FIRST SESSION—FIRST LEGISLATURE

THURSDAY, MARCH 29, 1906.

At the First Session of the First Legislative Assembly of the Province of Saskatchewan begun on the twenty-ninth day of March, 1906. On which day, being the first day of the meeting of this Assembly for the Despatch of Business, John A. Reid, Clerk of the Executive Council, delivered to S. Spencer Page, Clerk of the Legislative Assembly, a certificate containing a list of the names of such Members as had been returned to serve in this Assembly, which is as follows :

3 O'CLOCK P.M.

The Members having been duly sworn and having subscribed the Roll containing the Oath, repaired to their seats in the House.

3.15 O'CLOCK P.M.

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor entered the House and took his seat on the Throne.

The Provincial Secretary then said :

I am commanded by His Honour the Lieutenant Governor to inform you that he will defer stating the reasons for which he has summoned the Legislature until the Legislative Assembly have elected a Speaker. It is, therefore, His Honour's pleasure that the Legislative Assembly do now proceed to the election of a Speaker and present him here for His Honour's approbation.

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor then retired from the House.

Mr. Scott then addressed himself to the Clerk (who, standing up, bowed, and then sat down), proposed to the House for their Speaker Thomas MacNutt, Esquire, Member for the Electoral District of Saltcoats, and moved that he do take the Chair of the House as Speaker, which resolution was seconded by Mr. Lamont.

The question being put by the Clerk, it was

Resolved unanimously, That Thomas MacNutt, Esquire, do take the Chair of this House as Speaker, and the Clerk having declared Thomas MacNutt, Esquire, duly elected, he was conducted by Messieurs Scott and Lamont to the Chair, where, he then said :

GENTLEMEN,—

I beg to express my grateful thanks and humble acknowledgment of the high honour the House has been pleased to confer on me, and, while I leave the floor of this House to take the Speaker's Chair, I feel that I also leave all political or partisan feelings in order that I may discharge, with impartiality to all and to the best of my ability, the various and important duties pertaining to the high office of the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Saskatchewan.

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor then re-entered the House and took his seat on the Throne.

The Speaker then addressed His Honour to the following effect :

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOUR,—

The Legislative Assembly have elected me as their Speaker, although I am but little able to fulfil the important duties thus assigned to me.

If, in the performance of those duties, I should at any time fall into error, I pray that the fault may be imputed to me and not to the Assembly whose servant I am, and who, through me, the better to enable them to discharge their duty to their King and country, hereby humbly claim all their undoubted rights and privileges especially that they may have freedom of speech in their debates, access to your person at all seasonable times and that their proceedings may receive from you the most favourable consideration.

The Provincial Secretary then said—

MR. SPEAKER,—

I am commanded by His Honour the Lieutenant Governor to declare to you that he freely confides in the duty and attachment of the Assembly to His Majesty's person and Government, and not doubting that their proceedings will be conducted with wisdom, temper and prudence, he grants, and upon all occasions will recognise and allow, their constitutional privileges.

I am commanded also to assure you that the Assembly shall have ready access to His Honour upon all seasonable occasions, and that their proceedings as well as your words and actions will constantly receive from him the most favourable construction.

His Honour was then pleased to open the Session with the following speech :

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,—

Since the closing, in this hall, on the Eighth day of October, 1904, of the Third Session of the Fifth Legislative Assembly of the North-West Territories, the hope then entertained for an early establishment of provincial institutions in the West has been amply realised.

Parliament at its last Session passed two Acts after one of the most interesting debates ever heard at Ottawa, providing for the creation of the Provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan in that part of the Dominion lying between the Provinces of Manitoba and British Columbia, and south of the sixtieth parallel of north latitude, thus completing a chain of Provinces from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and thereby fulfilling the hopes of the Fathers of Confederation of forty years ago.

As was also the case in the neighbouring Province of Alberta the provincial Act came into force in this Province on the First day of September last, amidst universal rejoicing. The inaugural festivities were honoured by the presence of Their Excellencies the Governor General and Lady Grey, the Right Honourable the Premier of Canada and Lady Laurier, together with numerous other distinguished visitors, each and all manifesting the deepest interest in the event.

It has been a matter of considerable gratification to note the kindly expressions of welcome into the Canadian Federation extended to this Province voiced in the Addresses made at the opening of Parliament and the various Provincial Legislatures, and I am sure that these sentiments are warmly reciprocated by all.

