## Regina, Thursday, February 12, 1959

This being the day appointed by Proclamation of His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor, dated the Sixth day of January, 1959, for the meeting of the Third Session of the Thirteenth Legislative Assembly of the Province of Saskatchewan, and the Assembly having met:

Mr. Speaker informed the Assembly that he had received a communication from the Private Secretary to His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor stating that His Honour would open the Session at three o'clock p.m. today, Thursday, the Twelfth day of February, 1959.

3 o'clock p.m.

His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor entered the Chamber and, having taken his seat upon the Throne, was pleased to open the Session with the following Speech:

MR. SPEAKER AND MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

IT IS MY PRIVILEGE to welcome you to the Third Session of the Thirteenth Legislature of Saskatchewan.

The people of Saskatchewan anticipate with much pleasure the forthcoming visit of Her Gracious Majesty The Queen and His Royal Highness The Prince Philip. Last summer Her Royal Highness The Princess Margaret visited the northern reaches of the settled areas of our Province. We rejoiced in the opportunity of welcoming to our midst so gracious a member of the Royal Family.

In spite of a severe drought condition which prevailed last summer, a near average wheat crop was harvested. A serious fodder shortage which followed in the wake of dry weather in many parts of the Province was overcome through emergency measures taken to assist farmers to meet this crisis. An extensive grasshopper threat was successfully met during the past growing season. Chemicals will be made available to farmers at cost to help meet the more widespread infestation expected this year. The diversification of our agricultural economy continues at an encouraging rate. Livestock marketings have achieved new records. However, the added farm income realized from favourable conditions in the livestock market failed to arrest the growing disparity between farm costs and farm prices. It is apparent that steps must be taken by the Government of Canada to institute national policies to restore stability to our agricultural economy and give to the farmers their fair share of the national income.

Inadequate and uncertain returns have made it more difficult for families to transfer farms from one generation to another and for farmers to acquire economic farm units. Legislation will be introduced to assist the co-operatives in setting up a system of farm credit to help young farmers become established in agriculture.

The Government of Canada has announced that a measure to institute crop insurance in co-operation with such provinces as so desire will be laid before Parliament. This legislation has not been communicated to My Government but when it is available it will be studied. My Government will then determine, in consultation with the farm organizations, to what extent it will be beneficial to the farmers of this Province.

The Government of Saskatchewan welcomed the opportunity of signing an agreement with the Government of Canada for the construction of the South Saskatchewan River Development Project. Legislation will be introduced to establish a South Saskatchewan River Development Commission to provide for the orderly development of this great irrigation and power project.

Arrangements have been made for the Saskatchewan Research Council to undertake a comprehensive technical survey of water resources as related to the growing problems of municipal water supply. You will be asked to approve legislation regarding conservation, development and utilization of ground waters.

Despite adverse conditions in agriculture and the depressing effects of the national recession, Saskatchewan experienced significant advances in the field of industrial development and there was an encouraging increase in industrial employment. In 1958 a number of new industries were established and construction of a steel rolling mill was begun.

In spite of our industrial growth seasonal unemployment is still a serious problem.. To help meet this situation the Saskatchewan Government has joined with the federal and municipal governments in a series of work and wages projects. Mounting inflation has also added to the suffering of the unemployed and has threatened the security of low income groups and those on fixed incomes. My Government has urged the Government of Canada to take strong measures to deal with these threats to our national well-being.

The mineral industries continued to make a significant contribution to the expansion of the economy of our Province. During 1958 Saskatchewan rose to fourth place among all the provinces in the production of mineral wealth.

A flare gas collecting system and processing plant in the Steelman area was brought into production during the year. The construction of this plant and related storage facilities have been important steps in the conservation of our fuel resources. Gas heretofore wasted is now available to consumers in Saskatchewan.

During the year the first potash mine in Canada commenced production near Saskatoon. Work on the construction of a shaft and potash processing plant near Esterhazy is well advanced and other potash exploration programs are being carried on over a wide area. Important potential sources of iron ore in the Province are under investigation and have aroused widespread interest. A sub-surface geological laboratory for storage and examination of cores and samples was opened during the past year.

To keep pace with the growth in demand for electric power, it has been necessary to plan and bring into operation new generating units. Last year additional capacity was added to the Kindersley plant and the first unit of the Queen Elizabeth Power Station at Saskatoon was brought into operation. A second large unit at the new Saskatoon plant and the first unit of the Boundary Dam Generating Station at Estevan will be brought into operation this year.

