3 o'clock p.m.

This being the day appointed by Proclamation of His Honour the Lieutenant Governor, dated the Twenty-fourth day of January, 1962, for the meeting of the Third Session of the Fourteenth Legislative Assembly of the Province of Saskatchewan, and the Assembly having met:

The Clerk of the Legislative Assembly informed the Assembly that he had received the following communication from the Hon. Everett Irvine Wood, Speaker of the Legislative Assembly:

Circumstances make it necessary that I ask the Legislative Assembly to allow me to retire from the Chair, a position which I have felt greatly honoured in occupying for the past two Sessions.

I have earnestly endeavoured to uphold the great traditions connected with the office, and if any success has been achieved therein it is because of the support and co-operation received from all the Members of the Assembly. Please convey to them my sincere thanks.

His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor entered the Chamber and took his seat upon the Throne.

The Hon. Mr. Walker, Provincial Secretary, then said:

"I am commanded by His Honour, the Lieutenant-Governor to inform you that he does not see fit to declare the causes of the sumoning of the present Legislature until later today, when the Legislative Assembly shall have elected a Speaker, according to law."

His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor then retired from the Chamber.

The Hon. Mr. Lloyd, addressing himself to the Clerk, moved seconded by the Hon. Mr. Brockelbank, that Frederick Arthur Dewhurst, Esquire, Member for the Constituency of Wadena, do take the Chair of this Assembly as Speaker.

The question being put by the Clerk, it was

Resolved, That Frederick Arthur Dewhurst, Esquire, do take the Chair of this Assembly as Speaker.

The Clerk having declared Frederick Arthur Dewhurst, Esquire, duly elected, he was conducted to the Chair, where, standing on the upper step, he returned his humble acknowledgements to the Assembly for the great honour they had been pleased to confer upon him by choosing him to be their Speaker.

Thereupon he took the Chair, and the Mace was laid on the Table.

3:15 o'clock p.m.

His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor re-entered the Chamber and took his seat upon the Throne.

Mr. Speaker then addressed His Honour to the following effect:-

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOUR:

The Legislative Assembly have elected me as their Speaker, although I am but little able to fulfil the important duties thus assigned to me.

If, in the performance of those duties, I should at any time fall into error I pray that the fault may be imputed to me and not to the Assembly whose servant I am.

The Hon. Mr. Walker, Provincial Secretary, then said:-

Mr. Speaker,—

I am commanded by His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor to declare to you that your words and actions will constantly receive from him the most favourable construction.

His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor was then pleased to open the Session with the following Speech:—

Mr. SPEAKER,

MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

IT IS MY PRIVILEGE to welcome you to the Third Session of the Fourteenth Legislature of Saskatchewan.

The rate at which the national economy expanded during 1961 was not significant. This resulted from a slowing down of capital investment in Canada, relative declines in consumer expenditures and crop failures in certain areas. The most important single feature which affected the economy of our Province last year was the failure of the 1961 harvest. Wheat yielded only 8.3 bushels per acre—the lowest per acre yield since 1937. Net farm income was less than one-half the 1960 figure. Higher Canada Wheat Board and Prairie Farm Assistance payments and substantially larger livestock marketings accounted for an increase in farm cash income.

The almost total failure of the hay crop required emergency action to be taken. Special incentive payments were made to encourage the harvesting of cereal crops for fodder. A programme to assist farmers to transport haying equipment, fodder and feed grain was initiated. As a result there was no serious liquidation of cattle herds. My Government appreciates the co-operation of the farmers, local government officials and the publicity media as well as the financial contribution made by the Government of Canada.

Indications of the growth of the non-farm sector of the provincial economy are plentiful. New industries were established. Expansion of a number of established companies took place. Manufacturing output was well above the level reached the previous year. The total value of mineral production increased. The Saskatchewan Power Corporation met the increased demand from home and industry for more electric power and more gas. Electrical generating output increased by more than twenty-one per cent. Thirty per cent more natural gas was consumed. More than nine thousand new telephone installations were made.

Saskatchewan has not escaped the impact of chronic unemployment which has plagued Canada in recent years. Although there are fewer persons in Saskatchewan unemployed than there were one year ago, some twenty-seven thousand of our labour force are without work. Far-reaching action on the part of the Government of Canada is needed to create employment in all regions. My Government has deliberately followed, wherever possible, a policy of creating and maintaining general employment. It has attempted to alleviate the hardships which unemployment imposes on families and children. Government construction contracts provide for work to carry on during winter

months. Community work creating campaigns are encouraged and assisted. Municipalities have been urged to take advantage of financial assistance available for the construction of public works projects in off-season periods. Technical and vocational training facilities have been expanded. Additional classes have been established to enable unemployed workers to improve their educational qualifications.