As you are aware, in pursuance of the new constitution an executive Government was early organised, and a general election of representatives of the several electoral districts into which the Province is divided, duly held. Today it gives me very great pleasure to welcome you as the Members of the first Legislative Assembly of the Province of Saskatchewan, and to congratulate you in thus being privileged to participate in an event of such importance.

I feel confident that I shall only voice your own sentiments in taking advantage of the presence of His Royal Highness Prince Arthur of Connaught, whose visit to this City is shortly expected, in transmitting through him to our Gracious Sovereign the assurance of our sincere continued feeling of loyalty and attachment to his Crown, together with our grateful appreciation and warm thanks for the kind message sent to us on Inauguration Day, in which His Majesty expressed earnest hope for our prosperous future.

I am happy to be able to congratulate you on the prosperous conditions generally prevailing throughout the Province, and the success which is attending the efforts of our people in the various pursuits in which they are engaged. Short as has been the time since the organisation of our new Province, we have great cause for thanksgiving that the many blessings which our people have in the past enjoyed through the mercies of a kind Providence are still being continued to us.

You will be pleased to learn that the inaugural year of this Province has proved to be most auspicious in so far as the reward given to the labours of our agriculturists is concerned. The results of the first

harvest gathered after the establishment of the Province have only just been accurately determined, and indicate that an era of general prosperity has been entered upon, the limits of which can hardly be estimated. Within the boundaries of this Province, twenty-six million bushels of wheat have actually passed through the threshing machine during the past season. What this means may perhaps be partially gathered from consideration of the fact that, over the area now comprising the Provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan, in the season of 1904-5 only sixteen million bushels of wheat were threshed.

The Dominion Government has recently seen fit to withdraw the assistance formerly given to the dairy industry in the West, and it has seemed advisable to my Government that the results of the valuable work hitherto accomplished should not be lost by the abandonment of Government control and supervision of this important and profitable branch of agricultural husbandry. Every effort will be exerted by my Government to suggest in some cases and in others provide means for co-operative and educational work such as from time to time may be deemed of advantage, with a view to giving the industry such an impetus as shall ensure its perpetuation and progression upon the most satisfactory basis.

The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company has taken steps to prosecute with the utmost despatch the construction of its proposed lines in Saskatchewan. The Canadian Northern and the Canadian Pacific Railway Companies have also announced their intention of materially extending their systems throughout Western Canada. As a consequence I feel confident that all classes of our people will soon experience the beneficent results arising from the construction and operation of these important works.

The continued and rapid settlement of Western Canada is most gratifying. Being satisfied that there is every reason to hope for indefinite expansion in this direction my Government will, with your approval, take steps to encourage and assist in every way possible those who are seeking homes in our midst.

Under the terms of The Saskatchewan Act the laws in force at the date of the establishment of the Province are not affected by the constitutional change which has taken place. So long as these laws continue to give satisfaction it is the intention of my Government to leave them to their operation, only asking for their amendment or repeal as circumstances may demand. For general convenience, however, it is deemed advisable to have all the laws now in force revised and consolidated at an early date, and a Bill with that object in view will be laid before you.

As a consequence of the establishment of the Province it has become necessary to ask your approval to measures relating to the Lieutenant Governor, the Executive Council, the Legislative Assembly and the several Departments of the Public Service.

In view of the numerous applications to be made to you for the grant of railway charters the question has been engaging the attention of my advisers, and a Bill dealing with the subject will be submitted for your consideration.

You will also be invited to consider Bills relating to real property, public libraries, coroners, police and other matters of importance.

The Public Accounts and reports of the several Departments will be submitted to you at an early date.

The estimated requirements of the public services of the Province will also be laid before you. You will find that they have been prepared with due regard to economy and general efficiency.

I now leave you to your deliberations, fully believing that you will give to all matters which may be brought before you your closest attention, and hoping that your labours under Divine guidance will turn to the best advantage of the Province.

His Honour was then pleased to retire.

Mr. Speaker informed the House that in order to prevent mistakes, he had obtained a copy of the Speech of His Honour the Lieutenant Governor, which was laid on the Table.

Ordered, That Mr. Scott have leave to introduce a Bill respecting the Administration of Oaths.

