerned.
- 8. The Province of Saskatchewan has for many years followed a practice of budgeting and accounting on a net basis, that is, certain revenues are estimated and recorded as reductions of expenditure rather than as items

of revenue. In the opinion of the Committee this practice makes the Estimates and Accounts difficult to interpret. Your Committee recommends consideration be given to budgeting and accounting on a gross basis.

- 9. Your Committee is of the opinion that its Members can increase their value to the Legislature as they become better acquainted with the financial procedures involved in the carrying out of Government business. We would thus recommend that continuity of membership on the Committee be maintained as much as possible during the life of a Legislature.
- 10. Your Committee has considered the matter of sessional printing and recommends as follows:
  - (a) That 350 copies of the Journals be printed, including therewith the "Questions and Answers" as an appendix;
  - (b) That 400 copies of the Debates and Proceedings be multilithed with all convenient speed, one copy each to be supplied to Members of the Assembly; and,
  - (c) That 100 copies of the Minutes and Verbatim Report of Proceedings of the Public Accounts Committee be multilithed with all convenient speed, one copy each to be supplied to Members of the Assembly.
- 11. Your Committee advises that copies of the Minutes and Verbatim Report of Proceedings of the Public Accounts Committee will be tabled as a Sessional Paper.

Your Committee met for organization and appointed Mr. Leith as Chairman and Mr. Radloff as Vice-Chairman.

Having duly examined the Annual Reports and Financial Statements for the last completed fiscal year of the various Crown Corporations and related Agencies, as referred to it from time to time by the Assembly, Your Committee has satisfied itself that they reflect the true state of the Corporations and Agencies to which they severally relate, as operated in accordance with Government policy.

In conducting its examination, Your Committee interrogated the responsible Ministers, who attended with the Chief Officers of the respective Corporations and Agencies, no restrictions being placed upon questions asked within the Order of Reference, save and except questions, the answers to which, in the opinion of the responsible Ministers, might disclose information contrary to the public interest or prejudicial to the commercial positions of the Corporation or Agency concerned.

Your Committee recommends that, except where otherwise provided by statute, Crown corporations pay grants in lieu of municipal taxes equal to the taxes which they would be required to pay if they were private commercial undertakings.

This Committee recommends to the Legislature that it be reduced in number from 29 to 20 members and that membership on the Committee other than the Chairman and Vice-Chairman be transferable by assignment from one Member of the Legislature to another, such assignment to consist of written notice to the Chairman.

  - (3) provide protection for Saskatchewan people who have loans under the National Housing Act, Veterans Land Act, Farm Improvement Loan Act, and Farm Credit Corporation.

#### STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER

I wish to express the following opinion in connection with Resolution No. 8 standing in the name of the Member for Saskatoon Mayfair.

This Resolution in essence recommends the establishment of an independent electoral boundaries commission (similar to ones already established in the Provinces of Alberta and Manitoba) for the purpose of recommending electoral boundaries based on the principle of representation by population.

I now wish to draw the attention of all Hon. Members to the amendment to Bill No. 86 moved by the Member for Saskatoon Riversdale. The said amendment, in order, to achieve, in his view, representation by population, sought to have the Bill aforesaid referred to an independent commission not as yet established, but the establishment of which was implied, similar to one established in the Province of Manitoba. This question was debated and decided on Wednesday last.

Both the motion and the amendment sought to achieve similar results by similar means in support of a similar objective.

I wish to draw the attention of all Hon. Members to Sir Erskine May's Parliamentary Practice, 17th edition, page 396:

A motion or an amendment may not be brought forward which is the same, in substance, as a question which has been decided in the affirmative or negative during the current session. The rule may be fully stated as follows: No question, or Bill shall be offered in either House that is substantially the same as one on which its judgment has already been expressed in the current session.

Because, in my opinion, the Resolution of the Member for Saskatoon Mayfair is the same in substance as the amendment of the Member for Saskatoon Riversdale upon which the House has already expressed an opinion, I declare Resolution No. 8 to be out of order.

Mr. Speaker then said:

## MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOUR:

This Legislative Assembly has voted the supplies required to enable the Government to defray the expenses of the Public Service. In the name of the Assembly I present to Your Honour the following Bill:—

"An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of Money for the Public Service of the Fiscal Years ending respectively the Thirty-first day of March, 1970, and the Thirty-first day of March, 1971."

to which Bill I respectfully request Your Honour's Assent.

The Royal Assent to this Bill was announced by the Clerk.

"In Her Majesty's name, His Honour the Lieutenant Governor doth thank the Legislative Assembly, accepts their benevolence and assents to this Bill."

