WHEREAS, it is expedient for certain causes and considerations to convene the Legislative Assembly of Our Province of Saskatchewan, WE Do Will that you and each of you and all others in this behalf interested on Thursday, the Twenty-fifth day of January, 1917, at Our City of Regina, personally be and appear for the Dispatch of Business, there to take into consideration the state and welfare of Our said Province of Saskatchewan and thereby to do as may seem necessary. Herein fail not.

In Testimony Whereof, We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent and the Great Seal of Our said Province of Saskatchewan to be hereunto affixed. Witness His Honour Richard Stuart Lake, Lieutenant Governor of Our said Province of Saskatchewan.

At Our Government House, in Our City of Regina, in Our said Province, this Sixth day of January, in the year of Our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventeen, and in the Seventh year of Our Reign.

SIXTH SESSION—THIRD LEGISLATURE

REGINA, THURSDAY, JANUARY 25, 1917.

3 o'clock P.M.

This being the first day of the Sixth Session of the Third Legislative Assembly of the Province of Saskatchewan, for the dispatch of business, pursuant to a Proclamation of His Honour Richard Stuart Lake, Lieutenant Governor of the Province, dated the sixth day of January, 1917, and the House having met, His Honour entered the House and took his seat upon the Throne.

The Provincial Secretary then said:

I am commanded by His Honour the Lieutenant Governor to inform you that he will defer stating the reasons for which he has summoned the Legislature until the Legislative Assembly have elected a Speaker. It is, therefore, His Honour's pleasure that the Legislative Assembly do now proceed to the election of a Speaker.

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor then retired from the House.

Mr. Calder then addressed himself to the Clerk (who, standing up, bowed and then sat down), and proposed to the House for their Speaker, Robert Menzies Mitchell, Esquire, Member for the Electoral Division of Weyburn, and moved that he do take the Chair of the House as Speaker, which resolution was seconded by Mr. Motherwell.

The question being put by the Clerk, it was—

Resolved, nemine contradicente, That Robert Menzies Mitchell, Esquire, do take the Chair of this House as Speaker and the Clerk having declared Robert Menzies Mitchell, Esquire, duly elected, he was conducted by Messieurs Calder and Motherwell to the Chair, where he then said:

GENTLEMEN,--

I beg to express my grateful thanks and humble acknowledgment of the high honour the House has been pleased to confer on me, and while I leave the floor of this House to take the Speaker's Chair, I feel that I also leave all political partisan feelings in order that I may discharge with impartiality to all and to the best of my ability the various and important duties pertaining to the high office of the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Saskatchewan.

And thereupon he took the Chair and the Mace was laid on the Table.

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor then re-entered the House and took his seat on the Throne.

The Speaker then addressed His Honour to the following effect:

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOUR,—

The Legislative Assembly have elected me as their Speaker, although I am but little able to fulfil the important duties thus assigned to me.

If, in the performance of those duties, I should at any time fall into error, I pray that the fault may be imputed to me and not to the Assembly whose servant I am.

The Provincial Secretary then said:

Mr. Speaker,—

I am commanded by His Honour the Lieutenant Governor to declare to you that your words and actions will constantly receive from him the most favourable construction.

His Honour was then pleased to open the Session with the following speech:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

In welcoming you to the discharge of your duties at this Session of the Legislative Assembly, I deeply regret to have to inform you that the Honourable Walter Scott, who for upwards of eleven years so ably acted as the chief adviser of the representative of the Crown in the Province, was compelled through continued failing health to resign his position. I am confident that you one and all join with me in expressing the hope that he may rapidly regain his health and strength and that at an early date he may return to our Province to again take an active interest in its public affairs.

Since the Assembly last prorogued, His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, who for some years so efficiently and graciously represented his Sovereign as Governor General of Canada, has relinquished that position. His departure, as well as that of the Duchess of Connaught, is deeply regretted by all the people of Canada, and particularly by our own people, to whom they endeared themselves so much by their kindly disposition and the keen interest they always evinced in all matters pertaining to our welfare and advancement. That Their Royal Highnesses may be long spared to continue to employ their many gifts in the interests of the Empire and of humanity is the fervent wish of all Canadians.