He accordingly presented the said Bill and the same was received and read the first time, and

Ordered, To be read a second time on Monday next.

On motion of Mr. Scott, seconded by Mr. Lamont,

Ordered, That the Speech of His Honour the Lieutenant Governor to this House be taken into consideration on Monday next.

On motion of Mr. Scott, seconded by Mr. Calder,

Ordered, The Select Standing Committees of the House for the Present Session be appointed for the following purposes: 1, Standing Orders; 2, Privileges and Elections; 3, Public Accounts and Printing; 4, Law Amendments and Municipal Law; 5, Agriculture; 6, Education and Library; 7, Private Bills and Railways; which said Committees shall severally be empowered to examine and enquire into all such matters and things as shall be referred to them, and shall report from time to time their operations and opinions thereon, with power to send for persons, papers and records.

On motion of Mr. Scott, seconded by Mr. Calder,

Ordered, That a Special Committee consisting of Messieurs Sutherland, Gillis, Haultain, Stewart, Champagne, Wylie and the Mover and Seconder be appointed to prepare and report with all convenient speed a list of Members to compose the Select Standing Committees of this House.

And then the House adjourned at 3.50 o'clock p.m.

TO THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

Most Gracious Sovereign :

We, Your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, Members of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Saskatchewan of the Dominion of Canada in Session assembled, desire to humbly express to Your Majesty the satisfaction felt by the people of that part of Your Majesty's Possessions beyond the Seas whom we represent with the kind and gracious good wishes for our future prosperity expressed by Your Majesty through His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion on the occasion of the establishment of this Province,

We humbly desire to assure Your Majesty of our loyal and earnest hope that a beneficent Providence may long spare you to reign over us, and that your reign may mark a period in the history of the Empire that shall be greatly blessed by peace and advancement in all matters of public concern.

Dated at this Legislative Assembly Chamber, at Regina, in the Province of Saskatchewan, this Sixth day of April, and in the Sixth Year of Your Majesty's reign.

The Address as prepared was read by Mr. Speaker all the Members standing, and it was unanimously

Ordered, That the Report be now received and concurred in.

On motion of Mr. Scott, seconded by Mr. Haultain,

Ordered, That the Address to His Majesty be engrossed, signed by Mr. Speaker and forwarded by His Honour the Lieutenant Governor through the proper channel for presentation to His Majesty.

On motion of Mr. Scott, seconded by Mr. Haultain,

Ordered that the condolences of this House be extended by Mr. Speaker to the widow and family of the late Thomas Tweed, Esquire, upon their recent bereavment.

On motion of Mr. Scott, seconded by Mr. Lamont,

Ordered, That hereafter until the end of the Session if the business of the House is not finished at half past five o'clock Mr. Speaker shall leave the Chair until eight o'clock p.m.

We, His Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Saskatchewan, in Session assembled, humbly thank your Honour for the gracious Speech which Your Honour has been pleased to address to us at the opening of the present Session.

And the Debate continuing,

And the Question being again proposed,

Mr. Gillis moved in amendment, seconded by Mr. Wellington,

That the following words be added at the end of the Question?

While gladly joining with your Honour in mutual felicitations upon the establishment of our own Province of Saskatchewan as well as of the sister Province of Alberta, we must most respectfully express our regret that in their establishment that important principal of absolute equality among the Provinces of the Dominion, which is the only sure guarantee of the permanency of the Confederation structure, has not been adhered to in several important respects and notably in regard to lands, timber and minerals of the Province, and the legislative jurisdiction with respect to education and taxation,

The people of this Province unanimously held the view that when the Province was established it was only fair, just and proper that the land, timber and mineral resources in the Province should be handed over to the people dwelling there, to be managed and owned by them in the same way as in every other part of the Dominion except in the Province of Manitoba. They further asked for and expected that compensation for the lands in the Province alienated for federal purposes would be made to the new Provinces and regarded their claim to compensation in this respect as a supremely important item of the demand made by the people of the West for Provincial Autonomy.

We believe that the public lands of the North-West Territories were simply held in trust by Parliament until such times as Provinces should be established in that area.

We further believe that the public lands of the Province can be managed more efficiently, economically and satisfactorily by the Province than by Canada and that there was no good reason for a departure from the principle of the Confederation Act in the case of the Province of Saskatchewan.