The past year has seen notable advances in the development of our natural resources. Excellent progress has been made on the South Saskatchewan River Project. Construction of the main dam and reservoir proceeds on schedule. Detailed planning of the most suitable land for irrigation development is advancing. Plans for the development of the five hundred mile reservoir shoreline for recreation and other purposes are receiving attention. Proposals for further substantial provincial investments in this multi-purpose project will be submitted for your approval.

Emphasis continues to be placed on the conservation and development of our agricultural resources. Additional community pastures have been established. Additional acreage has been prepared for irrigation projects. To meet a water shortage emergency special crews were engaged to locate sources of water and to fill farm and municipal water reservoirs. You will be asked to approve amendments to the Department of Agriculture Act to facilitate the study of prospective water development projects.

The Roads to Resources Programme has been responsible for the opening up of resource areas. The Otosquen Road will be completed this year. The Lake Hanson Road is now open to winter travel. During the past year the Governments of Saskatchewan and Canada shared the cost of an aeromagnetic survey over nineteen thousand square miles at the north end of our Province. This programme will continue on the same co-operative basis.

More than a million acres of forest land were ravaged in the worst fire season experienced in our history. Timber operators are co-operating in salvaging some thirty-five million board feet of timber damaged in the fires.

The growth and development of our Province has demanded the further improvement and extension of highway and municipal roads. At the present time approximately sixty-five per cent of provincial highway traffic is carried on dust-free roads. Through the Municipal Grid Road Programme, Rural Municipalities have received assistance to construct more than seven thousand miles of all weather roads. New regulations fixing higher load limits for trucks will improve the efficiency of the trucking industry.

Rural Saskatchewan has become a better place in which to live. The electrification of farm homes and smaller communities has contributed more than any other single programme to increasing the standard of living of people in the rural areas. Few farms enjoyed the use of electric power when this programme began in 1949. Today electricity is available to virtually all occupied farms in the settled portions of the Province.

One hundred and twelve communities have been served with natural gas. Provision will be made to extend the gas system to serve additional communities.

Materials and services required for water and sewer systems were made available to almost three thousand five hundred farmers under provisions of the Family Farm Improvement Programme. In 1961 twenty-six urban communities were assisted in the installation of community water and sewer systems.

The programme to improve and modernize telephone service advanced further in 1961. Grants available from the Province enabled rural telephone companies to improve their standard of maintenance and to replace existing lines. A revised Rural Telephone Act will be presented for your consideration and approval.

Emphasis continues to be placed on providing additional and improved recreational areas in the Province. Plans for the further development of newly created provincial parks will be submitted for your approval. During the past year over one hundred municipalities participated in the establishment of fourteen Regional Parks. You will be asked to appropriate funds which will continue to assist in the development of local recreational areas. Amendments to The Provincial Parks and Protected Areas Act will be introduced.

The co-operative movement continues to grow and serve the needs of the people of Saskatchewan. Of special interest is the growth of co-operative activity in the northern part of the Province. Last year forty-four co-operatives and credit unions in this area did a combined sales and service business in excess of two-million dollars. Good progress is being made in the transfer to co-operative ownership of provincially owned fish filleting plants and trading stores in the north.

Credit Unions continue to expand. The twenty-fifth anniversary of the establishment of the Credit Union movement in Saskatchewan will be observed this year. Congratulations are due to those leaders and members who have made it possible for this movement to grow and to contribute so much to our Province. A new Credit Union Act will be introduced for your consideration.

My Government has decided to proceed with development of boundaries for the use of all units of local government. In developing policies on local government, the Province has worked closely with the Saskatchewan Association of Rural Municipalities, the Saskatchewan Urban Municipalities Association and the Saskatchewan School Trustees Association, all represented on the Local Government Council. Legislation relating to new forms of local government will be introduced.

In recognition of the increasing standards and costs of education you will be asked to vote a larger sum than ever before for school grants. The Legislature will be asked to approve plans to maintain the Grade Twelve Scholarship and the Teachers' Scholarship programmes. Provision will be made for the erection of additional modern school buildings in Northern Saskatchewan.