A major interconnection of provincial power utilities which is being planned in the Estevan-Brandon area will be of mutual advantage to both Saskatchewan and Manitoba. Plans are underway to develop and bring into operation a hydro-electric power site at Squaw Rapids on the Saskatchewan River east of Nipawin.

Over five thousand farms were added to the provincial power system in 1958. Today more than fifty thousand farms enjoy the benefits of electric power. A concentrated effort is being made to complete the electrification of the rural areas of our Province.

The provincial natural gas utility also continued to expand. Weyburn, Estevan, Maple Creek and ten smaller communities were connected to the gas system last year. The program to extend natural gas to all cities in Saskatchewan will be completed this year and additional communities will also be served.

During 1959 Saskatchewan Government Telephones will celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of its formation. The investment which the people of Saskatchewan have made in a public telephone system over the past half century has produced a modern, efficient communication system. It is gratifying to note that last year a record was set when approximately twelve thousand telephones were installed. Through the facilities of Saskatchewan Government Telephones, Swift Current was provided with direct television service from the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation in 1958. Prince Albert will be connected in a few weeks' time and the cities of Moose Jaw and Yorkton later in the year.

The continued development of the forest industry in Saskatchewan makes necessary the revision of The Forest Act. You will be asked to consider legislation to amend The Prairie and Forest Fires Act and The Game Act.

To keep pace with the increasing demand new parks are being developed to provide greater recreational facilities. A program will be undertaken to provide more camping and picnic facilities along our major tourist highways and within provincial parks.

The value of services rendered by co-operatives doing business in Saskatchewan reached a record figure of more than \$560,000,000. New records were also set in the number of members of co-operative associations.

My Government has been encouraged by the extent to which the communities in Northern Saskatchewan have been improved through the development of local co-operatives. This achievement of the people in this area now makes it possible for the Government to implement its plan to convert the provincially-owned fish marketing and trading services into co-operatives. Legislation will be introduced which will provide for the transfer of these facilities to the people of the North.

The record program of highway construction which was undertaken last year provided improved highways in many areas of the Province. A new policy for assistance to urban municipalities through which provincial highways pass was well received. During 1959 work will commence on the construction of a four-lane traffic bridge over the North Saskatchewan River in the City of Prince Albert.

During the past year further progress has been made in the construction of the municipal grid road system. Two hundred and sixty-four rural municipalities, eleven local improvement districts and twenty-nine towns and villages have participated in this program to date.

During the past decade the Government has constructed more than two thousand five hundred miles of roads in the mineral and forest areas of Northern Saskatchewan. Plans are underway to exceed last year's construction record of over two hundred miles of northern roads. In addition, the Saskatchewan Government is co-operating with the Government of Canada in the construction of roads which will connect Prince Albert to Creighton-Flin Flon, Hudson Bay to The Pas, Buffalo Narrows to La Loche and Lac La Ronge to Uranium City.

It is evident that Saskatchewan has taken great strides toward realizing our goal of a more balanced economic base. During the post-war period the total value of commodity production has increased almost threefold. In 1958 non-agricultural sources accounted for over sixty-five percent of all commodity production. A team of specialized Canadian and American consultants has been engaged to carry out an objective appraisal of our achievements. Their studies and analyses will assist the Government in working out further long-range programs for the fullest development of Saskatchewan's economic potential.

Substantial increases in operating grants for schools will be provided. To assist with capital financing the Government has for many years followed a practice of purchasing certain school debentures, and further assistance in the financing of capital expenditures is being planned. Having in mind the ever-increasing need for advanced education, the Government is proposing a university scholarship program to supplement the extensive assistance provided through the Student Aid Fund.

The first stage of construction of the Provincial Technical Institute is underway and will be available for use this fall.

It is encouraging to note a continued improvement in the level of certification of Saskatchewan teachers and an increase in enrolment at teacher training institutions.

This year the University of Saskatchewan celebrates its Golden Jubilee. A steadily increasing number of students continues to take advantage of the opportunities provided by our University. To an already impressive campus is being added a College of Arts Building, a Biology Building and an Animal Husbandry Building. Last year saw the completion of the Saskatchewan Research Council Building and the Cancer and Medical Research Building. 1959 will also be marked by the retirement of Dr. W. P. Thompson after many years' service as Professor, Dean and President of the University. Dr. Thompson's basic research contributed greatly to the development of rust-resistant varieties of wheat. Saskatchewan is fortunate in having had for so many years the services of such a renowned scientist, effective teacher and able administrator.