We not only dissent from the principle of a money grant in lieu of lands contained in the Saskatchewan Act but we further claim that the compensation offered by that Act is manifestly unfair and inadequate, and regret that Your Honour's advisers have not expressed any intention of establishing our claim in this respect by way of reference to the Courts.

We desire also to record our most empathic protest against those provisions of the Saskatchewan Act which assume to limit or restrict the powers of this Legislature, with regard to the important matter of Education, in a manner, and to an extent, in our opinion, beyond the powers of Parliament and contrary to the terms of the B.N.A. Act, 1867-1886.

We regret that your Honour's advisers have been willing to accept these limitations and restrictions instead of immediately taking steps by way of reference to the Courts to permanently establish the rights of the Province in this most important respect.

We view with alarm the insidious attempt made under the guise of legal and constitutional argument to bind upon the people of this Province forever a system of education which separates instead of unites, which estranges instead of harmonises, and which is based on principles of privilege instead of equality.

While prepared to abide loyally by the Constitution in every respect we cannot, until it is so decided by the Judicial Committee of His Majesty's Privy Council, accept any interpretation of that Constitution which deprives this Province of the right and power to establish that system of National Schools which we believe to be the only system, under which the various races and nationalities, which make up our mixed population, can be unified, harmonised and assimilated into a homogeneous people.

We further most respectfully regret that Your Honour's Speech contains no reference to the question of the Hudson's Bay Route, a question which by reason of its paramount importance to the farmers of this country should have been taken up without any delay by Your Honour's advisers.

We also desire to express our grave dissatisfaction that there is no intimation of any action on the part of the Government to vindicate the constitutional right of this Province to tax all classes of property equally by removing the exemption of the Canadian Pacific Railway, which has so unfairly and improperly been sought to be perpetuated by the terms of the Autonomy Act.

(2) To each society which has during the preceding year held a meeting or meetings as provided in clause 1 in section 3 of this Act the sum of ten dollars for each such meeting held up to the number of two.

(3) To each society which has during the preceding year undertaken co-operative agricultural experiments under the direction of the department the sum of five dollars for each experiment selected and satisfactorily carried out.

(4) To each society holding an exhibition and to any incorporated company or board of management of a joint exhibition holding an exhibition whose total expenditure for prizes at such exhibition exceeds \$250 an amount equal to two-thirds of the amount actually paid out for such prizes, but not exceeding the sum of \$1000.

(5) To each society holding a seed grain fair an amount equal to two-thirds of the amount actually paid out for prizes but not exceeding sum of \$100.

(6) To each society holding on any day of its exhibition in any year a live stock judging competition at which prizes amounting to not less than sixteen dollars are awarded and paid the sum of sixteen dollars.

(7) To each society holding in any year a seed grain field competition at which prizes amounting to not less than \$100 are awarded and paid the sum of \$100.

Provided that no grant shall be paid to any such society under the provisions of this section for any experimental work exhibition or competition unless all regulations framed by the Department for the guidance of societies in respect to such have been complied with ;

Provided further that no grant shall be paid to any such society under the provisions of this section unless all returns required by the Commissioner have been filed in the Department on or before the thirty-first day of December in each year ;

Provided further that the commissioner may withhold payment in respect to any prize offered at any exhibition held as provided in clause

4 hereof which, in his opinion, is not calculated to promote the legitimate objects of an agricultural exhibition ;

Provided further that no incorporated company that permits voting by proxy or allows more than one vote to be exercised by each shareholder irrespective of the number of shares owned or controlled by such shareholder shall be entitled to any grant under clause 4 ;

Provided further that no grant shall be paid to any agricultural society or exhibition company as provided in clause 4 hereof if upon a report of the Superintendent of Fairs and Institutes or other official authorised by the Commissioner to attend and report upon agricultural exhibitions it shall appear that at any exhibition held under the management of such society or exhibition company there were upon the grounds on which such exhibition was held or within 300 yards of the same any gambling device or apparatus for carrying on games of chance or any shows or exhibits of an immoral or obscene nature.