In his stead the Crown is now represented in Canada by His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire. As loyal citizens we join in welcoming him and his family to our shores. We are confident that during his term of office he will ever strive to discharge his duties and responsibilities in a manner that will redound to his credit and to the great advantage of our people. We desire to assure His Excellency and the Duchess of Devonshire that whenever they may be able to visit the Province of Saskatchewan a cordial welcome awaits them.

Today on the battlefields of Europe the great struggle in the interests of humanity continues unabated. As a people we are proud that Canada since the outbreak of war has striven to the full extent of her powers and resources to play her part manfully in the titanic task that confronts Great Britain and her Allies. I rejoice that throughout the whole British

Empire, as well as among the allied nations, there is a grim determination to carry on the contest until victory is positively assured for the permanent establishment and maintenance of those ideals and principles which in the first instance induced the Allies to resort to arms. Whether the end of the struggle be far distant or not, until the goal is actually reached it is the duty of every citizen to consecrate himself anew to the task of doing everything in his power towards securing a final and complete victory.

With this object in view there has recently been inaugurated throughout Canada a scheme for National Service, the immediate object of which is to ascertain as quickly and as definitely as possible our available man power and other resources. It is gratifying to note that throughout the Dominion a ready and patriotic response was given to the request of the Federal authorities in this regard. In this as in all other matters pertaining to the war I am confident that citizens of Saskatchewan stand prepared to respond to the call of duty in whatever form it may come.

As a consequence of the war, one problem of grave moment that confronts every Canadian citizen is that relating to the returned soldier who, at the call of duty and at great sacrifice, has played his part so nobly and heroically at the front. It is most important that ever increasing attention be given to the question of devising ways and means whereby all soldiers as they return may be provided with suitable employment and gradually absorbed once more into civil life. At a conference recently held at Ottawa at which the Federal and all the Provincial authorities were represented, it was recognised that the solution of this problem demanded the united efforts not only of the Governments in Canada but of all our citizens as well. As a result of the conference it is to be expected that provision will be made by the Parliament of Canada whereby soldiers returning to Saskatchewan will be enabled if they so desire to become settlers on Crown lands wherever they are available.

The provision made at your last Session for the levying of a tax for patriotic purposes has met with a hearty response upon the part of the great majority of the municipalities concerned. There has already been paid into the treasury a sum of \$815,000 and it is estimated a further sum of \$185,000 will be forthcoming. There will be placed before you for consideration statements respecting the manner in which these revenues have been disbursed.

While the returns of the harvest for the past year were not so bountiful as was at first anticipated, conditions generally throughout our Province are very satisfactory indeed, due chiefly to the high prices prevailing for all kinds of farm produce. Owing to world conditions, it is very desirable that another effort be made by all our people to increase the production of food and other supplies for Great Britain and her Allies. If the cause of the Allies is to succeed it is imperative that the armies in the field and at home be provided in abundance with the necessaries of life.

In two respects the year 1916 is unique in our history of grain production. Never before were our crops so injuriously affected by the two scourges, rust and hail. The losses to our producers from these causes ran into the millions. In the case of rust the farmers affected had to bear their loss completely, as they were unprotected by any system of insurance. In the case of hail, there were so many storms affecting such large areas that the system of co-operative municipal hail insurance established four years ago was unable out of its revenues and reserve to

meet the total claims made upon it. As a consequence the Hail Commission has been compelled to carry out the provisions of the law and make a pro rata distribution of its assets among the claimants. The question of amending the law so as to provide against a recurrence of these conditions has received the earnest consideration of my Government and measures will be submitted to you looking towards a solution of this difficult and complex problem.

In the Session of 1913 provision was made by law for a plan of loaning money to farmers on long terms on the security of land mortgages. Owing to the unsettled state of the money markets due to the Balkan wars and the present world war, it was deemed inadvisable to bring this law into operation. It would now appear that there is little likelihood for many years to come that money can be secured at the rates of interest that prevailed some four years ago. As a consequence it has been decided that nothing is to be gained by further delay. There will, therefore, be submitted to you a further measure dealing with this problem.