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor was then pleased to deliver the following speech.

#### Mr. Speaker, Members of the Legislative Assembly:

It is my duty to relieve you of further attendance at this Legislative Assembly. In doing so, I wish to thank you for, and congratulate you on the work you have done. I wish also to express my confidence that the approval of the programs and plans presented to you will continue to provide the services necessary to the orderly growth and development of our province.

The legislation you have passed in this Third Session of the Sixteenth Legislature has been designed both to stabilize the development of those resources Providence has bestowed on us, and to secure an equitable distribution of the benefits of that development, for present and future generations of our citizens.

You have given approval to various measures designed to accelerate the diversification of our agricultural industry, and otherwise, to alleviate the grievous consequences to that industry of over supply on the one hand, and of inflation on the other.

You have agreed to legislation that will guarantee loans to farmers for the purchase of livestock breeding animals up to \$6,000 at the subsidized interest rate of 7% for the first three years.

You have agreed to remove the tax on farm fuel which will ensure a saving to our farmers of about \$4,000,000 a year.

You have approved measures that will extend the protection of the law to farmers so as to guarantee their equity in farm machinery purchased, and to dealers so as to provide them more security in their dealerships.

In keeping with the absolute priority my Government places upon our education programs, you have approved measures to counteract the ever-escalating cost of education, and at the same time have approved large new expenditures to make possible the further improvement of educational facilities throughout the province.

You have made possible the extension of education services to our handicapped children.

You have completed our program to provide free text books to high school students by the inclusion of all students in grade 12.

You have also approved the greatest expenditure in history for the continued expansion of the University of Saskatchewan.

You have agreed to give students on the Regina and Saskatoon campuses the right to elect members to the University Senate.

You have approved a significant increase in the present ceiling for the pensions of teachers.

You have approved legislation which will permit my Government to give financial assistance to municipalities in providing adequate police protection for their citizens.

You have also approved legislation supplementary to the "Federal Designated Area Legislation", which will provide grants of up to \$300,000 to manufacturing industries locating or expanding in communities under 35,000 in population.

You have agreed to increase the individual amount of the grants which are paid to home owners in this province.

In addition, being conscious of the high interest rates on mortgages, and high building costs, you have approved the payment of a \$500 grant to all home owners who will construct a home during the winter months.

You have agreed to measures which will permit the sharing of the property tax levied against oil and gas lines.

You have agreed to increase again the present ceiling on annual pension benefits for civil servants.

Similarly, you have approved further adjustments to the existing superannuation allowances for our pensioners and widows.

Recognizing that the vast majority of our young people are discharging effectively their responsibilities as citizens at an earlier age than twenty-one, you have approved a measure which provides that a person who has reached the age of nineteen is to be considered a legal adult, with all the additional responsibilities and privileges that accompany legal maturity.

You have given approval to extension measures designed to facilitate the conducting of the business of this House, and in general, to ensure the more effective representation of the people of Saskatchewan in their Legislative Assembly.

You have approved legislation permitting most important refinements in the adoption laws of our province.

Furthermore, you have agreed to increase the food and clothing allowance granted under the Saskatchewan Assistance Plan, and to initiate a program which will establish day care centres for children in certain of our larger communities.

You have approved the expenditure of major sums for the expansion of our highway system, especially in the far North, and to provide assistance to municipalities for the expansion and maintenance of their road systems.

You have approved grants of up to 50c per capita to help urban centres with snow removal.

In full awareness of the present setback to the Saskatchewan construction industry, you have approved a dramatic injection of \$20,000,000 for capital projects, the good consequences of which will multiply throughout our entire economy.

You have agreed to sharply increase appropriations for the worthwhile programs of our young Department of Indian and Metis Affairs.

And finally, recognizing the inordinately high costs of railway and freight services to the people of Saskatchewan, you have approved measures that may greatly ease the excessive burden which has heretofore been laid upon our people.

I thank you for the contribution you have made to meet the further requirements of the public service and assure you the sum of money voted will be used economically, prudently and in the public interest.

In taking leave of you, I desire to thank all the Members of this Assembly for the manner in which you have devoted your energies to the activities of the session and wish you the full blessing of Providence as you return again to your respective homes.

The Hon. Mr. Heald, Provincial Secretary, then said:

Mr. Speaker, and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

It is the will and pleasure of His Honour the Lieutenant Governor that this Legislative Assembly be prorogued until it pleases His Honour to summon the same for the dispatch of business, and the Legislative Assembly is accordingly prorogued.

His Honour then retired from the Chamber.