With the continued expansion of the Province's resources skilled tradesmen and technicians are required in greater numbers. The Government is taking advantage of assistance under the Federal-Provincial Technical and Vocational Training Agreement to meet this need by developing new programmes and facilities. Greater attention will be given to the need for vocational training in agriculture.

My Government is continuing to give strong emphasis to the importance of preventive medicine and public health services. The entire area of the Province is now being served by full-time public health personnel.

Saskatchewan's mental health programmes have resulted in the modernization of mental hospitals, the establishment of training schools for mental defectives and the addition of psychiatric wards and mental health clinics to certain general hospitals. Important psychiatric research supported in large part by government funds is being carried out at the University. This record of achievement has had international recognition and has gained for our Province a reputation as a leader in the field of mental health.

During the public hearings in Saskatchewan of the Royal Commission appointed by the Government of Canada to examine the need for health services, my Government urged the establishment of a federal programme for the provision of comprehensive health services including the provision of medical care benefits on a prepaid insurance basis.

The Saskatchewan Medical Care Insurance Commission was appointed early in January and is proceeding as expeditiously as possible with preparations for the introduction of a plan of medical care insurance. This plan will represent an important social advance for our people.

Saskatchewan welcomes the increase which has been granted to recipients of the Old Age Security pension. Provision will be made to share the payments of Old Age Assistance, Blind Persons' Allowance and Disabled Persons' Allowances up to an amount of sixty-five dollars for those persons eligible.

The Province, through construction and maintenance grants, continues to assist local organizations to provide adequate housing for their senior citizens. At the beginning of this year there was accommodation in self-contained housing units and hostels for nearly four thousand persons. Construction had been started on additional projects providing similar accommodation.

The second report of the Royal Commission appointed by the Government of Canada to study transportation problems has been made public. This report will be studied in detail in order to ascertain the effect which changes recommended by the Commission would have on Saskatchewan. To assist in this study the Government will seek the co-operation of farm organizations, the co-operative movement, the business community and local governments.

During the past year the Government, the University of Saskatchewan and the City of Regina engaged the services of a renowned Architect-Planner to prepare a proposal for the development of approximately one thousand acres surrounding Wascana Lake in our Capital City. This proposal provides a unique concept for an area for government, education, recreation and the cultural arts. Legislation will be introduced at this Session to establish a Wascana Centre Authority to implement these proposals.

Saskatchewan will celebrate its sixtieth anniversary in 1965. In 1967 our nation will celebrate its centennial year. These are occasions which the people of Saskatchewan will wish again to commemorate the achievements of the past on which an even greater future can be built. Legislation will be introduced establishing a committee to assist and encourage the adequate observance of these events.

It is gratifying to note that the possibility of establishing a grid for the long distance transmission of electric energy from one province to another is to be the subject of a conference involving the Governments of Canada and the Provinces. Saskatchewan's proposals in this field, which have been formulated over the past several years, together with the experience acquired in exchanging power with Manitoba, will be made available to this conference.

As the area of public activity increases there are occasions when all levels of government must acquire an interest in property owned by the individual citizen. In some cases resort must be had to the machinery of expropriation many procedures of which have remained basically unchanged since constitutional government was first established. My Government proposes to review these procedures during the next year, and in doing so will seek to enlist the co-operation of various professional and community organizations with a view to evolving uniform and fair procedures for determining and protecting the property rights of the individual citizen, when expropriation becomes necessary.

The Mechanics' Lien Act was first passed in the Province in 1907. My Government believes that it is now appropriate to review this legislation in the light of modern economic conditions. The Honourable Harold F. Thomson has been commissioned to hold hearings on this question and to formulate recommendations.

My Government has taken part in a series of conferences with the Government of Canada and the other provinces for the purpose of seeking a means of amending our constitution in Canada. It is hoped that some mutually acceptable formula can be devised to make this possible. My Government views these negotiations as an opportunity and a challenge to devise a constitutional framework which will guarantee human rights, give due recognition of the two cultures in Canada, and upon which we can build social and economic progress .

My Government believes that any proposal to incorporate a new amending formula into our Constitution should be made known as widely as possible among the citizens of our country and should be proceeded with only after they have had ample opportunity to consider and discuss such proposals.

For the second year in succession My Government has introduced a new technique for obtaining capital for its construction programmes. Each week the Province is selling one million dollars of ninety-one day Treasury Bills, the first time that any Canadian province has undertaken the regular issue and sale of such securities. The Province will repeat in 1962 the sale of Saskatchewan Savings Bonds.