Another question that has been receiving the consideration of my Government is that relating to Workmen's Compensation. While the existing law has been of very great benefit to our working people it is felt that further reforms in this field of usefullegislation should be enacted. A measure having this object in view will be brought down for your consideration.

Throughout the year 1916 the campaign for "Better Schools" secured a great deal of attention on the part of our citizens and many suggestions have reached the Department of Education. The Saskatchewan Public Education League, which played such an important part in this movement, has recommended that until a more thorough survey is made of our elementary school system, legislative action should be deferred. In the meantime, however, it has been decided that provision should be made to secure a more regular attendance of children at school and a more frequent inspection of schools. You will be asked to consider measures having these ends in view.

In recent Sessions all our laws relating to municipal government except The Rural Municipality Act have been revised and consolidated. At the present Session it is proposed that you should complete your labours in this regard by revising the statute which confers upon the residents of the rural portions of our Province the duties and responsibilities of local government.

The referendum recently held on the question of the sale of liquor has resulted in a large majority in favour of provincial prohibition. A measure will be submitted to you putting into effect the wishes of the people in this regard.

Pursuant to certain resolutions adopted by you at your last Session, three Royal Commissions have since then been investigating charges made against Members and officials of my Government and Members of your House. One of the Commissions has completed its labours and its report will be laid before you for your consideration. Another Commission has submitted an interim report which likewise will be handed to you. As a result of these investigations, it is a matter of the greatest satisfaction that no Member of my Government has been found guilty of any improper conduct, but that on the contrary the effect of the inquiries has been to vindicate the honour and integrity of every Minister of the Crown.

The Public Accounts for the last fiscal year will be placed before you. Estimates of expenditures for the next fiscal period prepared with necessary and due regard for economy and the welfare of the public service will be submitted for your consideration.

In leaving you at this time I pray that the blessings and guidance of Divine Providence may attend the prosecution of your labours throughout the Session.

His Honour was then pleased to retire.

I ruled then "that a statement of facts may be questioned in moderate language but the Honourable Member who questions same must not impute intentional falsehood." As to the case in point on which I reserved decision, today, I do not feel called upon to give a ruling in this case as the Honourable Minister of Municipal Affairs was out of order in discussing same in debate as it was not relevant to the subject under discussion and was also a reference to a previous debate in this House during this Session.

I must rule, however, that the point of order raised by the Honourable Member for Prince Albert was not well taken, for, if allowed, it would practically close off all debate in this House.

Let me illustrate: The Honourable Provincial Treasurer may come down to this House this Session and state that the Province has a surplus of \$1,000,000, and as this would be a subject peculiarly within his own knowledge, the House would have to accept the same and no criticism would be allowed. This position would be absurd and contrary to all democratic principles.

- (3) That the aforesaid sums of money shall be raised as provided by The Saskatchewan Loans Act, and may be borrowed for any term or terms not exceeding forty years and at such rate of interest as the Lieutenant Governor in Council may determine; and the said sums shall be raised upon the credit of the General Revenue Fund of Saskatchewan and shall be chargeable thereon.
- (4) That all advances made to the Board by the Provincial Treasurer shall be made upon such terms and conditions as may be determined by the Lieutenant Governor in Council, and that the Board be authorised to execute any bond, obligation or other instrument of any nature whatsoever which the Lieutenant Governor in Council may deem requisite duly and sufficiently to secure the repayment by the Board of the principal sum and interest of the said advances.
- (5) That the total amount of securities issued by the Provincial Treasurer for the said purposes shall not exceed the aggregate amount of the mortgages held by the Board, and upon the proceeds of the said securities being advanced to the Board, mortgages to an amount at least equal in value to the amount of said advance shall be assigned or hypothecated to the Provincial

Treasurer by the Board as security for the said advance; and that any instrument executed by the Board upon the making of any such advance shall contain due provision for such assignment or hypothecation, and provision shall be made therein for the substitution from time to time of other mortgages for such of those under assignment or hypothecation as may become discharged; it being the intention that the collective amount of securities issued under its provisions and of all advances out of the proceeds thereof made to the Board shall at all times be protected and secured by the total amount of mortgages held by the Board; in addition to any other security which may be taken by the Provincial Treasurer from the Board.