Therefore be it Resolved that this House views with gratification the statements by Sir Wilfred Laurier made in Parliament on 3rd April, 1906, that "the people West of Lake Superior attach great importance to the construction of that railway, and not one of them attach greater importance to the construction of that railway than I do myself. . . . It is not enough for us to confine our views to the Canada that is now settled, we must look ahead and we must push northward as far as colonisation can go. I have great confidence that before many years are passed we shall see towns and villages on the shores of Hudson's Bay, as we see on the shores of Norway, where the people will be prosperously engaged in the lumbering business, the pulp industry, the fishing industry, the mining industry and others."

Whereas, previous to the year 1899 the grading of wheat in the Manitoba Inspection District was performed in so lax a manner, and the grain exported from western points was so deteriorated in value by systematic mixing that it was generally recognised the situation was one calling for drastic remedial measures; and

Whereas, in 1899, certain amendments with that end in view were made by Parliament to The General Inspection Act, by which the regular grades of wheat are permanently established by law; and

Whereas, experience has established the fact that the said grades have been fixed at an excessively high technical standard, so much so that even after such a favourable season as that of last year only about three per cent. of the western wheat crop was admitted into the highest grade; and

Whereas, the inducement to immigration that the Province of Saskatchewan holds out as a field for profitable and successful agriculture is dependent largely upon our official record as a heavy grower of high grade wheat; and

Whereas, a comparison of the standards of The General Inspection Act with those of similar standards specified in similar legislation in the State of Minnesota, shows that the Canadian standard is named quite one grade lower than those of that State for wheat of identically the same quality; and

Whereas, it does not appear to be in the public interest that Western Canada grades should be set so exceedingly high as to practically exclude western wheat, with its well established reputation for quality, from securing the place its quality fairly entitles it to; and

Whereas, the Grain Grower's Association of Saskatchewan in Convention assembled at Moose Jaw in the month of February last, and a similar organisation representing the Grain Growers of Manitoba, meeting at Brandon about the same time, both expressed themselves as strongly opposed to the present classification of wheat grades;

Therefore, be it Resolved that this Assembly do urge upon the Dominion Government the advisability of readjusting the present grades of wheat as established by The General Inspection Act so as to permit of a larger percentage of the best wheat to enter into the highest grade, and thereby remove the very erroneous impression being created that Western Canada is not capable of growing, even in most favorable seasons, more than a very small percentage of No. 1 hard wheat, an impression which is entirely due to the unreasonably high standard set up by the Act and not to the quality of the wheat grown or to the capabilities of the country producing it.

- (a) The number of days on which he has attended the Session ;

Whereas the said report purports to represent that there are no more than some 13,750,000 acres in the Canadian West, that is to say in the Provinces of Manitoba, Alberta and Saskatchewan, susceptible of cultivation, notwithstanding the fact that in this Province alone there are, in the districts now in process of becoming occupied over 70,000,000 acres of land, 1,639,563 acres of which were actually under crop in the year 1905; and

Whereas the said report further states that Canada, as a whole, can ultimately only be expected to furnish 75 per cent. of the 220,000,000 bushels of grain required to supply the requirements of Great Britain or 165,000,000 bushels, whilst in 1905, at the very beginning of her existence this Province produced 26,107,286 bushels of wheat alone, the three Western Provinces producing 84,175,226 bushels or one-half of Professor Mavor's limit of production; and

Whereas the data upon which Professor Mavor bases his principal conclusions are not in accordance with well established facts as to climate soil, arable area and the actual conditions of agriculture in this Western country, with the result that these conclusions seriously misrepresent the wheat raising possibilities of the Canadian West and particularly of the Province of Saskatchewan; and

Whereas these conclusions have been so extensively advertised by publication in the press of the United Kingdom and have the authority that attaches to an official publication of the British Government;

Therefore be it resolved, that this House declares the aforesaid Report to be misleading and damaging in its effects, and indorses the general grounds taken in the Report upon the subject of condemnation of Professor Mavor's article made by a Committee of the Winnipeg Board of Trade, adopted at the annual meeting of that body on February 6 last.

"To His Most Gracious Majesty:

"We, the Senate and the Members of the House of Commons of Canada in Parliament assembled, beg to humbly convey to Your Majesty, with the assurance of our loyalty and devotion to Your Royal Person, the expression of the desire and hope, long and fervently cherished by all British subjects inhabiting British North America, that Your Majesty would be graciously pleased to honour them with Your Majesty's presence, and thereby enable them to offer the personal tribute of their unwavering attachment to the Crown and the Government of the Empire, of their deep affection for Your Majesty's person, and their profound admiration for those kingly virtues and truly humanitarian deeds which have earned for Your Majesty first place among the great sovereigns of the world.