Saskatchewan is also fortunate in that the new President of the University is to be Dean J. W. T. Spinks, an outstanding scientist who has served the University with great distinction for many years.

No cases of poliomyelitis were reported in Saskatchewan last year. The framework of effective public health services built up in our Province enabled everyone under forty years of age to take advantage of the Government's policy of making Salk vaccine available without cost. This achievement gives hope that this crippling disease may ultimately be wiped out in Saskatchewan. A new health region was established recently in the Melfort-Tisdale area. This brings to ten the number of health regions in the Province. You will be asked to provide funds to establish another health region during the coming year.

My Government has reduced the personal tax payments for hospital services. Additional out-patient services, including minor surgical procedures, will be progressively added as soon as hospitals can provide the staff and facilities to handle the increased workload.

My Government has worked out with the organizations representing rural and urban municipalities a new system of providing social aid to those in need. You will be asked to approve a new Social Aid Act which will provide for greater financial assistance to municipalities and a more equitable distribution of the municipal share of social aid costs between the municipalities. You will also be asked to approve amendments to The Deserted Wives' and Children's Maintenance Act. Legislation will be introduced to provide for the integration of child welfare and juvenile correction programs.

During 1958 twenty-two new housing projects for senior citizens were completed, bringing the total to fifty-six. More than three thousand aged persons can now be accommodated in modern housing units. Six additional units are presently under construction and some twenty other projects are in various stages of planning. The growing life expectancy of our people continues to increase that portion of our population over sixty-five years of age. A conference of interested persons will be held early this year to discuss the problem of providing further programs and facilities for the care of the aged and those suffering long-term illnesses.

Legislation will be introduced to relieve the cities of the cost of housing surveys and to provide more housing for low-income groups by reducing to five percent the cities' contribution for low-rental housing.

Saskatchewan was represented at a Dominion-Provincial Conference which discussed the recommendations contained in the Report of the Fauteux Commission on Penal Reform. The Saskatchewan Government will continue to co-operate with the Government of Canada and work toward the development of a more humane and progressive correction program.

The work of the Local Government Continuing Committee is proceeding satisfactorily. Progress reports are being prepared for submission to the annual conventions of local government organizations.

Last fall Chiefs and Councillors from almost every Indian reservation in the Province met in conference with representatives of the Government to discuss the extension of the provincial franchise to Indians and other matters affecting their welfare. Arrangements have been made to have these questions discussed by the Indians on the various reservations. As requested by the Federation of Saskatchewan Indians, a further conference will be held next summer.

The report of the Royal Commission on Certain Mineral Transactions has been received. Legislation dealing with the matters reviewed by this Commission will be introduced.

The report of the Quadrennial Committee of Review of The Workmen's Compensation (Accident Fund) Act will result in some amendments to this Act being submitted for your consideration.

You will be asked to approve amendments to The Farm Security Act extending for a further two-year period the protection given to farmers against a final order of foreclosure of the home quarter.

Legislation abolishing ex parte interim injunctions in connection with labour disputes will be introduced. Amendments to The Landlord and Tenant Act to give greater security for wages to employees of tenants will be presented for your consideration. Amendments designed to strengthen provisions of The Fair Employment Practices Act will be proposed. You will be asked to approve legislation designed to provide simple and informal proceedings for the recovering of small debts and small damage claims. Amendments to The Attachments of Debts Act designed to assist wives and children in the collection of amounts payable under alimony and maintenance orders will be proposed.

Recommendations of a Law Reform Committee appointed to give consideration to desirable reforms in statute laws will be embodied in proposed amendments to The District Courts Act, The Limitation of Civil Rights Act, The Interpretation Act and The Land Titles Act. Amendments to The Queen's Bench Act and The Surregate Courts Act will also be introduced.

You will be asked to approve legislation transferring to the Local Government Board the jurisdiction now exercised over electrical and gas utilities by the Saskatchewan Power Commission.

Amendments to The Legislative Assembly Act and amendments to The Saskatchewan Elections Act will also be presented.

After a year of experience with uniform time legislation in the Province it is considered desirable to ask you to refer this question again to the Select Standing Committee on Municipal Law.

The Liquor Sales Outlets Inquiry Committee, appointed pursuant to a recommendation of the Assembly at its last Session, submitted its report to the Government. Representing all groups in the Assembly, the Committee reported a gratifying degree of unanimity on the major conclusions reached, thus enhancing the value of its contribution. Legislation based on the Committee's report will be presented for your consideration. You will be asked to approve plans for the extension of the activities of the Bureau on Alcoholism. Approval of additional grants to assist in expanding temperance education programs will be requested.