(6) That until the securities herein provided for are issued and disposed of by sale or otherwise, the Provincial Treasurer shall have power, subject to the approval of the Lieutenant Governor in Council, to borrow from the General Revenues of the Province or from any person, bank or corporation such sum or sums of money as may be required for advances to the Board to be used by the Board as its working capital until such securities have been disposed of and their proceeds advanced to the Board.

Mr. Martin, a Member of the Executive Council, then acquainted the House that His Honour the Lieutenant Governor, having been informed of the subject matter of the motion, recommends it to the consideration of the House.

- (6) That pending the issue and disposal of any securities provided for by this Act the Provincial Treasurer may, from time to time subject to the approval of the Lieutenant Governor in Council, borrow from the General Revenues of the Province or from any person, bank or corporation such sum or sums of money as may be required for advances to the Board, to be used by the Board as its working capital.
- (7) The Lieutenant Governor in Council shall have power to authorise the Provincial Treasurer to pay from the General Revenues of the Province the salary of the Commissioner for a term of two years and to pay to the Board any sum not exceeding the amount granted by the Legislature for that purpose which may be required to cover the expenses incurred in the organisation and initial administration of the business of the Board; any sums so paid to the Board shall be expended in such manner as may be approved by the Lieutenant Governor in Council and all such expenditures shall be subject to the audit of the Provincial Auditor.

"In Saskatchewan a law was passed in 1915 to prevent a farmer from even giving mortgage security on exempt chattels. Consequently, no matter how much a bank might be disposed to restake a quarter section man whose position had been rendered difficult by a crop failure, it could not afford to take the risk of largely increasing its debt. In the other two provinces the bank can take security for the old debt and stake the borrower without security for another season without putting itself in any worse position and yet give itself and the borrower a chance to recover. This being impossible in Saskatchewan, the average quarter section farmer is now practically shut off from bank credit unless he can get a responsible indorser.

"All such legislation seriously curtails farmers' banking credit and tends to increase interest rates."

(2) Has the Government any information or complaints from farmers or farmers' associations to the effect that the Amendments to

The Exemptions Act passed in 1915 "practically shuts off the bank credit of the average quarter section farmer unless he can get a responsible indorser," or do the conditions admitted by the said banker really exist?

(3) Does the Government contemplate any amendments this Session affecting exemptions on the mortgage of exemptions?

Mr. Langley answered as follows:

- (1) No.
- (2) No.
- (3) No.

Moved by Mr. Dunning, seconded by Mr. Calder,

That this House do immediately resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole House to consider the following Resolution respecting an Act respecting the Treasury Department and the Auditing of Public Accounts:

That it is expedient that:

The Consolidated Fund shall be charged with:

- (a) All costs, charges and expenses incident to the collection, management and receipt thereof, such costs, charges and expenses being subject, nevertheless, to audit and legislative review and vote;
- (b) All loans and other debts contracted by the Lieutenant Governor in Council under any Act of the Legislature by the issue of debentures, or otherwise properly chargeable to Capital Account;
- (c) The interest on such loans or debts, and the sinking funds established for their extinction.

The Lieutenant Governor in Council may from time to time, in case of exigency arising from failure of the revenue from unforeseen causes, direct the treasurer to effect temporary loans chargeable to the Consolidated Fund, in such manner and form, in such amounts, payable at such periods and bearing such rate of interest not exceeding 6 per centum per annum as may be deemed advisable; but such loans shall not exceed the amount of the deficiencies in the current revenue account to meet the charges placed thereon by law, or be applied to any other purpose whatever, nor shall any such loan be made for a period exceeding twelve months.