"Nearly fifty years ago Your Majesty, then the heir apparent to the throne which Your Majesty now adorns, honoured Canada with your Presence on the occasion of the inauguration of the Victoria bridge.

"We, therefore, most humbly pray that Your Majesty and Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen will honour the Dominion of Canada with their presence at such time as may be selected by Your Majesty."

And whereas the presence of Their Most Gracious Majesties would nowhere in the Empire be more heartily and loyally acclaimed than on the prairies of Canada;

Therefore be it resolved that this House do most earnestly support the action taken by Parliament in inviting Their Most Gracious Majesties King Edward VII and His Royal Consort to visit this part of His Majesty's Dominions beyond the Seas and expresses the sincere hope that the prayer of the people of Canada through their representatives in Parliament may be favourably entertained.

That the Bill does not commend itself to this House in the following important respects :

1. In that in only requiring twenty-five per cent. of the capital of any company to be subscribed and two and one-half per cent. of the capital to be paid up before the company is allowed to organise for active operations the Bill does not require a sufficient guarantee of good faith and capacity on the part of persons applying for the important and valuable franchise granted by a Railway Charter.

2. In that while compelling companies to fence their right of way it does not recognise the law and practice of the Province of cattle running at large during either a portion or the whole of the year, and practically limits the right to damages for animals killed or injured to cases where cattle are strictly confined to their owner's property and compels owners of stock either to abandon the existing method of running stock or to forfeit all right to damages which can only result from the failure of railway companies to erect and maintain fences.

3. In that it renders cattle running at large liable to be impounded if within fifty yards of the point of intersection of any highway with any railway, thereby reversing the conditions upon which cattle are allowed to run at large during the winter months in the Herd District and during the whole year in all other parts of the Province, and imposing upon owners of stock the expense and inconvenience of fencing or herding.

4. In that it makes no adequate provision for the prevention of prairie and forest fires by compelling Railway Companies to plough and maintain fire guards and to take other necessary precautions against fire.

That for the foregoing reasons this Bill be not now read a third time but that it be referred back to the Committee of the Whole House for the purpose of further amendment.

And the Question being put on the Amendment,
It was resolved in the Affirmative.

The House, according to Order, resolved itself into Committee of the Whole on the Bill (No. 73) to amend The Mechanics Lien Ordinance, and, after some time spent therein, Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair and Mr. Sutherland reported the Bill.

Ordered, That the Report be now received.

Ordered, That the Bill (No. 73) be now read a third time.

The said Bill was accordingly read the third time.

Resolved, That this Bill do now pass and be intituled "An Act to amend The Mechanics Lien Ordinance."

The Order of the Day being read for the House in the Committee of Ways and Means.

Mr. Calder moved, seconded by Mr. Scott,

And the question being proposed, That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair.

Mr. Haultain moved in amendment, seconded by Mr. Elliott,

That all the words after "that" to the end of the question be struck out and the following substituted therefor:

"The salaries paid to Ministers and the elaborate machinery of Government proposed to be created are out of all proportion to the area to be administered and the current income of the Province.

"The cost of legislation, more especially the amount of the sessional indemnity and the allowance to Mr. Speaker, is unnecessarily large.

"The grant to the Western Canadian Immigration Association is not warranted by any information furnished by the Government to this House and is an unnecessary contribution from the funds of this Province towards an organisation which was primarily formed in the interest of large land owning companies and individuals.

"The proposed expenditure of \$75,000 per annum for the services of the R.N.W.M. Police is unwarranted in view of the repeated statements of Members of the Government and the definite understanding of the people of the Province that the maintenance of the force was an important part of the obligation assumed by the Federal authorities under the autonomy arrangements relating to the lands of this Province. The agreement entered into by the Government on behalf of the Province with the Dominion Government does not secure either the definite or continuous performance of any of the services supposed to be paid for. There is no binding agreement as to the number of men to be stationed in the Province nor has the Provincial Government any authority over the location or disposal of such members of the Force as are in the Province.

"The increased cost of the machinery of Government and Legislation and the withdrawal from current income of large sums of money for the

purposes of capital expenditure on buildings which will be a permanent asset of the Province, decreases the amount which should be available for roads, bridges and other useful purposes at a time when public improvements are most necessary."