The Public Accounts for the last fiscal year, together with estimates for the year beginning April 1, 1959, will be submitted.

I leave you now to the business of the Session with full confidence that you will favourably discharge your duties and responsibilities. May Divine Providence continue to bless our Province and guide the Legislature in all its deliberations.

His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor then retired from the Chamber.

PRAYERS:

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Douglas (Weyburn) have leave to introduce a Bill respecting the Administration of Oaths.

He accordingly presented the said Bill, and the same was received and read the first time. Mr. Speaker then informed the Assembly that, in order to prevent mistakes, he had obtained a copy of the Speech of His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor, which was laid on the Table.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Douglas (Weyburn), seconded by the Hon. Mr. Fines:

Ordered, That the speech of His Honour the Lieutenaut-Governor be taken into consideration on Monday next.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Douglas (Weyburn), seconded by the Hon. Mr. Brockelbank:

Ordered, That the Votes and Proceedings of this Assembly be printed after first having been perused by Mr. Speaker; that he do appoint the printing thereof, and that no person but such as he shall appoint do presume to print the same.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Douglas (Weyburn), seconded by the Hon. Mr. Douglas (Rosetown):

Ordered, That *Messieurs* Brockelbank, Howe, Brown (Bengough), Cameron, Danielson, and Weber be constituted a Select Special Committee to prepare and report, with all convenient speed, lists of Members to compose the Select Standing Committees of this Assembly provided under Standing Order 50;

That the said Select Standing Committees be severally empowered to examine and inquire into all such matters and things as may be referred to them by this Assembly, and to report from time to time their observations thereon; with power to send for persons, papers and records, and to examine witnesses under oath.

The Assembly then adjourned at 3:30 o'clock p.m.

REPORT OF THE LEGISLATIVE LIBRARIAN

To the Honourable,

The Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan.

Sir:

I have the honour to submit to you the Annual Report of the Legislative Library.

The Library was honoured by visits of distinguished people during the year. Among those signing the Distinguished Visitors' Register were:

- His Excellency Dr. Lambertus Nicodemus Palar, Indonesian Ambassador, Ottawa;
- His Excellency Sir Velupillai Coomaraswamy, C.M.G., High Commissioner of Ceylon, and Lady Coomaraswamy, Ottawa;

Mr. Paul C. Hutton, United States Consul General, Winnipeg;

Members of the British Trade Mission:

Sir William Rootes, London, England, Sir Edward Herbert, London, England, Sir Vincent Tewson, London, England, Sir Norman Kipping, London, England, Lord Polwarth, Edinburgh, Scotland and Lord Riverdale, Sheffield, England.

The Library received many gifts of books and materials during the year. While it is not feasible to list each item, special mention is made of a gift of a Saskatchewan medal and various coronation medals from Reverend J. Harrison Hill, now of Goodland, Kansas, formerly of Pense, and a significant and unique collection of World War I materials including operational maps and company orders from Mr. Dan. A. Cameron, Regina. The Library is warmly appreciative of these and all other gifts.

During the year work was nearly completed on a mimeographed newspaper index for the period 1949-1954. The indexing of current Saskatchewan newspapers was continued. The Legislative Library and the Provincial Archives jointly published a Catalogue of Newspapers on microfilm in the Legislative Library and Provincial Archives of Saskatchewan. Again in 1959 scholars and technicians from Commonwealth and other countries used the facilities of the Library. There was a noticeable increase in the use made of library resources.

ALAN CARL STEWART, who died at his home in Long Beach, California, on July 26, 1958, was a member of the Seventh Legislature from 1929 to 1934, during which period he was Minister of Highways in the Government headed by the late Dr. J. T. M. Anderson, and of the Ninth Legislature from 1938 to 1944; and later, of the Federal House of Commons, from 1949 to 1953, as Member of Parliament for Yorkton Constituency.

This Assembly desires also to pay belated tribute to the memory of DEAKIN ALEXANDER HALL, who died at Victoria, B.C. on July 16, 1957, whose record of continuous service in this Assembly exceeds that of any Member, past or present, and who, throughout the 31 years he sat in this Chamber as representative of northern Constituencies, sought ardently to interest his fellow Members in the wealth and variety of the resources latent in Saskatchewan's Northland and to advocate their development.