If, when the Legislature is not in Session, an expenditure not foreseen or provided for, or insufficiently provided for, is urgently and immediately required for the public good, then, upon the report of the treasurer that there is no legislative provision or not sufficient provision therefor, and of the head of the Department having charge of the service that the necessity is urgent and the expenditure for the public good, the Lieutenant Governor in Council may order a special warrant to be prepared to be signed by the Lieutenant Governor authorising the expenditure of the amount estimated to be required.

Under regulations of the Board the treasurer may from time to time advance moneys, out of any appropriation available for the purpose, to provide for imperative expenditures connected with the administration of any institution or establishment sustained at the public expense.

The treasurer may, under any regulation of the Board in that behalf, and out of any appropriation available for the purpose, advance money to persons employed upon public business, for travelling or other necessary expenses.

On the receipt of a report from the Auditor that an item of expenditure for which a voucher has been presented for payment is a just charge on the Consolidated Fund, that the necessity for payment is urgent and that such expenditure cannot be charged to an appropriation either because sufficient provision has not been made therefor or because necessary authority in proper form has not been received by him, the treasurer may authorise the payment thereof by cheque upon a contingent account, which shall be provided for the purpose out of the Consolidated Fund, but at no time shall the balance against the said account exceed the sum of \$10,000.

All expenditures so made shall be reimbursed out of appropriations.

The Lieutenant Governor in Council, whenever he deems it conducive to the public good and when great public inconveniences or great hardship or injustice to individuals would otherwise ensue, may remit any tax or fee payable to His Majesty imposed or authorised to be imposed and relating to any matters within the scope of the powers of the Legislature, or any forfeiture or pecuniary penalty imposed or authorised to be imposed for any contravention of the laws relating to the revenue or to the management of any public work producing revenue, although any part of such forfeiture or penalty be given by law to the informer or prosecutor or to any other party.

That for the purpose of assisting in the maintenance and improvement of public highways leading to market towns there shall be paid by the department out of any legislative appropriation made for public improvements chargeable to income, to each rural municipality on or before the first day of July in each year such grant not less than \$300 nor exceeding \$600 as may be approved by the Lieutenant Governor in Council;

That the total of all such grants paid to all rural municipalities in any fiscal year shall not exceed in the aggregate 80 per centum of the net revenue received by the treasury department during the previous fiscal period from the fees collected for automobile licenses;

That every council receiving such grant shall by resolution, in form prescribed by the minister, determine how and where such grant shall be expended for the purpose for which it is made and a copy of such resolution shall be forwarded to the department on or before the first day of September in each year;

That it shall be the duty of the reeve and secretary treasurer of every rural municipality on or before the first day of November in each year to submit to the council a report in detail, in the form prescribed by the minister, giving particulars as to how and where such grant has been actually expended, which report when approved by the council, shall be forthwith forwarded to the department by the secretary treasurer:

That whenever the minister deems it necessary in the public interest that any submerged or swampy Dominion lands should be reclaimed by drainage in order to facilitate the construction or improvement of public highways through the district in which the said lands are situated, and upon the consent of the Dominion Government having been obtained for the drainage of any bodies of water within the purview of The Irrigation Act, and for the construction of the proposed drainage works on the said lands or for the purpose of draining them, the minister may make application to the Dominion Government for the purchase of such portion of the Dominion lands to be reclaimed as will in the opinion of the minister be sufficient when sold by the department to fully cover the cost of the drainage work and road work, and such lands may be purchased by the department from the Dominion Government upon such terms and conditions as may be approved by the Lieutenant Governor in Council;

That the minister, on making application to the Dominion Government for the purchase of such lands, shall with such application forward to the Minister of the Interior a copy of the report, plans and profiles and estimate of the cost of the proposed drainage work, together with a statement of the estimated benefit to each parcel of land to be affected, made by an engineer appointed by the minister. (New.)