And the Question being put on the Amendment, the House divided and the names were taken down as follows:

On motion of Mr. Lamont, seconded by Mr. Haultain,

Resolved, That whereas, on the twelfth of June, 1811, the Hudson's Bay Company under the authority of the Royal Charter granted to them on the second of May, 1669, by King Charles the Second, executed a deed in London, England, by which they transferred to Thomas, Earl of Selkirk, a tract of land in this country containing 116,493 superficial miles, or 74,555,520 acres exclusive of water. A portion of this land thus deeded now forms the Province of Manitoba and another portion is included in the new Province of Saskatchewan;

And whereas, one of the objects in view for conveying these lands to the Earl of Selkirk was for the purpose of establishing a British Colony in the country known thereafter as the District of Assiniboia;

And whereas, in this deed of 1811, it was and is expressly provided that one tenth of the said 74,555,520 acres be set aside for free grants to be from time to time given to retired servants of the Hudson's Bay Company settling in the country, the quantity of land to be given such servant being according to his rank or grade in the service; in other words the deed provided that nine-tenths of the land would belong to Lord Selkirk and his heirs forever and one-tenth of the land would belong to the retired servants of the Hudson's Bay Company, "and for no other use, intent or purpose whatsoever";

And whereas, after the granting of this deed in 1811, when the Hudson's Bay Company were hiring servants, it was very often specified in their contracts that at the expiration of their term of service a free grant of land would be given to each servant settling in the country, and many servants were hired and settled in the country by reason of this inducement. Many such retired servants received their grants of land, and many did not, and have not to this day;

And whereas, out of the 7,455,552 acres of land reserved for the retired servants of the Hudson's Bay Company under the deed from the Hudson's Company to the Earl of Selkirk on the twelfth of June, 1811, and reserved for no other use, intent or purpose whatsoever, only about 152,345 acres of land have been granted to said retired servants, leaving a balance of about 7,303,207 acres to be yet distributed among the retired servants and their descendants;

And whereas, the said retired servants who claim to be the *bona fide* owners of the land, have never conveyed their lands to the heirs of Lord Selkirk, the Hudson's Bay Company or to the Government of Canada;

And whereas, many of the persons entitled to these lands are residents of the Province of Saskatchewan;

And whereas, the veterans of the fur trade and their descendants are now petitioning the Parliament of Canada for the distribution among them of the said 7,303,207 acres.

Therefore let it be resolved:

That an humble Address be presented by this House to His Excellency the Governor General in Council praying that His Excellency will be pleased to cause an investigation to be made into the claims of the retired servants of the Hudson's Bay Company and their descendants as set forth in their petition to the Parliament of Canada with a view to securing an early settlement of the same.

On motion of Mr. Lamont, seconded by Mr. Haultain,

Ordered, That a copy of the foregoing Address of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan to His Excellency the Governor General be engrossed, signed by the Speaker and forwarded to His Honour the Lieutenant Governor through the proper channel for presentation to His Excellency.

The assent to this Bill was announced by the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly in the following words—

"In His Majesty's name, His Honour the Lieutenant Governor doth thank the Legislative Assembly, accepts their benevolence and assents to this Bill."

His Honour then delivered the following speech—

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY—

I am pleased to relieve you from further attendance upon the present session of the Legislative Assembly, which has been protracted beyond the period I anticipated when addressing you on the twenty-ninth day of last March.

The foundations of the Institutions of the Province have been laid and I am sure that you will all hope with me that the superstructure will be built in a worthy manner, one that will in the years to come redound to the credit of all who have any part therein.

You have applied yourselves with assiduity to the various measures that have been submitted to you, and I am certain that as these measures go into effect they will prove most beneficial.

I thank you for the liberal provision that has been made for the public service.

I take my leave of you in the earnest hope and trust that this most auspicious year may prove a true indication that, under Almighty guidance, this Province and its people are but upon the threshold of a long period of prosperity and Providential favour.

The Hon. Mr. Motherwell then said—

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY—

It is His Honour the Lieutenant Governor's will and pleasure that this Legislative Assembly be prorogued until it shall please His Honour to summon the same for the despatch of business, and the Legislative Assembly is accordingly prorogued.