In recording its own deep sense of loss, the Assembly expresses its most sincere sympathies with members of the bereaved families.

Carried by a very large majority. One dissenting vote.'

### Speaker's Ruling

Thereupon, Mr. Speaker said:

Yesterday, when this Question (No. 198) was called, the Premier asked me to rule as to its admissibility, on the ground that it related to matters not directly within the purview of a Department of Government and that the answer to it could be obtained only from non-governmental sources. I deferred my ruling, and the Question was allowed to stand.

I have made some inquiries of the Department or Crown Corporation to which the Question, had it not been challenged, would have been referred, and have ascertained that the answer to it, as the Question is worded, is not a matter of record with the Department, and that to arrive even at an approximation of "the average cost to the farmer of installing a rural telephone in each of the years 1937-38, 1947-48 and 1957-58" would involve search and analysis of the Annual Reports of some 900 Rural Telephone Companies. The matter seems to be of record with the individual companies and not with the Department or Crown Corporation to which the Question would have been directed. I must rule, therefore, that, in my considered opinion, the Premier's point is well taken, that the Question (No. 198) is inadmissible in its present form, and that it should be dropped.

(Citations from Beauchesne's Parliamentary Rules and Forms, 4th Edition:

Citation 171 (dd): "A question oral or written must not deal with matters not officially connected with Government or Parliament."

Also, Citation 178: "Questions addressed to Ministers should relate to the public affairs with which they are officially connected . . . or to any matter of administration for which the Minister is responsible.")

Your Committee has had under consideration Bill No. 90-An Act respecting the Dental Profession of Saskatchewan.

During its consideration of the said Bill, the Committee heard representations from The College of Dental Surgeons of Saskatchewan, proponent of the Bill, through its Counsel and officers, from representatives of the Association of Dental Technicians of Saskatchewan in support of the Bill, and from representatives of a group of Public Denturists operating in Saskatchewan in opposition to the Bill.

The dental technicians, in a brief presented to the Committee, stated that a draft Dental Technicians Act had been submitted by their Association to the Department of Public Health for consideration and suggestions, too late for introduction during the present Session of the Assembly. The public denturists agreed, for their part, that a Saskatchewan Dental Technicians Act was desirable and necessary to preserve high standards in the industry. The dental technicians further stated in their brief that the Bill for their Act was "complementary to the Dental Bill under consideration."

In view of these circumstances, the Committee is of the opinion that the two Bills, being complementary, might better be considered together at the next Session of the Assembly, and since no apparent hardship would be imposed on any of the parties concerned by deferment of the Dental Bill,

Your Committee recommends that Bill No. 90—An Act respecting the Dental Profession of Saskatchewan—be not further proceeded with at this Session.

In view of these circumstances, the Committee is of the opinion that the two Bills, being complementary, might better be considered together at the next Session of the Assembly, and since no apparent hardship would be imposed on any of the parties concerned by deferment of the Dental Bill,

Your Committee recommends that Bill No. 90—An Act respecting the Dental Profession of Saskatchewan—be not further proceeded with at this Session.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOUR:

This Legislative Assembly has voted the Supplies required to enable the Government to defray the expenses of the Public Service. In the name of the Assembly, I present to Your Honour the following Bill:

"An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of Money for the Public Service of the Fiscal Years ending respectively the Thirty-first day of March, 1959, and the Thirty-first day of March, 1960."

The Royal Assent to this Bill was announced by the Clerk:

"In Her Majesty's name, His Honour the Administrator doth thank the Legislative Assembly, accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill."

His Honour the Administrator was then pleased to deliver the following Speech:

MR. SPEAKER, MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

It is my duty to relieve you of further attendance at the Legislative Assembly. In doing so, I wish to thank you and congratulate you upon the work you have done. I wish also to express my confidence that the approval of the programs and plans presented to you will continue to provide the services necessary to the growth and development of our province.

You have made provision for schools in the province to receive additional grants. The scholarship program which you have approved will assist many students to obtain further education.

The legislation you have passed establishing a system of farm credits will afford additional assistance to young farmers to become established in agriculture.

The legislation you have passed to establish a South Saskatchewan River Development Commission will enable the Province to provide for the orderly development of this great irrigation and power project.

It is gratifying to observe the further development of the industrial potential of our province. Your decision to enact The Interprovincial Steel Corporation Limited Assistance Act 1959 has contributed to the establishment of a steel mill in Saskatchewan. It is anticipated that this important basic industry will encourage other related industries to come to our province.