That any land so purchased by the department from the Dominion Government shall be offered for sale by the department at public auction in accordance with such conditions and regulations as may be specified by the Lieutenant Governor in Council and approved by the Dominion Government, and the proceeds of the sale of such lands shall be applied towards reimbursing the department for the cost of construction of said drainage work and road work, including the purchase price paid or to be paid by the department to the Dominion Government for the land, together with all expenses incurred by the department in connection with the sale of lands and the collection of the purchase price paid therefor. "The Commission to have authority to pay an agreed percentage of the cost of large or permanent bridges in cities, towns and villages.

"All roads and bridges in unorganised districts to be under the control of the Commission.

"All construction work, to which the Commission contributes a portion of the cost to be done by contract after tender where the estimated expenditure exceeds \$50."

Mr. Speaker ruled that the amendment of the Member for Moose Jaw City (Mr. Willoughby) was out of order inasmuch as it proposed to substitute for the motion for the second reading a resolution which declared a principle adverse to the principle of the Bill. He could only move in this manner that the Bill be not read now, but at some future date.

That for the purpose of assisting in the maintenance and improvement of public highways leading to market towns there shall be paid by the department out of any legislative appropriation made for public improvements chargeable to income, to each rural municipality on or before the first day of July in each year such grant not less than \$300 nor exceeding \$600 as may be approved by the Lieutenant Governor in Council;

That the total of all such grants paid to all rural municipalities in any fiscal year shall not exceed in the aggregate 80 per centum of the net revenue received by the treasury department during the previous fiscal

period from the fees collected for automobile licenses;

That every council receiving such grant shall by resolution, in form prescribed by the minister, determine how and where such grant shall be expended for the purpose for which it is made and a copy of such resolution shall be forwarded to the department on or before the first day of September in each year;

That it shall be the duty of the reeve and secretary treasurer of every rural municipality on or before the first day of November in each year to submit to the council a report in detail, in the form prescribed by the minister, giving particulars as to how and where such grant has been actually expended, which report when approved by the council, shall be forthwith forwarded to the department by the secretary treasurer;

That whenever the minister deems it necessary in the public interest that any submerged or swampy Dominion lands should be reclaimed by drainage in order to facilitate the construction or improvement of public highways through the district in which the said lands are situated, and upon the consent of the Dominion Government having been obtained for the drainage of any bodies of water within the purview of The Irrigation Act and for the construction of the proposed drainage works on the said lands or for the purpose of draining them, the minister may make application to the Dominion Government for the purchase of such portion of the Dominion lands to be reclaimed as will in the opinion of the minister be sufficient when sold by the department to fully cover the cost of the drainage work and road work, and such lands may be purchased by the department from the Dominion Government upon such terms and conditions as may be approved by the Lieutenant Governor in Council;

That the minister, on making application to the Dominion Government for the purchase of such lands, shall with such application forward to the Minister of the Interior a copy of the report, plans and profiles and estimate of the cost of the proposed drainage work, together with a statement of the estimated benefit to each parcel of land to be affected, made by an engineer appointed by the minister. (New.)

That any land so purchased by the department from the Dominion Government, shall be offered for sale by the department at public auction in accordance with such conditions and regulations as may be specified by the Lieutenant Governor in Council and approved by the Dominion Government, and the proceeds of the sale of such lands shall be applied towards reimbursing the department for the cost of construction of said drainage work and road work, including the purchase price paid or to be paid by the department to the Dominion Government for the land, together with all expenses incurred by the department in connection with the sale of lands and the collection of the purchase price paid therefor. Any surplus money remaining after the total cost of such drainage work and road work shall have been repaid to the department, shall be refunded to the Dominion Government.

The Lieutenant Governor in Council may authorise the Provincial Treasurer to lend to the company on any warehouse acquired or established by it a sum equal to 75 per centum of the appraised value thereof, such loans to bear interest at a rate not exceeding 6 per centum per annum and to be payable in twenty equal annual instalments of principal and interest combined, the first instalment of principal and interest to be due and payable at the expiration of the first year from the date of the loan.

All such loans shall be secured by a first mortgage on the property upon which the loan is made.

The aggregate amount of such loans unpaid at any time shall not exceed \$75,000.