The Public Accounts for the last fiscal year, together with estimates for the year beginning April 1, 1962 will be submitted.

I leave you now to the business of the Session with full confidence that you will favourably discharge your duties and responsibilities. May Divine Providence continue to bless our Province and guide the Legislature in all its deliberations.

He accordingly presented the said Bill, and the same was received and read the first time.

Mr. Speaker then informed the Assembly that, in order to prevent mistakes, he had obtained a copy of the Speech of His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor, which was laid on the Table.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Lloyd, seconded by Mr. McDonald:

Resolved, That this Assembly records with sorrow and regret, the passing during the last year of five former Members of this Assembly, and expresses its grateful appreciation of the contributions each made to his community, his constituency, and to this Province:

CHARLES AGAR, former Member for Hanley Constituency, who died in Saskatoon on January 4, 1962. He was born in Belfast, Ontario in 1882, and moved west in 1905, settling briefly in Vermilion, Alberta, and Brandon, Manitoba, before making his home at Floral where he farmed. Mr. Agar sat in this Assembly from 1921 until 1944 and served as Speaker of the Ninth Legislature from 1939 until 1944. He was also a director of the Saskatoon Exhibition Board for many years, being president of that board in 1934 and 1935.

THE RIGHT HONOURABLE JAMES GARFIELD GARDINER, P.C., a Member of this Assembly from 1914 until 1935, twice Premier of this Province, and Minister of Agriculture in the Federal Government for twenty-two years, died in Balcarres on January 12, 1962. Mr. Gardiner was born in Farquhar, Ontario, in 1883. He moved west in 1901 settling finally at Lemberg. He farmed, taught school, and continued his own education, receiving the degree of Bachelor of Arts from Manitoba College in 1911. In 1914 Mr. Gardiner began a political career which was to last some forty-four years during which time he served the people of Saskatchewan as a Member of this Assembly, as Minister of Highways and Minister in charge of the Bureau of Labour and Industries, as Leader of the Opposition, and as Premier. Mr. Gardiner was appointed Minister of Agriculture in the Federal Government in 1935, a post he held until 1957. He was a Member of the House of Commons from 1936 until 1958 and was appointed to the Imperial Privy Council in 1947. Throughout his long career his interest in western agriculture never faltered, and the Prairie Farm Assistance Act, and the Prairie Farm Rehabilitation Act will remain among the many projects with which his name is connected.

ROBERT JAMES GORDON, a Member of this Legislature for the Constituency of Lloydminster from 1917 to 1934 who died in Saskatoon on December 1, 1961. He was born and educated at Nairn, Ontario; he homesteaded in the Tramping Lake district and farmed at Maidstone; he was Reeve of Eldon Municipality, Chairman of the Maidstone School Board, and chairman of various other public bodies.

Donald Alexander McNiven, Q.C., who died in Regina on July 31, 1961, was elected to this Assembly as Member for Regina

City in 1922 and held that seat until 1929. He was born at Walkerton, Ontario, moved west with his family and received his education at Virden, Manitoba, at Manitoba College, and at the University of Manitoba. In 1912 he was admitted to the Saskatchewan bar. He sat in the House of Commons for Regina from 1935 until 1944 when he resigned to accept an appointment to the Court of King's Bench. Judge McNiven served his community as a distinguished member of his profession, being at one time president of the Regina Bar Association and a member of the Council of the Canadian Bar Association. He gave leadership to his fellow citizens through his interest and active participation in community and fraternal organizations, particularly the Regina Community Chest, the Young Men's Christian Association, and the Masonic Order. He also served on the Saskatchewan Regional War Board, the Saskatchewan Wartime Relations Board, and the National War Labour Board.

John Allan Young who represented the Constituency of Biggar in this Assembly from 1938 until 1944, and who died at Kelowna, British Columbia on November 7, 1961. Born in Glasgow, Scotland, he came to Canada in 1911 and farmed in the Blaine Lake district. After serving in the Canadian Expeditionary Force from 1916 to 1918 he returned to the province where he served the Rural Municipality of Hillsdale as Secretary-Treasurer. He enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force in World War II, and later held the position of Superintendent of Insurance from which position he retired in 1955.

In recording its own deep sense of loss and bereavement, this Assembly expresses its most sincere sympathies with members of the bereaved families.

REPORT OF THE LEGISLATIVE LIBRARIAN

Regina, February 14, 1962.

To the Honourable,

The Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan.