You have provided for the transfer of provincially owned fish marketing and trading services to the people in Northern Saskatchewan to operate as co-operatives.

Your decision to authorize the Government to institute a new system of providing social aid will assist municipalities by providing for a more equitable distribution of the share of the costs involved. You have approved legislation which will relieve the cities of the cost of housing surveys and will reduce the cities' contribution for low-rental housing.

Your decision to abolish **ex parte** interim injunctions in labour dispute cases, to amend The Fair Employment Practices Act and to amend The Workmen's Compensation (Accident Fund) Act will provide further protection to workers.

The legislation you have passed embodying recommendations of the Liquor Sales Outlets Inquiry Committee provides communities in our province with the opportunity of deciding, on the basis of local option, whether additional liquor outlets are desired.

You have enacted legislation which will implement certain of the recommendations contained in the Report of the Royal Commission on Certain Mineral Transactions.

No reference to the work of this Session would be complete without inention being made of the work of the Legislative Committees. The members of these Committees have applied themselves diligently to the matters referred to them by the Legislative Assembly.

I am pleased to note that you took time during this Session to extend suitable honours to the Richardson Rink, 1959 Dominion Curling Champions.

I thank you for the provision you have made to meet the further requirements of the Public Service and assure you that the sum of money voted will be used economically, prudently and in the public interest.

We look forward with much pleasure and anticipation to the forthcoming Royal Visit to Saskatchewan. Plans are being made which will enable the citizens of our province to greet Her Gracious Majesty The Queen and His Royal Highness The Prince Philip in various communities.

In taking leave of you, I desire to thank you for the manner in which you have devoted your energies to the activities of the Session and wish you the full blessing of Providence as you return again to your respective homes.

The Hon. Mr. Willis (Melfort-Tisdale), Acting Provincial Secretary, then said:

- Answer: 22-foot top at time of construction, except for 4000 feet on the hill on the south side of the Qu'Appelle Valley, which was built 26-feet wide.
- (2) What was the total maintenance cost for the above-mentioned highway for the year 1957-58?
- Answer: The maintenance control section on which costs are recorded extends from the junction with No. 1 to the junction with No. 10 Highway, and maintenance costs in the section designated must be pro-rated on a mileage basis. Calculated by this method, the maintenance cost for the fiscal year 1957-58 was \$11,040.68.
- (3) What was the road count on the said road during 1958?

- Answer: A traffic count was taken on No. 56 Highway at a point approximately 1 mile north of No. 1 Highway for a period of 48 hours, from 4:30 p.m., April 21 to 4:30 p.m., April 23. The total traffic volume measured for this period was 488 vehicles. The derived average annual daily traffic volume based on this count is 300 vehicles per day.
- 3.—Mr. McFarlane asked the Government the following Questions, which were answered by the Hon. Mr. Brown:
- (1) What is the total cost of all buildings constructed in Katepwa Provincial Park during 1958?

Answer: \$15,540.73.

- Note: The above figures show total number of children committed as wards of the Minister during each of the fiscal years in question. This is the only basis of comparison we can provide since records were not maintained to provide information of the numbers of children admitted into care prior to 1956-57. In 1957-58, 724 children were admitted into care, of which 394 were children of unmarried mothers, and 330 were children of families.

Facilities Provided: 29 picnic tables; 19 picnic sites including fire-places; 5 camp kitchens; 26 toilets; 3 docks; 16 4x4 signs, 50 directional signs; 4 boat launching sites; 4 car parking areas.

Whole forest area photographed and inventoried and map sheets produced.

Kimball, Pierce and (proposed) Lac des Isles cottage subdivisions have been laid out according to planning principles to provide for various land uses, including: cottage areas; commercial area, public beaches, public parking areas, camp, tent and trailer sites, roads. This will assure orderly and efficient development of the land.

Fisheries research has been done on part of the Waterhen system for better management of the angling and commercial fishery resources.

A system of forest-fire control has been established for the whole park (area of 387,000 acres or 605 sq. miles).

Approximately 20 miles of access-road construction in various parts of the park (this does not include provincial highways).

A master plan for development of the whole park has been prepared. The plan will be the guide for development of recreational sites for the next 5 to 10 years.

Since the Industrial Development Office, in attempting to promote industry in the province, is working closely with Municipal Councils, Chambers of Commerce, Railways, Banks and Investment Houses, other Government Agencies both Federal and Provincial, and with many other groups and individuals, it would be presumptuous to suggest that any industry has established in an area or community solely through the efforts of the Industrial Development Office. In any case industry is not "brought" to a community, as the decision of locating in a specific community is made by the industry itself.