- (2) The Lieutenant Governor in Council may make any regulations deemed necessary to insure efficient service to the public in all such cold storage warehouses, and may by such regulations impose penalties not exceeding \$50 on any person offending against them.
- (3) The Lieutenant Governor in Council may rom time to time and on such terms and conditions as may be agreed on with the company, authorise the Provincial Treasurer to lend to the company:
 - (a) For the purpose of aiding in the acquisition or construction extension or remodelling of any creamery, cheese factory or other building required for the purpose of the company's business, a sum not to exceed 75 per centum of the cost of the building or of such extension or remodelling;
 - (b) In the event of certain localities of the Province being colonised by returned soldiers and upon application for the establishment of a local being signed by a number of such residents, such number to be determined by the minister, a sum equal to the cost of any creamery, cheese factory or other building required for the purposes of the local.

The balances of principal money remaining unpaid from time to time upon a loan shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding 6 per centum per annum.

Every loan shall be secured by a first mortgage upon the property in respect of which it is made.

- (4) The funds required for loans under this Act shall be raised in the manner provided by The Agricultural Aids Act, being Chapter 57 of the Statutes of 1913.
- (5) Subject to the approval of the Lieutenant Governor in Council and upon such terms and conditions as may be fixed by him, the Provincial Treasurer may from time to time enter into agreements with the company and with any person, bank or corporation to guarantee the repayment with interest of moneys advanced to the company for purposes authorised by this Act, and the company may secure the Government against loss through such guarantee in such manner or form as the Lieutenant Governor in Council may approve.

And whereas the said Commissioners began their inquiry into the matters referred to them on the nineteenth day of April, 1916, and between that date and the seventh day of December of the same year held sittings for some 135 days;

And whereas during the course of the inquiry it was held to be the duty of the Commissioners under the terms of their commission to inquire into all matters pertaining to the construction of road and bridge work undertaken by the Board of Highways Commission during the years 1913, 1914, 1915 and 1916, for the purpose of ascertaining whether or not any possible fraud was committed in connection with any of the said works;

And whereas the inquiry if allowed to proceed along this line would undoubtedly be spread over a long period of years at enormous cost to the Province:

And whereas during the course of the said inquiry numerous persons from distant parts of the Province were required to attend as witnesses at great inconvenience, loss of time and expense;

And whereas notwithstanding the fact that in the general public interest it is desirable that all necessary inquiries should be completed at as early a date as possible the Commissioners have been compelled to adjourn their sittings till the sixteenth day of April next;

And whereas the said Commissioners have completed their inquiries into certain matters referred to them and have submitted to the Lieutenant Governor in Council an interim report in which they set forth their findings, which report has been laid on the table of the House and has been received and adopted by this House;

And whereas in the general public interest it is desirable that steps should be taken by the House to devise some means whereby such inquiries as are still necessary may be expedited, the cost thereof to the public treasury materially reduced and necessary witnesses protected against loss of time and inconvenience;

"That whereas we are advised that the whole question of medical education will be brought up in the discussion before the Committee of the Legislature when considering the Bill respecting Chiropractics and as it appears to us that it is in the interests of the public that such legislation be delayed till such time as the whole question may be considered by an independent body such as the Senate of the University, we agree on behalf of the Council of the College of Physicians and Surgeons not to institute prosecutions against anyone at present practising Chiropractics in the Province until the Investigating Committee from the University reports to the next meeting of the Legislature. The Royal assent to these Bills was announced by the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly in the following words:

"In His Majesty's name His Honour the Lieutenant Governor doth assent to these Bills."

Mr. Speaker then said:

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOUR:

The Legislative Assembly of the Province of Saskatchewan in session assembled approach Your Honour at the close of their labours with sentiments of unfeigned loyalty and humbly beg to present for Your Honour's acceptance a Bill intituled "An Act for granting to His Majesty Certain Sums of Money for the Public Service of the Fiscal Years ending respectively the thirtieth day of April, 1917, and the thirtieth day of

April, 1918," thus placing at the disposal of His Majesty the means by which the Government can be made efficient for the service and welfare of the Province.