Sir:

I have the honour to submit to you the Annual Report of the Legislative Library.

The Library was honoured by a visit of the Premier Baron of Scotland, Lord Nigel Ivan Forbes, J.P., D.L. The Right Honourable Lord Morrison of Lambeth visited Regina in September and at that time inscribed and autographed the Library copy of "Herbert Morrison, an autobiography."

The Distinguished Visitors' Register was signed on March 8, 1961 by Mr. James M. Minifie, Washington correspondent for the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, Washington, D.C., and on July 13, 1961 the Library was visited by Miss Khin May Thein, Prime Minister's Public Relations Officer, Rangoon, Burma.

During the year the Library received numerous gifts. A History of the 28th (Northwest) Battalion, C.E.F., compiled by Major (retired) D. G. Scott Calder, Regimental Historian, was given by the Officer Commanding the Regina Rifle Regiment, Lieut. Colonel D. E. Williams, C.D. Three portfolios of drawings by Charles W. Jeffreys, Canadian artist, were added to our historical collection by Mr. R. McCrimmon, Imperial Oil Limited, Regina. A copy of a brochure "The Massey Family 1591-1961" compiled by Marion Massey Nicholson was donated by Mrs. Nicholson, Saskatoon. The Editor-in-Chief of the Neue Zurcher Zeitung, Zurich, Switzerland added a copy of the book "A great Swiss newspaper", to our collection. The Library is most appreciative of these and other gifts.

The research and reference facilities of the Library were again used extensively. The staff gave assistance to technicians and research workers preparing submissions to various Royal Commissions and Legislative Inquiries. Visiting administrators from the Commonwealth and other lands and University personnel and students made use of the Library resources. The Library more than ever serves as a centre for research.

The policy of collecting Canadiana has been continued and the Library has also made it a practice to collect the writings of Saskatchewan authors. The binding and protection of rare documents and reports has been proceeded with as the preservation of these documents is of inestimable value in historical research.

The list of the serial holdings of the Library has been completed. Copies of the check-list "Serial publications in Saskatchewan Legislative Library, 1961", have been sent to the National Library at Ottawa and to Legislative and University libraries as well as to the major Public Libraries in Canada. This list represents a great amount of intensive and concentrated work on the part of the staff and is an important reference guide for librarians and research workers.

Again the Library staff gave aid and advice to departments with library collections in special fields. Staff members contributed articles and book reviews to "Saskatchewan History". As in previous years the part-time services of two staff members have been made available for Archives work under the direction of the Provincial Archivist.

The summary following covers materials taken out of the Library. It does not include books, newspapers, periodicals, pamphlets or documents used for reference or research in the Library. The decrease in the total is the direct result of a growing emphasis on research carried on in the Library where the researcher has access to more than one type of source material. The number of reference and research inquiries answered showed a marked increase.

STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER

In view of the fact that a Bill respecting Rural Telephone Systems is presently standing on the Order Paper, and also of the fact that grants to rural telephone companies have been referred to Committee of Supply in the Estimates, I have had some difficulty in determining whether or not this motion is in order.

In my opinion, however, part (a) is in order because the motion is couched in the usual terms of a money motion, and because it is only by a substantive motion such as this that a formal request to increase an expenditure can be made. The House is aware that in Committee of Supply the only motion allowed is one to reduce an expenditure. (Beauchesne, 4th Edition, Citation 242 (2)).

On the other hand, part (b) of the motion is in my opinion anticipated by Bill No. 25—An Act respecting Rural Telephone Systems—introduced on March 14. Beauchesne, 4th Edition, Citation 131, points out that "in applying the Anticipation rule, preference is given to the discussions which lead to the most effective results." Thus a Bill blocks discussion of a motion.

As I understand the rules, there are two courses of action open to me: The motion could be ruled out of order under the Anticipation rule, for Beauchesne, 4th Edition, Citation 199 (4) points out that an irregularity in any portion of a motion renders the whole motion irregular. On the other hand, I have the right, as Speaker, before proposing the motion, to make "such corrections as are necessary or advisable in order that it should conform with the usages of the House." (Beauchesne, 4th Edition, Citation 199 (1)). I would be prepared to take this latter course but as it is a subject of some complexity, I would first be glad to hear the opinions of hon. Members.

(Later)

I thank the hon. Members for their comments, and I rale that part (b) is to be deleted from the motion.