The Industrial Development Office has provided services to new industries establishing, or to industries undertaking major expansions, in the following communities: Annaheim, Assiniboia, Chaplin, Bishopric, Dinsmore, Estevan, Esterhazy, Fort Qu'Appelle, Hudson Bay, Humboldt, Kamsack, Kerrobert, Lashburn, Lloydminster, Maple Creek, Moose Jaw, Nipawin, Percival, Prince Albert, Qu'Appelle, Regina, Rocanville, Saskatoon, Shellbrook, Steelman, Sturgis, Swift Current, Wartime, Watrous, Weyburn, Whitefox, Wynyard and Yorkton.

- 256.—Mr. Gardiner asked the Government the following Questions, which were answered by the Hon. Mr. Erb:
- (1) How many patients are at present in each of the T.B. Sanatoria in Saskatchewan?
- Answer: Prince Albert, 233; Saskatoon, 92; Fort Qu'Appelle, 148. Patient population as at March 31, 1959.
- (2) What is the capacity number of patients that can be cared for in each of the T.B. Sanatoria in Saskatchewan?
- Answer: The rated bed capacity of each of the T.B. Sanatoria in Saskatchewan is as follows: Prince Albert, 219; Saskatoon, 143; Fort Qu'Appelle, 300. (Includes 126 beds closed at the present time).
- 257.—Mr. Gardiner asked the Government the following Question, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Lloyd:

What was the result of the vote in the Yorkton Larger School Unit held in 1958 to determine whether the unit would be retained?

- Answer: Number of ballots cast for continuing the Yorkton School Unit was 2,235; number of ballots cast for disorganizing the Yorkton School Unit was 1,535.

What part did the Industrial Development Office play in bringing the Dominion Bridge Company to the City of Regina?

Answer:

The role of the Industrial Development Office is to attract industry to the province, but not to attempt to direct an industry to locate in any particular community. However, in order to ensure that more than one community will be considered as a possible location, industrial data on several communities is usually supplied to each prospect. The decision to locate in any particular community is invariably made by the industry itself in accordance with its assessment of what is the best location for its operations.

Insofar as the Dominion Bridge Company is concerned, the Office first contacted this Company in 1951, urging them to establish a plant in the province. The decision of the company to locate in Regina was made solely by the company itself on the basis of its own investigations, and not as the result of any recommendations on the part of the Industrial Development Office.

  - What Crown Corporations is D. H. F. Black a director of?
- Answer: Saskatchewan Government Telephones, Saskatchewan Minerals.

- .271.—Mr. MacFarlane asked the Government the following Questions, which were answered by the Hon. Mr. Nollet:
- (1) How many veterans have been granted leases with a purchase privilege on Crown lands, as of December 31, 1958?

Answer: 1,614.

(2) In how many cases have veterans received title to land by virtue of full payment as of December 31, 1958?

Answer: 109.

- 272.—Mr. McFarlane asked the Government the following Questions, which were answered by the Hon .Mr. Nollet:
- (1) How many notices of intent to cancel leases held by veterans were issued during 1958?

275.—Mr. McFarlane asked the Government the following Question, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Nollet:

What organization or organizations requested that Agricultural Implement Dealers' licences be increased from \$5 to \$25 per year?

- Answer: The Saskatchewan Agricultural Machinery Board upon consideration of suggestions from time to time by the Retail Implement Dealers' Association, and directly from retail farm implement dealers. Any increase was to be in conjunction with higher standards and increased inspection services. During the summer of 1958, over 2,000 inspections were made.
- 276.—Mr. Gardiner asked the Government the following Question, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Fines:

What was the amount of contingent liabilities at December 31, 1958?

Answer: See Budget Address page 8.

- 278.—Mr. Gardiner asked the Government the following Questions, which were answered by the Hon. Mr. Douglas (Weyburn):
- (1) What was the total cost of the banquets for the University Students visiting the Legislature in February, 1958?
- Answer: The Dome Cafe, located in the Legislative Building, is operated by the Saskatchewan Civil Service Association. The Government has no knowledge of the total cost of banquets referred to in this question.

(2) What was the total paid by the Government?

Answer: \$333.75.

(3) What was the total paid by others?

Answer: The Government has no information.