The Royal assent to this Bill was announced by the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly in the following words:

"In His Majesty's name His Honour the Lieutenant Governor doth thank the Legislative Assembly, accepts their benevolence and assents to this Bill."

His Honour then delivered the following speech:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

It is now my duty to relieve you from attendance at this the Sixth Session of our Third Legislature and in doing so I desire to give you the assurance that the results of your deliberations and labours during the Session will be of very great benefit to the people of the Province.

The question of making suitable provision whereby the necessary funds will be forthcoming to enable our citizens generally to bear their proper share of the duty which devolves upon them to provide for the dependents of our soldiers at the Front has again received your consideration and I am confident our people will unanimously approve the steps you have taken to increase the taxes to be levied for this purpose.

Another war time problem which will demand ever increasing attention upon the part of all the people of Canada is that relating to the soldiers who return from Europe. It is imperative that the necessary organisation should be brought into being so that the returned soldiers may be absorbed again into our civic life with the least possible delay and distress. I am pleased to note that you have had the matter under deliberation in so far as Saskatchewan soldiers are concerned and that you have passed a measure to provide for the handling of this problem by a Commission. I am confident that this Commission in the discharge of its important functions will receive the whole-hearted support of every patriotic citizen.

Your enactment of a measure providing for special representation in the next Legislature of our soldiers in Great Britain, France and Belgium cannot but be regarded as a fitting solution of a very difficult problem and a suitable recognition of the patriotic services rendered by all our Overseas forces. From now on, for some years to come, there will be many problems arising out of the war that will demand the attention of this Assembly and for this special reason it is very desirable that our soldier citizens should have a direct voice in dealing with these problems.

Your action in providing a measure for supplying the farmers of the Province with money for agricultural purposes at lower rates of interest and on more satisfactory terms than have heretofore prevailed will, I am certain, meet with the approbation of all who are interested in the future development of our Province. It is confidently expected that in a few short years the provision you have made for this purpose will bring a large measure of relief to many thousands of our farmers who in the past have been more or less restricted in their operations by conditions heretofore prevailing.

Owing to the widespread sentiment among our people in favour of restricting the traffic in intoxicating liquors the enactment of The Saskat-



chewan Temperance Act, together with the Act to prevent the keeping within our borders of stores of liquor for export, will undoubtedly have the indorsation of all who are interested in the cause of temperance reform. By the adoption of these measures you have once more shown that Saskatchewan stands prepared to lead the other Provinces in Canada in the movement that has been sweeping the Dominion in favour of the restriction of the liquor traffic.

All who are interested in the cause of education will be pleased to observe that during the Session you have made more adequate provision for the inspection of schools and the attendance of children. Your decision also to arrange for a comprehensive survey of our whole school system by a competent expert, aided by local educational authorities, will be universally regarded as of very great significance. Upon the thoroughness of this survey and the practical recommendations that result therefrom will depend in a very large measure the course of action to be taken by future Legislatures in moulding our educational institutions so as to produce the highest type of citizenship.

I desire to thank you for the liberal provision you have made for carrying on the work of government in all the various branches of the public service.

Before taking leave of you and closing the Session I desire once more to bring to your attention and to the attention of all our people the very grave necessity which exists for further united action in connection with all matters pertaining to the Great War. While there are indications that the stupendous struggle is drawing nearer to a close it is universally recognised by Great Britain and her Allies that if the principles of liberty, justice and democracy are eventually to prevail a last supreme effort must be made by all to secure these ends. In the past the people of Saskatchewan have done their duty nobly and I take this opportunity at the close of this Session to once more appeal to all our men and women to consecrate themselves anew to do their very utmost in every phase of patriotic endeavour.

The Hon. Mr. Turgeon then said:

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

It is the will and pleasure of His Honour the Lieutenant Governor that this Legislative Assembly be prorogued until it pleases His Honour to summon the same for the dispatch of business, and the Legislative Assembly is accordingly prorogued.