RULING BY MR. SPEAKER

I have now had an opportunity to study the subamendment and the Point of Order raised thereon, and I wish to advise the House that in my opinion the Point of Order was not well taken inasmuch as the subamendment, while suggesting a conclusion different from that suggested by the amendment, does not offer a direct negative to the amendment.

Indeed, the amendment contains a dual proposition: first, that the Government be commended for certain things, and second, that the Government do certain things. It is only the first proposition that is altered by the subamendment, and thus I cannot feel that the same result could be accomplished by voting against the amendment as by voting for the subamendment.

I would cite Beauchesne, 4th Edition, Citation 202 (13), my own ruling of March 27, 1962, and the ruling of Mr. Speaker Wood of October 24, 1961, both of which were sustained on appeal.

His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor was then pleased to deliver the following Speech:

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

It is my duty to relieve you of further attendance at the Legislative Assembly. In doing so, I wish to thank you and congratulate you upon the results of your deliberations.

You have enacted amendments to various Acts relating to local governments and have made provision for the establishment of larger units of administration.

You have voted further sums to provide additional assistance to all levels of education in our Province.

You have made provision for the financing of a comprehensive medical care programme.

The action you took to ratify an agreement between the Government of Canada and the Government of Saskatchewan was the final step necessary to vest the Province with full control of school lands and the School Lands Fund.

You have made provision for dependents of workmen who have been injured in industrial accidents to receive greater financial support.

The enactment of the Wascana Centre Act is the result of a considerable amount of planning on the part of the Government, the University and the City of Regina of a master plan for the future of an educational, cultural, recreational and governmental area in our capital city.

I am pleased to note that you took time to extend suitable honours to Saskatchewan sportsmen who have won national and international championships.

I thank you for the provision you have made to meet the further requirements of the public service and assure you that the sum of money voted will be used economically, prudently and in the public interest.

In taking leave of you, I desire to thank you for the manner in which you have devoted your energies to the activities of the Session and wish you the full blessing of Providence on your return to your respective homes.

The Hon. Mr. Blakeney, acting Provincial Secretary, then said:

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

It is the will and pleasure of His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor that this Legislative Assembly be prorogued until it pleases His Honour to summon the same for the dispatch of business, and the Legislative Assembly is accordingly prorogued.

- (d) All counts were taken from June 23 through to July 3, 1961. The results shown above represent Annual Average Daily Traffic, i.e. correction factors were applied to the week's count to give a figure which would represent the average of the daily traffic for the entire year.
- 16.—Mr. Guy asked the Government the following Questions, which were answered by the Hon. Mr. Davies:
- (1) What was the total amount collected under the Saskatchewan Hospital Services Plan in the Northern Administration District for the calendar year 1961?

Answer: \$76,524.56.

(2) What per cent was this of the total possible collection?

Answer: In order to answer this question it would be necessary to know the exact number of liable persons in the Northern Administration District at a given time. Individuals are free to move in and out of Saskatchewan without registering entry or departure. Moreover, movement between municipal districts within the province requires no prior notification of such movement or destination from the individual. For these reasons alone, it is not possible to establish for the Northern Administration District the number of persons at a particular time who are liable for payment of the hospitalization tax. Consequently, the total possible collection cannot be determined.

FRIDAY, MARCH 2, 1962

10.—Mr. Gardiner asked the Government the following Question, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Turnbull:

 - (b) For oats and barley—4c per ton mile on the one-way distance over 25 miles where the farmer used his own truck; three-quarters of the hired trucking charge where the one-way distance travelled was over 25 miles and provided the trucking charge was fair and reasonable. Maximum assistance paid was \$12.00 per ton.

This provision held to January 31st and commencing Februray 1st, 1962 the policy provides for a straight 4c per ton mile reimbursement where oats and barley is trucked over 25 miles with the farmer's own truck or a hired truck. Maximum assistance is \$12.00 per ton.

Answer: When the Creighton Liquor Store was established in November, 1947, the only accommodation available was the building in which the store is presently located. Alterations and additions to the building were made by the original landlord before it was occupied by the Liquor Board in 1947; further renovations were completed by the present landlord in September, 1960. Alternative rented accommodation, now available in Creighton, would require renovations and redecorating before it could be occupied. The Liquor Board considers that the Liquor Store in its present location serves the largest number of people in the area to the best advantage.

These various kits have been distributed to or are located presently with various local Civil Defence organiza-

tions mainly for training purposes. These kits, except First Aid Post Kits, are in constant movement from place to place within Saskatchewan.