- 280.—Mr. Loptson asked the Government the following Questions, which were answered by the Hon. Mr. Willis:
- (1) When was the toilet located in the north-west corner of the Legislative Building Grounds, a short distance east of Albert Street and south of Wascana Lake constructed?

Answer: During the calendar year 1957.

- (2) What is the dimension of the building?
- Answer: South wing: 13 feet, eight inches by 13 feet, one inch; North wing: 13 feet, eight inches by 13 feet, one inch; Access Area: 14 feet, eight inches long, triangular in shape, being seven feet, eight inches at the widest point.

(3) Has it a heating plant?

Answer: No.

(4) What was the total cost?

Answer: \$14,008.12.

NOTE: The nature and location of the building required quality construction to prevent deterioration from constant use, or possible defacement by vandals. During the summer months, particularly on weekends, crowds numbering several thousands visit the Legislative Grounds. The location near the water necessitated the use of pile foundations. Connection with the City water and electrical supply required tunnelling under Albert Street. The building is constructed of impervious materials with terrazzo floors, glazed paint, mechanical exhaust ventilation, and quality fixtures, all contributing to appearance and longevity. For further information see pages 24 and 25 of the Department of Public Works Annual Report, 1957-58.

#### FRIDAY, APRIL 10, 1959

283.—Mr. Gardiner asked the Government the following Question, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Douglas (Rosetown):

What were the rates paid by the Department of Highways for work done by 15-yard scrapers H.D. 20 Allis Chalmers Crawler Tractors with an experienced operator in the years 1955, 1956 and 1957?

Answer: The approved departmental rental and wages schedule would yield the following total rental rates: 1955, \$13.20 per hour; 1956, \$13.25 per hour; 1957, \$16.10 per hour.

121.—Mr. Coderre asked the Government the following Question, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Brown (Last Mountain):

What was the profit of the Saskatchewan Power Corporation for the years 1957 and 1958?

- Answer: The profit of the Saskatchewan Power Corporation for 1957 was \$1,817,848, and for 1958 was \$3,337,795.
- 128.—Mr. Gardiner asked the Government the following Question, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Fines:

What categories of persons are required to purchase insurance and/or bonds from the Saskatchewan Government Insurance Office under the provision of Section 15 (3) of The Saskatchewan Government Insurance Act?

- Ancwer: (1) Owners of public service vehicles in respect of policies and bonds required under clauses (b) and (c) of subsection (1) of section 30, of The Vehicles Act, 1957, and corresponding regulations under The Vehicles Act.
  - (2) Persons who are required to furnish bonds under The Electrical Licensing and Inspection Act and regulations thereunder.
- 151.—Mr. Nicholson asked the Government the following Questions, which were answered by the Hon. Mr. Kuziak:
- (1) What was the salary paid to Mr. Mike Kalmikoff, for the year 1958?

Answer: \$12,500.

(2) What were his expenses?

Answer: \$2,164.12.

- 154.—Mr. Gardiner asked the Government the following Question, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Fines:

What was the total in premiums of insurance and/or bonds purchased by persons required to purchase insurance and/or bonds from the Government Insurance Offic under the provisions of Section 15 (3) of The Saskatchewan Government Insurance Act?

- Answer: Calendar Year 1958—(1) Motor Truck Cargo Insurance, \$99,391; (2) Motor Truck Cargo Fidelity Bonds, \$2,180;
  (3) Electrical Contractors Bonds, \$7,110; (4) Gas Installation Bonds, \$2,440; (5) Lightning Rod Installation Bonds, \$176. Total, \$111,297.
- 155.—Mr. Foley asked the Government the following Question, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Brown (Last Mountain):

What has been the total cost to date to the Saskatchewan Power Corporation for the construction of the Natural Gas System in the province?

Answer: \$52,709,887.

- 164.—Mr. McFarlane asked the Government the following Questions, which were answered by the Hon. Mr. Brown (Last Mountain):
- (1) How many loans were outstanding under the time payment plan for rural electrification to the Saskatchewan Power Corporation as of January 1, 1959?
- Answer: 11,780 loans were outstanding under the time payment plan for rural electrification to the Saskatchewan Power Corporation as of January 1, 1959.

(2) What was the total amount of money involved in (1)?

Answer: \$3,563,853.40.

(3) What rate of interest is charged on above loans?

Answer: 5% simple interest is charged on the above loans.

165.—Mr. McFarlane asked the Government the following Question, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Brown (Last Mountain):

What was the total amount owed by farmers to the Saskatchewan Power Corporation for electrical power hook-up as at January 1, 1959?
